DISCOVERY OF LEAD

The discovery of lead deposits near Bakersville, half way between Bangs and Santa Anna is causing much talk and speculation as to the value of the deposits. The discovery of the ore was made while digging a weil and a vein of the ore two feet thick was found at a depth of forty-nine feet. In a drilled well near this, a vein seven feet in thickness was found at ninety feet, in addition to the two foot vein at the higher level.

A stock company at Santa Anna organized the past summer for the purpose of exploiting a copper mine in Knox County, has a lease on the property and are sinking a shaft six feet in diameter to a depth of one hundred feet in order to ascertain the extent of the deposits.

This shaft is on the Lee Baker place, half a mile north and a quarter mile east of the Carranza switch be tween Bangs and Santa Anna.-Bangs Enterprise.

As to these two main products and it incurable. Catarrh is a local disease, as to other farm products, not to speak of manufactured products, their commercial value depends upon the foreign market. Without a foreign market for cotton, for instance, even this year with the probable crop of only 12 million bales we have for export something like five million bales above the American consumption of approxihately seven million bales. If ve could not export cotton, therefore we would have a surplus of five million bales and that surplus would cause cotton to decline from the present high price of 26 or 27 cents a pound to a price far below the cost of production. As illustrative of this point it is necessary only to recall the conditions in 1914 when at the begin ning of the war shipping was uncertain and as a consequence cotton sold at six or seven cents a pound. Even with the short wheat crop this year we have something like 100 million bushels more than we need for consumption in the United States. It happens that Europe needs not only that 100 millions but very much more, but if we had accepted Germany's dictation and were to send only one ship a week to Europe, that 100 million

Should the pinch of military necesity increase beyond Class II, it would mean that the Nation would have to begin to commit itself to hardships and to an adjustment in agriculture and industry to meet the paramount necessity. We take in Class III a very small class of persons upon whom others are dependent for support, but we do not break up the closest and most sacred of the family relationship. We also invade the field of agriculture and industry to the extent of taking, in the small percentage affected, men who have specialized themselves or who occupy rather pivotal positions. In Class IV we find the men whom

we shall take as a last resort. Before that class is reached it is perfectly safe to say that by the addition of other classes as to age, say those who have attained 21 since registration day and perhaps adding the classes of 18 and 19 and 20 years' old, men, we shall have included two or three million men in our available list, and thus have saved Class IV.

Class V comprises the field of absolute exempts.

There is one thought that I must impress to eradicate an erroneous view that may be taken of this classification:

We are dealing in the field of labor supply. Presuming that the labor supply of industry and agriculture comprises men between the ages of 18 and 50, and assuming, for the purpose of this exposition, that there are 1,000,000 men of each of these ages, we are dealing with 32 classes, appurtenant to agriculture and to the various industries. The draft affects ten-thirty seconds of this supply or only about 31 per cent. Therefore, turning to class II, when we find skilled farm labor listed there, it does not mean that when class II is exhausted all skilled farm laborers will have been taken. From these figures, it would seem to mean that figure is misleading. Wihout the definite statistics that the present draft will eventually afford I can say, I think, that within this class of skilled laborers at least 62 per cent of those liable to draft will be found in classes more deferred than class II by reason of dependents, alienage, and of the Nation and stands as a source the like. The result is that when we have exhausted Class II, we shall have taken only 12 per cent of the skilled labor appurtenant to agriculture. The same figures apply to oth-

er industries. To raise an army comprising hundreds of thousands of men necessitates an inroad into the man power Polite Attention and Prompt Service of the Nation. 

"RULE 2. The licensee shall manufacture rolls and offer them for sale only in units weighing from 1 to 3 ounces, but no rolls shall be manufactured or offered for sale which shall weigh, unwrapped, twelve hours after baking, less than 1 ounce of more than 3 ounces.

"RULE 3. The standard weights herein prescribed shall be determined by averaging the weight of not less any one unit, or five dozen rolls of any one unit, and such average shall not be less than the minimum nor more than the maximum prescribed by these rules and regulations for such units.

"RULE 4. The licensee in mixing and dough for bread or rolls shall not use the following ingredients in amounts exceeding those specified below, per unit of 196 pounds of any ple. flour, or meal, or any mixture thereof:

"Sugar: Not to exceed 3 pounds of cane or beet sugar or in lieu thereof, 3 1-2 pounds of corn sugar. Where sweetened condensed milk is used, the licensee, in determining the permitted amount of sugar, shall deduct the densed milk from the net amount of other sugar, of the kinds herein desig-

"Milk: Not to exceed 6 pounds of fresh milk from which the butter fats lent thereof.

"Shortening:-No shortening shall be used except as follows: Not to exmultiples thereof, which shall be net ceed 2 pounds of 'compounds' containmal fats. In lieu of such 'compounds' pounds of vegetable fats.
