### The Victory Liberty Loan

Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director of the War Loan Organization, writes the Headlight as follows: "There seems to be some slight doubt in the minds of some people as to the exact nature and urgency of the Victory Liberty Loan. Will you allow me to place the facts very briefly before your readers? The government spent all of the Fourth Loan money before the last installment was due from the public. It has been borrowing billions of dollars from the banks during the past few months to pay our war debts, and the time has arrived when that money must be paid back to the banks. The money which we are now asked to lend is to pay for those vast stores of equipment and ammunition, which scared the Germans stiff and made them realize they were beaten. We are asked to pay for the preparations that saved thousands of American lives; for if the government had not run up this bill our boys would be fighting and dying in the trenches today. The loan should be considered in terms of human lives, and not percentages or any other considerations, for it will constitute the

real test of Americanism. It is a loan of thanksgiving to Almighty God, to the men who succeeded and died for us, and to a sane and enlightened government that kept us out of war as long as possible, and then being in it brought us out in a manner that will live for all time as a monument of courage and efficiency. It is a loan of thanksgiving, for the preservation of our national life, our business, our fortunes, our homes, all of which were threatened."

## CANADIAN AVIATORS PROVED WISE BIRDS

When the members of the Royal Flying Corps, who trained in the Eleventh Federal War Savings District, returned to Canada, many of them had become enthusiastic buyers of War Savings Stamps. Having been given a taste of buying Government securities for small amounts, they became so insistent that the Canadian Government inaugurated a system of War Savings Stamps, similar to that in the United States.

"The leading men of the world today," recently declared a Canadian financier, "those charged with directing its affairs, realize that the exercise of thrift is absolutely necessary for the restoration of normal conditions in all countries.

"It is to be observed also that these men consider it as necessary for the people of the United States and Canada—countries undamaged by the war—to save as it is for those of France and Belgium to do so. It is the condition on which financial and industrial recovery is based."

### From Over There

France, Jan 20, 1919.

Miss Retah Roper, Dear Sister:—I received your letter today and was truly glad to hear from you again. Had been looking for a letter for several days. I am still ok and was glad to hear that there was no sickness among the home folks. Was surprised to hear of so much sickness in the country. I received a letter from Henry recently telling of the illness of Frank and Ina, but he said nothing about Ethel. He said the baby was sick, also. Hope they get along alright. I suppose you have been having some pretty cold weather, for it was real cold here last night. There was some snow this morning. I always sleep warm; have a bed sack filled with straw to sleep on. I have slept in many places, even slept on a French bedstead, while I was on the front, which I found in a big, partly torn down house. We found all kinds of nice things in those buildings. When the Germans were retreating they would tear up everything they could that was left behind. When they left a machine gun they fixed it so it wouldn't shoot. Believe me we sure made them run off and leave things and most of the time when they ran they did not get very far. I went over the top on October 8. That was the day, you said, that Duff was killed. I wonder what division he was in. I got a slight wound on the finger the night of the 7th, by a piece of a big shell. On the morning of the 8th, while a bunch of us were sitting in an old trench, a big shell, commonly known as a G. I. can, hit in a few feet of us, covering us up with dirt. No one was hurt, but I think all were scared for a few minutes. It was late in the evening; we had advanced quite a bit and dug in for the night. A nest of German machine guns was located about 200 yards in front of us but we did not know it. Someone saw the Huns and told an officer. He took a look through his field glasses and said: "Come on, boys; let's get em!" We came out without our rifles and the Huns took to the brush, but most of them fell on the way. We got three machine guns, two German prisoners, a few got away and the remainder lay "at ease" on the field. I helped bring one of the captured machine guns back to our lines. We didn't lose a man in this encounter. They opened fire on us from somewhere as we started back and I didn't lose any time on the return trip. That night they began shelling us. They threw rolling kitchens, G. I. cans, and I don't know what else. I was not to say scared, but I could not help but shudder when those big shells camouflaged by or over me. I think the Lord was with me all the time. I felt all the time that I was going to make it through ok. Many things have happened since that day of which I can not take time to write, but I will tell you all when I get home, and I hope that won't be long. I know you need me to help do the work; you wouldn't have to work in the field if I was there. You are almost taking my place. I feel like I have done my part over here. I think they will get us back, tho, as soon as possible. We can't all come at once and I am willing to wait until my time I am still at H. Q. Co., and am getting plenty to eat. Today I had eggs and French fried potatoes. The potatoes were French fried because a French lady fried them. There is a French barber shop here. The Frenchman cuts hair and the French lady does the shaving. I generally get a shave. We had an entertainment here a short time ago put on by three ladies and a gentleman of the Y. M. C. A. They had a picnic program. Sunday morning I attended a Catholic church service. They have a funny way of doing things, but I felt like I was at church just the same. The interior of the church was very pretty. No one asked me to go home with them when church was over, but I beat it to the mess line, and was alright. I generally get more in my mess kit than I can eat but there is always a bunch of French kids to give it to, so I do not throw much in the waste barrel. Tell Emory to get his horses fat, if they are not already fat, as I may want to borrow them when I get home, to drive around.

Well, I must ring off this time, as it won't do to write too long a letter. So, love to you all. I think most of you home folks, and will be glad when I can look across the plains once more. Tell everybody, good luck. I would like to write to them all, but I can't, so give them my best wishes.

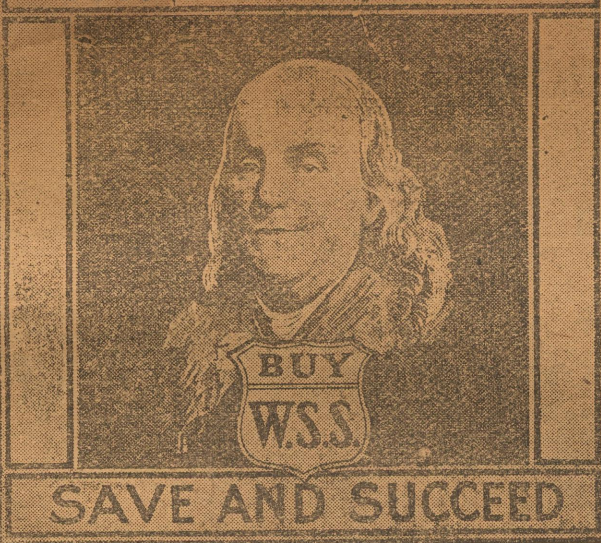

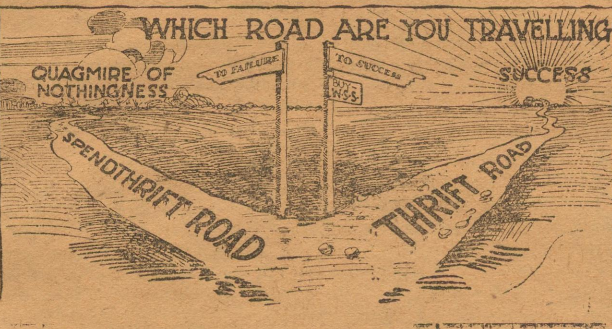

## Legislature Unanimously Urges Buying of War Savings Stamps

Wise spending, wise saving and the buying of War Savings Stamps is the financial program suggested by the present Legislature. In fact, a resolution was unanimously passed in both the Senate and the House in which the War Savings campaign is enthusiastically endorsed. Senator W. L. Dean of Huntsville and Representative C. F. Richards of Lockhart, presented the resolution.

"The importance of the War Savings Campaign is evidenced by this action of the Legislature," said Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director for the Eleventh War Savings District. "Every War Savings Stamp bought means much more for the support of the Government. It also means that the investor is making of himself a better citizen and laying aside a reserve for emergencies."

The resolution on War Savings, passed by the Texas Legislature, follows:

"WHEREAS an intelligent thrifty and saving citizenship is the greatest guarantee of the prosperity of a Nation or any subdivision thereof; and,

"WHEREAS, such characteristics are a certain proof of a strong, self-reliant and independent people; and,

"WHEREAS, the United States Government through a nation-wide educational campaign is seeking to inculcate the science of wise spending and wise saving through the practice of intelligent personal economy and conversation; and,

"WHEREAS, the United States Government through the War Savings Movement is urging its citizenship to attain the goal of success through the systematic and business-like saving and investment of their savings in United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps and Thrift Stamps; and,

"WHEREAS, a safer and surer investment than United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps, which constantly increase in value and which constant increase is guaranteed, cannot be had; and,

"WHEREAS, the flower of our State and the Nation have given their lives by the thousands upon the battlefields of France that the world

might be made safe for Democracy and the citizens of our State and Nation enjoy the blessings of world peace; and,

"WHEREAS, the United States Government spent of its treasure that victory might be won, believing that its people appreciate the blessings of peace to the extent that they will lend of their savings that the Victory bill may be paid and lasting peace assured; and,

"WHEREAS, there are still thousands of our soldiers guarding the Rhine and bearing the torch of Democracy on the snow-covered plains of Russia; and,

"WHEREAS, the test hour of the patriotism of our people and honor of our State is here; therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislature of the State of Texas that the citizens of the State of Texas be urged to the practice of wise spending and wise saving that by thrift they may acquire power and by saving succeed; and further,

"BE IT RESOLVED that the citizenship of Texas set itself to the practice of thrift, giving expression thereof in the acquisition of United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps and Thrift Stamps."
