



Performances will take place approximately every 20 to 30 minutes.



God's Word

Revelations chapter 13...the beast

People may find it difficult to read through all the analogies, death and destruction found in Revelations. Sometimes, I personally feel sad and nervous while reading it. There is nothing wrong with feeling these things. Revelations is packed with hard information to digest and follow. When we come across something difficult to understand, it's best to make a note of it for future studies, and let it be.

Revelations chapter 13 reveals what may be a powerful ruling system over the world under the control of a powerfully deceptive religious system. Their combined power will come from the devil who is also referred to as the "dragon." This ruling system will have power from the devil to make war with God's saints.

Please note that the "saints" will not include the 144,000 of Israel. The 144,000 of Israel show up later during the seven seals period. They will be marked and protected by God Himself through an angel

The above mentioned system is referred to as "the beast." It refers to two different "beast" systems, the second of which will arise to deceive many into worshipping the fist beast, and assisting in the murder of God's saints. There's no way to sugar-coat this. One beast system will deceive many through mighty miracles into worshipping the other beast.

It says that those who do not worship the beast will be killed. Everyone else will be marked. I can't tell if the location of the mark on the forehead or right hand is figurative or literal. But something will be done to separate out those who do not worship the beast.

Revelations 13:17 provides interesting details, "And that no man might buy or sell, save he that had the mark, or the name of the beast, or the number of his name." This information is often used as proof that we are currently living in the Revelations period of time. To the best of my understanding, the above-mentioned conditions are currently in the early development stages. This is evidenced by the amazing similarities.

The United States of America has pretty much established a similar system through the limitations connected with the Social Security number. The number has already been in use as a general identification number and is required for basic livelihood. All banks require the number in order to maintain accounts. The Federal Government has embedded the number into driver licenses. A high percentage of companies now require the number before considering potential employees.

Only a very small number of people have successfully rescinded their number and they must live on a cash only basis. They must know how to defend themselves in the courts when governments try to punish them for driving without a drivers license. At this time, it is still remotely possible to live without a Social Security number. But according to Revelations chapter 13, there will be a time in the future when it will be impossible to buy or sell without worshipping the beast.

Please understand that Christians having a Social Security number today are not considered to be worshipping the "beast" in God's eyes. We are living in the age of the grace of God, and not in the Revelations period. I see no reason to believe that this number is the same as the mark of the beast. At the same time, we do not have to get excited about and rally around the current system, which has ungodly limitations similar to the mark of the beast.

The information found in Revelations helps us to see what God wants to save us from. And He is so gracious and loving and patient and merciful

In the midst of the world, God's word of love, life and salvation sits like a gem. It's up to people to individually believe the story of Jesus' death and resurrection, just as they easily believe that a chair will hold them up without thinking twice about it. And when they start praying with the spirit of God (1Corinthians 14:15) they are sealed with the Holy Ghost unto salvation from the dark and wrath-filled Revelations period.

God revealed the problem, a way out and the final solution.





TSA intrusion is one price of empire

How gratifying to see Americans increasingly angry at the ansportation Security Administration (TSA) for using offensive fully scans and frisks in its latest production of what security expert uce Schneier calls "security theater."

The government would have us believe these measures are safe and fective, but its record for veracity is, to put it mildly, disgraceful. Eanwhile Schneier, an independent voice who makes it his business where the schneier is the schneier would have caught ten the would-be underwear bomber: "The guys who make the uchines have said, 'We wouldn't have caught that.'" Maybe a full frisk distinguishable from a sexual assault would have found the potential plosive, but that wouldn't have caught the guy in Saudi Arabia who ted to hide one in a body cavity. Is the TSA going to introduce cavity arches next?

Let's remember that the TSA has been incompetent from the ginning. No one can name a single plot it thwarted, but over the years have seen many stories of TSA inspectors failing tests announced advance. We can be sure that countless forbidden items carried by nocents have passed through security. One person unknowingly rried a full 9mm pistol magazine through security in a carryon bag. Thile some TSA agents are missing contraband they are supposed

to be looking for, others have pilfered things from people's checked luggage. Flying is anything but secure; the main problem, however, is not terrorism.

So let's hope the anti-TSA anger builds, but let's also be aware of the risks. I'm referring to the risk from right-wingers, such as Ann Coulter and Charles Krauthammer. The conservative critics of body scans and frisks have not hidden their agenda. They've made clear their hope that joining the civil libertarians might get them what they have long wanted: ethnic, national, and religious profiling of airline passengers. Why frisk a grandma from Minnesota or a child from Vermont, they say, when "we know" whom to target?

Here's how Coulter put it: "Is there any question that we'd be looking for Swedes if the 9/11 terrorists, the shoe bomber, the diaper bomber and the printer cartridge bomber had all been Swedish?.... Only because the terrorists are Muslims do we pretend not to notice who keeps trying to blow up our planes.... Swarthy foreigners stand out like a sore thumb in an airport. The American domestic flying population is remarkably homogeneous. An airport is not a Sears department store."

And Krauthammer: "[The] entire apparatus of the security line is a national homage to political correctness.... The only reason we continue to do this is that people are too cowed to even question the absurd taboo against profiling — when the profile of the airline attacker is narrow, concrete, uniquely definable and universally known. So instead of

seeking out terrorists, we seek out tubes of gel in stroller pouches."

I concede there is surface logic here. The profile of those who wish us harm is fairly narrow, although profiling would undoubtedly prompt a revision in tactics. But in a way, the profile is even more narrow than Coulter and Krauthammer would care to admit. At the top of the list of likely attackers are people with ties to countries the U.S. military and CIA are currently brutalizing with drone-launched Hellfire missiles, cluster bombs, and assassination teams. All the would-be bombers fit that profile, and when they have spoken in court they have said they wanted revenge for America's war on their people. Even the Nigerianborn underwear bomber, Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab, spent time in Yemen, where the U.S. government conducts a bombing campaign. (By the way, Abdulmutallab, a black man, doesn't look like an Arab. Would the profilers have netted him? The authorities were alerted by his father, and he still got through.)

If the truest profile marker is a link to a Muslim country that the U.S. empire is occupying or bombing, that indicates there's a better way than profiling to secure American lives: Dismantle the empire. It's worth a






