#### PROPOSITION 1

HJR 132 would amend the constito allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to HJR 14 would amend the constituthe mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipaliopen spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation."

Delayed once by the weather and again by a sputtering offense, the Rockwall-Heath Hawks finally broke out in the second half on the way to a 26-10 win over Arlington Seguin Sept. 11 at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.

The win evens the Hawks' record at 1-1 while Seguin remains winless at 0-2. The game was delayed for 30 minutes due to lightning in the area.

With the score 7-0 at the half thanks to sophomore Dorian Lawry's flying, two-yard dive into the end zone with 9:45 left in the second quarter, Seguin tied the game at 7-all when Dorsey Griffin hit Martice McNeil for a 10-yard score midway through the third quarter.

That, however, was the first and last real offensive threat by the Cougars, other than an 18-yard field goal by 270-pound defensive end Jack Hays later in the third quarter.

Heath, meanwhile, quickly broke the 7-7 tie for good when Kevin Rodgers hit Cameron Wilson for a 67-yard, catch-and-run touchdown just 90

On a third-and-five from the Hawks' 33, Wilson gathered in Rodgers' pass near the sideline at the Seguin 40, shook loose from a couple defenders and outraced the rest of the defense to the end zone to give the Heath a 14-7 advantage.

After Hay's field goal cut the score to 14-10, the Hawks defense limited the Cougars to just 23 total yards the last quarter and a half. Overall, the Heath defenders yielded only 200 yards total, with the Cougars able to amass only a dismal 17 yards on the ground on 28 rushing plays.

The Heath offense, meanwhile, tacked on two more touchdowns in the fourth period, including another two-yard run, this one by Jesse Irokwe on the first snap of the final quarter.




