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VETERAN RANGER DIES AT HOME AT COLEMAN

John R. Bannister, sheriff of Coleman county, ex-Texas ranger and long time inspector for the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, died Friday night at Coleman of paralysis. The pioneer westerner was stricken several days ago and never recovered.

Bannister was one of the most picturesque figures in West Texas. In July 1879, with a party of Texas rangers, fought an engagement with the notorious outlaw, Sam Bass, at Round Rock. Bass was mortally wounded and the next day was captured.

Several years ago Bannister was made a life member of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association.

In relating his experiences, Bannister was very modest. "I was among those present," was about all he usually had to say regarding many thrilling episodes and fights with cattle thieves throughout West Texas.

The veteran peace officer and cattle-man is survived by two sons, both now in the United States army. Capt. John R. Bannister Jr., is in France with the Ninetieth Division. Capt. Neill H. Bannister is with the Thirty-Sixth Division, now enroute to France.

SHELTON BEATY HERO IN FRANCE

Austin, Texas, July 30.—The story of how a Texas boy of 22 years died in the fighting on the western front recently, with a toll of six Huns dead and one wounded around him, has come to Judge Ed R. Kone of Austin. The boy was Charley Beaty, a cousin to Judge Kone, and was born in Goldthwaite, but was living in Oklahoma at the time of enlistment.

The story as cabled by the colonel to young Beaty's relatives here is that the boy was cut off from his comrades in the course of the fierce hand-to-hand fighting, and died rather than surrender. When the American troops cleared the ground, young Beaty was dead with six dead Germans near and one so badly wounded he could not get away.

The fight had been witnessed by some of Beaty's comrades who were so hard pressed themselves they could not go to his aid. The gallant American soldier fought with an automatic pistol.

Judge Kone has two grandsons and twelve nephews in the army, and the number of cousins in the army runs to about twenty-five. Many of them are in France, and Judge Kone is proud of the record of his family.

Mrs. Willie Sanderson Moore, wife of John H. Moore, district clerk, died Tuesday morning and was buried in the Odd Fellows Cemetery Wednesday. Rev. Z. V. Liles pastor of the Methodist church conducted the funeral services from the residence of Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Sanderson, parents of deceased.

Mrs. Moore had been a sufferer for a long time, but bore her trials with a heroic fortitude. She was a native of this town and everyone knew her only to love her. She was a sweet, christian character, loved and lovable. A husband and two small children are left surviving.

Many people of San Saba county are now glad to testify that every promise in the young, docile character of Pidgeon was redeemed in a life of usefulness and unselfish service.

Youth Desiring to Volunteer Into the Army Must have Age Certificates With Them.

By the new order received from the War Department, Washington, D. C., all young men under the registration age must bring with them a sworn affidavit, signed by their father or mother, or legal guardian stating the month, date, and year they were born. They must have this before they can be accepted at the U. S. Army Recruiting Station 403 1-2 Austin Street, Waco. This order has been issued, because of minors getting into the service, also to avoid unnecessary expense to the Government, and to save annoyance to the troops in the field, in subsequent discharge of such men. It is declared that all young men thinking of volunteering to serve their country, will bring this affidavit with them, so to save them a lost journey, by having to return home for it. It takes but a little time to have the statement made out by a notary public and signed by the parents.

Men from 18 to 21 years, and from 31 to 40 can volunteer now into the regular army. NO MAN IN THE DRAFT AGE WILL BE ACCEPTED AS A VOLUNTEER. The following branches are now open for volunteers:

Infantry, Cavalry, Field Artillery, Medical Department and the Quartermaster Corps for bakers and cooks only.

It is of aluminum, about two inches in diameter and a little less than a quarter of an inch in thickness.—Commanche Chief.

Somewhere in France, June 20, 1918

Dear Friend White:— Having just had one of the happiest meetings that ever occurred in France with your "Bill," I just want to say to you and Mrs. White that you have no reason to worry about your samic, the army has done wonders for him and the name "skeeter" will never be offered to him again. Today he is one of the best specimens of young manhood I ever saw. He must weigh 175 pounds. I am the only San Saba boy that he has seen since he has been over here, and he is the only one I have put my peepers on since I left San Antonio. To describe the meeting it would take more paper than I am allowed to use; any way we were marching into a town and the first soldier I saw was Bill. I yelled and he yelled; I am not sure which one saw the other first anyway it was one glad surprise to us both, for believe me when you see one of your old pal's over here you want to grab him around the neck. We have been together practically all the time since my arrival to this town and we will probably be together for some time as our Hospital will probably be located here. You people over there don't need to worry about us just send more men and more material and we are all dandy. You should hear Bill and I talk French, we both do a little with our tongues and "Heep much" with our hands. But we can say enough to get what we want.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 14 day of August 1918 at Post Oak Grove school house in Common School District No. 1, of this county, as established by order of the Commissioners' Court of this County, of date the 10th day of December, 1913, which is recorded in Book H, pages 105, of the Minutes of said Court, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property taxpaying voters of that district desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the School Fund to said district, and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this County shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually, a tax of not to exceed the rate of 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property in said district for said purpose.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of said State and County, and who are resident property taxpayers in said district, shall be entitled to vote at said election.


