### Hart Buys McCrea Ranch

A deal was recently made whereby W. B. Hart becomes owner of the Clayton McCrea ranch, located on the Palo Duro, 12 miles west of Hansford. The transfer of the property has not been completed, as Mr. McCrea now resides in Bella Vista, Arkansas, and it takes some time to have the papers all signed up and returned. This ranch consists of 2,400 acres of deeded and 2,000 acres of leased lands, and is one of the best little ranches on the Palo Duro. It is well watered and the breaks of the Palo Duro afford ample protection for the stock. About 175 head of high grade Hereford cattle are included in the deal. Their many friends are glad to know that the Hart family has again located in Hansford county. They sold a fine farm out southwest of town two years ago, and while the sons, Hayden and Mart, were in the army Mr. and Mrs. Hart and daughters spent a winter at Long Beach, California, but they have all come back to Hansford county and the purchase of the McCrea ranch would indicate that they are here to stay.

### AN OLD TIMER SELLS RANCH

#### A. E. Powers Sells the "Loma Alto" to Kansas Men

A deal is being consummated this week whereby A. E. Powers sells the Loma Alto ranch, consisting of 5,700 acres of choice Palo Duro Valley land to H. L. Brinkenhoff and C. C. Nye of Kansas. The cattle, horses and other live stock are not included in this deal, but Mr. Powers says he intends to sell out everything, including farming implements, etc., and states that it is his intention to leave the north panhandle. He thinks now that he will go to either New Mexico or Arizona, but retains possession of the ranch he is selling until all live stock and other property is disposed of. Messrs. Brinkenhoff and Nye were in Hansford the first of the week and will return the first of next week to complete the transaction. His numerous friends throughout the north panhandle will learn with genuine regret that Ace Powers intends to leave this section of the country. (He is an old-timer, having come into this section from Colorado in 1878, accompanied by A. Polk, John Anderson and a Mr. Scott. They were only prospecting then, and went as far south as the Turkey Track range, in what is now Hutchinson county. They returned to Colorado well pleased with the outlook here and in September of the same year came back with their cattle and located near where the Turkey Track headquarters now stand, built a dugout and wintered there. The following fall Mr. Powers moved down on the Washita, where he remained until 1884.) From thence they moved to Fort Stanton, New Mexico, and in a short time, on account of the failing health of Mrs. Powers, they went on to California. After forking hay in the state of the Golden Gate through one season, Ace decided that this was not a proper vocation for a gentleman of his habits and hit the road back to the panhandle, arriving here in 1895. He bought what is now known as the Simmons ranch of M. M. Chase and again took up the business of stock-raising. Two years later he sold this property to I. P. Mulock and, coming up the Palo Duro about ten miles, took up land and established the ranch on which he has since made his home, and where he reared a large family of fine boys and girls. It is known as the Loma Alto and is one of the very best ranches in north Texas. The natural protection for live stock on this ranch is as good as can be found, as is evidenced by the fact that during the recent great blizzard only one animal was lost out of the Powers herds. As we have stated before, his numerous friends will regret to see Ace Powers leave this part of the state. He is of the salt of the earth; one of Hansford county's staunch, reliable, pioneer cattlemen. To such as he we are indebted in a large measure for the development of this country; the making of a rich, prosperous community, furnishing homes for hundreds of happy families, out of a wild, uninhabited region, where the Indian and buffalo held sway. Loyal and true to his friends, he is ever ready to help a neighbor in distress. No worthy person ever went to Ace Powers for help and went away disappointed. We regret to see him go but hope it is for the best. For the past several years Mr. Powers' health has not been the best and he wants to go to a warmer climate in which to spend his latter days. The best wishes of a host of friends will go with him.

### WILL DISCUSS AMENDMENTS

#### A Meeting in Hansford Monday Night, April 21

A meeting will be held at the court house in Hansford on Monday night, April 21 for the purpose of discussing the proposed amendment to the state constitution "prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors." It is claimed that there is no law to prohibit saloons from operating in Texas after the peace treaty is signed and until national prohibition goes into effect, without this amendment is passed. District court will be in session at the time and it is planned to have District Attorney Pickens and perhaps others make talks on this proposed amendment. Four amendments to the state constitution will be voted on on May 24. They are: "Giving or lending the credit of the state," "Providing for and relating to equal suffrage," "Prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors," and "In regard to the salary of the Governor of the state of Texas." Attend the meeting Monday night and learn more about this proposed legislation.

### In Five Drives Without a Wound

Having participated in five drives on three famous American fronts in France, those of Chateau Thierry, St. Mihiel and the Argonne forest, Chas. Butler, a Frederick volunteer, has written his mother that he came through the ordeal unscathed. Private Butler is a grandson of Mrs. Ruth Thurmond of Hansford. His letter follows:

November 28, 1918.  
Dear Mother and all:  
Will again drop you a few words to let you know that I was not even wounded through the entire war and today is Thanksgiving and we will thank the Lord and be very thankful that the war is over and we have a nice chance of seeing home again some day before many months.  
We are now called an army of occupation and are marching and parading through France and Germany. We are now in what is called Lorraine, land that has been held and occupied by Germany for the last 48 years. There is no use of your worrying about me now, as I will be with you some day and here's hoping that it will be before next fourth of July, and the chances are favorable. They all say the worst is yet to come, but this is one time it missed. The worst is over and we will soldier until the day we are discharged. But, oh, you should see some narrow escapes we have gone through—shell fire, gas, bombing attacks, machine gun at-

### Did Your Wheat Blow Out

Farmers who borrowed money from the government to buy seed wheat will be interested in the following, if their crop was destroyed either by winter killing or high winds: "Representations having been made to the treasury department and the department of agriculture that in some instances the wheat crop planted in the fall of 1918 and mortgaged to the Federal Land bank as fiscal agents, in drouth stricken areas, has been totally destroyed by winter killing or other causes, or so nearly so as to render the crops failures. In such cases, especially if it is desired to plow the wheat land and plant same to spring crops, the borrower should notify me at once, in order that I may make the necessary investigation and report to the Federal Loan bank, which will cancel the mortgage and clear up the records.

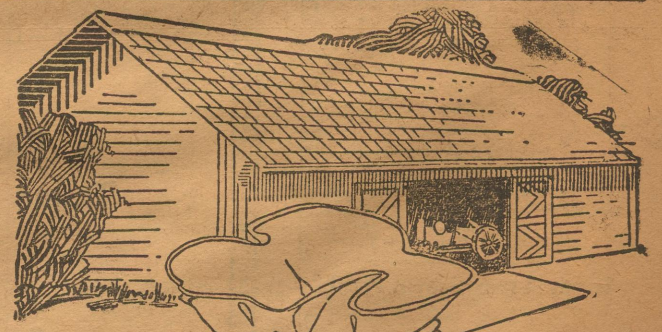

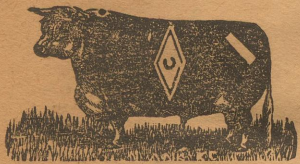

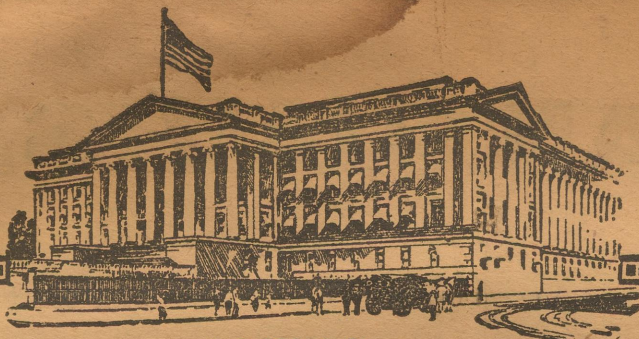
