8th graders, track progress of students using the data from unit tests and benchmarks, special education inclusion and increase number of certified ESL teachers. Scott Elementary has received a "Needs Improvement" accountability

rating for the 2014 school year for the second year in a row. The rating comes from the Texas Education Agency.

Assistant superintendent Kenny Kaye Hudson reviewed the reasons Scott scored so low, the main reason being that the students did not make the acceptable progress that measures year-to-year growth, by subject and student group.

Hudson said the plans to bring the school up to acceptable ratings will be intensive and include data driven planning. Increased learning time, making sure all teachers are properly trained and knowledgeable as to what must be done to bring the students to the academic level of where they need to be and stronger parental and community involvement. A reading coach will be brought into the school to work with the staff and more professional development will be given to work with the entire staff of the school, including the administration, to all work together successfully to bring Scott into compliance.

A reconstitution plan will be presented to the school board in January and to TEA in February. There is a short time and a lot of hard work to be done in order to bring the school to where it needs to be. Even if Scott brings the accountability level up by the end of the 2015 year, there still will be a reconstruction plan for next year and much supervision awareness of each teacher, the students' progress and the administration's support for all faculty and staff members.

Hudson noted that Scott is not a bad school, it just needs help from

many areas and the Royse City ISD will make sure it gets all the supplies, mentoring and support it needs.

"We're very serious about what we are asking our teachers to do, just as TEA is very serious about what they want us to do as a district to reach our goals," Superintendent Kevin Worthy said during the board meeting. "A potential growth plan for the teachers whose kids don't meet the growth expectations, will be put into place if needed."

Julia Robinson, assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction, said, "Our goal is to grow our teacher to where they need to be to help the kids reach their goals. Scott's staff wants their kids to succeed and they'll do whatever it takes to have their kids meet the goals."

Superintendent Worthy interjected, "Scott is having pretty good turnouts at Parent's Night. The parents want to know what to do to help their children to be successful."

The idea was brought up regarding the possibly of having teachers having to reapply for their jobs next year if the school doesn't become academically successful. Worthy said he hopes that decision will not have to be made, and by everyone working hard, long hours following the plan to bring the entire school to meet TEA requirements, that no one would have to reapply for their job.

Members of the board complimented the teachers for all the work, overtime and positive attitudes displayed to the encourage the students to strive to be successful and reach for higher goals.

All school board members were present.

Water, wastewater rates to increase December 1

Rockwall residents will see an increase in their water and wastewater years. rates beginning December 1.

Bob McLain of McLain Decision Support Systems gave a presentation during the Rockwall City Council meeting on Monday, October 17 explaining the increase and the study done by the North Texas Municipal Water District.

RCH Water Supply Corporation and Blackland Water Supply Corporation purchase wholesale water under long-term contracts with the city. Both contracts call for rates to be determined by a cost of service study rather than be tied to residential increases.

The proposed rate for Blackland and RCH is proposed to be \$3.57 per thousand gallons. The study includes increasing rates for the next five years of those agreements if they are in place.

The City of Heath contract is currently being renegotiated. The current agreement provides for a rate, which is 10 cents higher than the member

city rate. Staff is negotiating a longer-term contract with Heath at this time that will allow for more favorable rates for Rockwall in the coming

The proposed residential rates include an \$8.00 increase to the water base rate and no change in the volumetric rate for water. Base and volumetric sewer rates are proposed to increase by 14.5%.

The new rates would begin to appear on bills in January. Based on average consumption, residents would see their bills increase by approximately \$12 when not irrigating and \$16 when irrigating.

"Our average consumption has dropped from over 12,000 gallons a month, to closer than 8,000 a month," Assistant City Manager Mary Smith said, "That's a sign of how well our folks have responded to the need to conserve. In the month of October when we had gone back to once per week watering, our consumption was down 38% from October last year. So, we're still seeing our residents doing a very good job at

County Commissioner's Court removes Administrator

The Rockwall County Commissioner's Court voted 4-1 to accept the recommendation of the Rockwall County Elections Commission for the removal of Glenda Denton from the Elections Administrator position.

The vote came after a brief executive session during the last three minutes of the meeting.

During the Nov. 17, 2014 special meeting, Commissioners Cliff Sevier, Lorie Grinnan, Dennis Bailey and Judge Jerry Hogan voted for Denton's

removal, with David Magness entered the opposing vote. According to the motion, Ms. Denton would be on Administrative leave until Nov. 30, 2014.

The meeting began as three members from the public spoke to the Commissioners for an alotted period of three minutes.

Karen Jacobs, of Heath, spoke against removing Denton from the

Elections Administrator position. "Certainly mistakes were made in this election; but none of them

compromised the integrity of the election," said Jacobs. Ms. Jacobs went on to emphasize that the "biggest mistakes related to moving the election's office during the middle of the election and

halfway through the cycle were not Glenda's fault." Next to speak was Barbara Sampson, of Rockwall, who tauted Denton's

knowledge of the elections process and law. Tim Hartley concluded the public comments session by explaining

• Agreed to table the agenda item related to Case Management System for Rockwall County, which involves contracting with a vendor to replace an antiquated system with an integrated record keeping system that manages records from the point of arrest, to confinement and court records.

"You take the lead because you see a need," Duran said.

She shared a story of her time as a high school counselor, when she led a weekly group of grieving students. One student, Joseph, communicated his desire to drop out of school. Duran's response was to sit down and cry and beg him to reconsider.

"I decided at that point that as long as I was a counselor, there would be a place for grieving students in my school," she said.

Years later, she encountered this student, whom she no longer recognized. He had turned things around and was doing well with his life.

"Mrs. Duran, don't you recognize me? I'm Joseph." He was pursing a degree in law enforcement. "I never forgot that you cared enough to cry for me," he told Duran. "There's lots of different ways to change people - showing genuine and real caring and emotion made a difference. I'm lucky I ever found out later How we affect people."

"You step up when there's a need — that's leadership," Duran told the RHHS students. "It's amazing how one person can change a whole group for positive."

She asked students to write down their personal definitions of leadership and talked about the different types of leaders - authoritative, service

TOOTH-COLORED FILLINGS

Amalgam's silver color stands in stark contrast to natural tooth color when placed in visible tooth surfaces. For this reason, patients are likely to prefer composite-resin tooth-colored fillings, which can so closely approximate their natural tooth color as to be virtually unnoticeable. Composite resins may be somewhat less durable than amalgam fillings, and they may cost more, but patients' concerns over cosmetics have made them an increasingly popular choice. As far as dentists are concerned, the best filling is no dental filling. Prevention is preferred.







Food connects people. It provides calories and comfort. It creates and triggers memories. The smells and tastes of a certain dish can bring us back in time to a special birthday


or holiday or maybe even a typical Wednesday evening when your dad browned the hamburger for your mom's chili while you did your homework at the kitchen





"For her first meet, I was pleased with her technique, but we need to continue to improve," RHS Coach Brent Pohorsky said.


