NEWS WHILE

Austin, Sept. 30 .- Besides the impeachment of a governor the third called session of the Thirty-fifth legislature, which passed into history Saturday, little work was done.

One hundred and ten bills were in troduced in both houses during the session, sixtyfour in the house and forty-six in the senate, the majority being of a more or less local nature, such as road laws and independent school district laws.

No relief was granted to the drouthstricken sufferers in West Texas. The house passed its bill after cutting out the appropriation, but the senate insisted on the substitution of its bill by Senators McNealus and Hudspeth, carrying an appropriation for the relief of the sufferers. Both measures failed.

A brief resume of the more important bills passed and which have either been signed or are awaiting the signature of Governor Hobby, are:

Two soldiers' moratorium bills. Bill permitting fish hatcheries to obtain fish from the rivers, lakes and

streams for cultural purposes. Boll worm bill carrying \$10,000 for
