



# Water usage, West Nile testing discussed at Royse City Council meeting

Darwin Whiteside and Jim Melody, board members representing Royse City with the North Texas Municipal Water District, spoke to the Royse City Council June 25 regarding the contract the city has with the district. They addressed the issue of water usage reduction for Royse City, the policies for buying water, government regulations and the concern for the invasive zebra mussels in the lakes from where the city gets its water.

Mosquito spraying for the West Nile virus is a topic still on citizens' minds considering the illnesses and deaths that occurred from last year's outbreak of the virus. Brent Stowers, Parks, Recreation and Facility Maintenance superintendent for Royse City, said city officials are in the process of trapping the mosquitoes for testing. The mosquitoes will be sent to the Department of State Health Service in Austin.


Stowers said his goal is to send at least one sample every week and the results should be back from Austin in three to four days. Should a positive test be returned, his department will spray within a 1-1½ mile radius of the site.

Also on the agenda was the Shaw Drive dedication set for 10 a.m. July 12. The dedication is to name the unpaved road at Collin County Road 2515, which runs between the Royse City High School and the land owned by Imperium, Shaw Drive in honor of 97-year-old Runelle Shaw, a resident at the Royse City Health and Rehabilitation Center.

The motion to rename the unpaved road was addressed and passed unanimously in the May 14 Royse City Council meeting. Joan Shaw Cantrell, her sister and two brothers were instrumental in getting the council to make the move while their mother was still alive and could possibly attend or even speak at the event. Cantrell's family farmed that section of land year ago, even where the high school now sets.

An update by City Manager Carl Alsabrook confirmed that the Erby Campbell Overpass project is going well. He also noted that the house owned by the city at 107 N. Houston, built in 1882 and was the home of Byrd Royse, the namesake of the town, will soon have a fence around the house. This house is a part of the historical preservation of downtown Royse City. Alsabrook is working with an Eagle Scout to install and paint the fence as part of his service project.

Royse City Council members present at the meeting were Mayor Jerrell Baley, Mayor Pro Tem Janet Nichol, Bill Bell, Matt Wheatley and Tom Crowley. Meetings take place in the Police and Courts Building, 100 W. Main Street on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 7 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for July 9.

# Farmers Helping Each Other Early to Mid 19( Vall C Charles

Farming has changed dramatically over the last century. Today the farming is done with high powered machinery and very few actual farm laborers.

During the early 1900s, farmers plowed, planted, weeded, and harvested crops during the growing season, the warmer months.

The planting and harvesting of the crops was done by a handguided plow pulled by a horse or mule, and by the manual laborer with a hoe or rake. This was not just a man's job. Women and children also planted, weeded, and harvested the crops.

Farms were so large and such a demanding chore that children from the youngest age were put into the fields to help out. Farmers often helped each other by plowing and planting one farmer's crop, then moving on to the next farm to do the same. Cotton and corn were the main cash crops.

When harvest season came, families would all pitch in and help each other. If illness or death struck a family, neighbors would go to help run the farm, until the family was back on their feet.

The women would gather at each other's homes to help with the canning process as the men brought in the crops, of fruits and vegetables. As is told the book Images of America-Royse City written by Sheri Stodghill Fowler and related by Deloris Ballard of the Royse City Zaner Robison Historical Museum, the women would also go to each other's homes for quilting parties, and to make lye soap and candles.

Quilting parties could be held at any time during the year, but the making of lye soap and candles was done during the coldest months, usually January and February, as that is when the hogs were slaughtered. Soap and candles were made from rendering the fat of the hog.

"Hog killing time", as it was referred to, also was a time when families came together to help each other as it was a strenuous job. The hogs needed to be prepared, butchered, cut into the types of "cut" desired, then wrapped, and most often taken to an ice house for storage. People would pay to store their meat such as pork, beef, and chickens. If not, they would smoke the meats in a smokehouse.

I remember that as children, we loved this day. Everyone had a job, and it seemed like so much fun, yet very important. The best part was the end of the day, usually way after dark, as hog killing was a long process. Mother would fry up some fresh pork, make a big skillet of cream gravy from the meat drippings, and a big pan of fluffy, homemade biscuits. Now that was good eating! Those of you who experienced this special meal know what I am talking about.

Royse City resident Teddy Baley, brother of Royse City's Mayor Jerrell Baley, tells the story of his family during the 1940s. He said that they rented a farm from Dudley Miller. They grew mainly cotton and corn. He said they worked 6 days a week from daylight until dark in the fields, and brought in helpers to help out when the work got demanding, especially during harvest time. He was 6 years old when they started farming Dudley's place in Union Valley. Over time, they

rented 3 different farms from Dudley who was a busines says he knows all about planting and harvesting, and can n families worked to help each other.

On a personal note, although it was in the late 19 1950s, I can remember my Daddy putting me on the very cotton sack and pulling me through the hot cotton fields it with the cotton he was picking. My little brother 4 them me, rode on the end of Mother's cotton sack as she pulled us because the sandy loam dirt was extremely hot a summer the only shoes we had were our Sunday-go-to-m today referred to as dress shoes.

## Forest Service urges caution over the July 4 holiday

More wildfires are reported on July 4 than on any other day of the year, a statistic that stresses the need for folks to be extra careful during Independence Day celebrations.

Whether you're shooting off fireworks, grilling hotdogs and hamburgers or just hanging out around the campfire, residents should remember to use caution when doing anything outdoors that could potentially cause

"Keeping your home safe from wildfire is always important whether you've had rain or not," Texas A&M Forest Service Fire Prevention Specialist Jan Amen said. "If you plan to cook outdoors, do so away from any sort of vegetation and do not leave your grill unattended."

Texas A&M Forest Service Predictive Services Department Head Tom Spencer said the wildfire risk over the Independence Day holiday is elevated in West Texas where the vegetation is dry and gusty winds are commonplace - perfect conditions for a potentially devastating

Though parts of Texas have seen recent rains, more than half of the state remains mired in drought. Specific areas of concern include the Panhandle down through Midland and the Trans-Pecos Region.

"Safety should always be your No. 1 concern," Spencer said. "The safest wildfire is always the one that never ignites."

Fireworks safety tips:


· Before you celebrate, always check with local government officials to ensure fireworks and outdoor burning are allowed in your county. Be sure to comply with all restrictions.



## Cesebrating America's Independence

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776 The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America

the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth. rate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which important the causes which imp the separation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, and the pursuit of Happiness. - That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, - That whenever any Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing rs in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light sient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they istomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to f such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to ir former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world. He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has forbidden ernors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to them. He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right ble to them and formidable to tyrants only. He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures. He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people. He sed for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; e remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within. He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose ing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands. He has obstructed inistration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers. He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount ment of their salaries. He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance. He has kept among us, in times of Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures. He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power. He has combined with others to subject us sdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation: For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us: For ag them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States: For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world: For imposing n us without our Consent: For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury: For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences: For abolishing the free System sh Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing e absolute rule into these Colonies For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments: For suspending our own ures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever. He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War us. He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people. He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat ss of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nahas constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by nds. He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an guished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been ed only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attenour British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances migration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations. rould inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which ces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

erefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are ed from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. - And for the of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.


