### SPEAKER R. E. THOMASON ANNOUNCES FOR GOVERNOR

El Paso Attorney, Native of Gainesville, Throws His Hat Into gubernatorial Ring.

Speaker R. E. Thomason, of the House of Representatives, has formally announced his intention of becoming a candidate for governor at the democratic primary election in July.

Speaker Thomason was reared near Gainesville. He was district attorney there for four years, during which he made a record for law enforcement.

Removing to El Paso he became one of the leading attorneys of the western part of the state and was elected representative for four years. He was selected as speaker of the House of Representatives without opposition as a testimonial to his popularity and hard work in the interest of better laws.

During the different sessions of the legislature, Representative Thomason was active in the passage of prohibition laws and in the interest of woman's suffrage. He was the author of several clean election laws and the joint author of the zone bill which

enacted prohibition about the army camps.

Mr. Thomason plans to open campaign headquarters in Dallas later and will begin his speaking campaign at his home in Gainesville and will cover the entire state.

Rev. Ira B. Sanford, who has been pastor of the Methodist church of Hansford the past year, was sent by the conference recently held in Lubbock to Vega, Oldham county. Mr. Thayer has accepted the cashiership of the First National Bank of Holly, which institution is owned by C. C. Chandler and associates. Their many friends regret very much that this most estimable family are leaving us. They will be greatly missed in business and social circles.

### DISTRICT COURT

Judge Ewing and Attorney Pickens arrived in Hansford Sunday afternoon and were on hand bright and early Monday morning to hold the regular November term of the district court. There were no cases of importance on the docket, and the petit jury was dismissed for the term Monday at noon. The grand jury was in session Monday and Tuesday and, we understand, found a number of bills of indictment, all of which were of a trivial nature, such as "shootin' craps, etc." The finding of these bills by the grand jury is something very much out of the ordinary. The people of Hansford county are a law-abiding people and it is very seldom that any but civil cases are on the court docket. S. B. Hale, B. V. Andrews and Fred W. Brandt served as jury commissioners and selected the jurymen for the April, 1920, term of court.

### A REAL BUSY MAN

Everybody is busy these days, but Mr. Bumpas, the depot agent, is particularly busy. When seen by a Headlight reporter Wednesday night Mr. Bumpas reported that about thirty cars of wheat had been shipped out of Spearman to date and that eight cars were then being loaded. Freight is being received daily, a particularly large shipment being received that day for local and Hansford merchants. The passenger train arrives each afternoon and leaves for Shattuck each morning. It is not yet running on a regular schedule, but will be soon. The ballasting, surfacing and bridge gangs are working this side of Perryton and when they have finished the work to this point the road will be ready to turn over to the railway company and business will then be conducted in the regular way. The workmen will be here within thirty days to begin the construction of the depot. The Santa Fe telephone line is up as far as Booker and is being strung on down the line toward Spearman at a rapid rate. It will take the place of a telegraph line for the present.

### DISTINGUISHED VISITORS

A large party of distinguished visitors, among whom we noticed Messrs. Thos. C. Spearman, E. J. Engle, R. J. Parker and J. W. Walter arrived in Spearman Tuesday afternoon in their special car and spent several hours looking over the greatness of the little city at the end of the rail. Many of these gentlemen are interested in Hansford county real estate, and came out to see how the country looks after a railroad has been built into our midst. They were also inspecting the road and making arrangements for further improvements at Spearman. They were well pleased with developments at Spearman and say they expect it to make one of the best towns in the southwest. This is the first special train which has been run to Spearman, and the visitors received a royal welcome from our citizens.

E. H. Barbour, prosperous farmer-stockman of the Wilbanks community, was trading and looking after business matters in Spearman Wednesday.

Hayden and Mart Hart passed thru Spearman Tuesday with two of as fine bulls as can be found in the Panhandle, which they were taking to their ranch up the Palo Duro. The boys had purchased these fine animals at a sale of thoroughbreds recently held at Weatherford, Oklahoma.

Spearman is rapidly developing into a wheat market of considerable importance and the local buyers are having pretty fair luck in keeping cars on hand to unload the wagons as fast as they come in. A new wheat buyer appears on the scene almost every day and all seem to be doing a good business. Wheat is bringing a good price; about \$2.15 per bushel. Much complaint is heard among the wheat growers concerning the way their wheat has been graded in the past. They claim that Hansford county farmers have been skinned out of thousands of dollars during this season, by the buyers not paying the top of the market and also grading the wheat down. Farmers are delighted in that they can now take a load of wheat to town and return the same day. It is much better than spending from three days to a week on the road, and much less expensive.

The vote Tuesday of last week disclosed some very interesting facts. The voters who didn't know anything about the issues just shut their eyes and voted "anti" on everything. They swatted the whole ticket. Nobody could possibly want to deny Galveston the right to build their own sea walls and protect themselves from devastating gulf storms, and yet forty per cent of the voters were against granting Galveston that privilege. They voted for the confederate pension amendment without knowing what it was but just because it had the words "Confederate Pensions" on the amendment; and this comment is not condemning the amendment either. We are just commenting on the way the voters handled their ticket. The prison profits amendment was one of the most progressive and humanitarian steps that the state has ever taken and it would have in a measure cured the suspended sentence evil and the pardon privilege that is becoming irksome to the public. It would not have cost the property owners of the state anything in taxes, but the east Texas voters swatted it just because it had something—Canadian.

### OUR OIL WELLS

Coal is being hauled out from Spearman this week to be used in putting down the Coble-Haywood test well, 19 miles south, in Hutchinson county. The derrick is up and everything about in readiness to begin drilling on this well. The result of this test will be watched with great interest throughout this entire country. That gas in great quantities will be found, there seems to be little doubt, as it is bubbling up through the water in a nearby creek, and geologists say that every indication of oil is found at this place. The machinery will be shipped to Spearman and hauled out to the site from here. It is not known at this time how soon drilling will begin but the work is being rushed as much as possible. A force of workmen are now engaged in building a road from Spearman out south over which the machinery can be hauled. Experienced oil men who have examined the Coble-Haywood proposition say they have great confidence in the venture and do not hesitate to say that they believe oil will be found in paying quantities.

Jack Craig of the Beaver Oil & Gas Company, came from Liberal Monday to look after business matters here. Mr. Craig says everything is in readiness to start the drill on his company's test on the Miller anticline, on the north line of Hansford county, but that they are being held up on account of the failure of a shipment of casing to arrive. This casing has been on the road about three months and the company has three men out trying to locate it. Business will pick up over on the Coldwater as soon as this casing arrives.

Bob and Dan Archer of Holt were looking after business matters in Spearman Wednesday afternoon.

R. F. Dennis, prosperous farmer and good citizen of the Halt community, was transacting business in Spearman Thursday.

R. S. McClellan and sons, R. L. and Elmo, loaded a car of wheat at Spearman Tuesday, from their farm in the Grand Plains community.

Sheriff Hicks L. Wilbanks was over from Hansford Wednesday afternoon looking around and trying to stay up with the growth of our city.

B. V. Andrews returned Tuesday from a business visit to Kansas City. Mr. Andrews came back via Shattuck over the North Texas & Santa Fe.

Work on the Spearman public well is progressing nicely. The drilling is about finished and as soon as the pump and engine arrives, Spearman will be supplied with water.

Druggist Lyman J. Hillhouse spent Tuesday at the Cator ranch, up the Palo Duro, vaccinating the Diamond C calf crop. Mr. Hillhouse says they are a bunch of mighty fine calves.

W. T. Martin and J. A. Brown of Stratford and Victor Schubert of Dalhart were business visitors to Spearman Wednesday. These gentlemen are thinking some of coming to Spearman and engaging in the mercantile business. Come on; there is always room for one more.

Sid Clark is fixing up a very nifty barber shop on the east side of Main street. He is putting in new fixtures and bath and will overhaul and repaint the building from top to bottom and end to end. Another barber is on the job steady now, and you never have to wait so long as formerly and sometimes you don't have to wait at all.

H. Probst of the Probst Grain company of Arkansas City; R. L. Smith of Shattuck and J. W. Gerhardt of the Hipple Grain company, commission men of Kansas City, were in Spearman Thursday. 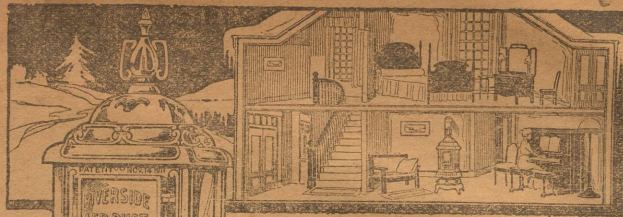

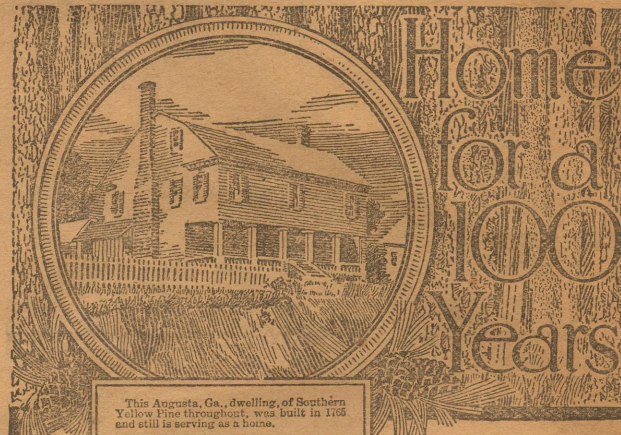
