

Hope for Paws plans dog adoption ever of

When Gene and Nicki Mason started Camp Diggy Bones as a boarding facility for dogs, they had no idea what would lay ahead.

The 11 acres on Hwy. 205 in Lavon was perfect for their three horses and allowed them breathing room and fresh air while tending to the beloved pets of those who needed to be away.

It didn't take long for no kill rescue groups to take notice of the property and Camp Diggy Bones became the shelter for abused, neglected and abandoned dogs from Rockwall Animal Rescue, DFW Pup Patrol, Paws in the City and Happy Endings.

Recently, the Masons created Hope for Paws, a nonprofit organization, to help support the rescued dogs. The Hope for Paws campus includes 10 buildings that house 30 to 50 kennels each. Each kennel is heated/airconditioned and has access to both indoors and outdoors. The rescued dogs are given medical attention and heartworm medications, have their shots and are spayed/ neutered and trained. The dogs are taken care of and loved by the owners and staff. Owners,

The Masons still live on the property and there is staff on property at

The dogs are available for adoption from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

"With the economy in its present state, there are more and more people that find themselves unable to care for their pets and there are others who simply harm these animals, as hard as it is to understand," said Gene Mason. "Costs are high and working with four different groups, we have over 350 dogs at any given point and time. We can now accept donations, apply for grants and hold fundraisers to help keep this campus operational.'

hewickwall County Be aware of wildlife as spring unfolds

Spring time in Texas is a beautiful time but there are dangers present during this time of the year. As we begin to spend more time outside enjoying the weather and nature, remember to be safe and use sound

A few simple reminders can protect everyone from the dangers that lurk during this time of the year, according to a City of Rockwall news

coming but they may strike if they are startled

Rockwall has many species of wildlife within its city limits. Sightings of bobcats, coyotes and fox are fairly common. Within the last 12 months, there have also been sightings of mountain lions, alligators and a river otter. Many of these animals occupied the area where houses have been built and their habitat has diminished. They have been forced to live in smaller ecosystems and food sources can become scarce. When their food sources are scarce, they will often expand their hunting grounds for food and that often includes residential neighborhoods.

If there are multiple sightings of wildlife in a residential area, contact the Animal Control Division of the City of Rockwall at (972) 771-7790. Depending on the situation, the officers may attempt to trap the animal to have it relocated or work with the Texas Department of Parks and

As a precaution, always keep a close eye on small pets and children. When walking in wooded areas, stay in a close group and keep aware of the area you are in. If you spot an animal, do not go near it and go the other direction. Always remember, these are wild animals and you should not attempt to feed or touch one of these animals. In most



Royse City volunteer fire department has strong community rotable

Royse City was a quickly growing town in the 1940s, with many new businesses establishing in the downtown area. Back then, all the homes and businesses built from wood and there were many fires. Thus the citizens were proud of and dependent upon their volunteer fire department. During this time, the Royse City Fire Department consisted of the 18 men shown in the group photo.

According to information in Sheri Stodghill Fowler's new book titled "Images of America-Royse City" and information furnished by Deloris Ballard of the Zaner Robinson Historical Museum, the building at 124 Arch St. is where the Royse City Fire Department and the City Hall was housed during this time. The two-story brick building was built in 1925 for the



Masonic Lodge. The organization used the top floor of the building and still occupy the space today.

In 1941, the city acquired the bottom floor and with alterations to the exterior of the building made it the home of the fire department. The wide opening to the right of the building in the photo is where the fire truck was stored when not in use.

Once a new building was built and opened for the fire station on Main Street on April 1, 1982, a library was housed in the old building for several years until the Zaner Robinson Historical Museum was established there in 2008. The building at 124 Arch St, is listed in the National Register of Historical Places and now displays the rich history of Royse City back through the 1800s.

"We only had one fire truck," said Homer 'Toogie' Pierce. "I can't remember the exact population of Royse City at the time, but I think we had about 1,000 people. When a fire was reported, our fire chief would go to the Royse City water tower (which is still located across the street from where the present fire station is on Main Street) and he would sound the whistle. The whistle would blare really loud, stop, blare again, stop and blare again. The volunteers would rush to the fire station, get the truck and equipment, and head for the fire.

"Everybody in town knew there was a fire when they heard the whistle, and many people would also come to help the firefighters with the fire," Toogie said.

"I always backed my car into the driveway so that when the fire whistle

blew, I could pull straight out and head for the station, and didn waste time trying to back my car out. Of course the fire station little few blocks from here.

"I worked for the Royse City Volunteer Fire Department for 38, not only lived in Royse City all my life," said Toogie, "but I have this spot of land all my life. We tore the originally house down a this one."


During the 1950s and the 1960s several large fires destroyed no downtown areas including the two-story Cookston Hotel, Bass S. the meat locker, the ice cream parlor, the Cookston Body Shop and City Theater. Many older citizens still talk about the terrible fire sadness the loss brought to the town.

Toogie, 91, and Bob Crowell, now 98, are the only two surviv fighters from the 18. They have been eyewitnesses to so much City's history and are proud of their service to the town and its cit

But most American officials did not want to hear — and did not want the American people to hear — that Muslim violence was in retaliation for U.S. foreign policy. When Ron Paul, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination in 2008, criticized U.S. interventionist foreign policy during a primary debate, he was admonished by another candidate, Rudy Giuliani, among others, who claimed he had never heard such an outrageous thing.

Giuliani was either lying or unaware that the official 9/11 commission and the Pentagon had previously acknowledged that U.S. foreign policy creates resentment among Muslims.

What about the Tsarnaevs? We await the facts, and Dzhokhar Tsarnaev reportedly told authorities his acts were motivated by "religious fervor." But it's a good bet this resentment was part of their motivation.

The Tsarnaev family is Chechen, but Chechnya's beef is with Russia, bin Laden's own fatwa against the United States named three on the United States, so that seems an unlikely source of a desire to kill

It is more likely the young men were angered by U.S. drone warfare that has killed thousands of Muslims in Pakistan, Yemen, and Somalia; brutal occupations in Iraq and Afghanistan; backing for dictators and corrupt monarchs throughout the Muslim world; and unwavering material and moral support for Israel's oppression and humiliation of the Palestinians, with no end in

The Washington Post reports that a neighbor of Tamerlan Tsarnaev, the older, deceased brother, told him, "In Afghanistan, most casualties are innocent bystanders killed by American soldiers."

If revenge for U.S. foreign policy was the motive, what will happen next? Will such evidence prompt a national reconsideration of America's decades-old imperial foreign policy? Or will it be quickly dismissed, while the bombings are exploited in an effort to double down on that foreign policy.

U.S. Rep. Peter King, a Republican, has already begun that effort. (Interestingly, Alberto Gonzalez, who was attorney general under President George W. Bush, acknowledged on CNN over the weekend that U.S. foreign policy is indeed resented by Muslims abroad and prompts a desire for revenge.)

There is much we still don't know about the Tsarnaev brothers and why they chose their deadly path. (What, if anything, did it have to do with Chechen organized crime?) Maybe it will turn out that they simply developed a hatred for what they saw as American licentiousness and felt they needed to strike out at it. (That Dzhokhar Tsarnaev partied at his college after the bombings, casts doubt on that prospect.)


It seems far more likely that the murder-by-drone of Muslim children, the no-knock night raids of Afghan homes, the daily humiliation of and violence against Palestinians, and the support for violent and corrupt rulers are what made these men want to exact vengeance against Americans.

Of course, none of this would justify killing innocents. But if we wish to prevent such wanton crimes in the future, we'd better understand what motivates the criminals who commit them.




