# Wallace saga over in a matter of minutes

The four-month saga was all over in just 20 minutes.

The Wallace family farm and more than a dozen adjacent properties were annexed by the Rockwall City Council after a brief discussion Feb. 18. The property enters the city under an agricultural designation and no homeowners will owe taxes until 2010.

Before annexing the property, the council returned to a proposed "non-development" agreement discussed in previous meetings. Councilman Matt Scott said the agreement promised to withhold annexation as long as ment had a one-year renewal provision, but the land remained undeveloped. give the family enough time to consider plans for the future. Some members, including Councilwoman Margo Nielsen and Councilman Glen Farris, promised to renew the agreement next year if the land remained undeveloped and if they retained their council seats.

The Wallaces formally rejected the agreement at the meeting.

Mike Wallace, speaking for his family, said he had no intention of ever developing the land. His family passionately objected to annexation and development at two public hearings and a number of meetings. But he said the family could not accept two provi-

# Rockwall ISD trustees release and academic indicator information ntinues to offer the len annually so they ca

In this month's regularly scheduled board meeting, Rockwall Independent School District parents got a first glance at how students stacked up against other students in other districts.

According to the Texas Education Agency, the Academic Excellence Indicator System pulls together a wide range of information on the performance of students in each school and district in Texas every year.

This information is compiled into the annual AEIS reports, which are available each year in the fall. The report focuses on several specific performance indicators, such as student assessment, student information, staff information, budget (operating expenses) and academic programs.

Since 1994, The TEA has compiled the Accountability Rating System for Texas public schools and districts by taking a subset of the performance measures computed for AEIS to assign a rating to each public school and district.

RISD students in every grade surpassed their peers in the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills in every applicable

subject area, to include reading, language arts, math, writing, social studies and science. In 2006-2007, the district was acknowledged by the TEA for commended performance in reading/English language arts and social studies. The report is available on TEA's Web site, at: http://www.tea.state.tx.us/



If Taylor had been anywhere else but the school, Harris said, the outcome may well have been different.

"From the time Lisa came and got me to the start of CPR was no more than one to two minutes," Harris said. "If it had been longer

Those who helped Taylor that day said the nursing instructors had planned to all go to lunch together. But, for some reason, the group decided not to go, and so help was there when it was needed.

Also, said Health Science Center Provost Helen Reid, having a defibrillator close and having those with the proper training to use it nearby made all the difference. She is very thankful for all those who contributed to the positive outcome in Catherine's situation.

In addition, said Harris, some of the classes had been practicing CPR just that week, and so all the equipment needed to make the job easier was right there at hand.

"I can't imagine what might have happened if any of those things had been different," said Harris.

The incident changed the way things operate at the Health Science Center. A bag containing a stethoscope, the bag used for pushing air into the airway during CPR, and the equipment needed to open an airway if needed is now located in each classroom.

"I hope we never need it again, but if we do," Harris said. "That's the sort of planning we would do if we were a hospital, not a school, but we're doing it anyway."

Also, said Harris, the instructors have agreed that they will begin teaching CPR earlier in the year. Before, it was being covered a month or so into the semester. And students will learn quickly how to use a defibrillator in conjunction with CPR.

Reid said she is encouraging more defibrillator training on TVCC campuses, because this incident proves that emergency

services can be needed at any time and that CPR works.

Even five months later, Taylor said she is still amazed by how everything happened.

"It was God - which is kind of scary because I kind of wonder what God has in store for me, to save me like that. But He lets you know and I just kind of keep hoping to do what He wants me to do," Taylor said.

Taylor said having the defect and surgery has changed her health, and she said she has still not completely recovered. Also she may need another surgery later in her life.

But those remaining complications are nothing, compared to having another day, Taylor said.

"Every day is a blessing. Every day is something to be cherished. I could have not been here for Christmas this year," Taylor said. Her experience has made her

more determined than ever to finish school and go into the medical field, she added.

"I just hope to be able to bless others the way He's blessed me," Taylor said.






