Royse City ceremony to mark arrival of U.S. honor flag

Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends, found in the Bible, John 15:13.
A most special day is being planned at the Trinity Baptist Church in Royse City at 300 N. Erby Campbell Blvd. on Sunday, Sept. 13. The Sept. 11, 2001, Remembrance Project will be called No Greater Love.
The event will honor the 418 fallen heroes and a special four-year-old, a K-9 named Sirius, a Port Authority Police Department dog who was killed when the second tower collapsed, according to the Downtown Express Newspaper website. The portrait was created by artist Debbie Stonebraker.
The honor and in remembrance, a U.S. honor flag from New York will arrive at 7:45 a.m. in Royse City under Highway Patrol escort. Many dignitaries will be present at the commemoration, which is scheduled from 10 a.m. until about 12:30 p.m.
Coordinator of the entire event is Laszlo Laky, chief transportation specialist-Dallas Gateway Traffic Safety.

The program will begin with the presentation of the U.S. honor flag.
The "National Anthem" will be sang, followed by the welcoming by deacon Mario Retta of Trinity Baptist Church and Royse City Mayor Janet Nichol.
Pastor Josh McGrew will give the message titled No Greater Love.
David Leos, a Dallas firefighter engineer, will give his recollection of the destruction of the Twin Towers and the lives lost on one of the blackest days in the history of the United States of America.
The Dallas Fire Department Honor Guard, made up of 40 retired firefighters, will bring their hose wagon with a ceremonial bell attached. During the ceremony, the names of 418 first responders who gave their lives at the Twin Towers will be read and the bell will be rung after each name is called, then at the end, a final toll will ring.
The final toll according to Roger Chumley, captain, Dallas Fire Department, retired, will be the International Code of 5555, which

signifies that the "fires of life are out" and "those involved are ready to return to the place where God wants them to be."
There are 52 confirmed readers of the Honored Fallen Responders. Among the readers will be Joshua Finkenbinder, State House of Representatives Director, Honorable Tony Tinderholt and his staff, District 94 Representative, State House of Texas, Sheriff Terry Park and Deputy Jeff Epley, of the Choctaw County, Oklahoma Sheriff's Department, Honorable Scott Turner, District 33 Representative, State House of Texas, Honorable Bob Hall, State Senator of Texas, Deputy Polly Culver (and son Kagun, who suffered the loss of a K-9 recently) Pushmataha County Oklahoma-K-9 Officer, Rickey Don Callahan, Dallas City Councilman, District 5, Danny Turrentine, Celeste Police Chief, and Mary Beth Schaper, granddaughter and niece of NYPD officers.
Dallas Sheriff Lupe Valdez is sending representatives from her department to participate in the program. The list is too long to list them all, but Texas and Oklahoma will be well represented.
Two law enforcement officers attending the ceremony are Deputy Jeff Epley of the Choctaw County Sheriff's Office and Lt. Steve Babcock, of the Hugo Police Department. Epley was shot 17 times and Babcock was shot 16 times in an ambush on April 23, 2015. Babcock was in critical condition after the ambush but survived his injuries. Although numerous, Epley's injuries were not life threatening. The ambush occurred in Rufe, Oklahoma. The suspect opened fire on the officers who responded to a call of a neighbor firing on them.
"The suspect was killed by other officers, when he set his house on fire and came outside and tried to grab an officer's gun," according to the KFOR-TV Querry and Laszlo Laky, organizer of this 9/11 commemoration in Royse City.
First responders put their lives on the line every day and these two officers are just two examples of the danger they face when they leave their homes and families to report for duty.
Two Boy Scout Troops have constructed 418 crosses representing each of the first responders who lost their lives. The crosses will be displayed on the front lawn of the church, and the procession of events will proceed down the middle, with crosses on each side. The crosses will be placed 10 feet apart and 100 yards long. The Royse City Boy Scout Troop and Cub Scout Pack 312 sponsored by the

The CITC missions' team landed in San Salvador, on August 2nd. The team collected their luggage, made it through customs, (with out a Praise the Lord) and met up with Pastor Wally Cook, formerly of Canyon Texas, their Missionary contact.

Pastor Cook's church demographic is mainly young adults and young families. He and his church host mission-trips from different churches around the U.S. through out the summer months. Pastor Cook and his wife, 3:16, may be found in Facebook under Wally Cook.

When the team met up with Pastor Cook, he told them what they would be doing for the week. He said part of the trip was to hold services in a village outside the city; in the village of Zacaataluca, for three missions.

Part of what they did was to go out and invite the residences to the services. "We would go out in the village during the day; inviting people to the services, and seeing if there was anything that they needed for the village was in need of help." Ms. Gilbert stated.

Since El Salvador is on the equator, the country only has two seasons: dry and rainy. The missions team was there during what was supposed to be the rainy season, but it had not rained for some months prior to their arrival. The village of Zacaataluca is a farming community that harvests wheat and sugar cane but without rain there would be no harvest.

They arrived in the village Monday, Aug. 3, 2015 during the afternoon. The first two nights, about 20 to 50 people attended the services. The team prayed that the people would be open to hearing and accepting the Love of God.

On the third night, the heard the heart of the mission's team answered their prayers. It was a packed house. Not only did the people of Zacaataluca come to the service, but the surrounding villages showed up as well! The team was thrilled and amazed that so many people were hungry for the love of God! That night many heard the word of God, received prayer for sickness and anything else they needed.

One of the women in the village talked with the team about the drought of rain, which meant lack of work. Mrs. Hogden told her that in her area of the metroplex area we had been in drought for seven years, and now churches in our cities started to pray for rain, and God answered their prayers this summer.

"After we got back to the U.S., Pastor Cook called and said that the people of the village took what we said to heart and started to pray for rain. Within three weeks it started to rain. The farmers were finally able to plant crops for the fall harvest." Said Ms. Gilbert with a smile. "An amazing God we serve!"

After service that night, the team spent some time fellowshiping with the people. The women of the village made Tamales and coffee; they made their version of coffee and donuts, and there were two Piñatas for the children. For the first time since they'd been there, the people smiled, laughed, and God continued to do awesome things for the people.

Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the amount of or repealing the

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)

HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related debt.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

Earlier in the week they visited Tia Anna's House. Tia Anna is a woman who takes care of street children who have no home or anyone to call their own. "Tia" is Spanish for aunt. Anna saw a need in her community, and had compassion for the children. She does this without government aid, and relies on God for help. Ms. Gilbert said, "The sight of these children broke my heart. Most of the children were orphaned or abandoned at a very early age. I can't even begin to imagine what it feels like being so small and helpless; not knowing where you are going to sleep or when the next time you would be fed. Thank God for people like Tia Anna who see a need and do the best they can to fill it. The team spent time with the children and prayed for the women who raised them. One of the women, who helps Anna, is in her early thirties and suffers from arthritis in the knees. Sometimes the pain is so great that she can't stand. They laid hands on her, and prayed. The bible says the end of Mark 16:18, "they shall lay hands on the sick and they shall be healed." After they prayed, she was asked to do something she couldn't do before, and she started to jump. She said she hasn't been able to jump in several years; she started crying and praising God!

"A mission trip is so much more than just hopping on a plane, feeding the kids and taking a few pictures. None of this is a bad thing, it's a mission trip is not just a trip it's a call, a call to take a step of faith, to leave your comfort zone, get out of the familiar, and go to a new level of 'adventure,'" said Ms. Gilbert.

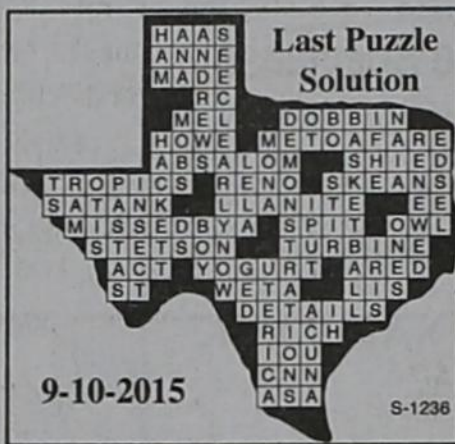

The demolition plan is as follows: Beginning at 8 p.m. on Sept. 11, the eastbound frontage road and westbound frontage road will be closed. The benefits of a honest and truthful investigation into 9/11

In the years following the explosively tragic events of September 11, 2001 in Manhattan, New York, many survivors, family members and the general public have pressed for a full investigation into the bottom of what happened, and identifies suspects by the names of the individuals that were ignored by the 9/11 Commission. The national media has responded to the 9/11 truth with mixed emotions. The national media government down-plays the need for a full investigation. The common response is to suggest a full investigation would be a waste of money for the victims and survivors.

The government should hear the media and government burying the subject of the 9/11 investigation, we are witnessing either lazy journalism or a cover-up. This is especially evident in the case of the 9/11 investigation, which involved vast amounts of evidence and numerous witnesses. All government investigators and detectives have a duty to investigate 9/11 no matter how unpopular their findings may be.

Prosecution power

No government attorney has used prosecutorial power in an investigation with intent to exhaustively follow the real leads, and identify the real people who financed, planned and implemented the crimes.

The use of prosecutive power allows for investigative subpoena power, where sworn affidavits and witness testimony to be presented before a court.

An honest and precise investigation with use of prosecutive power not only honors the victims and family members; it allows us to identify certain signatures and prints left by the criminals. Such signatures might help people and investigators more accurately understand earlier and later high profile and devastating incidents, such as the 1995 explosive destruction of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City; or even the peculiar devastation of the Echelon Building in Austin, Texas.

The Echelon incident offers an excellent example. The official conclusion was that a man named Joe Stack flew a small Cessna airplane into the Echelon Building, and upon impact caused extensive

damage inside the building. This was the essence of the professional investigators conclusion.

After the incident, people found Stack's airplane hanger in the Williamson County Central Appraisal District website. They took screen shots of the page and posted them on websites or social media for others to see. It was simple.

What else did they learn? Stack was not the sole owner of the hanger. Instead he was listed as co-owner. Although this article will not mention the name of the co-owner, any investigator should have exhaustively researched their relationship and activities. Recall that the national media did not mention a co-owner.

This is not to suggest wrong-doing on the part of the co-owner, but that person should have at least been treated as a person of interest toward determining what really happened.

Learning from 9/11 information

After a more precise and honest examination of 9/11, we might be aware of latest drone technology that can be installed in both small and big airplanes.

People's eyes might open to the possibility that the criminals planted explosives in the WTC Towers, remotely flew planes into the buildings with the use of timed detonation devices designed to cause more explosive damage than a plane could cause, and after about 30 minutes set off timed high grade and nuclear explosives designed to pulverize the buildings into fine dust.

With this awareness, investigators of the Echelon plane incident might not be so easily distracted by the pre-conceived conclusion. Instead they might courageously follow all the leads, no matter how ugly the real picture looks.

Photographs taken during the cleanup phase showed the crumpled plane resting against the foundation outside of the building.

It was not charred! Interestingly, the same photographs revealed a large crater positioned below, and to the left of the plane, in the retaining wall. The same photos also show the massive burnt damage inside the building.

Based on a combination of real data and fiction, we may conclude that while flying at an extremely high speed, a small single-engine Cessna struck the retaining wall, bounced off the retaining wall,

settled against the side of the building, causing the windows on all floors to blow out from massive explosions. See the conflict?

The government investigators and media led many people into believing the plane caused the damage on all floors.

Simple common sense would dictate that the small plane would be incapable of causing such extensive explosions and damage, even if it entered through the side of the building.

If the plane was not charred from a massive explosion, then why was there no mention of finding Mr. Stack's body?

Comparing 9/11 with the Echelon incident, a pattern emerges.

In both cases, the still/video photography revealed a distinctly different picture than was painted by the official investigators and media.

In the 9/11 incident, commercial grade passenger airliners were allegedly commandeered by inexperienced hijackers, and hit both targets after traveling over 200 miles.

They were able to turn off the transponders, and then turn them back on later. They were able to reprogram the autopilot system to reach a new destination.

Finally, the hijackers were able to pull off a number of astounding feats including: 1) Caused the planes to slice through the towers' massive outer steel grids like hot knives through butter (with no signs of damage to the planes during impact); and 2) Caused the Pentagon's missile defense system to recognize "Flight 77" as a friendly intruder.

This does not even address how Towers 1 and 2 collapsed into their own blue prints at near free-fall speed of 10 seconds, and how multi-ton beams were propelled out of the towers piercing buildings over a block away.

False conclusions ...

False conclusions require misinterpretation of data. In the case of 9/11 and the Echelon incident, the false conclusions required a significant deviation from basic principals of structural/architectural engineering and physics.

Apparently, thousands of professionals agreed about the inconsistencies and deviations. They decided to form an organization entitled Architects and Engineers for 9/11 Truth, which includes numerous essays and published research studies. Other professionals formed Pilots for 9/11 Truth, Attorneys for 9/11 Truth, etc.

The good news is that it was not long since 9/11 occurred.

It is still available for government detectives, investigators and attorneys to discard the false conclusions, and perse, arrest and prosecute the people who financed, planned, and implemented the demolition of WTC Towers 1, 2, Building 7; and murdered thousands of people who were in and near the towers.

They can subpoena the Directors of the company that provided security during the months leading up to that day. The Directors and former President of the company can provide orders and reports detailing the lengthy security black-outs and peculiar construction work, that were later reported by a number of survivors who worked in the towers.

They can obtain a court order to release the WTC demolition plan, that was reportedly sealed from public view since the beginning. They could then ascertain whether the culprits utilized the demolition plan.

With the right authority, it would not be difficult to hunt down and prosecute the real criminals.

This kind of investigation may very well go a long way toward restoring the people's trust in their current and future governments, and honoring the victims and survivors.

Texas Constitution Article 1, Section 16

No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, retroactive law, or any law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall be made.

The act of forcing any business and natural person to purchase any kind of insurance for others, who render services, constitutes "impairing obligation of contracts."

The exception is for Federal Instrumentalities engaged in statutory "employment" on the soil of Texas.

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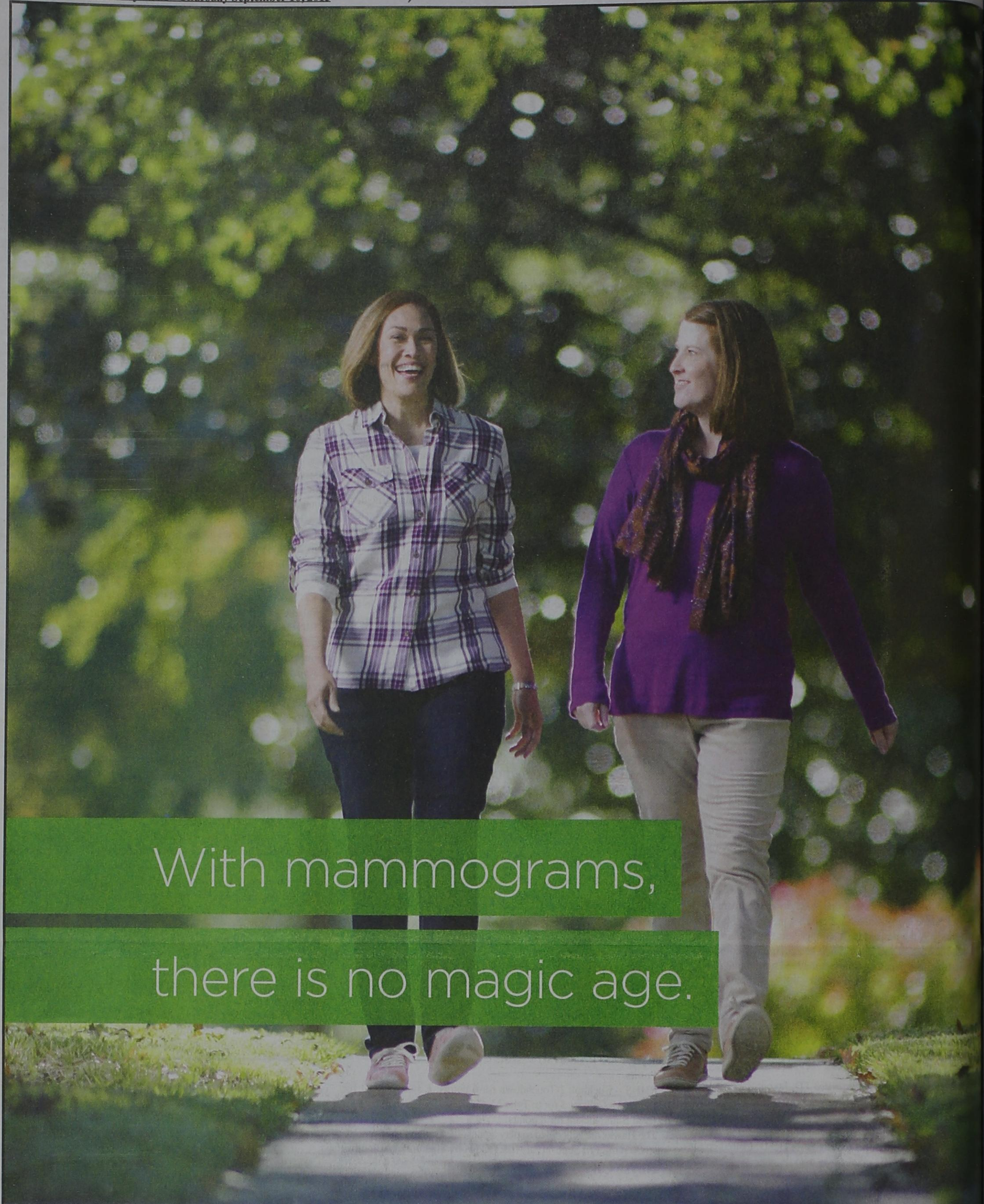
