## FLU EPIDEMIC IN SOLDIER CAMPS IN MUCH IMPROVED CONDITION

PARENTS OF SOLDIERS IN TRAINING CAMPS SHOULD NOT BE ALARMED FOR CONDITIONS ARE IMPROVING AT ALL CAMPS.

1. On account of the wide-spread epidemic of Influenza, all induction calls announced for Texas for this month have been temporarily cancelled. This affects Call No. A-1427 (the "Auto Mechanics" Call mentioned in last week's bulletin); hence the voluntary period under this call did not close on the 12th instant but is still open. As stated last week, this call is for men registered before September 12th, 1918.

2. The following is taken from the bulletin that cancelled the calls referred to above and same should have the careful attention of the public: "The five calls mentioned above have been temporarily suspended on account of the influenza epidemic. There are some cases of influenza in the camps at this time and it is unwise to send registrants from civilian life to camp under present conditions. I want you to understand however that the situation is well in hand at each camp and the number of deaths at the various camps is remarkably small. I have no doubt that the soldiers suffering from this disease are getting, in most instances, more careful attention and treatment than the civilians who are suffering from the same malady, and I have no doubt that a smaller proportion of soldiers are dying from influenza than civilians. In other words, there is no cause for excitement or hysteria among our Texas people; the suspension of these calls is purely a precautionary measure." (Major John C. Townes, Jr., Supervisor, Selective Service Law in Texas.)

3. Since the appearance of last week's bulletin, the following registrants of Class of September, 1918, have been individually inducted into the S. A. T. C.: Thomas Jefferson Moore and John Thomas Walters, San Saba, A. & M. College. Clyde Leslie Oliver of the Class of 1917, post office San Saba, temporary post office Dallas, has been individually inducted into the S. A. T. C. and sent to Baylor University, Dallas. No

further individual induction orders concerning the S. A. T. C. have been received by this Board and as this is the last date for inductions into the S. A. T. C., it is probable that the nineteen registrants of this jurisdiction listed in this bulletin and the bulletins for the past two weeks will be all who will enter this branch of the service.

4. The physical examination of registrants of this Board who registered last month and who have been placed in Class I has been delayed on account of the influenza epidemic. The schedule for such examinations will be worked out and put into effect at the earliest day possible.

It is especially desired that the Annual Meeting when held shall be attended by as many Red Cross members as possible.

### NONESSENTIAL WORKERS

Recently several employers have spoken to me in regard to the classification of their employees in the nonessential workers class. Judging from this I feel sure a wrong impression has gone out and I wish to correct this at once.

Some time ago the United States Employment Service which is working the Labor Department asked me to make a list of the "nonessential workers" loafers and idlers of this county. My work has been mostly with the people of the county districts since I have been in San Saba county and I am not familiar with the work being performed by the people of the town of San Saba. Having this in mind I called to my assistance several citizens of whom I made inquiry.

The names given me by citizens as being employed in non-essential pursuits and those who were termed as unemployed etc. Most of the names on the list I do not know personally and had to rely on others for information. In making this list I am not classifying any one but merely giving information as to the employment of certain men engaged in work outlined as nonessential in the instructions.

To be absolutely fair about the matter I have noted the employment each man on the list is engaged in and leaving the classification to the Draft Board and the Labor Department. I have no authority to classify any one and I am glad I am not charged with this difficult and embarrassing task. I do not know what the Labor Board wants with the list as I am not informed, but I presume they wish to offer those engaged in nonessential work employment in other lines thus being a help to them. If this is the case it will be a help to all who are engaged in nonessential work.

Pete Sloan recently bought the Ward Holman stock of cattle and received them this week.

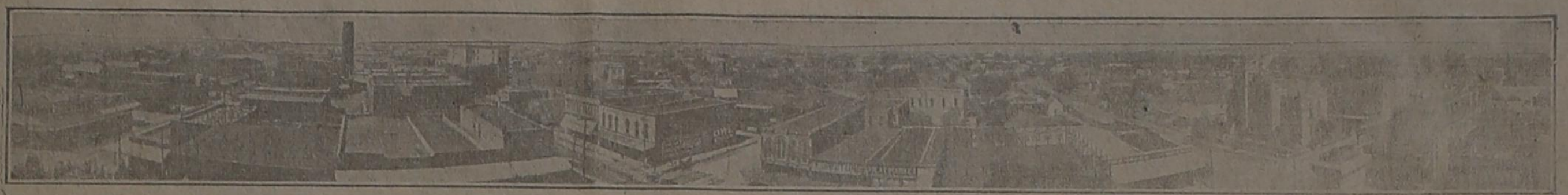

There is but one picture that could equal it and that is when our boys have conquered the Huns and the war is over and all our San Saba boys on one great ship could land near New York and have all their mothers behind a rope 300 yards away and stand and see our boys march up to that rope and embrace their mothers and then bring them home and turn them over to our noble Worth Hart to finish their education and turn them out in the world better prepared to fight the battles of life.
