#### Good Roads Convention At Austin Best Ever Held

The sixth annual convention of the Texas Good Roads Associaion which was held at Austin on Wednesday and Thursday of last week was the most successful that has ever been held. An exceptionally strong program of addresses by well known good roads advocates and good roads authorities was carried out. And the convention will represent one of the greatest influences in the safe passage by the present legislature of the State Highway Bill, which is due to reach the Governor's desk for his signature within a week or ten days.

Among the speakers, Col. P. L. Downs, of Temple, in a characteristic way, sometimes with humor, told of the efforts and the success of Bell county in getting passed a bond issue for improved roads, discussing in that connection the "before and after" condition of the roads in his county. He urged permanence in road building and strict maintenance. He held that the creation of a State Highway Commission would be a panaca for practically all road evils in Texas. L. S. Franklin, speaking on "Permanency in Road Building" nowed the folly of building roads only for the present in disregard for the future.

Judge J. A. King of Albany, responding to Mayor Wool-Cleveland Ohio-Wood Briggs dridge's address of welcome, without a budget or commission priation of \$75,000,000 was made by congress, to be distributed among those States which have highway commissions. Judge King forcibly brought out the point that the railroads, the greatest spreaders of civilization up to the present date, have now about reached the place where their development will cease.

He went on to state that the present road laws were not equal to the modern situation, since they make provision only for the construction of short intra-county and intra-precinct roads.

Senator F. M. Gibson of Bonham stood for good roads everywhere, especially in Texas, and in his opinion the quickest way to obtain them was to create a State Highway Department.

Railroad Commissioner Earle B. Mayfield asked for the cooperation of the State Association in securing the passage of a bill to confer power on the Texas Railroad Commission to required non-grade crossings. This association," he stated, is vitally interested in one phase of the question and that is the separation of railroad grade crossings and highways. The Railroad Commission should have power to separate these grades. Accidents are happening too irequently at these crossings and the time for a cessation has arrived. No progress at all has been made along this line in Texas, while in nearly every State of the Union power has been given the Railroad Commissions to separate grades. I ask you for your hearty co-operation to form sentiment in favor of the bill which has been introduced in the Texas Legislature."

NLESS we are to throw up our hands and confess ourselves at the mercy of other nations we must have compulsory military serviceuniversal military service, if you please.

The events of the past year have demonstrated, I should think to the satisfaction of every one, that the present military system of the United States is a failure. WE CANNOT DEPEND ON THE NATIONAL

GUARD OR THE VOLUNTEERS.

Before I went into the war department I believed universal military service was a good thing. After my experience at the head of the department I became convinced that it was necessary, and I think the present government is about convinced of it. Compulsory service is the only solution of the problem of preparedness. I have not thought out in detail what, in my judgment, would be the best plan to follow in placing the country on a compulsory basis, but a plan by which every citizen should be made to bear his burden of defense is necessary.

#### **Animals That Puzzle Scientists**

There are two animals that puzzle naturalists more than any others. They are nature's submarine and airplane—the whale and the eagle, says the Pittsburgh Gazette - Times. It is known that whales occasionally descend as far as 3000 feet below the surface of the sea-a depth at which, from the pressure of the water, they ought to be crushed flat. Why they are not injured naturalists have yet to discover. It is this pressure that prevents a modern submarine from descending more than some 300 feet. Eagles have been seen thru telescopes to fly with apparent ease from 30,000 to 40,000 feet above the sea level. At that height no human being can live owing to the rarefaction of the air. How birds live and fly at far greater heights than man can endure is another question still unanswered.

Dallas, Tex., Jan. 21.-William Jennings Bryan and George H. Hodges, former governor of Kansas, are among the prominent speakers who will assist prohibition forces in Texas when the submission campaign comes up, according to local leaders. Forest E. ### Diagnostic Tests Necessary to Stamping Out of Tuberculosis

By Dr. RICHARD COLE NEWTON, Surgeon and Physician

THE principal reason that we are making so little headway toward the stamping out of human tuberculosis is that there are so many unlocated incipient cases. Before we shall make real progress in this direction the popular conception of the extent and true history of the

disease must be entirely changed.

The tuberculin diagnostic test must be generally adopted and some method must be devised by which practically all children and all adults whose systems are below par without an obvious cause must be subjected to the test, and those found to be infected must be treated, and that, too if possible, BEFORE POSITIVE SYMPTOMS CAN BE DEMON STRATED IN THE LUNGS OR ANY PART OF THE BODY.

When a positive diagnosis of tuberculosis can be made by physic examination of the chest the case is no longer incipient, and the golder

It may be a long time before wholesale tests with tuberculin will be made upon human beings as they are now made upon cattle.



"'They are of normal weight,' she said, 'and can not have meal to-day. They must wait for Tuesday night, Jan. 30: until their weight is reduced before they may have food, -this may be one or, perhaps, two or three days. Only those who are under weight and are facing starvation may have food. There is so little food that only those I do. who need it most may have it.'

"Mr. Hoover was astounded and overcome, and asked the woman if it was possible that the children must be really starving before they could be allowed to have a meal.

"Yes, that is so,' she said sadly. 'We can not feed so many little mouths with so little. It we had the food we would give it istics of the island. to them-but what can we do? The Origin of Carrier Pigeons.

The origin of the use of the carrier pigeon is lost in obscurity, but the first people of whom we have any record of employing it are the Greeks. By them it was used with great success, and the knowledge they had acquired they imparted to the Romans, who first used it as a message bearer about 120 years before the Christian era. About 500 years ago pigeons formed part of a telegraphic system adopted by the Turks, who erected high towers thirty or forty miles apart. They were provided with pigeons, and sentinels stood constantly ready to secure the messages as the birds arrived.-London Standard.
