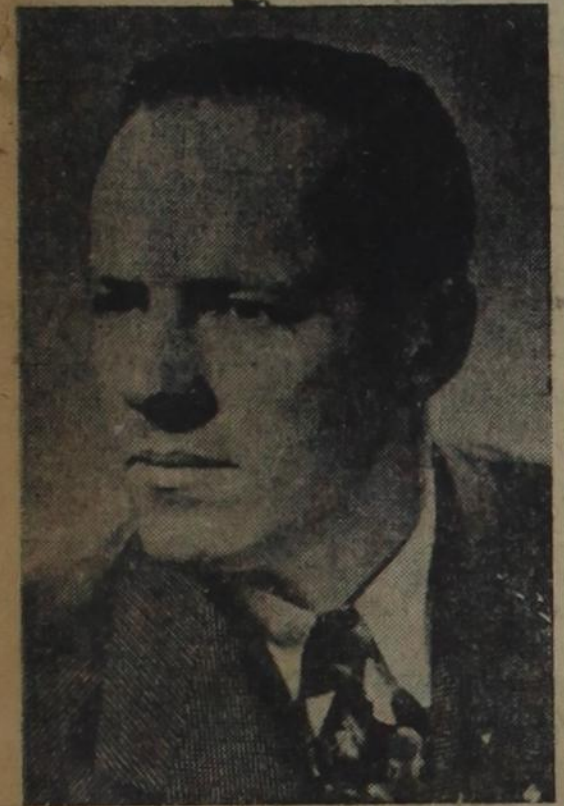

The banks presented the steer to the Eastland County Cattle Raisers Ass'n., sponsors of the show, to be sold and the proceeds applied to the improvement of the show plant.

The show drew the largest number of entries in many years, George Steel, president of the livestock association, said. Waverly Massengale of Eastland was the general superintendent.

The show opened with a parade through the Eastland business district Friday afternoon in which the Rising Star Roping Club was awarded first place and presented with a trophy.

Sold at Auction.

The remainder of the premium fat animals were sold at auction Saturday night at the Eastland Auction Barn, operated by D. S. Buchanan, Eastland, and Lloyd Coan, Stephenville.

In the fat lamb show, a Southdown cross exhibited by Frazier Clark of Rising Star was named champion of the Southdown and Southdown cross division; Truman Bacon of Cisco exhibited the champion medium wool mutton lamb and Larry Morrow of Carbon had the champion fine wool fat lamb.

The grand champion fat barrow of the show was a Duroc owned and exhibited by Nathan Files of Gorman. The reserve champion barrow was a Hampshire, belonging to Bo Caraway of Carbon.

In the breeding swine division, Park Plambeck Jr. of Cisco exhibited the champion female of the Duroc division. Also, she was named the reserve champion breeding female of the swine show.

FFA Chapter Wins.

A Yorkshire sow belonging to the Rising Star FFA Chapter was selected champion of other class of breeding swine and was also chosen grand champion female of the show. In the breeding beef cattle division, Ross Wilson, Gorman, executive secretary of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Assn., exhibited the grand champion female, a Hereford. The grand champion bull was a Hereford exhibited by Wesley Warren, also of Gorman.

The banks buying the grand champion calf were First State, Rising Star, Commercial State, Ranger, First National, Gorman, Eastland National, and First National, Cisco.

Dairy cattle, breeding sheep and goats were judged Friday. The champion dairy female was a Jersey, exhibited by Billy Horn of Olden; the champion fine wool breeding ewe belonged to Baylis Pope of Nimrod; the champion fine wool ram belonged to Joe Pope of Nimrod.

12-Unit Low Rent Project Bids Asked

Bids on the construction of a 12-unit Low Rent Housing project in Rising Star are scheduled to be opened at the City Hall here on Wednesday, April 27, at 2 p.m., according to an invitation for bids published this week in the Record.

The project will be of brick veneer construction, completely modern in design and architecture, and will represent an investment of approximately \$135,000. It will be built by the City of Rising Star under a contractual agreement with the Public Housing Administration whereby the units will be rented to tenants of low income at less than standard rentals.

Title to the project will be vested in the Housing Authority of the City of Rising Star, Texas, an agency of the municipal government whose five directors are appointed at regular intervals by the City Council.

The project will be financed by bonds sold to private investors and guaranteed by the FHA.

The project will be located on a tract on North Main purchased from the McDonald Estate. The houses contain from one to four bedrooms. Each house will be of a different colored brick and the site will be landscaped to enhance the attractiveness of the project.

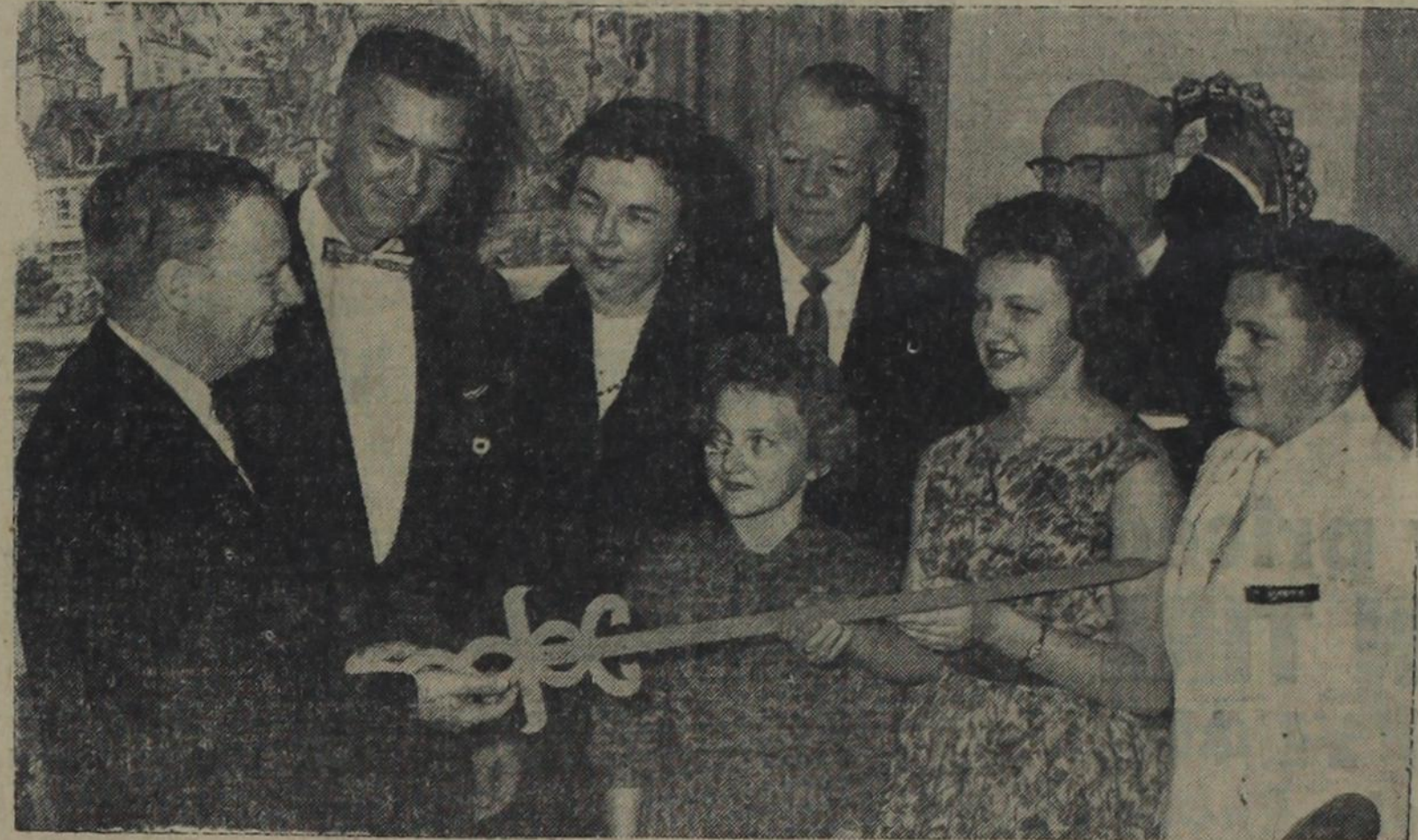
Attend State Meet of Rebekahs at Fort Worth

Cisco Petitioners Seek Beer Election

EASTLAND. — An application for a local option beer election petition was filed this week by a group of Cisco men. Sought is an election to legalize the sale of beer for off-premises consumption in the City of Cisco.

The petition signed by 11 Ciscoans, was accepted by County Clerk Johnson Smith, who issued dated forms Friday morning. Only 10 names were needed for the petition to be issued.

Under state law bearers of the petition must get 25 percent of the number of qualified voters who voted in the governor's race in 1956 to sign the petition before an election can be held. Records show that a total of 1,559 voters cast votes for the three candidates for governor in the general election that year in the Cisco voting precincts. That would mean the 389 signatures would be needed on the petition.

Census Takers to Be Easy to Identify

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying the takers of the 1960 Census of Population and Housing when they start their rounds on April 1, District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder pointed out today.

Each census taker will be provided with a red, white, and blue identification card to be worn on the lapel. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. Persons purporting to be Census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the Census office.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is brown and bears the legend, "1960 Census of the United States," printed in green ink. In the portfolio, the census taker carries his supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools of his trade.

Special steps are being taken in the 1960 Census of Population and Housing, which starts April 1, to make sure that all transients are counted.

Places such as large hotels, motels, and other accommodations for transient guests will be canvassed under a different procedure than the one used for regular household dwelling units.

Bobcat Bounty Is Raised to \$5.00 On April First

The County Commissioner's Court Monday raised the bounty to be paid on bobcats killed in Eastland county from \$3 to \$5 per head. The increase is effective on April 1, and cats on which the increase is paid must have been killed on or after April 1. Cats killed before April 1 will entitle the hunter to only \$3. The claimant must take the ears of the cat to the county auditor to receive payment and must make a statement that the kill was made in this county and give the date of the kill.

The court also authorized county participation in right-of-way purchase for about two miles of new highway from Sabanno west to the line of Callahan County, which will be the route of the new Coleman to Cisco state highway running through Cross Plains.

March 31 Last Date For Wool Subsidy

Wool and unshorn lambs must be sold by March 31, 1960, in order to be eligible for the 1959 subsidy payments, Emmett Powell, County ASC office manager, reminded this week.

If a grower has sold wool or unshorn lambs between the dates of the marketing year April 1, 1959 through March 31, 1960 and has not turned in the receipts to the ASC office, he should be sure to do so not later than April 30, 1960, said Mr. Powell. The receipts must be the original sales documents.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — ON July 1 an automatic increase in the postage rate on third class bulk mail goes into effect, unless the Post Office Department decides otherwise. IT IS supposed to have the effect of more nearly equalizing the cost of "throw-away" mail as related to first class. THERE IS concern, however,

that the drop in the volume of business may reduce revenues to the Post Office Department. For example, direct mail advertising was the only major advertising to suffer a drop in volume in 1959. First reports indicate a decline of almost 3 per cent from a \$1.8 billion business in 1958. THE OLD saying that most

Grassed Waterway Asset to Farm; Can Be Installed at Small Cost

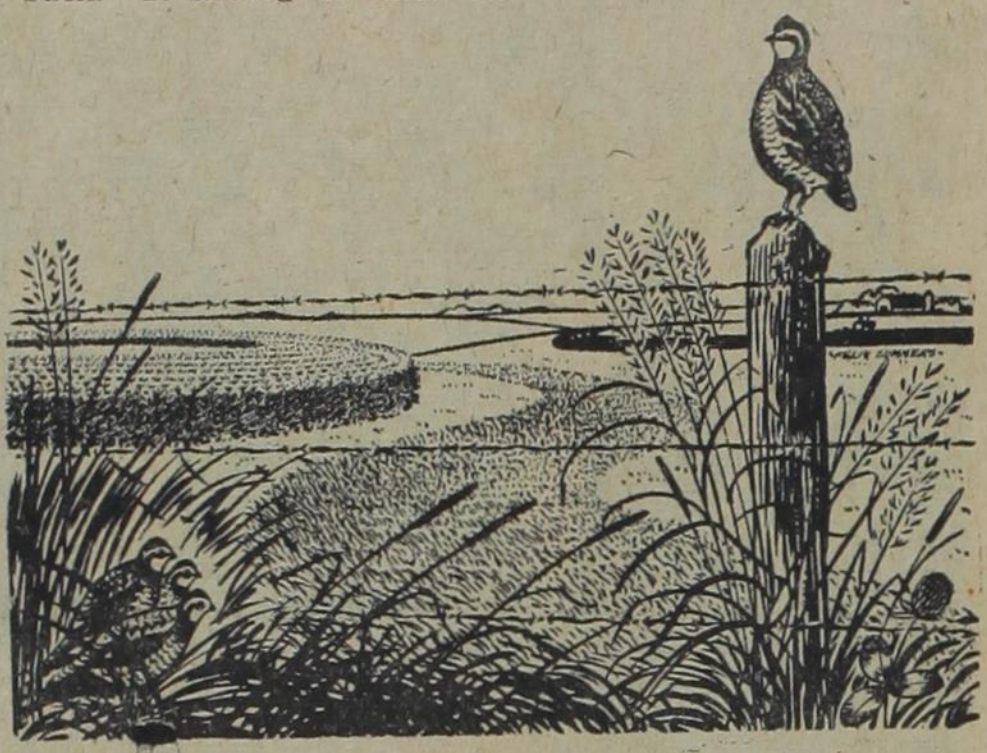
A waterway for handling water disposal safely is an asset to many farms in the Rising Star area according to Raymond Wade, local Soil Conservation Service technician.

Natural waterways can often be installed with little or no shaping costs and, can be utilized as pasture or meadow strips. Where shaping is needed, the work should be done early enough to allow seeding or sodding before summer arrives. The waterway should be mowed or shredded for weed control and until the desired grass cover is obtained. Usually the area in the waterway is the most productive land on the farm and should be treated as such. It should be man-

aged for maximum hay production or pasturage by fertilizing regularly and by controlling undesirable vegetation.

The County Agriculture Conservation Program offers cost share payments for waterway establishment. The Soil Conservation Service is equipped to give farmers guidance in the location, design, layout and in adapted vegetation.

A well planned and established water disposal system can help any farmer use more of the rain that falls on his land. While the water is on his land it belongs to him, but when it leaves his land in the form of run-off it belongs to someone else and he cannot reclaim it.

anything can be proved by figures is applicable to that \$4.2 billion surplus called for in the President's budget. As June 30, the end of the fiscal year, approaches, it looks less likely. As indicated earlier in this column, the figure was based on a number of "ifs," which include the raising of postage rates on first class mail and a further increase in the gasoline tax. Neither of those contingencies are likely to materialize. Incidentally, even if the budget should have a surplus this year, it would still mean that according to the figures our Government would show a deficit of \$14.8 billion during the last eight years. This figure results from taking \$7.6 billion in the years when there has been a surplus from \$22.4 billion over-all deficit.

INCIDENTALLY, THE present budget adds 30,000 new workers to the Government payroll.

ANOTHER ITEM which may further contribute to the unbalancing of the budget is the concern over the number of air crashes which have caused several hundred deaths since the first of the year. Funds to modernize major airports, and particularly flight control as-

istance, are likely to be increased from \$63 million to about \$200 million or more. The Federal Aviation Administration is attempting more strict regulation on the flights of certain commercial aircrafts, and may even ground some types of planes.

LEGISLATION AND regulations evidently are not keeping up with airplane developments. It is predicted that within eight years commercial aircraft will be traveling between 1,300 and 2,000 miles per hour — Texas to New York or California in less than one hour. There is strong indication, according to the experts, that the accidents which occurred with the turbo-props Electra were caused by great speed at high altitude. What happens to controls in the air and on the ground with planes traveling faster than the speed of sound? There is also the problem of the sonic booms, with which there has been considerable experience in Central West Texas.

Eradication of TB Is Possible Goal, Says Doctor

ABILENE. — Calling tuberculosis a "completely unnecessary scourge" Dr. James Perkins of New York City today told 350 physicians and TB workers that "We are now at the place where eradication of tuberculosis is an entirely possible goal in the U. S." The talk took place at the annual meeting of the Texas Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Perkins, managing director of the National Tuberculosis Association, brought the group the findings of experts who recently explored possibilities for complete TB control, which now is almost a reality in certain areas of the U. S. — the North Central and Northwest. It is not true in Texas. "A year ago," the physician stated, "those of us in the TB association and in the U. S. Public Health Service noted an increasing tendency to assume that the TB problem was solved, and to cut back on staff and appropriations at a time when an extra push was needed to take advantage of our newer tools to get rid of TB, once and for all. It took a year to get together necessary facts. Then 18 experts from across the U. S. — chest specialists, health officers, professors, bacteriologists, nurses, rehabilitation people, and others, met to digest these facts and make recommendations."

Conclusions, brought by Dr. Perkins, were adopted by the Texas Tuberculosis Association for its program for the coming year. Among them is a recommendation for initial hospitalization of all persons with contagious tuberculosis. Continuing hospitalization is recommended for those where home care is not adequate. Such hospitalization should not be terminated until the patient's disease is controlled and he is no longer contagious.

100 Million Dollar Drop in Texas Tourist Revenues Recorded in Year

AUSTIN. — The 1959 Texas Tourist Industry Report released by the State Highway Department today shows a 100-million-dollar drop in tourist expenditures within Texas in the past two years.

In 1959, Highway Department surveys indicate 9.6 million visitors spent \$431 million in Texas as compared to 1957 estimates of 10.3 million visitors and \$531 million spent.

Herbert C. Petry, Jr., Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission and Member of the Texas Development Board, expressed the hope that the new state advertising program would soon get under way in full force. He indicated that this program would be most effective in expanding the tourist crop and thereby preventing a further drop in tourist expenditures.

Petry explained that competition from other states for the tourist dollar was strenuous,

and that the Texas tourist industry was feeling the ill effects of more vigorous programs in other vacation states.

"Texas has been given the go-ahead to advertise both tourist and industrial attractions, and as soon as funds are provided we are ready to carry on a campaign for these out-of-state dollars. We are like a man with a few million acres of a fine product, but have not yet been able to get it marketed," Petry stated.

The Texas Tourist Report defined tourist dollars as new money earned elsewhere and brought into the community where it is then spent and re-spent into the local business cycle. Largest part of the tourist dollar is spent for food, lodging, and car upkeep. The average visitor in 1959 spent \$8.19 per day, and stayed 5.5 days in Texas.

Tourists themselves provide the records from which the
