## Rockwall Sheriff's Deputy Keven Rowan receives commendation for lake rescue

Rockwall Sheriff's Deputy Keven Rowan was recognized by the Sheriff's Association of Texas at its annual conference for his rescue of two young women from Lake Ray Hubbard on Jan. 28.

The women, Ngac Do, 20, of Garland, and her cousin, Nhi Tran, 21, were unfamiliar with the area around I-30 and Robertson Park and drove into the lake after mistaking a boat ramp for a road at about 1 a.m. The women recently moved to the United States from Vietnam.

Rowan spotted the submerged

Honda Civic as he was patrolling the shoreline at the park.

swam out and used a window punch tool to break a window and remove the two women who were trapped in the back seat of the car. The water was deep enough that the women's heads were already against the roof of the car as they waited for help to arrive, Rowan said.

Since the rescue, which was captured on Rowan's dash-mounted video camera, Rowan has been recognized by several civic and professional groups, most recently by the Rockwall County Commissioners, the Rockwall City Council, the Sons of the American Revolution and the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

Rowan was nominated for the Law Enforcement Officer of the Year by Rockwall County Sheriff Harold Eavenson for consideration at the annual conference, which took place the week of July 21-24 in Dallas. Rowan received a plaque commemorating his courage and service to the citizens

un added, marily, Mr. Krause and Ms. Galanides are alleged to een present the polling place without any legal excuse."

rung publised comments by Rockwall County District Attorney Culpepper :gram noted:

"Ms. Culpepper is quoted as saying (in reference to Ms. Zurek's interaction with voters who were in line to vote) that, 'Exchanging pleasantries is not necessarily against the law.' This quote, if accurate, suggests a misrepresentation of the law prohibiting the presence of a candidate in a polling place."

Ingram side-stepped the accusation by candidate Joan Ream that Zurek intentionally covered or obscured Ream's signs at the polling location. "There is some disagreement over whether campaign signs were vandalized or stolen, or if they were hidden or discarded," Ingram wrote.

"We lack evidence to judge whether the movement of campaign signs or the polling place errors constituted criminal acts. Our focus is therefore limited to the allegations of loitering, electioneering and bystanding in or near the polling place on election day," Ingram added.

Winnett had included in her complaint to the Secretary of State, information about errors by election workers during election day voting.

Ingram closed his letter by explaining that the Secretary of State is "unable to refer this matter to the Texas Attorney General for investigation or prosecution."

Ingram noted that the "Texas Attorney General, in exercising its investigative and prosecutorial discretion, has adopted a policy that limited

state resources will not currently be diverted to the investigation of electionrelated misdemeanor criminal offenses, and has asked that we refrain from referring such matters for investigation until we are instructed to do so."

Winnett comments

"I believe in the Constitutional Law that is the foundation of the United States of America. At the very base of our rights as citizens of this free country is the protection of our election laws. The Texas statutes of law that protect our rights with regard to electioneering and loitering in the polling location are very easy to understand.

"I think that the majority of citizens who vote know there is a boundary whereby we are provided privacy to vote. For the very officials who should be protecting these laws to have violated such important voting statues, are actions that cannot be overlooked, disregarded or silenced. "This kind of election violation is against our most basic privilege of voting and is an action that can never be allowed. The constitutional rights our founding fathers defined are as strong as ever because they were not founded on a monetary value but a moral, ethical value. Failing to enforce election laws destroys our representative form of government, making a mockery of the electoral process.

### On God's Word

### Questions about the crucifixion of Jesus Christ...

. The Biblical accounts of Jesus Christ's crucifixion include certain events that are debated in Theological circles. During the next few weeks we will shine the light of God's word on the following questions: How many people were crucified with Jesus? Did Jesus carry the wooden cross designed for his crucifixion? Did God forsake His beloved son?

It might be argued that the number of people crucified with Jesus Christ would not have affected the ultimate outcome. So why make such a big issue about it? Why should we study the minute details to see exactly how many people were crucified with Jesus?

Truth is, the integrity of God's word is at stake. There is no doubt that we love God very much. But it should be our desire to search the scriptures and align our personal beliefs with what God says about how many were crucified with Jesus. For hundreds of years people have held the cross as a symbol of what Jesus Christ did for all of mankind. Sadly, many still carry Jesus hanging on the cross. Gladly, many more carry only the cross without Jesus on it.

Jesus is alive and in heaven, no longer hanging on a cross. In our study of the cross that Jesus carried, we will examine the context of how the word "cross" was used in the different Gospel accounts.

The question of whether God forsook His beloved son drives in the underlying question of whether God followed through with His promise.

According to the King James Bible, while hanging on the cross Jesus cried out, "My God, My God why have you forsaken me!" This is a highly charged

subject that must be addressed.

If God truly forsook His son, then He did not raise him from the dead. And if God never raised Jesus from the dead, then all of God's word in the Gospels, Epistles and the book of Revelation would be null and void. As we take the time to shine the light of God's word on the above topics, we can learn to do the same in other areas of personal beliefs. We can let God's rightly divided word shine more light in our hearts toward increased understanding and growth in our spiritual walk.

### **Rockwall County** Judge issues burn ban effective immediately


Rockwall County Judge Jerry Hogan on Tuesday, July 31, announced a burn ban has been placed in effect immediately for all of the unincorporated areas of Rockwall County due to the dry conditions that exist.

This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for: 1) firefighter training, 2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, 3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops, or 4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

A violation of this order is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

The Commissioners Court will confirm this order on August 9.



#### IS GUM DISEASE LINKED TO OBESITY?

After the vote against the fee, Hogan warned the court, "I want you all to remember that now when we start talking about budget revenues and shortfalls."

#### **Bird Remediation**

The Court heard a presentation from Josh Lyles of Premier Pigeon Control about methods to permanently remove birds from the new county courthouse and eliminate the bird dropping problem that is marring the entryway and Veteran's Memorial.

Commissioner Dennis Bailey met Lyles at the courthouse to investigate and form a plan of action. Lyles suggested installing a stainless steel spike strip to the ledges and window sills where the birds are perching. The strip would be permanent, would not require any maintenance, and would not be visible to visitors to the facility. Lyles said the strip has a 10-year manufacturer's warranty and his company has a five-year guarantee that the birds would not return once the strip is installed.

Lyles also discussed other removal methods such as a shock track which runs on solar power but requires maintenance. He also said if bird droppings hit the shock track, it can be shorted out. He was asked about less physical methods of removal such as speakers that play predatory bird calls but Lyles said the pigeons soon learn that there are no predators and will often return to their perches. He said he's even see birds nesting inside the speakers.

Lyles' company is just one of several the commissioners are consulting on the best way to remove the offending birds. Lyles was expected to provide the commissioners with addition information and an estimate for his services by Monday, July 30.

#### **Historic Records**

The Court approved an agreement with Kofile Preservation Inc., to perform preservation services of historical county records at a cost of \$196,144. The funds will be paid from the County Clerk records management and preservation special archive fund. The records will be preserved and stored in specially designed sleeves and binders to take pressure off the documents and prevent tearing and uneven wear for decades to come, according to a presentation to the Court by Kofile representatives.

#### Texas Film Industry

Commissioners David Magness and Dennis Bailey will begin discussions with the Texas Film Industry about future opportunities for film companies to consider Rockwall County and its facilities as a destination.

The two commissioners will start gathering basic information and bring it to the Court at a future date. Magness said he has already been in contact with the Texas Film Commission and the Dallas Film Commission.



DART seeks a declaratory judgment to conclusively establish (1) DART's authority to issue bonds secured by the pledge of a combination of revenues from DART's 1% sales tax and a designated portion of its transportation system revenues, including farebox revenues; (2) the validity and incontestability of DART's Senior Lien Sales Tax Revenue Bonds, Series 2012 (the "Series 2012 Bonds"), described in the Original Petition and attachments thereto, in the amount of \$155,000,000 (exclusive of premium); and (3) DART's authority to expend the proceeds of the Series 2012 Bonds and transportation system revenues to finance and refinance improvements described in its long-term Transit Plan or to refund such obligations.

The Original Petition, which more fully describes the planned expenditures and the Proposed Bonds, is on file with the court and is available for review by all persons who (1) reside in the territory of DART, (2) own property located within the boundaries of DART, (3) are taxpayers of DART, (4) or have or claim a right, title, or interest in any property or money to be affected by a public security authorization or the issuance of the public securities by DART (such persons constitute "Interested Parties").

All Interested Parties and the Honorable Greg Abbot, in his official capacity as Attorney General of the State of Texas, are hereby notified of their right to appear at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, August 13, 2012 in the courtroom of the District Court, Dallas County Texas for hearing and trial of the claims made in the Original Petition and to show cause why prayers of the Petitioner should not be granted and that DART's authority and the Series 2012 Bonds validated and confirmed.





By ignoring the election code violations, the AG and the DA blatantly disregard the rule of law, leaving Texas voters exposed to unlawful election procedures without consequence for the violators.

No wonder thousands, maybe millions of Texas believe their "vote doesn't count." Nationally, voter fraud has been reported over and over again, and like Texas, the federal attorney general turns his back to the widespread election violation complaints.

Naturally, the decline in voter registration and voting is accelerating as more and more qualified voters shrug their shoulders in disgust.

The end result of these policies can be nothing less than the destruction of a functioning electoral system, which was originally established by our founders as the bulwark of a republic form of government, based on a system of representation through the limited franchise of voting.

But what we address is not a federal issue ... it is a Texas issue. The state legislature creates lawful voting procedures and establishes regulations to secure the privilege of voting. Those regulations are designed to protect qualified voters from being disenfranchised by corruption, voter fraud and other unlawful actions.

County and state officials who ignore those regulations are directly participating in the collapse of the republic form of government. When voters lose faith in the security of the vote, anarchy is certain to follow.

Why should individual citizens bother to "obey" the laws when officials required to enforce the laws show such disregard for the rule of law?

Prosecutors are quick to prosecute individual citizens for "Class C Misdemeanor" violations ... through enforcement of the transportation code. But they turn their backs on election code Class C Misdemeanor violators.

Perhaps this practice is due to the fact that traffic code violations are major funding sources for cities and counties, whereas election code violations don't put near as much money into government coffers, if any at all.

What's a law-abiding citizen to do?

We must insist that elected and appointed government agents obey the law ... not as it is interpreted, but as it is written. It is not an unreasonable expectation, but is shamefully in short supply. It's up to each of us to do the best we can to remind government agents of their obligation to the law.

That requires citizen participation ... first, know what the law says, then demand appointed and elected officials to also know what the law says, and

Otherwise, we are doomed to a future of lawlessness ... with enforcement based on the personal whim of the political bosses, while citizens defend themselves as best they can.

In short, anarchy always follows when the rule of law is abandoned through "discretionary authority."

(The amendments to the Social Security Act concern the establishment and empowerment of an Independent Medicare Advisory Board to reduce the per capita rate of growth in Medicare spending.)

All of the five Democrats who went against their party and supported the Republican repeal effort voted against Obamacare when it was originally passed with no Republican votes on March 21, 2010. Reps. Dan Boren (Okla.) and Mike Ross (Ark.), both known as conservative Democrats, are not seeking reelection. The other three - Reps. Larry Kissell (N.C.), Jim Matheson (Utah), and Mike McIntyre (N.C) - face tough reelection battles.

This Republican attempt to repeal Obamacare was the first since the Supreme Court's ruling on the constitutionality of the Obamacare "individual mandate." There are certain to be other attempts as well.

The reason the House of Representatives keeps voting to repeal Obamacare is that the bill they pass never goes anywhere in the Senate. Republicans control the House 242-193, but Democrats control the Senate 51-47 (with two Independents who vote as Democrats).

So the House Republican vote to repeal Obamacare is just symbolic. Like much of what Republicans do, it is just political theater, since there is absolutely no chance that the Democratic-controlled Senate will ever agree to the legislation and even less of a chance that Obama will sign into law a bill repealing the legislation that bears his name.

The show put on by House Republicans makes it looks as though they are defenders of individual liberty and limited government. But at the same time they are voting to repeal Obamacare, Republicans in the House are also voting to pass insidious legislation that wars against individual liberty and limited government.

The New American magazine's "Freedom Index" for the 112th Congress has just been released. The higher the number on this index, the stronger a congressman's "adherence to constitutional principles of limited govern-

ment, fiscal responsibility, national sovereignty, and a traditional foreign policy of avoiding foreign entanglements." Rep. Ron Paul (R-Tex.) scores a perfect 100 virtually every time the index is published (about twice a year). He didn't do so this time, but only because he didn't make the minimum number of required votes, since he was out campaigning for president. Although three Republicans in the Senate earned a score of 100, no one from either party did in the House

The ten issues that members of the 112th Congress in the House are being rated on this time are: blocking EPA regulations, the omnibus appropriations bill, the debt limit, a line-item veto, the Keystone Pipeline project, repealing the death panels in Obamacare, government data collection, the Export-Import Bank, national ocean policy, and the indefinite-detention provision in the National Defense Authorization Act.

The Republican votes on two of those issues caught my eye.

The Export-Import Bank Reauthorization Act of 2012 (H.R.2072) reauthorized the Export-Import Bank for two years and increased its lending cap from \$100 billion to \$140 billion. The Export-Import Bank is a government corporation that issues loans and loan guarantees to international buyers to

help them purchase U.S. products. It also provides insurance policies to U.S. companies and banks to mitigate risks of noncollection from foreign buyers and borrowers. In other words, the Export-Import Bank provides corporate welfare backed by U.S. taxpayers. And as the New American comments, "The federal government has no constitutional authority risking taxpayers' money to provide loans and terms that the private sector considers too risky to provide." There were 147 Republicans in the House who joined all 183 Democrats in reauthorizing the Export-Import Bank. Only 93 Republicans voted against doing so.

The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013 (H.R.4310) does just that -

it authorizes appropriations to the Department of Defense (DOD) for the next fiscal year. Rep. Adam Smith (D-Wash.) offered an amendment (H.AMDT.1127) to strike language from the bill, in the words of the New American, "so sweeping that American citizens accused of being terrorists can be detained by the U.S. military and held indefinitely without habeas corpus and without even being tried and found guilty in a court of law."

Said Representative Smith, "This is an extraordinary amount of power to give to the president, to give the government the power to take away an individual's rights and lock them up with nothing more than one quick court hearing, without the due process rights protection in our Constitution. It's not needed. This is our opportunity to repeal it."

Now, although there is far more wrong with the National Defense Authorization Act than just the indefinite-detention provision, as I pointed out the last time this bill was passed, Smith's amendment is a noble attempt to protect Americans' civil liberties. Yet 219 Republicans voted against the amendment with only 19 Republicans voting for it.

So while Republicans put on a show and vote to repeal Obamacare, they are at the same time waging war on the Constitution, the taxpayer, and freedom. Sometimes Republicans don't even try to hide their hypocrisy:

On the eve of the 2010 midterm election House Republicans released their "Pledge to America" promising a "new governing agenda for America" that "stands on the principles of smaller, more accountable government." On the very same day, they also voted in overwhelming numbers along with Democrats to pass four pieces of legislation that violate the very pledge that the Republicans maintained they would adhere to if the voters gave them a majority in the House: The Family Health Care Accessibility Act, The Emergency Medic Transition Act, The National All Schedules Prescription Electronic Reporting Reauthorization Act, and The Training and Research for Autism Improvements Nationwide Act.

If Republicans were really interested in medical freedom, they would vote to repeal not just Obamacare, but an earlier version of health-care reform: the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act

The reason that that legislation will never be repealed is that it was introduced by the Republican House Speaker, supported by the Republican leadership in the House and Senate, passed with overwhelming Republican support, and signed into law by a Republican president.

So when the Republicans in the House vote to repeal Obamacare for the thirty-fourth time, remember that it is all just political theater.

No one who believes in the government's forcing people to pay for the health care of others should be taken seriously when he questions the government's forcing people to purchase health insurance for themselves.







pastor of 10 churches. I have been in the pastorate for 25 years, spending 25 more years in the Overseas Ministry in other countries such as Africa, China and Russia. I was blessed pastoring American churches. My best work was when the Lord opened the way for me to be involved in overseas missions. Our mission organization invited churches here to work with a church overseas. We had groups go from churches all over the U.S. I participated in over 50 of this type of crusades and Juanez participated in 36.

"Juanez was extremely involved in all the overseas ministries. She began as a regular secretary for the organization then quickly became a counselor because of her experience," Calvin said. "She helped the people acquire their visas and passports, which were often a long drawn-out ordeal.

"For three to four years now, I have led a Bible study class at the Senior Citizen Center and sometimes I play my harmonica for my music class and the senior center."

Juanez, now 80, was born on June 13, 1932, the oldest of four children. The couple has a son, Marcus, who lives in Houston, and a daughter, Juana Jean, who lives in Atlanta, Ga.. They really enjoy having three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Calvin Remembers Calvin remembers his childhood as being a really tough time for his

"When I was about 4 or 5, we moved to a sandy farm West Texas. For two years straight, my dad's crops didn't make. In the spring we pulled up green weeds to feed the hogs. We pulled up young tumble weeds and ate them as greens. At night we ate mush made out of corn meal. Then the sand storms came and the dust and sand was so bad that inside our house you couldn't

see anything. Mother would light a lamp. It was very hard to even eat. "We kids had to work in the fields up until Christmas supporting the family, so I really fell behind in school. I had to repeat the first grade. The teacher liked me and tried to help me catch up. I had a bad speech impediment and that hindered me. My self-esteem was low.

"In the 9th or 10th grade, I had to write a speech and present it in a contest. I won the contest and the teacher said that I won because I wrote and spoke like I was telling a story and that was what writing was about. I was so proud. From then on I had confidence both as a writer and speaker.

"A funny thing happened one day in school. I wore coveralls with the trap-door in the back. I was walking to the front of the room and one of the boys reached over and undid my trap door. I came up fighting," Calvin said. "They did that to me on the bus too. They would run over me, but I always came up fighting and soon I was fighting like a tiger.

"I served in the Air Force from 1948-1950 during the Korean War, then was called back to serve another year at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort

Worth, Texas. "When I first started preaching, I didn't know anything about anything," he said, laughing. "I was totally 'country' in my way of speaking and actions when I first started off."

Juanez Remembers

"My father was also a farmer and we worked in the fields too," Juanez said. "Calvin and I farmed the first year we were married. We had no money. I worked and helped put Calvin through college. It was hard but we made it. Calvin made \$25 a week when we pastored his first church.

"Look at this card we just received from a lady," Juanez said. "Calvin pastored this lady's church over 50 years ago in 1959 and she still keeps in touch with us. One of the nice things about being in the ministry and mission field is that we have made friends all over the world. Our life is so rich because of our friends.

"Many people couldn't pay us for pastoring their church so they gave us eggs and vegetables out of their gardens as payment. We had no money, but never went hungry. We did come very close a lot of times though."

Calvin and Juanez have been right by each other's sides all these years. They have been involved as one, in all they did. Where you found one, you would definitely find the other.

They are active in the First Baptist Church of Royse City where they have attended since moving to Royse City 16 years ago. They participate in the activities at the RC Senior Citizen Center and the Silver Sneakers and Strength and Core Training at the Royse City Fitness Center. Many precious and lasting friendships have been formed by continuing to make new friends wherever they go.

Calvin has written the story of his full, rich and rewarding life. In his writing he said, "My heart overflows with gratitude for the wonderful gift of Juanez. We were partners in the ministry."

On the dedication page he wrote, "This book is affectionately dedicated to my godly wife, Juanez Beach, whose unselfish love and support constantly encouraged me to go through the doors that God opened for me."

"We don't feel like we've made any sacrifices in our life," Juanez said. "No, there is nothing we regret or would change," Calvin added. We have had a good life."


In other business, the council addressed an issue initial raised July 10 by Richard Allen regarding a citation he received for keeping chickens in his yard.


