## SAN SABA'S POET "THE STAR GAZER" IN FRANCE

### How The Texans Went "Over The Top."

Chaource, Aube, Jan. 10, 1919. Mr. W. D. Cowan

San Saba, Texas. Dear Sir and Friend:—

Since there's no more fighting to do we American Soldiers left in France are a home-sick bunch. We are on our sixth month in France and it seems we are due to remain here for several weeks yet.

I am sure you have read all about the good showing our Division made on the Champagne front, from Oct. 8th to Oct. 31st. Our brigade, composed of the 141st and 142nd Infantry Regiments and the 132nd Machine-gun Battalion, hit the front line Tuesday Oct. 8th at 5:30 a.m. Although new at fighting, they captured a hill in 35 minutes. That the 2nd American Division (composed of marines and regulars,) failed to capture in three days trials, and two days later, the men from Texas and Oklahoma had driven the Hun from the heights above the Somme Py back to the Aisne river, a distance of over 23 miles. When our bunch went over the top for the first time they let out a series of yells, that must have curdled the blood in the veins of the most fearless German.

It used to be that American band-men acted as letter bearers on the front. This was real honest-to-goodness labor and dangerous, at that, for Jerry fired on non-combatants as well as on combatants. So many bands were crippled that an order came out to the effect that no more American band-men would act as letter-bearers. This order was received just before our Division moved to the front, so you can see how lucky we were. As it was, we put in some hardwork salvaging equipment, ammunition, etc. on the battlefield, and we were under shell-fire a number of times.

Our Division is in an area less than a hundred miles southeast of Paris, in the department of Aube. This part of France is not subjected to severe winters, for we haven't had much freezing weather, although we had snow on Christmas-day. Vegetables are still growing in gardens, and although most of the trees are bare, the grass is just as green as San Saba grass in the spring.

Our regimental P. C. is at Chaource, a town of about 2000 people but which has no railroad. This is the largest and best town we have billeted in since coming over. The band billet is a block from a most famous and ancient church which was started in the XIII century and finished before Columbus started on the western voyage that made him famous. The carvings and statuary on the interior of the building are both beautiful and wonderful. In the basement is a life-size group, showing the body of Christ—laid out after the crucifixion. Roman soldiers are on guard, and gathered about His body are those who loved Him, with Mary standing by His head. The expression of sorrow and pity on the faces of the women are almost human in appearance.

Our forty-piece band is better than ever and has a fine reputation. We are kept busy, going from battalion to battalion giving concerts for the dough-boys. We are now at the 3rd. battalion in the village of Pargues.

We hike wherever we go—packs on our backs—and it is nothing for us to shake off 25 K a day. There are rail-roads in France, but we don't use them to ride on. When we came from the Verdun front, we were ten days hiking. We ate our Thanksgiving dinner of corned-willie, bread and coffee on the side of a muddy road in a cold

drizzling rain, and finished our long hike that night at Survanne.

If I ever get back to the states and decide to go some where I'm going to throw a couple of blankets over my shoulders, put a can of tomatoes in my pocket and start hiking down the road. I have learned that to pay rail-road fare, is an unnecessary waste of money.

Ellison is O. K. but mighty thin. Beasley is fat and noisy as ever. My best regards to you, and please remember me most kindly to all those warm-hearted San Saba people.

## HOUSE KILLS HOMESTEAD AMENDMENT

Austin, Tex., Feb. 3.—By a vote of 45 to 32 the house today refused to have printed the favorable minority report of the house committee on constitutional amendments on the house joint resolution proposing an amendment to the homestead provision of the state constitution. This action of the house practically means the death of this measure which is generally known as the federal land bank amendment and which would permit persons to borrow money on their homesteads for making improvements and buying seed. This measure was recommended by the governor.

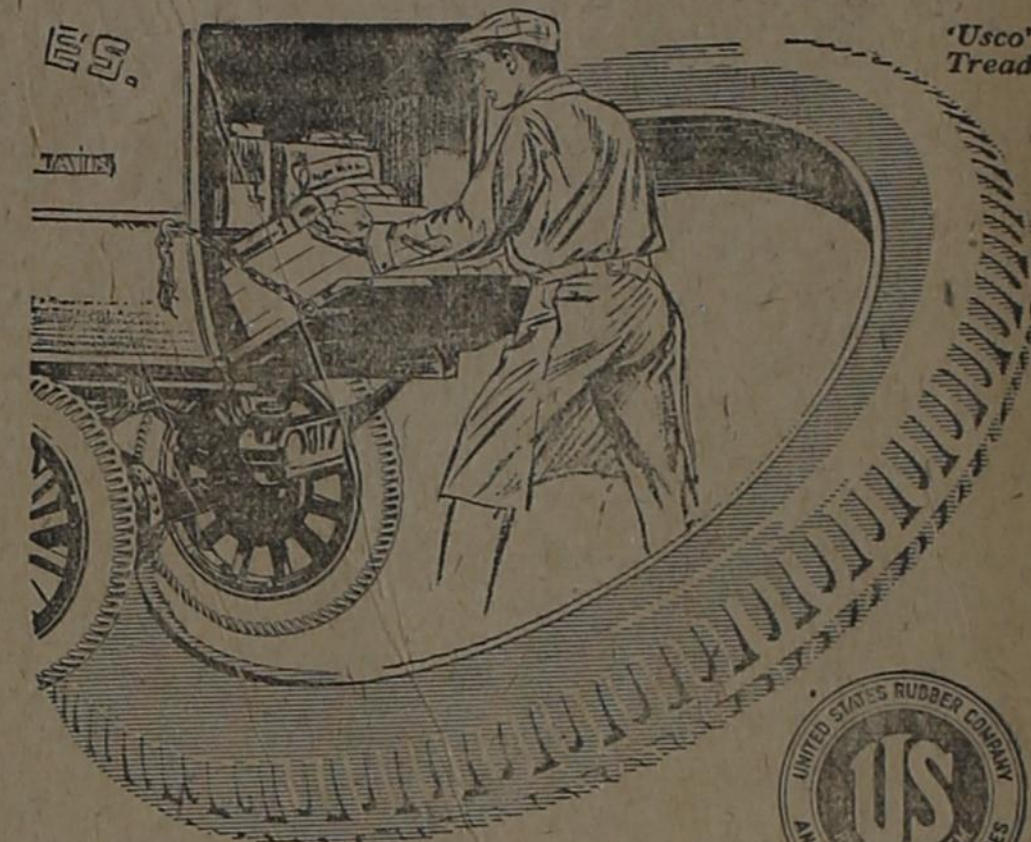

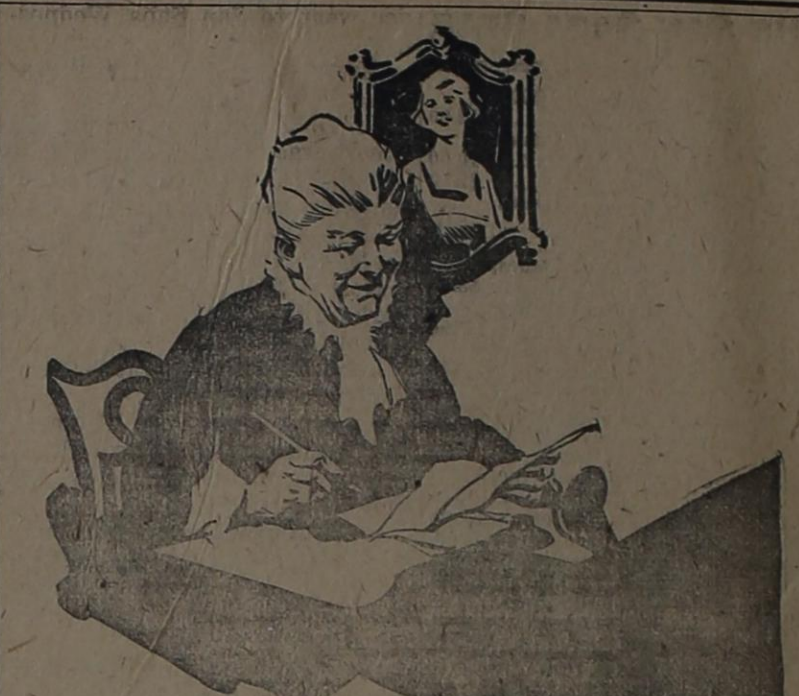

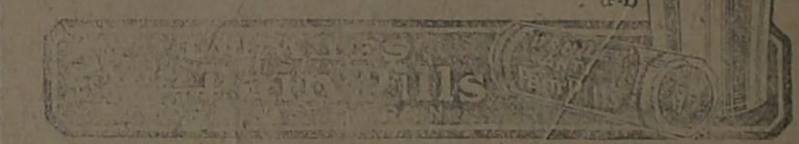
