In other business, Verizon Wireless will be permitted to install three additional antennas to the water tower behind Towne Center Park, representing additional revenue of \$9,000 per year.

Following up on an item from a previous council meeting, the council voted to add two additional TxDot road projects to an existing "wish list" of projects by the City of Heath. These projects, along with projects submitted by other county municipalities, will be considered by the Rockwall County Planning Consortium under the \$100 million bond package approved by voters in 2008.

One is the widening, to a four-lane divided road, of FM 550 from FM 549 to the east city limit, near where Rabbit Ridge and McDonald Road intersect with FM 549.

Providing an Effective Date

In another item, the council voted to authorize the City Manager to engage Freese and Nichols, Inc. to survey, design and provide environmental services for four Safe Routes to School projects. In April 2011, the city received grants totaling \$1,522,429 for the projects. It is estimated the total cost could be upwards of \$2,000,000, in which the city of Heath would bear responsibility for the difference. The four proposed projects are separate, meaning each has its own designated grant amount. The money for one project cannot be used for any of the other three. The city is required to make a final decision by April 2013, regarding which, if any, or all of the four, to pursue.

The other is FM 740 from its intersection with FM 1140 South (Smirl Dr.) to the Rockwall County Line. It is being recommended for straightening and widening to a six-lane, divided road.

Although on the agenda, there were no additional discussion items related to the 2013 Annual Fiscal Budget. Pending the Public Hearing, a vote on the budget could take place at the Sept. 18, City Council meeting.

After a presentation from Heath Director of Public Safety, Terry Garrett and considerable council and staff discussion on the threat of West Nile Virus, the council took action in a unanimous vote to initiate a trapping and sampling protocol to determine the city's likelihood of exposure to the virus. The process takes approximately two weeks. Results will be discussed at the next council meeting.



On God's Word

Were the bodies of the saints truly resurrected in Matthew 27:53?

After Jesus died on the stake a number of phenomenal events occurred that seized the attention of everyone present. We will closely study the record of dead bodies rising from graves and appearing to many people in Jerusalem.

Matthew 27:50-53, "Jesus, when he had cried again with a loud voice, yielded up the ghost ... And the graves were opened, and many bodies of the saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after his resurrection, and went into the holy city, and appeared unto many."

This scripture is popularly interpreted to mean that Old Testament saints were actually resurrected from the dead and visited many people. 'The above verse includes the word "appeared." It was a translation of the earlier known Greek word emphanizo, which meant to exhibit, reveal, make known. In the passive tense it meant to appear.

In the King James Companion Bible, E.W. Bullinger provided more information for emphanizo as follows, "to cause to be manifested or shown plainly and clearly. Used of causing that to be seen (or known) which would not otherwise have been cognizable by the unaided eye (or mind)."

When we apply other scripture it can be seen that the people could have seen a clear vision of a future event that probably did not literally happen at that time. A brief study of God's word concerning the resurrection and the holy city should help in our study.

The same Greek word is used in Hebrews 11:14, "For they that say such things declare plainly that they seek a country." To declare plainly is emphanizo, make known or reveal. What kind of country?

Verse 16, "desire a better country, that is heavenly...for He has prepared for them a city." This verse is not talking about a earthly city, but a heavenly one.

Returning to the Gospel account, according to Matthew 27:53 the bodies went into the physical city of Jerusalem and were seen by many people. Even though it was built by men's hands, it was still counted by God as a holy city at the time because it housed his people of the Old Testament times from Jacob to Joshua (aka, Jesus) before his death and resurrection.

Go back to Hebreww 11:13, "...these all died not having received the

One of the most critical factors in a republic form of government is citizen participation through the electoral process. In America, the responsibility for securing the privilege of voting rests with the individual states. Contrary to popular opinion, there is no right to vote ... it is a privilege regulated by the individual states of the United States.

Through the years the federal government has gradually grabbed that power from the states through legislation and judicial tampering. However, security of the vote remains a responsibility of the states, not the federal government.

In Texas, we expect our state and county officials to secure the vote. That security includes administration of the appropriate voting laws created by the state legislature. When those government officials fail in that responsibility, voters will suffer and the system itself will begin to fall apart.

With the recent discovery that the county district attorney and the state attorney general will not investigate or prosecute election code violations, voters are exposed to inevitable corruption in the voting system.

In the local case, violation of the election code by favored elected and appointed government officials demonstrates a major flaw in the administration of the state law. Even after the Secretary of State confirmed a clear violation of the law, there has been no serious investigation by the district attorney or the attorney general.

Exercising "discretionary" power, both of these officials undermine the very security of the vote that they are bound by their oaths of office to uphold. Heath city officials who admitted to having violated the code by their presence at the voting location are treated with immunity from the law. In other words, the law is administered not according to the law, but according to the whims of those sworn to uphold the law.

With "discretionary" power, the law is enforced on some but not others ... a stab in the heart of the rule of law ... suffocating the American principle that "no one is above the law."





Warren moves to offense, scores 6 TDs as Jacket

Chris Warren started the first game of his sophomore season for Rockwall at defensive end.

For the second game, he moved to running back - and did he ever run!

Warren gained 243 yards in 27 carries and scored all six of the Yellowjackets' touchdowns as they rallied to defeat Rowlett 41-37 Friday, Sept. 7.

"Nine yards a carry. Six touchdowns. He's very much a team player," said RHS head coach Scott Smith. "I'm proud of him, and all our guys. It was a good team effort."

Coming off a 43-17 opening-game defeat, the Jackets fell behind 3-0 less than 4 minutes into the game, and trailed at the end of each of the first three quarters - 9-7, 23-21 and 29-28. After each of the Eagles' six scores, Rockwall marched back down the field at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium and regained the lead on a Warren rushing touchdown.

The last of those, a 3-yard run, put the Jackets ahead to stay with 3 minutes, 48 seconds remaining.

That was enough time for Rowlett to regain the lead, but RHS' defense held on downs and the Jackets ran out the clock. That left each team with a 1-1 record.

So now that Warren has established himself as a running back, will he play just offense and not any defense.

Smith said. "No, but we would use him as a situational thing."

Without Warren, the defense still had trouble stopping the running game of Rowlett's duo of Derrick Imade and Texas Tech-bound Jalen Rhodes. The Eagles rolled up 303 yards on the ground, with Rhodes going for 181 yards and two touchdowns and Imade for 132 yards and three scores.

Rowlett outgained the Jackets through the air, but a bigger problem was pass interference penalties that kept the visitors' early drives alive. Rockwall was penalized 90 yards for just seven flags.

Linebacker Josh Rippy had 2 1/2 of the five sacks generated by the Jackets' strong pass rush. In the secondary, Barron Black and Sean Hardenbrook each broke up three passes. Nehemiah Solis, making his first start of 2012, led RHS with 14 tackles.

The most important numbers for Rockwall were 3, 7, 20, 70, 46 and 3 again. Those were the lengths of Warren's six touchdowns.



The Lady Jackets (16-10 overall) began district play Friday, Sept. 7, with a 25-10, 25-13, 25-16 victory over Longview


Before that, Rockwall won three and lost three the previous weekend against tough competition at the Nike Pearland Volleyball Classic.







The Royse City varsity football team is now 0-2 this season after a 34-3 home loss to North Forney High School Friday, September 7.

It should be noted that North Forney is in their first year as a 4A school. North Forney made the playoffs during their last two seasons at the 3A level.

About midway through the first quarter, Royse City began what would be their one scoring drive of the game. Starting from their 26 yard line, the Bulldogs marched all the way to North Forney's 15. After this impressive 13 play, five minute drive stalled, senior place kicker Chase Selby came on and booted a 32 yard field goal to tie the game at 3 at the 2:17 mark of the first quarter.

"We are in a process right now that isn't the most fun but necessary for improvement," Head Coach Greg Strahm said. "Our players are continually improving each week. At this point, we are not good enough to make a mistake and overcome that mistake. Consistency is a goal we practice towards. The will to win is there but the mental preparation to win is still a little behind. I take full responsibility for that area and we will fix it."

Rockwall placed third, losing only to host Texarkana Texas last weekend in the eight-team Texas High Team Tennis Invitational.



Fulkerson said, "It was a hard-fought match, and the kids had to dig deep. They pulled together and won. I'm very proud of them!"


District play was scheduled to begin Tuesday against Rockwall-Heath. Coppell won the tournament by defeating Texarkana Texas in the final.




