No Hand Grenade Banks

Relative to the contemplated distribution of hand grenades converted in to savings banks, the following telegram was recently received from Washington by Frank M. Smith, federal district director:

"The Secretary of War has cancelled contracts for the sale of hand grenades to the treasury and has requested non-distribution of grenade banks. As the war department has determined that the distribution of hand grenades as souvenirs shall not be made and has cancelled its arrangement for supplying grenades to the treasury department to be manufactured into grenade savings banks, the treasury is unable to distribute the banks. In order, however, to recognize the efforts of persons in working and saving, each one who would have been led to a bank will receive a Certificate of Achievement from the Treasury in appreciation of his industry in saving and buying Government securities."

In Spearman Next Week

If the weather continues favorable and if the workmen do not go out on a strike—which workmen are wont to do these days—the railroad will reach Spearman about Wednesday, October 15. Spearman will not celebrate the occasion at this time, on account of the uncertainty of weather conditions at this season, and the further fact that there are so many other matters that demand immediate and diligent attention. It is not likely that a great deal of moving will be attempted until Ochiltree, LaKemp and Gray are thoroughly and completely moved, thus releasing the men and equipment for the work on this end of the line.

Reports of developments at Spearman are coming thick and fast and it will be a matter of only a few weeks until almost every line of business will be represented there. A Chautauqua Next Summer

J. R. A Well at Spearman

Mindful of the great and rapidly growing need of an adequate water supply at Spearman an important meeting of the Hansford County Chamber of Commerce was held at the court house on Tuesday afternoon to take steps toward having a well put down on the townsite. The meeting was called to order by President E. J. Thayer, and after a thorough discussion of the matter, during which many plans were submitted, suggestions advanced, and a careful estimate made of the cost and equipment of a well, it was decided to appoint a committee of five men to take the matter in hand and proceed as they think best, along lines which had been suggested or as nearly so as was found practicable. The president appointed on this committee Messrs P. J. Maize, John R. Collard, Hicks L. Wilbanks, Sid Clark and S. B. Hale, who immediately took the matter in hand and are working on the same. They went to Canadian yesterday to confer with F. W. Wilsey, of the Spearman Land Company, in regard to a location for the well and other matters connected therewith. The funds to defray the expense of putting down and equipping a well will probably be raised by popular subscription from lot owners and others who are interested in the town of Spearman. Or it may be that a company will be organized and stock sold. In any case, this committee of five are duly authorized to put a deal across that will insure water for the town of Spearman, and the entire community, especially the Hansford County Chamber of Commerce, is supposed to stand behind the gentlemen and assist them in every way possible. They are wide-awake, sound business men and what they do will be the best that can be done for the town and community. Be ready to meet them with a word of cheer when you are approached on the subject. This is no time to air your grievances. Watch Spearman grow.

Government Surveyors Here

Paul C. Brandon, geologist with the United States Geological Survey, is making a survey of this section of the country. Mr. Brandon informs us that as a rule oil company promoters follow these surveys very closely and take advantage of the public by trying to use the mounds placed by the survey to promote the sale of stock, leases, etc. The Bureau of Geological Survey is a government bureau, under the Department of the Interior, and the records are public documents, available to the public. Investors should consult these records to ascertain if the company in which they are investing have holdings pronounced favorable by the Geological Survey. Mr. Brandon wishes to inform the public that he is desirous of letting the public know that his survey does not mean that this quadrangle is either favorable or unfavorable for oil or gas products. The report will be made in time and then can be had by anyone who will write for it to the Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. No information is given out by Mr. Brandon or his associates.

TO KEEP CLEAR OF "WAR CHESTS"

RED CROSS RULES THAT DRIVE IS EXCLUSIVELY FOR MEMBERSHIPS.

CHAPTERS RECEIVE NOTICE

Objection Is Made to the Use of Red Cross Name in Such Connection, Is Announcement.

The Red Cross will not become a party to local or community "war chests," according to an announcement issued recently by Alfred Fairbank, Manager of the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross. The decision follows a recent ruling of the Central Committee of the American Red Cross and is based upon the fact that the forthcoming Red Cross drive, November 2 to 11, is to be a campaign for individual, not wholesale, memberships.

Chapter chairmen of the Red Cross Chapters throughout Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas have been sent the following notification by Manager Fairbank:

"The Central Committee of the American Red Cross has announced that Red Cross Chapters should not become parties to any local war chests or community war chests inasmuch as its Third Roll Call is primarily a call for Red Cross membership.

"As the Red Cross does not plan a wide general campaign for funds this year, the objection to the use of the Red Cross name in connection with such movements is more strongly emphasized than ever. Not only the success of the coming campaign but the future of the Red Cross will be largely dependent upon a full individual membership enrollment.

"Through a direct membership campaign it is possible for the Red Cross to gain the loyal and enthusiastic support of thousands of individuals to whom it must look for its future service. Only insofar as each member feels that the achievements of the Red Cross are made possible through this individual support will it be possible to carry on as comprehensive and far-reaching a program as that upon which the organization now is entering. The acquisition of every loyal member of the Red Cross forms a bulwark of strength far surpassing any possible good that could be gained through general money donations.

"It would, therefore, be detrimental to the spirit and policy of the Red Cross to seek wholesale memberships through war or community chests. The use of the Red Cross name in connection with such movements would tend only to confusion of the public mind and would lessen greatly the force of the individual call to membership."

FIGHTING MEN RESPONDING

SERVICE MEN AID RED CROSS NOVEMBER CAMPAIGN.

Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Are Answering the Call for Volunteer Workers.

Soldiers, sailors and marines, many of whom saw active service overseas, are responding in appreciable numbers to the call of the Red Cross for volunteer workers in the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11.

EARLY BUILDING FOR SUCCESS

Youth's Wise Employment of Leisure Hours Means Everything in His After Life.

If the young man could only assimilate very early in his life the fact that merely to live and eat and drink and sleep, and then die, is not enough, but that he must rob himself of many of the pleasures usually taken up by young men if he means to make his life of the highest possible use to the world, he would set his foot on the pathway to accomplish something worth while.

There is no harm in billiards or pool or in darning, baseball or card-playing, or any one of the scores of different diversions and recreations open to young men. The natural inclination usually is to devote a large part of the leisure hours of young manhood to such pleasures. But the youth who is really earnest in his ambition to do something worth while will discipline himself to resist such temptations during his early, formative years, for the whole fate of a man is largely determined by how he utilizes his plastic years. 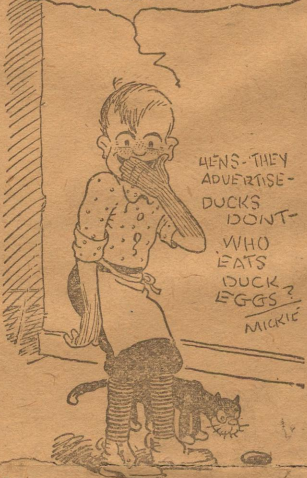

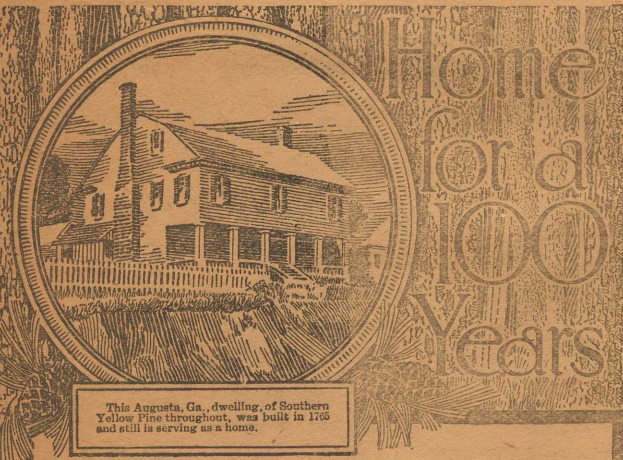

RANKS FIRST IN NATIVE BORN

Pennsylvania Leads All Her Sister States, Even With Its Record of Immigration.

Traveling through the state of Pennsylvania, one quickly gathers the impression that it is peopled with foreign born, writes John Oliver La Gorce in the National Geographic Magazine. Its vast industries have laid heavy drafts upon the labor markets of the world in times gone by, and for years not a ship that carried an immigrant to America came without a quota bound for the iron, steel and coal centers of the commonwealth.

An analysis proves, however, that even with the influx of alien labor, Pennsylvania outranks every other state in the Union in the number of sons and daughters of native parentage. Even New York has 1,000,000 fewer people whose parents were born under the aegis of the American flag.

Still, the state is distinguished for its great number of foreigners. No other state has so many Welsh, Austrians or Hungarians. It has more Welsh than County Radnorshire, more Austrians than the province of Salzburg, more Hungarians than any two cities in Hungary, Budapest excepted. It has as many English as the counties of Cambridge and Oxford together; as many Irish as County Kerry; as many Scots as County Clackmannan; as many Russians as the government of Kharikov.

THEORY PROVED ALL WRONG

New Idea of Brain Development, Started at English College, Was Quickly Dropped.

Doctor Allington, head master of Eton, gave an address at a meeting of the Windsor branch of the Workers' Educational union in the library at Eton college a few days ago.

Touching on the development of the brain, Doctor Allington said that an eminent scientist discovered that by using the right hand they developed the left side of the brain. It was thought that by using the left hand the right hand side of the brain could be developed, and it was decided at Eton to start the boys writing with the left hand. However, another eminent scientist later found that if they developed both sides of the brain at once they became idiots, and the experiment was hurriedly discontinued.

LEICESTER AGAIN A CITY.

The mayor of Leicester has received a letter from the home secretary announcing that "his majesty has been pleased to approve the restoration of your ancient town to the status of a city." The announcement, following so quickly upon the royal visit to Leicester, has given great satisfaction to all classes.

Leicester, Ledecestre, or Leycecestra, was called a city in Domesday. On the subdivision of the Mercian See in 679 the district was formed into a separate bishopric, having its See at Leicester, the first bishop being Cuthwine. The last Bishop of Leicester was Leofwine, who died in 874, and in 1078 the See was united with that of Lincoln, at which date the dignity of being a city was lost.—London Telegraph.

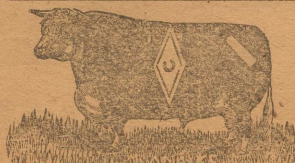
