Rockwall Police arrest DWI suspects; no refusal initiative

According a Sunday May 26, 2013 press release from Sgt. Aaron McGrew, Public Information Officer of the Rockwall Police Department, officers of the Rockwall Police Department responded to a report of an accident near the intersection of State Highway 205 and 276.

The officers responded to the call on Saturday May 25 at approximately 6:18 p.m..

The officers completed a traffic accident investigation and one of the involved drivers was found to have been consuming alcoholic beverages.

Based upon the findings of the investigation, a 38 year old man who lives in Rockwall County and serves as an officer with a Police Department in a county adjacent to Rockwall County, was arrested for the act of "Driving While Intoxicated" in violation of Texas Penal Code 49.04, and booked in at the Rockwall County Jail.

The press release continued that in accordance with the no refusal DWI initiative, a warrant was obtained for a blood specimen from the accused individual.

The test results are pending.

Sgt. McGrew stated that the case would be filed with the Rockwall

County District Attorney's Office.

As of the end of the day on Tuesday May 28, no case was filed in the record of the Rockwall

County District Court.

McGrew verified the police

found no evidence of an alcoholbased assault, nor were there any injuries in the accident.

The accident involved three automobiles.

The names of the other parties in the accident were not made available.

There were no other people in

the car with the accused.

There were no other people in the car with the accused.

Sgt. McGrew verified that the police officer sought the search warrant for the defendant's blood based on the situation and his observations, and after review of the warrant affidavit, a judge determined there was adequate probable cause to seize the blood from the accused as evidence.

According to the Rockwall County jail records, the accused was released Sunday May 26 on a \$500 bond.

According to the Rockwall County jail records, six other individuals were also arrested by and jailed for "Driving While Intoxicated" between Friday May 24 and 26.

Two of the six were released on \$750, three were released on \$1000 bond and one shows a release date of Tuesday May 28 with no record of a bond.

The Police Department did not provide the names of the hospital and



Stand up and keep the play alive ...

While reading through and studying the death and resurrection of Jesus, it's difficult to ignore his boldness and love toward others along with faithfulness toward God. According to Matthew 11:29 Jesus said, "Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in heart."

After facing two fraudulent trials and Pilate's judgment, Jesus was finally sentenced by democratic vote of the people's voice to be crucified. Before his crucifixion, Jesus was beaten and scourged by many Roman



soldiers. Please understand that the scourging was far beyond what most of us can imagine.

Based on a prophecy found in Isaiah 52: 14 Jesus' "visage was so marred more than any man, and his form more than the sons of men." In essence, he was scourged and beaten to the point that even his closest friends and family would not have recognized him. This occurred prior to being led to the cross.

With this in mind, let's return to Luke 23:27-31. As Jesus was led away to be crucified, he saw a large number of people including women who were lamenting greatly. Jesus turned to them and began to speak by the spirit of God, "Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for me, but weep for yourselves, and for your children..."

After facing such horrendous persecution under the power of the Jewish and Roman government leaders, Jesus still had the peaceful frame of mind to be able to encourage and edify others with words of prophecy by the spirit of God.

But he didn't stop there! After he was nailed to the cross, Jesus prayed for the Roman soldiers who executed him by saying, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). This prayer occurred about the time that the soldiers started casting lots for his clothing.






NTMWD launches website to computer water needs



gap between rich and poor continues to grow.") Moreover, until the factory collapse, garment workers could not organize without employer permission.

Crony capitalism deprives Bangladeshis of property rights, freedom of exchange, and therefore work options. The people need neither the corporatist status quo nor Western condescension. They need radical land reform and freed markets.

Champions of first amendment deliver for Texas citizens

When the dust settles from another hard-fought legislative session, the people of Texas will have a clearer picture of current events in the Lone Star State, thanks to the hard work and determination of two Texas statesmen — one Republican, one Democrat.

Rep. Todd Hunter, R-Corpus Christi, and Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, scored major transparency victories in the 83rd Legislature. Three of those victories will be particularly helpful in strengthening and clarifying the public's right to complete and accurate information.

One crucial bill that Ellis and Hunter shepherded through the legislative dust storm strengthens a crucial First Amendment law they passed two years ago.

That law took aim at legal actions known as Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation (SLAPP) — suits filed against whistleblowers by individuals or entities who have plenty of money to pay lawyers.

SLAPP suits are designed to intimidate and stifle those who dare to exercise their First Amendment rights. Thanks to the 2011 law, however, it was finally possible for a David Q. Citizen with meager resources to defend himself against a SLAPP suit filed by a deep-pocketed Goliath.

Unfortunately, an appeals court ruled that the 2011 law did not include certain appeal rights for David. If a judge ruled against David's motion to dismiss Goliath's suit early in the process, David could very quickly find himself bankrupted by the expensive discovery process following that denial.

The legal tweak pushed through the 2013 session by Hunter and Ellis makes it crystal clear that David does, indeed, have a right to appeal, thereby stopping the discovery process until the motion is heard on appeal. It is a major victory for those who believe the quality of justice shouldn't be determined by the depth of one's pocketbook.

Another measure championed by Ellis and Hunter makes it clear

that a government official's use of his private electronic device for messages regarding public business does not allow him to hide those messages from public scrutiny.

In recent years, a number of local officials across Texas have

maintained that their government-related messages are no business of the public so long as the official uses his private device to send or receive them. Texas attorneys general have consistently ruled against that strained and arrogant line of reasoning, but officials continue to try to evade Texas' open records laws anyway.

Once signed by the governor, the law will establish in black and white that citizens do indeed have the right to access these electronic messages about the public's business. There should be no doubt going forward that if a public official is discussing public business in cyberspace, those messages are, yes, public — regardless of whether they're transmitted on the official's government computer or his personal e-tablet.

The third bill enhances public discourse by establishing clear and fair rules for prompt corrections by publishers. Until now, there was no established legal framework for a citizen to request a correction, nor were there guidelines for publishers to follow in addressing that request. The new law establishes clear processes and deadlines, which will result

in the record being corrected quickly and fully when a mistake is made.

None of these important legal advances would have happened without the hard work and legislative prowess of Hunter and Ellis. For decades the two veteran lawmakers have fought hard — often against daunting opposition — to expand and protect citizens' access to government information and journalists' right to cover the complex issues that affect

our daily lives.


The 83rd Legislative Session of the Texas Legislature saw these two veteran legislators from different parties — men who do not consider the First Amendment a partisan issue — at the top of their game. And because they were at the top of their game, the citizens of Texas can see more clearly now.



wind. Residential and business water customers can go online, select a weather station near where they are located and select the brand and type of irrigation system they use. Based on the previous seven days of weather conditions recorded at the weather station for that microclimate, the site will compute the amount of water needed.

"Research indicates that most landscapes require less water than many people realize," said Jim Parks, executive director of the water district. "This tool will help reduce overwatering of lawns, which will extend our available water supplies on any day, during times of drought and while the Texoma supply is offline."

Proper watering is critical as the NTMWD and its member cities and customers prepare to enter Stage 3 drought restrictions June 1. Residential and business customers will be limited to watering once per week, if needed, using automatic sprinkler and irrigation systems.


