# **County Tax Vote** Saturday

Eastland County will build a new jail. A United States Federal

Judge has ordered it. Voters on Saturday, Aug. 12, will decide how the new facility will be paid for.

Election Judge E. L. Gaines has announced that voting will be done at City Hall in Rising Star, Saturday, August 12th from 7 a.m. to 7

p.m. Mr. Kenneth Morrison will act as alternate judge. Also helping with the elction will be Mrs. Mary Claborn, Mrs. Inez Elliott, Mrs. Emma Jean Steel and Mrs. Rowena

Chambers.

On that day, voters in all county precincts will go to the polls and vote "for" or "against" a proposition, which if passed, would authorize the county to assess up to thirty cents a hundred valuation, for the county road and bride fund.

In effect, this will enable the county to transfer funds from the general funds to retire the necessary retirement to build the jail. An architect's mendation for a 25 bed facility adjacent to the present jail has been ap-

proved by the county court. In the event that the tax issue isn't passed, it is altogether possible that the county could be played under an order by the federal court which would require that certain amounts of money be placed in seperate funds to pay for the new facility. A number of towns in the county are familiar with such federal court orders, and labored under them for years, paying off old oil boom debts for capitol improvements, after defaute.

Also in the event of a turn down by voters, there would appear to be the distinct possiblity of a major property revaluation in order to provide the funds to pay for the jail. This would have widespread effect on many areas, not the least of which is school local fund assignment requirements.

County missioners Court has recently issued the following fact sheet regarding county finances:

One of the most important duties of the Eastland County Commissioners' Court is to manage the financial affairs of the county, and in so doing we must be reminded that the Texas Constitution is not valuation in any one year for the county's general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes. An amendment to the Texas Constitution allows an adtional 30 cents per \$100.00 value to be levied for Farmto-Market Lateral Road and Flood Control purposes. This additional tax may not be levied except by a majority vote of the voters of the county. The rapidly increasing

costs of maintaining the county roads and bridges has made it necessary to secure additional revenues. Inflation is the biggest cause of increasing costs; some examples: the cost of a road grader has increased from \$19,000.00 in 1964 to approximately \$50,000.00 in 1976; steel grader blades from 75 cents per linear foot to \$3.50 per linear foot; diesel fuel from 17 cents per gallon to 45 cents per gallon and gasoline from 23 cents per gallon to 50 cents per p

The Texas Legislature, within the past few years, has passed legislation taking away Governmental Immunity from Political subdivisions; this requires the purchase of costly liablity insurance coverage; also the Legislature passed legislation requiring governmental bodies

acquire Workman's Compensation coverage; the cost of this insurance coverage for a county road worker is approximately \$12.00 for each \$100.00 in wages, this would mean that a worker receiving a salary of \$500.00 per month would have an insurance premium of \$60.00 per month. These examples must be considered in light of the fact that there has been no general increase in tax sources or revenues, with the exception of Federal Revenue Sharing. Federal Revenue Sharing was a tremendous aid to county finances, it is generally believed that it further fueled the fires of inflation.

this method of road and bridge financing are: to increase present property tax values; if this is done, these increased values would have to be taxed at the present 80 cents per hundred dollars value plus an additional 12 cents per hundred dollars value, which is the state tax rate and the state taxes are sent to Austin, whereas is the 30 cents county road and bridge tax is approved, all of the revenue will remain in Eastland County for the use and the benefit of citizens of Eastland County.

If and when this replacement occurs, it will be of primary importance that Eastland County finances be on a sound and solvent basis in order to receive good ratings on the marketing of either general obligation bonds or time warrants. Eastland County has never defaulted on the the payment of a debt or obligation; and at this time, has no bounded or warranted indebtedness; and the only outstanding obligations are for the microfilming of County Clerk's records and

machinery which are being paid for out of current revenues and operating funds. Within the past few years, the County has paid off the remaining balance of \$100,000.00 time warrant issued for the purpose of right-of-way for Highway 80 when it was made a four-lane highway through Eastland County and the last of the \$40,000.00 time warrants which were issued for the purpose of remodeling and air conditioning the quarters of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.
