Cherokee Bond Election Is Held Valid

Judge N. T. Stubbs held a special session of the district court at San Saba last Friday and Saturday. He was accompanied here by Capt. Hammond, district attorney.

The case of L. W. Barker et al, contestors vs. A. B. Wilson, county attorney, contestee, is the style of the case. The contest is over the legality of the school bond election recently held in the Cherokee common school district. The commissioners court canvassed the returns and declared the bonds carried.

Judge Stubbs heard the evidence and arguments of counsel and then held that the election is valid, thus upholding the commissioners court. Contestors gave notice of appeal to the higher courts.

Messrs Barker and others were represented by Walker & Burleson, and the contestee was represented by Flack & Flack.

Committee Rejects Mansion Deficiency

Austin, Feb. 15.—The subcommittee of the finance committee of the house has refused to allow \$2,850 deficiency in the appropriations for the governor's mansion as requested by Governor Ferguson. This includes \$2,550 for fuel, lights, groceries, etc. and \$300 for labor.

It says the expenses of the mansion shows "a total expenditure of \$4,316.46 for the fiscal year Sep. 1, 1915, to August 31, 1916, for groceries, meats, vegetables, butter and eggs, laundry, feed, cakes and bread, milk and cream, automobile parts and repairs, gasoline and oil, ice, water and light, telephone, wood and coal, stationery, cut flowers, unkelele and music, tea and coffee, brick ice cream, mints, fruits, etc., express, etc., none of which it was said, can legally be paid out of public funds under the constitution which allows only "the use and occupation of the governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture."

It says further that the amount made by the legislature was not in toto completely expended for the purpose originally intended and recommends that none of \$2,850 asked in the deficiency be allowed. A favorable minority report will be made.

Odd Fellows Buy Building and Lot

Messrs Rector & Rector sold last week for Mrs. Maud Callan of San Antonio to John Seiders, for Alpha Lodge, No. 204, I. O. O. F. the lot and two-story stone building situated in the center of the block on the north side of the public square, known as the W. K. Ray building, now occupied by Mrs. Hart for the Queen Hotel. The price paid was \$3,100.00 cash.

The building is 30x70 feet and it is the intention of the Odd Fellows to put in a modern front to the building, build the necessary partitions in the second story for a first-class lodge room, with ante rooms, and banquet hall, and to move into the building some time this year.

The lower or first floor will be fitted up for a business house and be rented separate from the other part of the building. Trustees T. C. Henry, S. T. Taylor and R. S. Crain are now having parties getting up estimates of the cost of remodeling the building and work will begin in a short time.

RECEIVER REFUSED

In the case of C. W. Hall vs. The San Saba Marble Co. last Saturday Judge Stubbs refused to appoint a receiver as prayed for by Hall. The case was tried in the special session of district court.

Plaintiff Hall excepted to the judgment of the court and gave notice of appeal.

Berlin, Feb. 18, by wireless to Sayville.—It is officially announced that one German submarine within twenty-four hours sank one auxiliary cruiser of 20,000 tons gross, two auxiliary cruisers or transport steamers of 13,000 tons each and one transport steamer of 4,600 tons. Six steamers and one sailing vessel, totaling 25,000 tons were sunk Feb. 13. One steamer carried 1,000 tons of hay, 1,500 tons of wheat and 2,000 tons of oats, and another carried kerosene for England. A submarine has brought in three captains, two engineers and one wireless operator as prisoners. Two of the tank steamers were armed.

If war is coming it means that this is the time to raise less cotton and more of something to eat. Wheat can be planted as late as March 1st, and from 15 to 20 bushels to the acre made. Lay off furrows as for corn, about 2 1-2 feet apart. Sow wheat thin in furrow, about one peck to the acre. Cover with harrow. Cultivate after each rain with harrow or small plow. Most any corn planter can be arranged to plant wheat.

An Interesting Military Career. First Service on the Firing Line Experienced in Cuba

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 19. Gen. Frederick Funston, commander of the southern department since February, 1915, died suddenly at the St. Anthony hotel here tonight, a few minutes after he had finished dinner. He collapsed while seated in the lobby of the hotel talking with friends, and was playing with little Inez Silverberg of Des Moines, Iowa, a guest with her parents at the hotel, when he fell unconscious. Death was almost instantaneous.

General Funston was 51 years old. Ever since March, 1916, when he was placed in command of all United States force of the Mexican border, Gen. Funston had worked at an unusual pace.

Besides his wife, General Funston is survived by three children, Frederick Jr., 10; Barbara, 8, and Elizabeth, 8 months old.

He didn't mention it in his letter, but he found "Booger Hill" on route three almost impassable. These carriers are doing a great public service; they are doing a faithful public service. They deserve the utmost consideration. The better the roads the better the service which they can give. The bad roads are a hindrance not only to the carrier individually but to the service. And the service belongs to the patrons.

IT SEEMS TO US THAT GOVERNOR Ferguson needs to pray for deliverance from his friends. His friends in the state senate, who refused to allow an investigation of public charges, amounting almost to impeachment, and which are of record in the Senate Journal, have thus cast a stronger suspicion on his official integrity than all the campaign charges and persistent rumors of all his opponents for the past two years. We have no confidence in investigations. They are a waste of the people's money usually. An investigation usually amounts to a whitewash. In fact we do not now call to mind a political investigation in state or nation which has accomplished more than the elevation of some unknown politician to public place or favor. However, when an official with a public trust refuses, or permits his friends to refuse, the light to be turned on his official records the darkness grows darker and the grounds for suspicion are materially increased. What the Governor's friends really did last week was to turn off the light instead of turn on the light. Governor Ferguson spoke the truth when he said: "if they are true then I ought not to be governor. If they are not true, then the man who made these charges ought to resign from this Senate and acknowledge before God and man that he is unworthy of being an American citizen." According to the Dallas Morning News of Wednesday, Feb. 14, Senator Johnson accepted this challenge and put the Governor and his friends in-

to a most unenviable position. Here is the News' report: "Mr. Johnson said that he wanted to bring books, papers and witnesses from all over the state to testify to the truth or falsity of these rumors, in order that the truth might be known, adding that he did not believe the Governor could afford to sidestep the investigation and that he did not want him to, but wanted him to submit to it to clean his name if he is blameless. The evidence before me has been such that I, a citizen of this state, believed the rumors were true, and I now believe they are true," said Mr. Johnson, "and I dare him and his friends to come to such a trial." The News has never supported Governor Ferguson but he is now the governor of this state and the honor of the state is in his keeping. A charge against the Governor put in such strong language as Senator Johnson used is a charge against the honor of the state. We are always slow to believe campaign thunder or charges against a public official. It is so easy to charge a public officer with wrong doing. But it is another thing to prove it. Senator Johnson should be made to put up or shut up. The light should be turned on. He should be made to prove his charges against Gov. Ferguson or else be branded with ignominy and carry to his grave the contempt of decent men, who love the honor of Texas. There is something rotten in Denmark. Let's have the light,

County Good Roads Association Organized

One of the events of the joint meeting of the three good roads associations of the county, held last Saturday night at the District Court Room, an account of which being given in another column of this paper, was the formation of a county good roads association. The local good roads associations that will make up its initial membership are those of San Saba, Richland Springs and Bend. This matter was put through at the close of the joint meeting mentioned, R. W. Burleson and H. C. Coryell being elected temporary chairman and temporary secretary, respectively, of the meeting. At first there was some question as to whether or not a permanent organization should be formed that night, W. J. Millican leading the members from the Bend Association in their effort to perfect permanent organization at once. They carried their point, and on motion, Chairman Burleson appointed a committee of three, composed of Judge W. A. Smith, of the San Saba Association, J. R. McAtee, of the Richland Springs Association, and D. F. Moore of the Bend Association, to make nominations for permanent officers of the association for the first year. This committee nominated R. W. Burleson, of the San Saba Association, for President; T. J. Murray, of the Richland Springs Association for First Vice-President; D. F. Moore, of the Bend Association, for Second Vice-President; and H. C. Coryell of the San Saba Association, for Secretary-Treasurer; and these four gentlemen were elected by acclamation. President Burleson then, in accordance with a motion to that effect, appointed a committee of at least two members from each of the three associations to draw up a constitution and by-laws for the county association and report at the next meeting of the county association, naming A. V. Riley, Chairman, and Mitch Johnson, H. C. Coryell, J. R. McAtee, R. A. Gardner, W. F. Lewis, and L. T. Doss on this committee.

The hour being late and there being no other matters for the newly created association to take up that night, the meeting was adjourned till the date of the next regular meeting of the San Saba Association, the first Thursday in March, which latter meeting will be merged with this second meeting of the county association.

This next meeting will be an important one. Aside from the adoption of the constitution and by-laws of the association, there will be a general consideration given the question that came up at the joint meeting last Saturday night and an effort will be made to arrive at some definite plan of procedure. Hence every member of the three associations who can manage to be present should be there.

The good roads associations of the county have now accomplished something they have been planning for some months—the organization of a county association made up of themselves and of other local associations yet to be formed, and they should now be able to carry out the larger work that has called for a county organization, which means the spreading of good roads sentiment throughout the county, and the co-operation with the County Commissioners Court in planning a road system for the county and arriving at the best method to follow in raising road funds and the best plan to follow in road repair and maintenance work and new road work; and, so far as out-of-the-county work is concerned, directly and through the State Association ascertaining what adjoining counties have done along these lines and what they propose to do, with the view that their trans-county roads when connected with those of this county will form a continuous stretch of good roads of such a length as to work to the advantage of this county when trans-state highways are mapped out by the State Highway Commission. This is indeed a larger work and will call for the assistance and cooperation of all good roads advocates in the county, and all who are just now appreciating this fact should align themselves with the good roads associations of the county without delay.

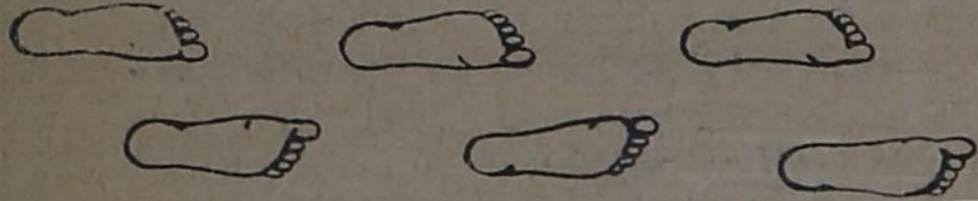

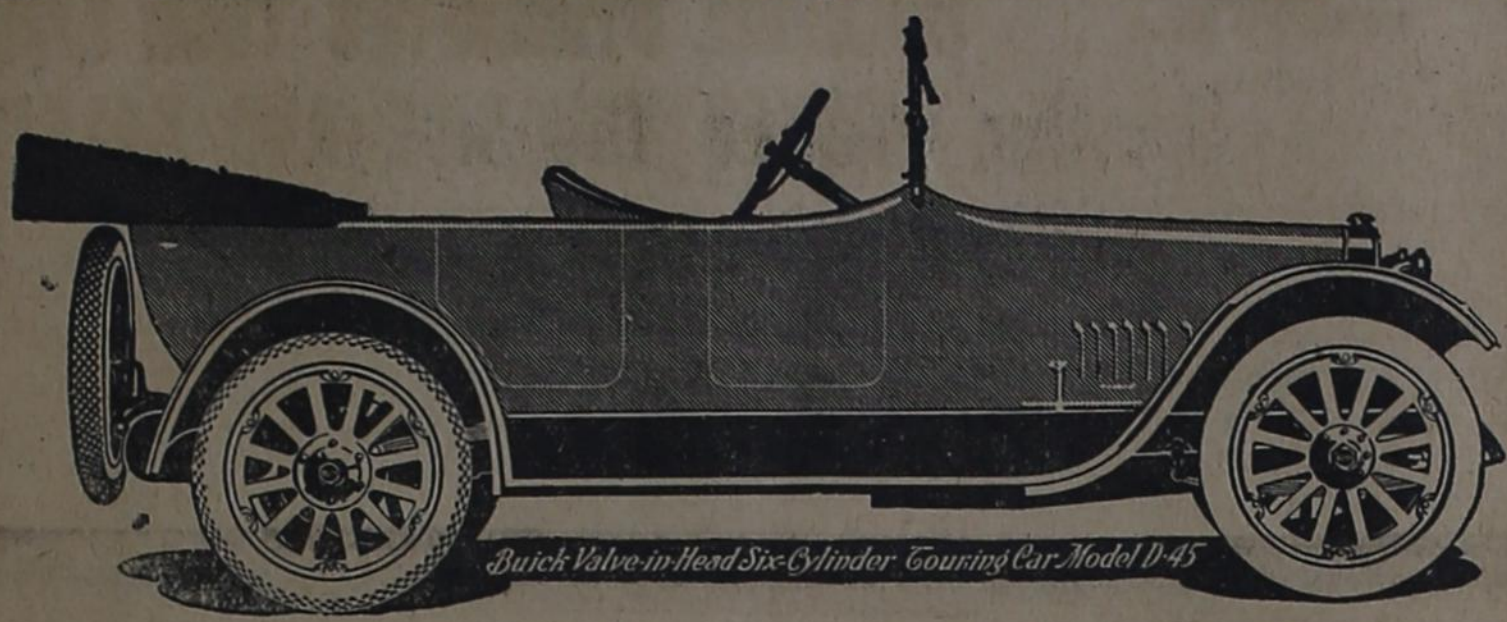

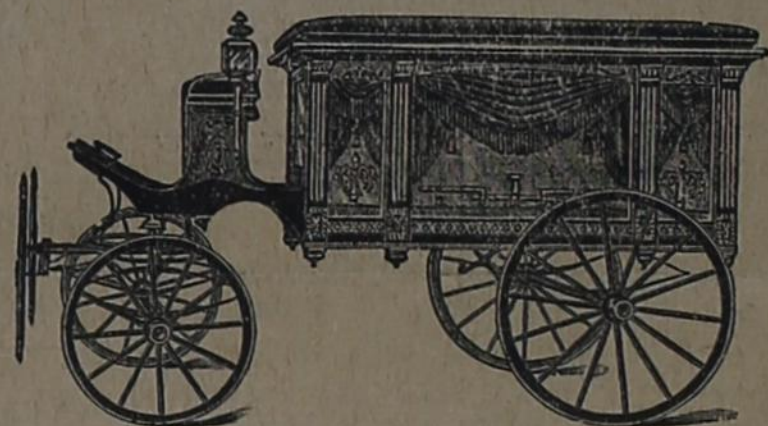
