CAMP TRAVIS **NEWS ITEMS**

The color line plays no part at all in the efforts made by the United States to train, equip, and make suitable for the supreme effort against the Germans, the men responding to the call to colors under the selective draft act. White or colored, they are equally well provided for, notwithstanding some of the arguments made by German sympathizers.

Never before in his lifetime has the negro had such opportunities accorded him as he has at the present sime, in the service of the United States. No more must he keep on a continual scramble for such employment as will afford bread and meat and clothes for himself and family, to the absolute annullment of any chances to better himself. As a soldier in the great armies of the country the black race has an opportunity long desired but never possible before.

At Camp Travis, for instance the negro, soldier has opportunities of schooling, of training along mechanical lines, of training along hundreds of other lines of work that will better fit him when the war is over to take his place in the world. Thousands of negroes have gone from Camp Travis in engineering units, or stevedore companies, or in fighting branches. In every instance they have been able to accomplish much. Especially in the work of fighting men, have they called forth the praise of General Pershing and of the French and English military officials.

Aside from his work at drill, with his rifle on his shoulder, or in his studies in the camp bakeries or cooking schools, or in the mechanical repair shops, or constructing bridges, and roads according to the most approved methods, there also is plenty of pleasure for the negro soldier. Schools are open for his study of English, for reading and writing. Thousands of library books are at his disposal. The Y. M. C. A. has a branch open to the negro where he has the benefit of everything the Y.

Entertainments of a literary and athletic nature are provided by the commissions on these various activities. Recently at Camp Travis there was organized a negro band of more than fifty musicians that is developing into one of the finest of its kind in the country. A negro minstrel show displayed such talent that it was invited to perform at neighboring camps and the money thus acquired will be used in the purchase and erection of a negro dance hall mear the camp. At certain intervals great field meets are held with cash prizes for clog dancing, jigging, for boxing, wrestling, leap frog racing, etc. Then there is competitive athletic drill as well as military drill. These are but a few of the advantages of fered the negro of today.

Added to this is the fact that in the Government service the soldiers as a privates receives thirty dollars per month, with his clothes, bedding, a place to sleep and three good square meals per day. Medical attention is also provided when necessary. The negro in Uncle Sam's army has ar opportunity to develop, physically, mentally, and in every way to make him a better citizen.

WHY IT WAS ORGANIZED

From a sub-section of a bureau of a Government department, with a staff of only a few persons, to a great national machine covering the country with branches and agents numbered by tens of thousands and charged with the mobilization of America's industry man power-all accomplished in six months:

This epitomizes the story of the United States Employment Service of the Department of Labora story that will go down in history as one of the country's greatest achievements of the war.

The United States Employment Service as new constituted is old in name only.. While the nucleus of a federal employment system was established ten years ago in the former department of Commerce and Labor and continued in a more developed form when, in 1913, the Department of Labor was created, the present service really dates from January, 1918.

The previous nine months had taught the necessity of a national mobilization of labor for war production-the centralization in a movement agency of all war labor finding and placing. Independent and unregulated labor recruiting by the growing war industries had demoralized the labor market. War plants, sick of the situation, were forced to "steal" or "poach" in effort to maintain production. Unscrupulous private, fee employment agencies grew opulent on turnover.

Centralization Begun

Then came the first of the year and with it a federal, state, municipal, and other public employment

new order of things. When in January the Secretary of Labor was made Labor Administrator and, with his advisory council, formed the national war labor programme, the first step was the creation of labor recruiting and distributing machinery. The United States Employment Service was chosen as the machine base and Secretary Wilson directed its separation from the Bureau of Immigration, and its complete organization and expansion as the war labor mobilizing agency of the government.

This began the equipment of the machinery, the installation of its parts, the replacement of obsolete or inadequate units. Literally the administrative staff worked day and night in the assembling task. This was doubly difficult; for labor had to be supplied in daily increasing numbers while recruiting and placing machinery was being made. Men of great experience in the industrial world came to Washington to assist and direct-far-sighted, patriotic men who had vision and combined it with prac-

And when last June all the production departments and boards of the government, through the medium of the War Labor Policies Board, agreed upon the centralization of war labor finding and placing in the employment service, beginning with common labor on Aug. 1, and the policy was approved by the President, the six months' record card of the employment service showed this:

Six Months Accomplishments

The welding into a single national system of all

offices, and the establishment of several hundred vice Reserve. It has more than 20,000 agents in the new offices.

An increasement of placements from about 20,000 a month to 250,000 a month.

The creation of a labor recruiting system, known as the Public Service Reserve, with agents in virtually every county and township, and with 300,000 skilled men registered for service.

A system of labor clearances, enabling the sending of labor from one section to another-from ten to 3,000 miles—as quickly as possible and on a manner equitable to the states.

A centralization of administration in the main office of the service at Washington and a decentralization of execution with the state as the unit.

The country divided into thirteen employment districts, each in charge of a superintendent; the employment service system in each state in charge of a state director.

500 Branch Offices and 20,000 Agents

There are today more than 500 branches of the employment service actively functioning-six times as many, as existed a half-year ago. Several hundred more will be established. Connected with these offices are examiners, trained men who can judge the fitness of a worker for a particular job. "The right man in the right job" is the service's cardinal

The branch offices constitute the placing arm of the service. The recruiting arm is the Public Ser-

cities, towns and rural communities, and a director for each state and county.

Working in co-operation with the branch employment offices and the reserve agents are several hundred newspapers, hundreds of telephone lines, commercial organizations, state and county councils of defense, the community machines of the Liberty Loan, Red Cross, and other organizations.

While the branch office is a local proposition, it is in direct touch with the national situation and whole employment service system. The state director's headquarters in each state is the clearing house for the local offices within the state. The district superintendent's office is the clearing house for the directors of the states within the district. The districts in turn clear through the main office at Washington.

Employers and Workers Assist

That their co-operation may be more than in name, the employers and employees in industrial communities will share in the administration of and the responsibility for the recruiting and distributing of war labor. This will be accomplished through community labor boards, which consist of a representative of its workers and a representative of the United States Employment Service, who acts as chairman.

Employers, employees, or the government cannot singularly solve the war labor problem; together they can and will, for the war must be won.

TEXAS FARMERS SENT MESSAGE BY COL. OUSLEY | What W.S.S. Will Do

On his return to Washington after his recent visit in Texas, Clarence Ousley, Assistant Secretary of the United States De-

partment of Agriculture, sent the following message to the farmers of Texas:

"Production and conservation -creating and saving-are the most effective means the people of Texas have for helping their Government win the war against Germany.

"Food must be produced and conserved. But food is not the only problem of the war; there must be money, many millions of dollars available for the use of the Government. It should be conserved and placed as far as possible at the disposal of the Government through the purchase of War Savings Stamps. The price of victory is the purse of the American people. UNITED STATES FOOD ADMIN-ISTRATION

(Texas Industrial Congress)

Dallas, Texas, September 7-Texas has produced substantially fifty percent of the food and feed required for a year, according to reports from 240 counties, which have been compiled for the Federal Food Administration in Texas by the Texas Industrial Martin Phone 23 Texas Phone 33 Congress. From a State wide survey it appears that the acreage of all crops except rice, is less than last year, conditions poorer, rainfall more deficient and range conditions worse than last year, when production was below the average of the state.

> Thousands of acres of cotton have been abandoned; reports show that on an average sixteen acres of the remainder will be required to produce a bale, and the rains of August and September it is said have arrived too late to affect the result.


The corn yield of he State, will average fifteen bushels, despite the fact that 60 counties reported the yield as nothing, usually adding, "it will not pay for the gathering." Less than Always call on me before you sell half of the reports however undertook to estimate the crop.

\137 counties reported a peanut acreage, the average being 2 per cent Practice in all courts of the State less than last year, the crop yielding from reports of 83 counties, 17 bushels per acre. The sorgum, kaffir, milo and feterita yield is reported as twothirds of last year's, the average per acre being given by 91 counties as 1.15 tons.

131 counties report a sweet potato acreage of four-fifth of last year, with the yield, estimated by 95 counties at 47 bushels per acre. 37 reports show an acreage less than that of last year, the yield being either extremely small or impossible of estimate.

Range conditions are reported as good in but seven counties; four of them, Hartley, Ochiltree, Parmer and Terry being in the extreme northwest of the State. VER 75 per cent. of the sugar used in the United States is delivered by ships, There is produced about 800,000 tons of beet sugar and 250,000 tons of cane sugar in Louisiana. The total consumption of the United States is about 4,500,000 tons of raw sugar, which makes about 4,250,000 tons of refined sugar.

If our coasts were blockaded as Germany's now are, we would have available for the use of the people of the United States only one pound of sugar for every four we use. 'Under such circumstances there is no doubt that the American people would get along on this limited supply without complaint.

The United States Food Administration is asking every American household to use not more than two pounds of sugar per person each month for domestic use. Reducing our sugar consumption here means that we will be able to help supply the needs of France, England and Italy. Sugar conservation on the American table also means conservation of ships.

The Army and Navy have sent out an "S. O. S." call for ships. "Save Our Ships to Transport Troops and Munitions to France, in order that we may keep the fighting front where it now is and not allow it to extend to our own homes," is the message.

There is ample sugar in the world for all requirements—in fact, there is a large surplus, but on account of the ship shortage it is not available for use in this




