Decidedly the largest cattle deal reported from this county for a long time was closed last week when Asa Huffstuttler of Georgetown and Tom Huffstuttler of Lometa sold to a Mr. Hudgin of Matagorda county 3000 head of 3 year old steers at \$53 a head. This totaled a consideration of \$159,000 for the lot.

These cattle are all from the Edwards and Green ranches in the southeast part of San Saba county. It is said to be a splendid bunch of stuff. The delivery is to be made about April 15th.



"Were the matter of highpriced paper not so serious, the results obtained by the Federal commission might be considered a joke. We, too, built high hopes when the commission recently announced that an agreement had been reached whereby print paper in rolls would now be supplied at 2 1-2 cents per pound. We figured that ought to give us the flat sheets at about 5 cents per pound, which is a considerable saving over 7 cents and up.

But the paper drummers can't see it that way. They say the Federal commission's findings were immediately accepted by two paper manufacturers, who very generously agreed to accept the 21-2 cent rate. Investigation, however, develops the fact that both these paper manufacturers have already had their entire output for the next year or two contracted, so unfortunately, they will not be able to supply any of the low priced paper for some time to come.





#### Fly Guilty of Murder.

Dr. Crumbine of the Kansas state board of health discovered the murderous character of the fly in keeping a monthly record of infants who died from diarrheal diseases.

He found that deaths increased as flies multiplied.

In January, the season of no flies, deaths were only thirty-five, while during July and August, the season when flies swarm in greatest numbers and carry most filth and germs to the baby's bottle and the baby's lips, the deaths of little children soared to 176. There is a call for such action NOW

as will stop flies from breeding. Will you heed that call now or wait until your own baby dies?

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\* TEACH CHILDREN TO SWAT THE FLY.

IVE your children the fly swatter and teach them to use it. Teach them to shun flies as you teach them to run from automobiles. The little tiny silent flies are more dangerous. They are killing a great many more children than the great big, noisy automobiles. \* Besides, teach your children to look for the flies, as one or another may stealthily sneak into your carefully screened house. Give a prize of a penny a dozen 🚁 for all dead flies, and teach the \* children not to touch them, as they are dirty and may be carrying disease.


