

COTTON CROP IS FAR BELOW 10-YEAR NORMAL

WASHINGTON, June 1,-The condition of the cotton crop on May 25 was 69.5 per cent of normal, compared with77.5 last year, 60.0 in 1915, 74.3 in 1914and 79.1 the May 25 ten-year average, the department of agriculture announced today in its first report of the season. The acreage planted to cotton will not be announced until July.

WAKE UP AMERICA

TAX COLLECTOR MUST EN-FORCE COLLECTIONS

The Commisioners' Court last week refused to approve the insolvent list of the Tax Assessor until executions have been made on all personal property for the taxes due thereon.

After refusing to take the oath being carried in many a man's vest that all legal means had been excourt then entered the following ord er: "It is ordered by the Commission-People should learn that a watch is ers' Court, all members being present, that W. W. Skelton, Tax-Collector, be and he is hereby instructed to use all A speck of dust too small to be seen the means conferred on him by law solvent taxes on the 1916 tax colls of San Saba County."

> It seems that the law makes it incumbent on the Tax Collector to levy on all personal property and sell the same for the taxes due. The law requires the Commissioners' Court to certify under oath that there is no property out of which the taxes can be approved.

The insolvent list submitted by the Tax Collector shows about \$2,500 of state and county taxes unpaid. Of this more than \$1,000 is assessed to the county.

Ever since the year one it has been the custom for the Tax Collector to file his annual statement of moneys collected. Also and with this statement file a list of the real estate upon which the current taxes had not been paid, together with a list of those against whom had been assessed taxes on personal property. No forced collections have ever been made against personel property. Judge Dean and Commissioners' Court take the position that all men should meet the responsibilities of maintaining the government equally. All get the same protection and it is not right for one to pay his taxes and another escape. Under the law all personal property is subject to execution for current taxes. This order of the court directs the Tax Collector to levy on all personal property in the county where the taxes have not been




