This bale also had the 1915 first bale beaten in weight and time.Last year's was brought in August 17 by Rube Senterfitt, and weighed only 450 pounds. Mr. Sullivan grew the cotton
on A. Behrns' place, about eight on A. Behrns' Dlace, about eight
miles west of San Saba, in the miles west of San Saba, in the
Wallace Creek section. The business men raised a premium
of $\$ 21.75$. This, with purchase of $\$ 21.75$. This, with purchase price of bale and free
$\$ 4.30$, totals $\$ 112.79$.
