Two seats on the Rockwall City Council are up for grabs this Saturday, and four campaigns are entering the final

The premise is simple. First, cancer survivors walk around the track to commemorate their long and often difficult journey. Their caregivers, friends and family join them for the second lap, followed by the entire community the third time around.

In a literal sense, the relay lasts all night, with folks walking the track from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. The 12-hour saga is intended to make a powerful political point - that cancer survivors and supporters will keep walking until a cure is found.

The event is designed to raise awareness and funds for cancer research, and is sponsored by the American Cancer Society. The international event raised more than \$405 million in 2007 for cancer research through relays just like the one in Heath last week.

It's also a major community gathering. Families of all shapes and sizes turned out for support, and while taking a break from the track they played soccer and frisbee as the sun set. Dozens of businesses set up charity booths and sponsored teams to walk with the survivors, and it took several hours for the large crowds to finally dissipate.

"It's a great way to help the community," said Twyla Westerman, a registered nurse who sponsored a booth at the event along with MetroCare.

"We all have loved ones battling cancer, and we care for all the victims. We're part of the treatment, and this way, we can be part of the cure."

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Judge considering HOA ruling

Did the Oaks of Buffalo Way Homeowners Association step beyond their authority or are they within their rights? That is what a Rockwall County judge is considering.

Seven Oaks of Buffalo Way residents filed a lawsuit against the HOA saying the board stripped them of their voting rights by acting on bylaws that were never filed. Both sides were in the Rockwall County Court of Law May 2 pleading their case. After more than two hours of testimony, the judge said he would take the case under advisement and asked for additional briefing.

"I feel very strongly on the position that we've taken," said Matt Scott, a resident and a Rockwall City Council member.

Attorneys Scott and Bob Lyon represented the plaintiff's case while Garon Horton defended the HOA.

Scott and the other residents filed the lawsuit after the HOA asked the communities' 61 homeowners to pay \$1,500 toward a two-mile walking trail that cost \$125,000. A letter, sent on Jan. 29, demanded payment within 30 days or the homeowner would pay 18 percent interest.

On March 29 the HOA board voted 5-4 to suspend the voting rights of residents who hadn't paid the fee. the case as early as next week.

Scott questioned the board's authority to strip the voting rights and the timeliness of it. Scott said the announcement of the suspended rights came two weeks before residents would vote on board members.

Horton said the HOA was within their authority to strip the voting rights of residents who hadn't paid the fee.

Horton said the Oaks of Buffalo Way developer adopted the rules of the development when it was established in the 1990s. He said those rules include that the HOA has the ability to strip voting rights of members or put liens on their homes if they don't pay a special assessment approved by the members.

"They've done what they can to try and deescalate the tensions," Horton said.

An estimated 11 residents haven't paid the fee, including Scott. Scott. said he's paid the bulk of the bill.

"Eighty percent of the homeowners paid in full," Horton said.

Scott said in a previous interview that even if the HOA has the power to suspend voting rights, it's disgraceful that they would.

Scott said the lawsuit is not about money, but the principal of what he deems questionable techniques by the HOA.



Largest one-day food drive to benefit Helping Hands

Rockwall letter carriers, in - when school is out and no association with the National Association of Letter Carriers, will be collecting food for the Helping Hands organization on May 10.

The Rockwall letter carriers, working in partnership with the U.S. Postal Service, nizers are asking all residents Kroger, Campbell Foods, United Way, and the AFL-CIO, will participate in the 16th annual Letter Carrier Food drive.

Residents are asked to leave non-perishable food items at their mailboxes in a plastic sack, grocery bag, or box. Letter carriers will deliver the items to the Helping Hands organization that will distribute these donations to individuals and families.

In the last four years, demand from food from agencies and food pantries have increased by 45 percent. Many focus on the food drive donations during the Christmas holiday season. However, the summer months school lunches to look forward to - are when children are in most need. With the rising cost of food and gas, requests for assistance have grown even more. The need is extremely great so orgawho are able to donate during the annual one-day effort.

This is the largest one-day food drive in the nation.

According to Rockwall Postmaster Paul drain, the Rockwall office carriers collect food twice each year. The first time, in May, is sponsored nationwide by the Letter Carriers Union. The second time, in early November, the carriers participate in another drive in conjunction with Rockwall Helping Hands.

"During both of these food drives we are collecting between 5,000 and 10,000 pounds of food, and we are a major contributor to our local food bank," Drain said.

Winner of the comeback kid award for this year has to be absinthe - the storied, vilified, and until recently, banned liquor. Absinthe was the darling of the Belle Epoch from the late 1880s until World War I in Europe (especially France), as the drink of artists and the glitterati. Artists, Manet, van Gogh, and the writer Hemingway were all fans of the drink sometimes referred to as "The Green Fairy." Originally created in the late 18th century in Switzerland, this anise-flavored, light-green liquor is made up of a potent mixture of highproof alcohol, herbs, and the leaves and flowers of the wormwood plant.

Wormwood is the culprit for most of the bad press that absinthe has suffered under, for the past century. In addition, modern science has discounted the rumored effects of thujone - a psychoactive ingredient in absinthe - and given it a clean bill of health, at least in small to moderate amounts.

Historians and researchers now think that the cause of the reputed addictive and hallucinatory effects of absinthe were caused by the high-alcohol - 45 to 75 percent or 90-150 proof - present in most versions of this liquor past and present. Interestingly, the phylloxera infestation of European vineyards and decimation of the grapess during the late 1800s had caused a severe shortage of wine on the Continent, and opened the door for alcohol substitutes such as absinthe.

Part of the appeal of absinthe is the ritual associated with serving this strong green li-quor. Traditionally, cold water is drawn from an ornate urn and flows over a sugar cube on a small slotted spoon into a glass that contains the clear liquor. As the water is added, the absinthe clouds in the glass.

We recently had the opportunity to taste two of the absinthe brands that are currently available in the U.S. The samples were mixed at a ratio of about 4-5 parts water to one part absinthe, and served in the traditional manner over a sugar cube. Kubler Absinthe 106 proof and about \$60/liter will be familiar to current drinkers of products such as Pernod or Ricard from France. Very distinctive and penetrating black licorice nose. Smooth in the mouth with licorice elements along with a hint of herbs. Very nice and enticing.

Lucid Absinthe 124 proof \$68/750ml. A bit stronger in alcohol than the Kubler, but, you don't sense the increased strength. The label features fierce, distinctive panther eyes. Black licorice and herbal in the nose and mouth, along with a lovely taste of lemon oil in the finish. A bit more complex than the Kubler, this was our favorite.
