Plans mapped out for downtown area

Improvements to the City of Rockwall's downtown area, as outlined in a recent study, will be one of the projects considered for the next Capital Improvement Program, city council members agreed recently.

The Council also authorized city staff to work with developers interested in downtown private investments.

The cost to implement the plan will be about \$6 million, according to the Downtown Improvements Study completed by Birkhoff, Hendricks & Conway authorized by the City Council in 2007. Projects include paving, drainage and sidewalk improvements;

streetscape improvements such as landscaping and irrigation; and electrical improvements.

The Downtown Plan is a project that includes retail shops, offices and residential units around a pedestrian-friendly square where people gather for regular public event such as concerts and fairs Development would continue with gourmet restaurants and specialty shops to become a gathering destination reflecting the character of the Rockwall community.



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

Forty seventh-grade students participated in a two-week Culinary Camp conducted by the Rockwall Independent School District Career and Technical Education program earlier this month.


As part of the program, Zanata



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

Power outage leaves Heath in the dark

Several Heath neighborhoods and businesses were left in the dark on Wednesday, July 16 after a truck damaged power lines and three utility poles. The accident occurred at Laurence Drive and Willow Springs.

According to Cindy Tayem at Oncor Electricity Delivery, an 18-wheeler traveling on Laurence became tangled in the cable t.v. power lines and hit the three power poles, breaking all three. One pole carried a transformer that was destroyed. All three poles had to be replaced.

Electric service was out along Laurence-740 north to Summer Lee Drive. Oncor

was able to switch service in stages from other grids to the affected areas while the damage was repaired. Tayem said 400 customers were without power for about 26 minutes, 200 customers for about an hour and 20 minutes, and 120 customers for about four hours.

The recent death of Tony Snow brought sadness to millions of Americans who admired the man's public service and optimism about his country. But not everybody felt the need to honor him. Just hours after he died from cancer, the Associated Press released an obituary that has shocked some people and badly damaged the AP's image, at least in the conservative community.

AP reporter Douglass Daniel began the article by listing some of Tony's accomplishments, but then suddenly veered into ideological territory, writing: "With a quick-from-the-lip repartee, broadcaster's good looks and a relentlessly bright outlook - if not always a command of the facts - he became a popular figure around the country to the delight of his White House bosses...

"Critics suggested that Snow was turning the traditionally informational daily briefing into a personality-driven media event short on facts and long on confrontation."

Now, remember, that was written just hours after the man passed away at age 53. To accuse Snow of factual inaccuracies without citing evidence is itself irresponsible, but to do it in an obit is outrageously inappropriate and an insult to the Snow family. If the Associated Press wants to do an opinion piece about Snow's public service, fine. But at least wait until after the funeral.

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The AP's treatment of Tony was in marked contrast to its sendoff for the late Tim Russert. That obituary was a glowing tribute to the man, as it should have been. Russert had a lot in common with Snow. They both worked for political guys - Russert's former boss was the late Democratic Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan - and they both hosted Sunday morning network news programs.

But while Russert was suitably honored by the AP, Snow came in for some snarky jibes.

Of course, this is all about ideology. The Associated Press has no use for President Bush, and that opinion has crept into its hard news coverage. This is a serious situation. The AP is America's primary news service; its dispatches go out to thousands of media organizations all over the world, many of which simply print whatever the AP sends them.

And increasingly the AP is sending them opinion, not fact.

The head of the Associated Press, Tom Curley, told my producers he "stands by the obituary," so we invited him on "The Factor" to defend it. Immediately Curley turned standing into running — as in away. He refused to come on the program or issue a further statement.

I think Curley's treatment of Snow should be included in his own obituary. And furthermore, the Associated Press may now be dead as an objective news organization.

How ironic that one obit could so quickly lead to another.

Faith-based currency... what's it worth?

The Latin term "fiat" roughly translates to "there shall be". When we refer to fiat money, we are referring to money that exists because the government declares it into existence. It is not based on production or earnings, and not backed by any commodity.

It is solely based on trusting the government. Fiat money is exchanged in the economy as long as there is faith in the government that issues it.

Some are blaming the recent shakeup in the markets to "whining" or financial fear-mongering, which misses the whole point. History has shown that fiat money, or "faith-based currency" always fails, because when governments claim this power, they always behave irresponsibly.

When government has the ability to create and spend all the money it wants, priorities shift, and the concept of budgeting, as most Americans know it, loses all meaning. Hand a teenager a credit card, and tell him there is no limit and no accountability for what he spends, and the effect would be the same. You see, this problem is not unique to our government.

It is a predictable outcome based on human nature, and we've seen variations of what we are experiencing now happen over and over throughout history. I didn't have a crystal ball or a fortune teller when I predicted this three, seven, or even 30 years ago. Actions have logical consequences. The government becomes the reckless teenager with the credit card, and in the end, the taxpaying citizens get the bill. What happens after that is never pretty.

This is why our founding fathers considered, but decidedly rejected the creation of a national central bank. They understood that governments, even

Douglass' students are four to five years below grade level. Most of its ninthgraders read at the third-, fourth- or fifth-grade levels. In 2006, only 24 percent of its students tested proficient in reading, in math just 11 percent, and that's an improvement over previous years. Only one student managed to score above 1,000 on the SAT and another student scored 440 out of 1,600. You get 400 points for just writing in your name. Out of its 1,100 students, 200 to 300 are absent each day. Many of those who do show up don't do so on time; they roam the hallways and leave the school during the day. Only one-half of the school's 500 incoming freshmen ninth-graders return for their sophomore year and far fewer remain for graduation

Sixty-six percent of the teachers are uncertified. Even if there were no certified teacher shortage, I doubt whether many teachers with attractive alternatives would want to teach at the school. Douglass High School is not a place for teachers with high expectations for their students. English teacher Mr. McDermott resigned in the middle of the school year saying, "Teaching becomes secondary, and discipline is the main thing that goes on. I don't feel like I'm making a difference anymore."

Cameras followed then-principal Isabelle Grant on her visit to the home of a chronically absent student. The student who reads at the fifth- or sixth-grade level is promised that if she attends school regularly she'll be promoted to the 11th grade. It is impossible to eliminate such a reading deficit in a semester. Teachers are pressured into passing failing students. The documentary showed that within a few days of graduation time the school went from having 138 eligible graduates to 200. Promoting and graduating students who haven't made the grade is nothing short of academic fraud.

Douglass High School teachers and staff appeared to be concerned and caring people, but the poor quality educational outcomes demonstrate that concern and caring is not enough. The virtually empty classrooms, filmed on back-to-school night, suggested little parental interest in their children's education. School day behavior demonstrated little student interest. Some students spent class time laughing, joking and tussling with one another. Others had their heads lying on their desks or appeared uninterested in the teacher's discussion. Many of those engaged in student-teacher exchange on academic topics showed very limited reasoning ability. Frederick Douglass was founded in 1883 as the

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
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
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the best of governments, cannot control spending. Even the current administration, which promised strict fiscal responsibility, has had to increase the national debt limit by 65 percent to keep up with its spending sprees.

Every dollar created and spent by government makes the dollars in your pocket worth less and less. Eventually any currency controlled by government will be debased to worthlessness, and will wipe out the savings of the citizens who put faith in that currency.

Hard currencies, on the other hand, force governments to remain in check, strictly limited to the revenues they can raise from the country's economic health. This is also an incentive for government to stay out of the way of productivity.

The hyper-regulation in today's economy demonstrates that this is no longer the case. What does it matter if the economy is crippled and the tax-base eroded, if government can create whatever dollars they need to keep the special interests happy?

We have been building economic castles on the sand, and the tide is coming in. The answer is not to bring in more sand, but to move to more solid foundation. So yes, it is true that many are complaining about our economic trouble, but our economic trouble is not caused by their complaining. Many are being forced to wake up to the predictable troubles associated with faith-based currency. As more people notice the hardships, more will lose faith.

We are long overdue for a course correction and I can only hope that this awakening translates to a solid approach to currency reform.

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

Believing...Mark 9:17-27


Believing God's rightly divided word is the key to unlocking those doors that have been keeping us from tapping into a victoriously more-than-abundant life from God in heaven.

In Mark 9:14-27 we find more scripture for us to learn from on the subject of believing to receive from God. A man brought his son to Jesus' disciples to be healed, and they could not heal him. He then brought his son to Jesus for the same reason.

"And one of the multitude answered and said, 'Master, I have brought unto you my son which has a dumb spirit."" The man knew where to bring his son. He understood Jesus Christ's authority. In verse 18 he described to Jesus the symptoms of the problem. He then informed him that he had already brought his son to Jesus' disciples, and that they could not heal his son.

Later in verse 22 Jesus asked the man how long it had been since this came upon his son. You know, when somebody comes to a minister or an elder in the Church with a need for healing or ministering, there will usually be a need to get more information. This could be true even when the ministering and healing involves direct revelation from God.

During the man's explanation, he revealed his heart with the following words in verse 22, "...but if you can do any thing, have compassion on us and help us." The use of "if" is often an indication of doubt. He had already blamed the disciples for not being able to heal his son. Now he's coming to the son of God and saying "if" you can



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
