A Fiddling Senate

History says that Nero fiddled while Rome burned. The United States senate is indulging in a similar pastime. Senator McCumber of North Dakota, republican, scored the Foreign Relations committee of the senate last week for playing politics with the treaty of peace and the league of nations. Everyone knows that the delay in ratifying the treaty is causing unrest and disturbance throughout the world, as well as keeping up the high cost of living. President Wilson has stated that the league of nations is only binding on us morally, and it in no way limits or interferes with our sovereign power or any of our rights. There are three great moral forces embodied in the league of nations, each of which, alone will prevent wars in the future. The first is, that the league binds every nation to give up arms, and to stop starting a war. In three months time, the power of public opinion will be able to prevent the commencement of that war. The second point is that no nation will be allowed to build up a traffic in arms, such as the great Krupp works

in Germany did, and without which Germany would never have started the war. The third point is that every nation signing the league has agreed to impose a commercial boycott on whichever nation wilfully attempts to start a war. These three great principles will be more than ample to prevent another terrible war. While the senate has been dilly-dallying with the treaty and talking as if they were going to reject it, the Hapsburgs of Austria have been getting busy and one of the grand dukes of the old dynasty actually got possession of the Hungarian government for a few days, and there are powerful influences at work in Germany endeavoring to place the Kaiser back on the throne. All of these evil developments have resulted from the hostile attitude of certain senators in regard to the league of nations. If there is no sense of nations there will be nothing to prevent the old bloody warriors and savages of Germany and Austria from plunging Europe into war again and finally drawing us into it, as they did before. Every senator who votes against the league, or who delays it by offering useless amendments is working in the interest of future wars and further slaughter of the human race. It is said that every senator is receiving piles of letters from his constituents urging prompt ratification of the league, which will not only prevent future wars, but will speedily restore the country to normal and peaceful conditions. Every citizen who believes in ending wars for all time should write to his senator urging him to vote for the ratification of the treaty.

Sipe Springs Oil Money Is Going into Safe Investments.

Ralph's machine and crew, which has been operating south and southeast of town, being now at the J. C. Lee farm, up to Thursday noon had threshed out 73,000 bushels of wheat, oats and barley. They are short of helpers but manage to keep going. Mr. Schoolfield states that after this season's run is finished he will retire from the threshing machine business, and is now offering his entire equipment for sale.

Billy Christian, sheriff and oil booster of Hutchinson county, was in Hansford Monday on business. Billy says the contract was recently let to E. A. Haynes, who is drilling the Trigg well 18 miles north of Amarillo, for a test well on the Dial ranch, 5 miles west of Plemons, to be spudded in within 120 days. This is the third drilling contract let for test wells in Hutchinson county, while one rig is up and running.

The largest campaign fund ever raised in the history of the nation is to be attempted by the democrats in the coming presidential election, according to Wm. D. Jamieson, director of finance of the National Democratic Committee, who announces that five million dollars will be raised for that purpose. A large part of the money will be spent in educating women in the art of voting, Mr. Jamieson states. Among those mentioned by Mr. Jamieson as available material for next presidential timber are: Wm. G. McAdoo, Attorney General; A. Mitchell Palmer, Governor Cox of Ohio; John W. Davis, Ambassador to England; Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska; and Vice President Marshall.

CONDEMNNS NEGLECT OF BLIND

Director of Institute for Helping Unfortunates Criticizes the Attitude of the Public.

In the American Journal of Care for Cripples, the attitude of the public toward the blind is discussed by Lieut. Col. James Bordley, director of the Red Cross Institute for the Blind at Baltimore, where American blinded soldiers are given the courage and the training necessary for their struggle with a new mode of living.

"By some strange process of reasoning the blind man is looked upon as something apart from the rest of our civilization," writes Colonel Bordley. "He automatically loses his job, and his social position with the loss of his vision; he is looked upon as not only physically but mentally disqualified from earning a living. This is not only unfair, but it is absurd. There are capable blind and incapable blind just as among sighted people. The most potent cause in the failure of the blind is the total lack of provision for their vocational re-education. There is not in this broad land of ours a single vocational school for the blind, nor has there ever been devised a scientific scheme for their education. There is not a single normal school teacher to teach the blind. The average wage of the industrious blind man is \$4 per week, and of the corresponding blind woman about \$3 per week. Is this not utterly unfair?"

LOYAL TO BELOVED AUNTIE

Small Girl Willing to Give Up "Good-look" to Help Unfortunate Relative's "Reputation."

Aunt Marcia is head of the English department in a Hoosier high school and very proud of her position—or was until the other night when her eight-year-old niece came home from school crying. The whole family coaxed until finally she explained what was wrong. "The children said that you were a terrible old maid," she finally sobbed, pointing to her auntie.

Everybody was amused, most of all Aunt Marcia. But still she tried to console her small niece. "Yes, auntie is an old maid," she admitted, "but what of that? It makes you have a lots nicer time than if she were married. If I were married like mother then I couldn't buy you all the pretties I do nor take you all the places I do. Now, wouldn't you rather have me an old maid than married?"

The tot considered the situation for a brief time. Then unselfishly she made answer: "I'd hate to give up my pretty things, but still I will if you'll get married, auntie. I'll do anything to help your 'reputation.'"

ENEMIES TO MOSQUITOES.

If you want to free the neighborhood of mosquitoes encourage swallows to make themselves at home, says a report of the American Forestry association. These birds feed almost entirely upon obnoxious insects and they will do much toward protecting orchards and other trees from insect pests. No better investment can be made, therefore, than some houses set out for martins or other swallows. Of the blue swallows the purple martin is the largest, the male being entirely blue above and below while the female is blue above with a gray breast. Swallows are highly migratory, most of them spending the winter in South America.

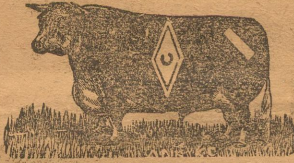

EXPENSIVE COAL IN ALASKA

Hard to Understand in View of What Has Been Told of the Abundant Supply There.

But with coal at \$37.50 per ton and other necessities in proportion, what can we do in the matter of developing the country?"

Have we not been told in days past that coal was abundant in Alaska? Has it not been remarked that there was a source of supply which the Western states ought to consider carefully?

Why, then, should it command a price that excites wonderment even down here in the land of costly coal? And if it is so expensive so close to the place where it is mined, what would be asked for it by the time it got to the Pacific coast ports?—Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.

COST OF GINGHAM.

Why do you have to pay 75 cents a yard for gingham that would have sold four years ago for 25 cents? One reason, explains Richard Tingley, in Forbes Magazine, is that the manufacturers of cotton goods were suddenly called upon to switch their industry that had been "set" or "gauged" to produce the goods of the civilian trade to the production of the goods of war. The war found the cotton mill men working on well-established lines, producing just about goods enough (or a little bit more) to meet the needs of our home people. War stepped in and told them that they must reorganize their smooth-running factories and produce the goods of war. The result has been that, for the last two years their factories were working about 40 per cent on the goods of war, and about 60 per cent on civilian goods. More than this. The disruption of organization has resulted in a loss of efficiency in the production of civilian goods of at least 20 per cent, so it is safe to say that the production of cotton goods such as you and I wear has been but about 50 per cent of normal since the war began. To give you an idea of what this means, I will say that this 50 per cent shortage amounted, in 1918 alone, to upward of 7,000,000,000 square yards of cloth!
