morrow, the 28th instant, for Camp Mabry, Texas, where they will receive a special course of instruction as auto mechanics. Both of these draftees voluntarily applied for induction under said call, the county's quota under which being two men.

5. General Induction Call No. 1203 has been received, which will take two men from this jurisdiction. This call is for Class I, Group C (special or limited military service) white men, the draftees to be sent to Camp Bowie, Fort Worth. The movement in the State will be 800 men, between September 3rd and 6th, both inclusive. The date of entrainment at San Saba is yet to be announced.

6. General Induction Call No. 1239 has also been received. This call is for Class I, Group A, white men, to be sent to Camp Travis and includes 8000 in the State, the movement beginning September 3rd and ending on the 6th. The quota for this county is the heaviest so far announced—58 men. This will be the first call filled by this Board in which the quota of Class of 1918 will be inducted. The date of entrainment under such call has not yet been given this Board.

Court Asked To Keep County Agent

At their last session the County Commissioners' Court in an effort to cut expenses decided to discontinue the appropriation of \$700.00 the county was paying annually to help pay the salary of the County Agricultural Agent. Those who voted to discontinue the appropriation argued that in as much as drouth had made farming unprofitable that there was no need of an advisor.

As soon as it was known that the county agent was to be withdrawn from the county by the Government, it developed that the advice on cultivation of crops was a very small part of the county agents duties. It was found that the U. S. Government depended upon the agent for information and acted through him largely in its dealings with the people. It was found that many benefits received by the people came through the county agents efforts and that without the agent some of the relief proposed to be extended to the drouth stricken section could not be had.

Realizing that in this time of war everything must be done to co-operate with the Government, the County Council of Defense called a meeting of representatives from all over the county and decided to offer petitions to the people for reinstatement of the appropriation so the county agent would be retained. These petitions are now coming in numerously signed and it is noted that many of those who opposed the appropriation before they were informed of the many duties of the agent have signed the petitions.

What action the Court will take cannot be fore told but it is learned that action will be taken very soon.

A Soldier Boy's Letter

August 20, 1918
Mr. Billie Smith,
San Saba, Texas

Dear Billie,

I am going to drop you a line or two this morning to see if all you people are dead at home. We are doing fine down here as we get three squares a day and \$30.00 per month and all good exercise we can stand up to. I had a right nice trip down here. We are still here today. All well satisfied and feeling and looking fine. All the San Saba boys are called to leave Camp Travis except one. Bob Browles, has taken the mumps, of course they don't expect to ship him yet.

Well I am going to tell you something along the first experience in drilling. Some of the boys it comes natural and some it comes very exerting to the first time or two. When they would hallow right face, left face, parade rest an so on, but the most of those are making good soldiers now. Well in fact all of them are doing good.

We can do most anything around camp in way of house keeping and so on.

Well how are you all making it with the cavalry boys? I heard one of them got shot. If this whole bunch down here doesn't get a shot once or twice a week they think all are mad at them. Some have been going to the dental infirmary ever since they came down here and still cry at night. Some of them are home sick I think instead of having the tooth ache. We have one soldier that I think drills all night. He goes to bed about 10 every night and some times hallow squads right, and about that time he gets up off the floor.

Well to-day as one month ago we came down here a surveillant arrived here about 10:30 and went to the inspection of soldiers. Then went to dinner. We started back to be examined, and I am going to say this much right now we stood some examination, but I am through with all the boys. Some would say here is your last stal but I kept nugging on and after awhile I found that I had the whole soldiers rigging from head to foot and from the Barrock to the mess hall. So am still with the bunch.

Now Captain if you remember I am quite a short soldier in height, but the only trouble they have ever had with me is to keep me from walking with any of the boys. I can walk with any of

I went visiting Sunday and saw several of those San Saba boys who came here before we did. I saw Taylor, Clark, Harkey and all those old settlers. Would have seen Gaines but he has been promoted to Corporal of a bunch of Africans down below us a ways. He got a furlough and had gone home for a five day stay so didn't get to see him. Don't suppose we will get to see him before we leave as we are expecting to get out some time to-day. Stood inspection about a half a day yesterday. All past, we think we will go near Atlanta Georgia and some think we will go to Oklahoma, but please bear in mind there will be some bunch of soldiers where ever we go.

I will close for it is near hash time and can't afford to miss anything like that.
