O cials with the City of Rockwall anticipate the North Texas Municipal Vat District will request all of its member and customer water systems nit; Stage 4 of the Water Conservation and Drought Contingency and Emil ency Response Plan on or before April 1.

officials made this statement in a Jan. 4 news release.

According to the release, other le Stage 4 provisions could include the prohibition of commercial and esi atial landscape watering except foundations and trees may be watered we ours on any day with a hand-held hose, a soaker hose or a dedicated on using a drip irrigation system.

NTMWD likely will initiate Stage 4 as a result of the temporary loss of [exoma, which now stands as 22.5 percent of the city's total raw water up 7; Lake Lavon holding at 51.25 percent of its capacity; the probability this month or next the NTMWD's Lake Chapman will be below the ever where water can be pumped; and drought conditions continue in the Noi Texas area. These conditions would result in a loss of 40 percent of the list t's total water supply, according to the news release.

R ord heat and record drought have drained local lakes. Texas experienced to est 12-month period on record from October 2010 through September 201 One hundred percent of the state has been designated as experiencing form of drought, with most counties facing 'exceptional' drought for ions.

Although zebra mussels are not harmful to humans and do not minate the water, they do attach to pipes that pump water into water tree nent facilities causing increased operating and maintenance costs. Once the city submits the "locall preferred route" the consultan can complete the preliminar schematic and forward it to the Texa Department of Transportation.

The submission of the city "locally preferred route" to TxDOTi necessary to secure state funding fo the roadway improvement project The news release indicates, however that no timeline has been linked to \$1505230 or ema when the funding for the project may be available and approved by the state agency.



also railed on Jesus similar to the rulers by saying, "If you are the Christ, save yourself and us."



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



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remember me when you come into your kingdom."



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



Rains force delay in Habitat schedule



A new acquaintance recently asked whether she and I could get along, considering that she's a liberal while I'm libertarian. Her second question focused on Ron Paul, likely the only person she ever heard of associated with libertarian philosophy: "Are all libertarians as conservative as Ron Paul on topics like abortion and gays?"

This is where things can get complicated even when we try to keep them simple. Libertarians are not conservative. We're not liberal, either. We're libertarian.

Even saying we are fiscally conservative and socially liberal - though there's some accuracy to that - can be problematic, because the concepts of conservative and liberal morph into other ideas and connotations that are far from libertarian. Indeed, the morphing is so common that there's really very little difference between the policies of the other two.

Consider the word "conservative." It refers to someone who wants to conserve, to save, to keep things as they are. But what does a conservative want to save? We'd likely be told that the aim is to conserve and save the American way of life. But what does that mean? Does the way of life to be conserved include an imperialistic foreign policy that has the country playing world policeman and maintaining around 1000 military bases in more than forty different countries?

All but one Republican hopeful for that party's 2012 presidential nomination advocates such a policy, but so does President Barack Obama, a liberal Democrat. So did neoconservative Republican George W. Bush before him and liberal Democrat Bill Clinton before him. If Obama and Clinton want what conservatives want, how can we tell the difference? Is there one?

Does "conservative" mean the continued prosecution of the unconstitutional war on drugs? Again, only one of the Republican hopefuls wants to end that war. Liberal Obama wants to maintain it. He's even cracking down on medical-marijuana facilities in states that have legalized cannabis for medicinal use, something he said he wouldn't do.

Conservatives and liberals both like the indefinite detention allowed by the National Defense Authorization Act, and neither have trouble with the president ordering the assassination of U.S. citizens. They are statists, placing

the power of the state over liberty, responsibility, and the Constitution.

Liberals and conservatives both favor welfare, albeit to different recipients. Liberals, for the most part, want so-called entitlements for individuals, while conservatives favor subsidies for businesses. Both, however, play on both sides of that fence, and they love making people dependent on government. They can each play both sides, because they have no philosophical root. Their principles are more like falling leaves floating on the wind, without root, anchor, or rudder.

Libertarians are different. We don't want an interventionist foreign policy that wages war for the sake of nationalism. We don't want a war against our basic civil liberties, whether it's called a war on terrorism or a war on drugs. Both are wars on liberty and responsibility.

We don't play the favoritism game, unless it's simply favoring liberty over force. And that's the ultimate difference. Libertarians place a higher priority on individual liberty and personal responsibility than we place on government power. Neither conservatives nor liberals can make that claim. For them, it's power over principle.

It's that prioritizing between liberty and obedience to authority that sets us apart; that's how we should define ourselves. And that prioritization is based on the moral value of liberty.

Libertarians favor peace at home and abroad, with both stemming from the philosophy of liberty. We respect an adult's right to choose what he puts into his body, just as we respect another country's decision on what type of government to have. We advocate defense of our country's legitimate sovereignty and safety, but we respect the same for other nations. We don't believe in nation building.

We believe in the equality of rights of all individuals, not groups, because only individuals have rights - groups don't. Groups are just bunches of individuals, and rights are not additive.

Libertarians are not simply conservative on some things and liberal on others. So let's not muddy the issue by describing ourselves that way. We are libertarian on all issues. It's a moral distinction.




Up front, McMillan and classmates Hailee Johnson, Taylor Powers and Whitney Willis give the Lady Eagles some size.

Hawks suffer twin heartbreaking losse

Even more than they believe they soon will start winning, the Rockwall-Heath boys' basketball team must believe in déjà vu.

What else could explain that after losing 48-47 at home to Wylie Friday, Jan. 6, the Hawks would lose a similarly disappointing 48-46 decision Tuesday at Highland Park, among the top 25 in the Texas 4A rankings. Rockwall-Heath led each game at halftime, and kept them close throughout

the second half. If nothing else, the HP game showed that RHHS had overcome the emotionally draining loss to Wylie. That game featured 17 lead changes – 15

in the second half, the last with 2.4 seconds remaining on Chad Hamilton's drive into the lane for the Pirates' game-winning basket. Matt Greene, who had made a 3-point shot with 20 seconds to play for the Hawks' last lead, took a shot at the buzzer that hit high on the backboard and

bounded back past the basket. "I thought we deserved to win," said RHHS head coach Brad Waters. "They gave me everything they had. A couple of calls didn't go our way, but

they didn't even let that bother them." The loss four nights later to the Scots dropped the Hawks to 7-14 overall and 0-4 in District 10-4A. At 17-2 and 4-0, HP is tied for first place with

Rockwall-Heath now has lost 18 consecutive district games since a 49-48 victory over Rockwall Feb. 16, 2010, in the Hawks' last game of the 2009-10 season. The Yellowjackets, in fact, are the only current 10-4A team RHHS

has ever beaten. The Hawks are coming closer, and they clearly haven't stopped trying.

Wylie made five of six field goal attempts in the third quarter, which they closed with a 7-0 run for a 34-28 lead. RHHS used a press to cause six turnovers and pull into a tie at 39-39 with

3 minutes remaining. That basket and every other score after either changed the team in the lead or tied the score. Waters said, "The press is something that when we really buy into it, it

There was little energy in the RHHS gym during a first half when the teams sleep-walked to a 19-18 lead. That bottled-up energy came out on the court

and in the stands during the second half. Waters said, "We're in the process of changing the nature of Heath basketball. It may not show in the record."

Against Wylie, the Hawks played essentially with their third point guard. Junior Conner Geiser wasn't able to return to the team, and sophomore Cameron Martin had been ill. That gave sophomore Luke Ramirez most of

the playing time. Even as Ramirez was apologizing to his coach for not playing better, Waters said, "Luke has done everything I've asked him to do. The kid is playing as hard as he can play, and his doing really well."

That means Ramirez could help change the program's nature. Without a star, Christian Nwabuko and Jordan Points were the team's scoring leaders. Nwabuko scored 11 against the Pirates and eight against HP; Points contributed 10 and 8. Nine Hawks scored at Highland Park, but none
