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



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

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Lake Ray Hubbard alligator seen near The Shores after weeks of rain

Residents of The Shores neighborhood in north Rockwall have reported a 10 to12-foot alligator cruising along the Lake Ray Hubbard shoreline near the golf course for at least the past 10 days.

Captain Garry Collins of the Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) office in Garland said the shallow, wooded creeks and shady areas at the far north end of the lake are home to many alligators, but they usually do not venture far from there. He said with this spring's rainy weather, area lakes have filled and Lavon's waters are currently being released into Hubbard, flooding the shallows and disturbing the alligator's edge until he goes home." preferred habitat.

To be eligible, a student must have a minimum 3.5 grade point average on at least 12 semester hours and no grade lower than a C.


nuisance animal if it were to wander out of the lake and into the yards, marina or golf course that border the lake. Collins said in that case, residents should immediately call 911. Local police officers would then contact Texas Parks and Wildlife to assist them in assessing the situation and safely removing the alligator.

Collins said it is not unusual for the alligators to be seen in other parts of Lake Ray Hubbard. He said several years ago, an alligator was seen for several days near the boat docks around The Shores, and gators have been reported as far south as Chandler's Landing.

The alligator currently taking up residence near The Shores has been nicknamed Smiley, because of an apparent injury to his snout. Resident Kenneth Szolosi said the gator appears to have been hit by a boat propeller or injured by another animal, since the tip of his snout looks to be missing or disfigured, showing his teeth and giving him the appearance of smiling.

Residents of The Shores keep each other informed of the gator's whereabouts and other important news by means of a neighborhood website.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife website has a great amount of



information on alligators, their habitats and habits and what to do if an alligator becomes a neighbor.

The site says that, in addition to habitat disturbances due to heavy rains, alligators mate in the spring and summer, moving around to breeding grounds, making them more visible.

If you see an alligator, keep these things in mind:

If an alligator hisses, you are

If you have a close encounter with an alligator on the ground, back away slowly. Gators can run up to 35 mph, although it is rare for an alligator to chase a human.

Alligators enjoy basking along the banks of rivers and lakes to warm themselves in the sun. As they rest they will often open their mouths to cool their body temperature, since they do not keep cool. An approaching human will often cause the gator to retreat into the water.

An alligator becomes a nuisance if it leaves the lake banks to approach homes, livestock pens or other structures.

If you walk near the water and an alligator come straight towards you, it is a nuisance animal and must be reported. In many of these cases, the gators have been fed by humans and have lost their fear.

Make sure pets are on leashes when walking near the shoreline. Keep pets in locked, gated areas when an alligator is reported in the area.

If a gator is seen in the roadway, do not attempt to move it. Notify authorities to handle the animal.

If an alligator is seen in your favorite swimming pool or pond, do not swim there, but report it to

authorities.

America" series Arcadia is creating about communities across the country. The photographic history book is appealing, she said, because "most people don't like to read about history as much as they like to look at the pictures."

The Rockwall book has 186 historical photographs from the 1840s to the present. The pictures came from several different sources, including Fowler's own family collection, the Rockwall County Historical Foundation archives, the private family collections of area residents and the files of the Rockwall Texas Success newspaper.

Fowler said she followed Arcadia's formula for organizing the book, including how she would divide the photographs into chapters. After filling in an outline provided by Arcadia, she said the chapters fell into place.

The first chapter is titled, "Early Settlement and the Arrival of the Railroad: 1840-1900." Chapter 2 is, "Cotton is King in Rockwall's Agrarian-Based Economy: 1900-1945." The third chapter is titled, "The Fabulous 1950s and the Decline of King Cotton:

1945-1965." The final chapter is called, "Construction of Lake Ray Hubbard and the Economic Shift to Suburbia: 1965 -

Fowler said the book's purpose is to "tell the story of our history through pictures. The picture tells us who the people are and the words then tell the story of other things about the picture."

"The story of our community is told through these photographs, in addition to who is in it."

Another part of the book's formula was the wording that accompanied each photo. Fowler could arrange the photos on the page in any combination she wished, but each page had to have at least 150 words, i.e. one photo on a page had to have a cutline with 150 words; explanations for two photos had to equal 150 words.

One of her favorite stories in creating the book involved a photo of a pharmacy soda fountain with four people in the picture. The only identification included with the photo was, "Harvey Way third from left."

She needed 145 more words. After much thought, she began to wonder how soda fountains came to be in pharmacies.

Her research taught her that, in earlier days, pharmacists would mix mineral water with medications for medicinal purposes for the less wealthy members of the community. The more affluent would flock to the mineral springs for a dip in what they believed was healing

The medicinal concoctions eventually evolved into flavored drinks, then ice cream treats and lunch favorites.

This research led her to describe the history and eventual decline of the great American soda fountain – in 150 words.

She said many residents, upon hearing of her project, called to offer their family photographs consideration. Fowler said many times the people or activity in the photo were not the historical focus, but the background images, such as the former 1892 courthouse or other buildings or vehicles, made the picture book-worthy.

"Sometimes you include a photograph that's not the greatest, but the story behind it is great," she said.

Fowler's book is available for purchase at the Historical Museum at Harry Myers Park and several retail outlets in Rockwall.



Just 72 hours after turning in what was without a doubt their worst performance of the year, a blowout 10-0 loss to McKinney May 9 that put the Rockwall-Heath softball team on the brink of a first-round elimination from the postseason, the Lady Hawks turned in perhaps their finest effort of the season in a 2-0 win May 12 that instead abruptly ended the Lionettes trip to the playoffs.

Gilbreath made his first trip to state a memorable one, winning not one, but two state championdemy's Adam ships as well a setting a new state

record in an event he had only trained about a month for, at the 1A Division of the TAPPS championship track meet May 8-9 at the University of Baylor.

Gilbreath, a senior, won the 100 meters with time of 11.71 seconds, just edging out Kolby Burns of DU Christway by a mere four hundredths of a second.

He also won the long jump with a state-record leap of 21-3.75, beating his nearest rival by almost two feet.

"The funny thing about being a double state champion is that he came to me about two weeks before the regional and said he'd like to try long jump," said Fulton coach Matt Burgy. "I figured 'why not'? So, he entered and won with only two weeks of training. He then worked really hard in the two weeks between the regional and state, and added almost two feet to his jump. He also had a scratch jump in the state meet that would have shattered the state record."

Gilbreath became Burgy's - and Fulton's - first state champion, though the coach was quick to share the credit.

"If I had to say anything about Adam it would be that he worked tirelessly to attain this goal. He completely focused his effort on

becoming a state champion after winning the regional championship," Burgy said. "He and (track coach) Mrs. Burgy deserve all the credit though. They were the pinnacle ones in establishing the track team. Mrs. Greenwalt - our Head of School - deserves a lot of credit too. Without her willingness to support the athletic program at Fulton, there would be no team. The program has grown by leaps and bounds under her leadership and she deserves the credit for allowing our athletes the flexibility to compete in whatever they choose to."

Also competing for Fulton were sophomore Kendall Johnson, who took eighth in the 3200 and the seventh-place girls 4 x 200 relay team of senior Della Temple, junior Whitney Vaughan and freshmen Quinn Ellison and Kierra Tatum.



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

TXDOT NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING CSJ: 0009-12-073

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), in cooperation with the City of Rockwall, will conduct a Public Hearing on Thursday, May 21, 2009 for the proposed interchange at Interstate Highway (IH) 30 and John King Boulevard (formerly known as State Highway 205 Bypass) in the City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas. The project limits extend along IH 30 from approximately 1.4 miles west of Farm-to-Market Road (FM) 549 to approximately 0.27 miles west of FM 549, a distance of approximately one mile. The purpose of the Public Hearing is to present the anticipated social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed project. The Public Hearing will be held at Rockwall High School, 901 Yellow Jacket Lane, Rockwall, Texas 75087. Prior to the Public Hearing, an Open House will be held from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., to allow for questions and review of project exhibits. TxDOT staff will be available to answer questions during the Open House. The Public Hearing portion will begin with a formal presentation at 7:00 p.m., followed by a public comment period.

The proposed project would involve the construction of a new location interchange with entrance/ exit ramps and the reconstruction of IH 30 within the project limits to accommodate John King Boulevard. The reconstruction would involve the main lanes and adjacent frontage roads. The four main lanes would be reconstructed (two in each direction) to accommodate the proposed interchange. These lanes would transition into two, three-lane bridges (one with the three eastbound lanes and the other with three westbound lanes) spanning John King Boulevard. The third lane for both the eastbound and westbound traffic would serve as an auxiliary lane connecting the entrance/exit ramps on either side of the proposed bridges. At the proposed interchange, John King Boulevard would consist of six lanes (three in each direction) and two left turn lanes. The frontage roads would be reconstructed as two-lane, curb and gutter roadways along the eastbound and westbound main lanes of IH 30.

Existing IH 30 right-of-way is approximately 300 feet wide. The right-of-way width of the proposed project would range between 300 to 360 feet. Approximately 2.32 acres of additional right-of-way and 0.77 acres of drainage and construction easements would be required for the proposed project. No residential properties would be displaced. One commercial business property would be displaced and require relocation. Finally, the proposed project would not affect the 100-year floodplain.

The project's environmental document along with maps and drawings showing the project's location and geometric design will be presented at the Public Hearing. This information is also available for public inspection and reproduction at the TxDOT Dallas District Office, located at 4777 East Highway 80, Mesquite, Texas 75150. Project information is also available at the City of Rockwall Engineering and Public Works Department, located at 385 South Goliad Street, Rockwall, Texas 75087. Information concerning the TxDOT Relocation Assistance Program, benefits and services for displaces as well as information about the tentative schedules for right-of-way acquisition and construction may be obtained from the TxDOT Dallas District Office.

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


