### Letter From France

Dea Ragsdale of the Colony settlement was killed in action recently in France. He was a soldier of the old "fighting ninth" infantry regiment. The following letter is the last his parents received from him. It is a good one and breathes the exalted spirit of a true American patriot and thristian soldier. His was a glorious death in a glorious cause. Some day San Saba county will appropriately honor her brave boys who are sleeping in the sacred soil of France. Here is the letter:

At The Front,

June 26, 1918 Dear Mother and Father:-

From the heading you can tell where I am. You may think that the front would be a very bad place to be however, it is not half so bad as you would imagine. Oh yes the big guns roar and the bursting shells come close and the machine guns clatter away, but at times everything is reasonably quiet. Sometimes things gets rather warm but the faith of the Yanks never weaken. The only thing left for us to do is to stand fast and trust in God. He will give us victory.

You have no idea how much encouragement you good folks at home do bring us boys over here when you tell us that you are working for the Red Cross and for the soldier boys across the sea, also when you say we have had some good rains and the crops are looking fine. And, oh how we do appreciate the fact that our fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters are at home praying for our victory and safe return.

The soldier has a difficult life in which to live a christian. It seems that his environments are continually wicked, and he seldom has a chance to attend church. But mother and friends do not forget us in your

## Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.

It is then loaded into a refrigerator car where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days.

Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.



A shingle or a square of slate found ter should be attended to at once. If it is delayed the next rainstorm might cause enough water to soak through the roof to ruin the ceiling and possibly injure the floors.

A broken pane of glass may seem unimportant to attend to at once, but if the wall paper or polished floor get a soaking it will cost much more than the expense of a pane of glass to repair the damage. If the broken window happens to be in the cellar it may cause the freezing of the water pipes or the boiler.

The paint on the exterior of the house should receive a share of the attention and should be renewed at least every third year. The life of the house depends on its ability to withstand the ravages of weather, and if the paint is in poor condition the house is bound to decrease in value.





Lord Rhondda, the English food controller, recently cabled the American food administrator, that unless we can send the allies before the next uropean harvest 75,000,000 bushels of wheat in addition to what had been sent up to January 1 of this year he could not assure the people of the allies that food to carry on the war.

He did not say anything in this cable about the other food necessary, but he has told of these needs in other cables-and by his actions in England. For example, his latest regulation compels a reduction of meat eating in the United Kingdom to a maximum of one pound per week per person, this pound including the bone and other waste parts in the meat as bought in the shop.

The allies must have more wheat, more meat, more fats, more dairy products, more sugar. 


