Hammering the Hun line until it bent and broke, bearing the Kaiser and his clans down to inglorious defeat on in greater numbers than any other It was a weapon they had never used before, one that had been obsolete for centuries—the hand-grenade—but when the brawny lads from the U.S. A, sent the old "eggs," as they wer called, spinning into dugout and pill box, the only Boches remaining on the ground were those ready to be buried

Grenades were known to have been used five centuries ago. In 1427, at the siege of the Fortress of Casmag giore on the River Po in Italy, the defenders used a primitive grenade, made of a glass bottle filled with powder. For a time, grenades remade out of heavy paper, then out of glass and then out of metal. With the close of the eighteenth century, the grenade began to be discarded and little use had been made of it unil the Russo-Japanese war in 1904 It remained for the Great World War to see the grenade developed into its present efficiency. The grenades used by the American doughboys were as carefully manufactured as their rifles. But the end of hostilities found a limited supply on hand and these were turned over to the Savngs Division of the Treasury Depart ment, the explosives extracted and they have been made over into savings

OWED MUCH TO STEREOSCOPE

How Commanders During the Great War Got Information of Vital Importance.

The old-fashioned stereoscope played an important part in the world war. It supplied an angle to photographs, snapped from airplanes, that could not be obtained from the that could not be obtained from the ordinary camera lens, Before its use the pictures all seemed flat, but the stereoscope added height, and thus steep slopes, that appeared in pictures like flat ground, were shown in their true characteristics, and the lives of men who would have to cover the ground in attack were saved.

The airnlane camera looks directly

the ground in attack were saved.

The airplane camera looks directly down on the spot to be photographed, making a picture as a one-eyed man would see it. A stereoscopic camera, in which the lenses are two and three-quarters inches apart, would not worker the storeographs affect. Place three-quarters inches apart, would not produce the stereoscopic effect. Photographers decided to take pictures 100 yards apart to give a view, just as a giant, with eyes 100 yards apart, would see it. These pictures were put on cardboard, and viewed through the stereoscope. At first a cottage 160ked like a tower, a bucket like a well, a trench like a canyon, etc. The officers soon learned to translate these eccentricities, and the problem was solved. True pictures, giving just the exact information desired, were then obtained by the sirplane photograobtained by the airplane photogra-

Average Person Seems to Lack Sense When Brought Into Contact With the Afflicted.

"It is easy enough to re-educate the blind, but much harder to educate the public," writes Eugene Brieux, the noted French author, in the current issue of the American Journal of Care for Cripples.

"People who can see know nothing of the life of the man who has lost his sight, and on meeting a blind man are often so deeply moved that their judgment is completely upset. It often occurs, for instance, that in a railway carriage, on seeing a blind man with a guide, a traveler addresses himself to the latter with the question: 'Has he been blind for a long time? As if the blind man were a piece of luggage and unable to answer for himself.

"Many seeing persons are so affected by the thought of blindness that they confuse it with death. A lady made me the following avowal, awful in its naive egotism: 'I should like to help the blind, but I cannot do it personally. I cannot look at them; it is too dreadful, and I am so sensitive.' She sent a gift to a charitable society and considered that she had done her duty toward
