





Austin, Texas, May 6 .- The attor-

ney general's department has given out a construction of the woman's suffrage law in several particulars. It is held that the provision of the act requiring women who reside outside of cities and towns of 10,000 population and over to register as a qualification to participate in the 1918 primaries is unconstitutional and void.

Not Required to Register

This holding is predicted on Section 35, Article 3, of the constitution that requires the subject matter of a bill to be expressed in the title and that renders void any subject of a bill not expressed in the title. The title to this bill only mentions the purpose of the legislature to require registration of women who resided in cities of 10,000 and over. The body of the bill not only requires women who reside in such cities to register, but, also requires all women residing in other precincts to register as a qualification to vote in the 1918 primaries. The opinion of the attorney general is that this portion of the bill requiring women residing out of such cities to register, not being mentioned in the caption but really being contradictory of and inconsistent with the caption, is void and that, therefore, 2,008.21 the only women who are compelled to population and over.

Women required to register shall present themselves in person at the tax collector's office in the county seat of the county and in her own hand writing fill out the blank necessary to secure their registration receipt.

If a woman should be unable to read and write the English language it will be impossible for her to register as this contingency is not provided for in the law. She is not authorized to delegate another authority to fill out the necessary blanks.



Mrs. L. Taylor died at her home in Brownwood Tuesday and was buried here Wednesday. A fuller notice will appear next week.







SIGN PLEDGE TO CARRY OUT FOOD ADMINISTRATION PROGRAM.

Explain New Wheat Ruling to Thousands of Customers-Insures Greater Food Saving.

enthusiastically the 50-50 basis for the purchase of wheat flour and are doing their utmost to explain the new regulation to the housewife. This ruling by the U.S. Food Administration requires each purchaser of wheat flour to buy one pound of cereal substitute, one kind or assorted, for every pound of wheat flour. It was necessary to restrict the use of wheat flour in order that the allies and our fighting forces abroad might be assured of an adequate supply of wheat to meet their vital needs. This supply must come from our savings because we have already sent our normal surplus.

Wheat saving pledge cards were for warded by the Food Administration to all retail food merchants, and these are being signed and posted in stores throughout the country. This card states, "We pledge ourselves loyally to carry out the Food Administration program. In accordance with this order we will not sell any wheat flour except where the purchaser buys an equal weight of one or more of the following. a greater use of which in the home will save wheat:

"Cornmeal, corn flour, edible corn ' starch, hominy, corn grits, barley flour, potato flour, sweet potato flour, soy bean flour, feterita flour and meals, rice, rice flour, oatmeal, rolled oats and buckwheat flour."

For instance, if any mixed flour is purchased containing 60 per cent. wheat flour and 40 per cent. substitutes it is necessary that an additional 20 per cent, of substitutes be pur chased. This brings it to the basis of one pound of substitutes for each pound of wheat flour.

A special exemption may be granted upon application in the case of specially prepared infants' and invalids' food containing flour where the necessity is shown.

Some misunderstanding seems to exist on the part of consumers in assuming that with the purchase of wheat flour one must confine the additional 50 per cent, purchase to one of the substitutes. This is not the case. One may select from the entire range of substitutes a sufficient amount of each to bring the total weight of all substitutes equal to the weight of the wheat flour purchased. For instance, if a purchase of 24 pounds of wheat flour is made a range of substitutes may be selected as follows:

Cornmeal, 8 pounds; corn grits, 4 pounds; rice, 4 pounds; buckwheat, 2 pounds; corn starch, 1 pound; hominy, 2 pounds; rolled oats, 3 pounds.

These substitutes may be used in the following manner:

Cornmeal, 8 Pounds.-Corn bread, no flour; corn muffins or spoon bread, one-fourth flour or one-third rice or one-third hominy; 20 per cent. substitutes in whole bread.

Corn Starch, 1 Pound.—Thickening gravy, making custard, one-third substitute in cake.

Corn Grits, 4 Pounds,-Fried like mush, used with meal in making corn

Rolled Oats, 3 Pounds .- One-fourth to one-third substitutes in bread, onehalf substitute in muffins; breakfast porridge, use freely; oatmeal cookies.

Buckwheat Flour, 2 Pounds .- Onefourth substitute in bread, buckwheat

Hominy, 2 Pounds.-Boiled for dinner, baked for dinner, with cheese

Rice, 4 Pounds .- One-fourth substitute in wheat bread, one-third substitute in corn bread, boiled for dinner (a bread cut), as a breakfast food, to thicken soups, rice pudding instead of





ALLIES DEMAND MORE CEREALS

American Meat Restrictions Relaxed to Effect Greater Wheat Savings.

ARGENTINE ARRIVALS SHORT.

Meat Supply Here Considerably Enlarged — Food Administration, However, Warns Against. Waste.

The allies have made further and increased demands for breadstuffs, these enlarged demands being caused to some degree by shortage in arrivals from the Argentine. It is, therefore, necessary for the U.S. Food Administration to urge a still further reduction in the consumption of bread and breadstuffs generally if we are to meet our export necessities. The Food Administration has issued a statement explaining the situation in detail, particularly the reasons which lead it, for the purpose of centering effort for the time being upon the cereal situation to relax temporarily the restrictions on meat consumption.

Experience shows, this statement says, that the consumption of bread stuffs is intimately associated with the consumption of meat. For various reasons our supplies of meat for the next two or three months are considerably enlarged, and we can supply the allies with all of the meat products which transportation facilities render possible and at the same time somewhat increase our own consumption. In these circumstances the Food Administration considers it wise to relax the voluntary restrictions on meat consumption to some extent with a view to further decreasing bread consump-

Conservation of food must be adjusted to meet necessities from time to time, for neither production, nor allied demands are constant factors, nor can any of these factors be anticipated for long periods in advance in the disturbed conditions in which we at present live. While the world situation is not one that warrants any relaxation in the efforts to eliminate waste or to relax economy in food, the Admiration desires to secure better the ment in food balances.

So long as the present continue the only special restriction we ask are the beefless and porkless

The meatless meal and the porkless Saturday are no longer asked.


The farmers of the United States are responding to the national call to increase hog production. Their increase, to all appearances, is being attained more rapidly. Of more immediate importance, however, are several complex factors which have effected an immediate increase in meat supplies

The transportation shortage before the government took over the railroads, the bad weather in January and early in February, the large percentage of immature corn in the last harvest and the necessity of feeding this corn as rapidly as possible to save it from decay, have not only resulted in backing up the animals-particularly hogs-on the farms for a longer period of feeding, but have resulted in a great increase in their average weight and will result, with improved transportation conditions, which already appear, in larger than normal arrivals at market for the next two or three months. The weight of hogs coming to the market for the past two weeks indicates an increase in weight of from an average of 203 pounds last year to the almost unprecedented average of 232 pounds, or a net increase in their meat value of over 15 per cent. This is a distinct addition to the nation's meat supply. It there fore now seems certain that we have such enlarged supplies for at least increase our exports to the allies to the full extent of their transportation facilities, but at the same time can properly increase our domestic

The response of the public to our requests for reduced consumption of meat during the past few months has been most gratifying, and this service alone has enabled the government during this period to provide such supplies as transportation to the allies

The Administration also suggests that in those parts of the country where the old fashioned home preser vation of pork is still the custom, this practice should be extended at the present time, as it will relieve the burden upon transportation to and from the packing houses and is economical ly sound as saving the cost of packing operations and at the same time will provide home supplies of pork to last

The Food Administration desires to repeat that it does not want to give the impression that these are times when simplicity and moderation of living are not critically necessary, but that its sole desire is to secure an adjustment between our different food supplies and meet changing conditions from time to time and to keep the public fully and frankly advised of its position with the full confidence and reliance that whenever it becomes necessary renewed appeals for saving will met the same loyal response as in the

Sentiment is supposed to be a stranger in the armed camp. But the supposition is not borne out by the following communication published throughout Camp Travis two days before Mothers' Day:

"General Pershing has issued the following order to all units of the American Expeditionary Forces in France: 'May 8-To all Commanding Officers: I wish every officer and Wholesale and retail grain, Hay and soldier in the American Expeditionary Forces would write a letter home on Mothers' Day. This is a little thing for each one to do but those letters will carry back our courage and affection to the patriotic women whose love and prayers inspire us and cheer us on to victory, Pershing.' The Secretary of War most heartily approves the foregoing and desire to urge upon every officer and soldier in the army that he emulate the example of the soldiers in France by writing a letter home on Mothers' Day, May 12th."

Indications are that the appeal found a ready response in the hearts of the Camp Travis men, most of whom are comparatively recent arrivals from civilian life, and a number of whom have just come into the National army. 





Governor Receives Aero Route Letter

PRESIDENT OF THE AERO CLUB SENDS GREETING ON FIRST TRIP OF SERVICE.

Austin, Texas, May 18 .- Governor Hobby today received his first letter dispatched by airplane. The envelope bore the distinctive "Air Mail Service" postmark and the new 24c stamp for such service. The postmark also noted "first trip." The letter was dispatched from New York to Washington and then by rail to Texas. It was mailed in New York on May 15, reaching Austin this morning, which is fast time. The stamp cancellation shows two widespread wings, with the words, "Via Airplane Mail." The stamp base is red, with an airplane in blue color in the center. The letter was signed by Alan R. Hawley, president of the Aero Club of America, who wrote:

"The Aero Club of America sends you a message of greeting by the first aero post leaving New York for Washington.

"We sincerely hope and confidently believe that the aerial route inaugurated between New York, Philadelphia and Washington, which carries this message to you, is the forerunner of a network of aero mail lines which will cover the entire world and will be a dominant factor in the reconstruction that will follow the war.

"The rapid development of flying over the land will soon be followed by extensive flights over the sea, and we will soon have large airplanes crossing the Atlantic, which will lead to the establishing of trans-Atlantic aerial mail lines, as well as the delivery of airplanes from the United States to our allies by air.

"We extend our most hearty congratulations upon the inaugurating of airplane mail service, thus adding the facilities of aerial navigation to another great department of the Government. 

5th, 1918, will be about ten per cent of the total registration on June 5th, 1917; in other words, we can roughly estimate that about forty thousand boys will register on that day in Texas. * * * Every person of the designated age will be required to register under the supervision of the Local Board having jurisdiction of the area in which he permanently resides." Regulations for registration of June 5th, 1918, are yet to be issued. Further information in the matter will be given in later bulletins.

6. General Induction Call No. 564 has been received. Under this call two men will be entrained on one of the five days beginning the 29th instant for Fort Sam Houston, Texas. This call is for white men in Class 1, Groop A, only. The call is a national one and includes 50,000 men. This amount added to the 233,000 men covered by the three other general induction calls now pending makes 283,000 men due to be mobilized during the month throughout the nation, his amount being exclusive of the total number of men specially inducted

7. No new voluntary induction calls have been announced for over two months and no former ones have been in effect during such period. Call No. X, which authorizes inductions, is still in force.
