# Bankhead National Highway plaque to be placed in Fate

According to the agenda for the Fate City Council meeting of Nov. 19, "Ordinance No 0-1218 approving the proposed final service and assessment plan, final assessment roll, final reimbursement agreement and the levying of assessments against property within Williamsburg Public Improvement District No 2" was approved and passed.

Present was Fate City Attorney Andy Messer, who told the council that "this is the final action required in order to move forward with Williamsburg PID (Public Improvement District) #2."

The Williamsburg project has been "a matter of community interest" on the agenda for several council meetings and a matter of interest for the financial growth for the city of Fate.

The Portrait Ceremony, hosted prior to the vote, honored Hall's service as chairman of the Science, Space and Technology Committee. Hall has served on the committee since first elected to office and assumed the chairmanship in January 2011 at the beginning of the 112th Congress. He is the only member to serve as ranking member both as a Republican (2007-2010) and as a Democrat (1999-2003).

"Ralph's record of service to the committee, to our country, has been a thing of beauty," said Speaker John Boehner, who accepted the portrait. "And, I think Mr. Martin's portrait here matches that description. I'm not

much of an art expert, but if you look closely at this [portrait] you'll see a couple things. One, of course, is the portrait within a portrait of Ralph and his beloved Mary Ellen. And so when I accept this portrait I'll do so in her honor. And the other thing you'll notice is on Ralph's lapel. It's a fitting symbol of his commitment -- long commitment -- to the space program. And as chairman, how much time he devoted, and the focus of the committee was devoted, to all of our frontiers. He's done a great job, and I know that Ralph is proud of the shuttle, proud of the work he did, and keeps it all in his heart as

at \$85,000 of the \$215,000 raised this year came from Fate, which has increased its population from 400 ) since the tax's inception. According to assistant district attorney John Thatcher, Fate feels it is being unfairly as the city now brings in increased revenue, but is not allocated any increase in funds.

Thatcher said the Comptroller's Office is creating a map of the region to see if there are any overlapping areas or duplication of services. The commissioners also discussed the possibility of changing district boundaries to exempt Fate from the tax.

In other business, the commissioners voted to approve the issuance of Tax Road Bond Services for approximately \$25 million for the FM 3545 interchange.

"We are working with the state to repave the roadway," Magness said. "We'll front them the money, and they'll pay us back based on the use of the roadway."

The commission also discussed ways to improve a rating given the county by Standard & Poor. "The rating has to do with the overall debt connected to the county, the city and schools," said Magness. "Much of it comes from the great growth we've experienced and money spent on roads and the new county courthouse."

The commissioners also approved increased insurance coverage for county employees to help them stop smoking.

"Our employees tend to be with us a long time," Magness said. "So we're focusing on the wellness aspect. Keeping healthy employees will also keep premiums down."

County employees are also required to have an annual physical.

"All are welcome to celebrate the coming of our Savior, Christ the Lord," Taylor said.





# **Profiles of Heath: Amy Parks'** 'Joy'-full ray of sunshine

For the past 11 years, every student who has crossed the front drive at Amy Parks Heath elementary has received a big dose of love and kindness from Miss Joy – Joy Kiteley that is – the school's treasured crossing guard.

Miss Joy will tell you that her job as crossing guard is much more a labor of love than anything else. Even on the days of the most bitter cold, Miss Joy is prepared with smiles and love to greet each student, that they may be armed with the confidence to have the best day

It's apparent the affect that she has on the students. For many children at the school, the day has not properly begun without a greeting from Miss Joy. Even the older ones regularly return to say hello when they're on their way to Cain or Rockwall-Heath High.

She shares that she knew it was God's mission for her to do something with children.

"I have really learned that the love of a child is just something that can not be beat, because of the fact that it's so pure and it's so innocent and it's so unconditional," she says. "My goal has always been for them to walk through that door feeling that love from me. They make it special for me every day. I want them to feel happy when they get into school. It makes a difference."

When Miss Joy retired, she had anticipated a life with a bit more leisure. She had worked and also raised show chow dogs, traveling to shows around the country and parading her dogs in the ring.

When her husband had retired, he began serving as a crossing guard at another school. Miss Joy then stepped in at Amy Parks when a substitute was needed while a permanent employee could be found. That was in October of 2001 and she hasn't left yet. She hadn't anticipated working again, but felt strongly that this is where God had led her to be.

Originally from Oklahoma, Miss Joy has been a resident of Rockwall County for 34 years and was married to her husband Ernie for 37 years until he died in 2010. Miss Joy said he loved children as much as she did and he was a man that was respected, fair and kind. It's heartwarming to hear her speak of Ernie.

Miss Joy is the proud mother and grandmother to two children, four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. She is very involved in First United Methodist Church Royse City, participating in children's activities like vacation bible school and the children's Sunday sermon. She is also blessed with family that lives near -- a sister and her mother -- who recently celebrated her 95th birthday.

"There's no way that you just can't have a great feel about these kids. It's such an awesome feeling, that you look in those eyes and those smiles. I compliment them, I tell them they're beautiful inside and out. They beam. They need that," she says. "If they want to stand in the middle of the crosswalk, I stand there and listen, because it's

important to listen." Miss Joy is as fond of the staff at Amy Parks as they are of her.

"This is my other family," she said. "They've made me feel so welcome. They are wonderful."

She shares that when her husband got ill and died that the parents and teachers covered for her when she was not able to be at her post each day.

"I thought that was really nice of them," she said.

On behalf of the children and parents of Amy Parks, we thank you, Miss Joy, for the love and care you provide for our children each day at school. You are a ray of sunshine.

Praise God for His powerful and simple love with patience an fulness, that anybody can believe unto true righteousness. Praise God!



### Recording city council meetings

I have been attending City Council meetings in Heath for several years and I have been requesting the City's records of some those meetings for some time. Recently the records I have requested are the authentic time records of the meetings. The City's records at the time of the public meetings are handwritten notes. From these handwritten notes the secretary types the minutes which are published some days or weeks later on the City website.

The City of Heath pays a contracted person \$40,000 per year to manage our newsletters and website. The City also pays many more thousands of dollars to newspapers and magazines reporting on City community events. Despite spending over \$50,000 annually on multimedia advertising and contract labor to keep us informed about the parades and other community events, the City's only true time record of the very important public City meetings are handwritten secretary notes written on the pages of a steno pad. I have included on a blog an attachment of handwritten notes from the November 6, 2012 Heath City Council meeting (http://heathtxlove.blogspot.com/)

Due to this closed and biased handwritten recording of the City's important public meetings many of the citizen's and other's comments are lost forever. The City picks and chooses what to make public record by the editing done behind the scenes with these handwritten notes. If you view the minutes the City has posted on the website and compare them with the notes below, you can clearly see the discrepancies (if you can read the handwriting in the notes). There is nothing transparent about recording public meetings by a secretary in handwritten form.

I find it hard to logically understand how all the City Council members can use IPads, that the City is in debt over \$20 million dollars, that the City pays over \$50 thousand dollars for multimedia services and that 2 employees in City Manager's office receive over \$500 thousand dollars in salaries/benfits but the City has to record the proceedings of its public meetings by handwritten notes on a steno pad.

Why can't the City of Heath be completely truthful and transparent in their reporting of public meetings and move some of the thousands of dollars spent on multimedia into a true time electronic recording of the City's public meetings? Personally, I would rather be able to see and hear a citizen's comment on a public issue then to see and hear that a parade was a success.

# County Courthouse: It's time to move or

In 2008, after the voters had twice voted not to build a new Courthouse, the Commissioners Court, by a vote of 3-2, elected to fund Tax Notes, which did not require the approval of the voters, to proceed with the design and building of the new \$37.2 million Courthouse. The building was to be erected on land already owned by the County adjacent to the new Library and between Yellow Jacket Lane and I-30.

There was a large outcry from the citizens against this action. Sides were quickly drawn among the citizen groups and non-support for the action became the "talk of the town" almost every time two or more citizens gathered together. Political careers ended for members of the Court who voted for the construction.

And then on 11/11/11 the new Courthouse was officially opened and dedicated along with our new Veterans Memorial next to the Courthouse. And while the Commissioners Court of 2008 that made the decision to build the Courthouse without the support of the citizens may have made

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a big mistake in the way they made their decision to build, they certainly made no mistake in the building they helped design and construct.

Already the building has become the shining example of what a modern, but classical looking, Courthouse should be. Counties from around the State are coming to Rockwall to see how the design was done and what technology is contained in the courtrooms, office facilities, and jury room as well as the security which separates the citizens from the inmates appearing before our judges. TV production companies are coming to Rockwall to film in the Courthouse bringing the exposure of our County to the rest of the State as well as adding the economic benefit of this visibility.

### **Lingering Complaints**

But there continues to be that lingering group of critics that complain about the Courthouse, its expense, the way it was constructed, where it was constructed, how it was funded, and the vote that authorized the building of the facility. Hopefully as time passes these critics will become fewer and fewer and the focus will change to the pride our citizens will have

> going forward on what this building offers to our community.

But now we have another issue that has the potential of dividing our citizens. This time it is not the Courthouse, but rather the Veterans Memorial.

### **Veterans Memorial**

During the building of the Courthouse, the Commissioners Court made the decision to build a Veterans Memorial adjacent to the Courthouse. Funds had been allocated previously for this project and \$500,000 was available for the

separate Memorial. A committee made up of veterans and interested citizens was formed to be in charge of the Memorial They conducted a design contest and selected one of the ten designs submitted for the actual Memorial. Laborious detail on the part of the Committee was the order of the day on what the Memorial would look like, how it was to be arranged. where each portion of the memorial would be located, the appropriate rules and regulations for this type facility, the composition of the walls, the texture of the materials, etc. Part of their detailed work was the selection and design placement of the flags that would become part of the Memorial.

The design for the flags called for three flags to be placed near Memorial: the American, State of Texas, and POW flag. The design for the American flag to be in the center of the three flags and to b feet higher than the other two flags. Because of the way in which could observe the flags, either down in the Memorial about sever below ground level, or at ground level from the side of the Mem the alignment of the flags could be observed differently; from the gi level the design called for the State flag of Texas to be on the right American flag, but from down in the Memorial looking up at the flag State flag of Texas would be on the left of the American flag. A discu could be held on which design is correct and which is incorrect, b argument can be made for either way.

The Memorial was constructed as designed by the winning d architect and the Memorial committee.

After the dedication of the Memorial, Commissioner Jerry Wi raised a question with the Court as to the correctness of the design. opinion the American flag should not have been constructed higher the State flag and the alignment of the flags was also incorrect. The discussed this for about twenty minutes but without taking any vote o agreement that Commissioner Wimpee was correct in his interpretati the design. The issue was then dropped by the Court.

Shortly afterwards, Commissioner Wimpee contracted for a comto come to the Memorial and reduce the height of the American fl it would be the same as the other two flags. This was done withou knowledge or approval of the Court.

Commissioner Wimpee's action resulted in an investigation by the Rangers and subsequent action by a Special Prosecutor where he ordered to pay for the restitution of the flag pole, write a letter of apo to the citizens, and donate money to The Wounded Warrior program.

Citizens are now split on this issue. Many feel the punishment too light; others feel that Commissioner Wimpee did nothing w It's the same type division we saw with the decision to build the

I have sat on the Commissioners Court with Commissioner Wimpe about two years. We do not vote the same on many issues, but I al listen to what he has to say during the debate on issues. He is a good th who has dedicated 20 years to the service of the citizens of our Coun a Commissioner. Before that he spent his life in law enforcement comes from a family where his father was County Judge of our Co for many years. He is a proud man whom I believe has always ha betterment of the County and the State as one of his prime objective is not a bad man; it's time to end this division just like the division the Courthouse needs to end.

Whether the punishment is too light or too heavy or whether there should have been any, is irrelevant; it is done and over with. It's tir move on! Whether the design is correct the way it is or should be cha is also irrelevant; it is built the way the memorial committee wanted be built. It too is done and over with.



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

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# Smith felt time was right to step down as Jackets coach, Al

In essence, Scott Smith fired himself as head football coach at Rockwall

Then Scott Smith decided he didn't want to remain as the Rockwall Independent School District's athletic director.

Smith had served in both roles since Mark Elam resigned as the district's AD early in 2009

Now he has decided he wants to remain a football coach only.

On Nov. 27, he met with RISD superintendent Jeff Bailey and resigned both Rockwall jobs effective Dec. 31, as well at the RHS athletic coordinator's position. Smith indicated that he will be accepting a coaching job in another district, but hasn't said where or when.

"I do not gauge coaches on won-loss record," Smith said, wearing his athletic director hat. "It's more by feel. Are they being effective? I don't think the head coach of Rockwall football was being effective. I believe I can evaluate a football program better than other sports, because deep down, I know the feel."

To illustrate that feel, Smith used the example of his 1998 team at Highland Park, which reached the Regional finals before losing to Southlake Carroll. "That year we went to Game 14, and I had the exact same feeling this year that I had then."

At that time, he returned to his alma mater, Baylor University, where he was the starting strong safety for 3 years and an assistant coach for 3 more

under legendary head coach Grant Tiff. Smith's new job was assistant head coach under Kevin Steele.

When Steele was dismissed after four seasons, Smith became the head coach at Odessa Permian for 2 years before coming to Rockwall in 2005. His eight seasons as Yellow jackets head coach represent the longest he has stayed at one place in a 31-year coaching career.

The Jackets were 3-7 overall and 2-4 on their return to District 12-5A last season, and 38-45 during his eight-year tenure. Smith's career head-coaching record in 18 years at Garland, Duncanville, Highland Park, Permian and Rockwall is 104-80-2.

Until a full-time head coach is named, RHS defensive coordinator Chris Patton will move up to interim head coach and athletic coordinator. The position of district athletic director, who is in charge of athletics at both high schools and all three middle schools in the district, also will be filled.

Smith said, "I feel I would not be best for this (AD) position, having been on the Rockwall side, and I'm not ready to just be an AD. I still enjoy coaching the game.

RHS' head coach since 2005, Smith became the interim AD in March of 2009 with the understanding that he could decide at the end of the year which job he would keep.

However, when 2009 ended, superintendent Bailey told Smith he had done such a good job that the district wanted to retain him in both positions.

Smith initially resigned in November of 2011, but that resignation was not

In a district release, Bailey said, "As a coach and athletic director Smith has not only been dedicated to developing outstanding student at but has put equal emphasis on developing athletes who display charac integrity. He has been a positive influence on hundreds of students dur tenure in the district and we are grateful for his service to our studer families. We wish him well in all his future endeavors and thank him he has done for Rockwall ISD."

In addition to his coaching - most notably in 2006, when the Jacket the undefeated champions of District 10-5A, Smith will be remer in Rockwall as the champion of the "Honor Before Victory" progra teaches the value of good sportsmanship. He also has been the face marketing campaign at the renovated Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial S that adds some \$200,000 a year for the RISD general fund.

Twenty years ago, Smith, then 34, was considered a candidate to i Tiff at Baylor when he retired in 1992.

Former Baylor quarterback Cody Carlson, then with the Houston told the Houston Chronicle's John McClain, "The players, coach friends I know who have been around Scott think he would be a fa choice as the next head coach. Scott has the morals and values that B looking for, and he also has the right work ethic."

## **RISD** names Lee Stout interim athletic director



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
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
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
