Rockwall police chief Moeller addresses actions during recent armed standoff

Rockwall Chief of Police Mark Moeller met with residents of the Lakeside Village neighborhood last Wednesday to explain his orders during a standoff with an armed suspect the previous week.

The meeting was closed to the media but Rockwall Police Department Information Officer Sgt. Jeff Welch said residents allowed the police to explain why officers did not try to apprehend the suspect, a man with a lengthy record, during the incident which lasted more than 12 hours.

"I'm glad I had the opportunity to meet with the residents and I appreciate their time," Chief Moeller said. "I think the meeting went well and I'm glad to have the opportunity to address their concerns."

The incident began when Rockwall police officers responded to a 911 call from Lakeside Village at around 9 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 11. The caller said he had seen a man breaking into his truck in the 4200 Block Postei Court and followed him as he ran into a condo within the neighborhood. Lakeside Village is a gated community located just north of the intersection of I-30 and Village Drive.

The homeowner chased the suspect, 21-year-old Cody Lee Welborn, to the home of Welborn's girlfriend, 20-year-old Regan Holder, at 3932 Mediterranean Street.

The suspect allegedly stole an AR-15 .22 caliber rifle, more than 300 rounds of ammunition, and a laptop computer from the truck after they were parked for a trip the next day.

When nine Rockwall police officers responded to the scene, reports from media outlets that the Garland Police Department SWAT Team responded were not correct, according to Sgt. Welch.

Moeller confirmed that Welborn was in the condo but he did not respond to attempts by police to contact him by cell phone and using the Intercom (IPA) system.

Chief Moeller told residents that the scene commander, Lt. David Valliant had been on the phone with Assistant Chief of Police Kirk Riggs during the incident, and then Moeller called Valliant. After Welborn did not respond to officers, Sgt. Welch said the chief thought if officers pulled the suspect might come out and they could get him away from the building area to arrest him or pick him up at a later time. Sgt. Welch said he did not order the officers to leave the scene, just pull back out of the area. Chief Moeller said he followed protocol based on the information he received from the commander on the scene.

"The chief felt the suspect was more of a threat to officers than to the community," Sgt. Welch said.

Rockwall officers, Lt. Valliant and Officer Chris Campbell, remained on the scene, according to Sgt. Welch.

The owner of the stolen property later entered the condo, against police advice with the suspect's girlfriend and another girl who also lived at the residence. The trio found the suspect "unresponsive" in an upstairs bedroom, Sgt. Welch said. They called for help and when officers entered

the bedroom and pulled the covers off the suspect to check for weapons, he began swinging and fighting with the officers. The officers used their stun guns to bring the suspect under control.

Other media reports that the owner of the stolen property had a physical altercation with the suspect are not correct, according to Sgt. Welch.

Welborn was arrested at the scene and remains in the Rockwall County jail. He was arrested on an active parole violation felony warrant and has also been charged with theft of a firearm, unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon, felony theft, resisting arrest, and possession of

drug paraphernalia. He also has a pending public intoxication charge in Kaufman County.

Welborn's girlfriend, Regan Breanna Holder, was also arrested at the scene after she tried to interfere with officers arresting Welborn. She posted bond and was released.

Chief Moeller said he has addressed how he will receive information from officers in the future during an event, calling the scene commander himself to make sure he has the most accurate information possible in order to make informed decisions.

City of Rockwall lauds employees, distributes service awards

The City of Rockwall employees recently were recognized for their dedication and service, including Employee of the Year Donny Delgado of the Street Department, according to a Rockwall news release.

"It's really nice to know there are still some honest people out there," said the city manager and director of street maintenance Brad Griggs, explaining that Delgado turned in more than \$300 in found to his supervisor. "The money belonged to a fellow employee and he turned it back the next day. Donny was recognized for the award for his outstanding contributions and kindness."

Frank Dunlop of the Rockwall Police Department and Dennis Pittman of the Wastewater Department each received the Director's Choice Award for demonstrating the core values of the city.

A former officer with the police department for 22 years, Dunlop was assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division and oversees the operations and activities of the public safety mobile computer system.

"On a daily basis Frank is tasked with managing our department's New World video system and the same system used by the Rockwall Fire Department and the Health Department of Public Safety," said Rockwall Police Chief Mark Moeller. "He is also responsible for supervising our crime analyst, three clerks and the property and maintenance technician."

For 13 years, Dunlop has been instrumental in several upgrades of the department's software. He recently simultaneously upgraded the Mobile System and replaced the video system with a digital Coban in-car video system. Dunlop managed to cover all hours of the day and weekends so he could have personal contact with each field employee of each agency on their shift and every vehicle they use.

"This literally saved the city thousands of dollars in overtime," Moeller said.

Dunlop is working with the Rockwall County District Attorney's Office

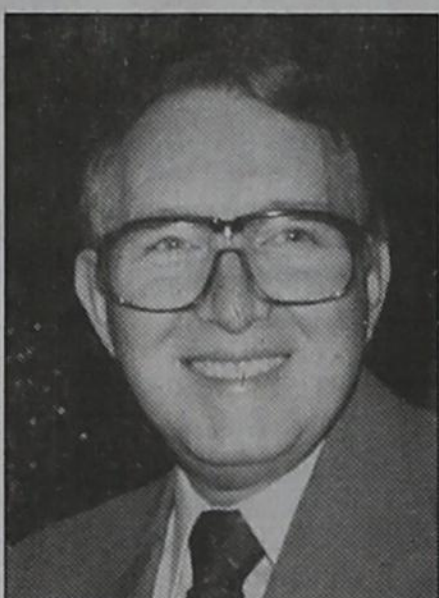
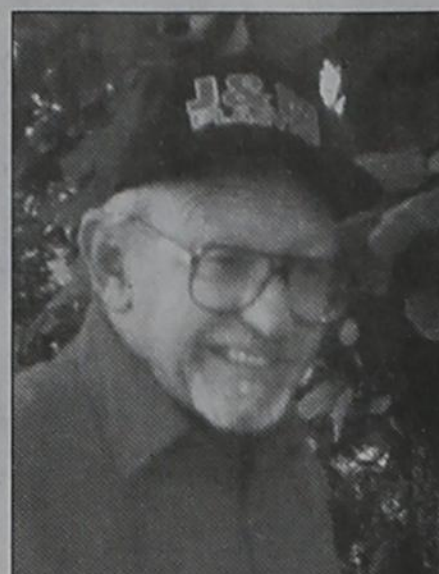

On God's Word

Meek and lowly in heart ... Joseph

Jesus said to his disciples, "...learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in heart" (Matthew 11:29). Learning of Jesus' meek and lowly heart can include searching the uses of meek and lowly in other accounts.

The ancient Greek word for lowly was used to translate an ancient Hebrew word used in Genesis 41:52, "For God has caused me to be fruitful in the land of my affliction." This was related to the meaning of Joseph's second son Ephraim. The word "affliction" was translated from a Hebrew word, that was translated to the ancient Greek word in the Septuagint that was later translated to the English word "lowly" used in Matthew 11:29.

The story of Joseph reveals an excellent example of meekness and lowliness.

Joseph was one of 12 sons from Jacob, who was later called Israel. A study of his life will shine light on Joseph's heart for God, and will help to understand the meaning of meek and lowly heart.

When Joseph was 17 years of age, his brothers began to hate him. It says, "And when his brethren saw that their father loved him more than all his brethren, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably unto him" (Genesis 37:4). Verse 2 reveals more about Joseph's meekness toward his father Jacob, "...and Joseph brought unto his father their

evil report."

From his early years as a young man, Joseph had a meek heart toward his godly father and he began to experience lowliness and affliction because of his brother's hatred and envy toward him.

It says that his brothers hated Joseph because of Israel's love for him and that Israel made a special coat for him. In the King James Companion Bible, E.W. Bullinger explained that "the coat, with long sleeves was worn only by the chief and his heir. The colors marked the coat as priestly or royal."

Genesis 37:5-11 reveals Joseph's meek heart toward God. (And Joseph dreamed a dream, and he told it to his brothers. And they hated him yet the more. And he said unto them, 'Hear, I pray you, this dream which I have dreamed. For, behold, we were binding sheaves in the field, and, lo, my sheaf arose, and also stood upright. And, behold, your sheaves stood round about, and made obeisance to my sheaf.'")

It continues, "And his brothers said to him, 'Shalt thou indeed reign over us? Or shalt thou indeed have dominion over us?' And they hated him yet the more for his dreams, and for his words."

Later Joseph told his brothers about another dream, and said, "'Behold, I have dreamed a dream more. And, behold, the sun and the moon and the eleven stars made obeisance to me.' And he told it to his father, and to his brothers; and his father rebuked him, and said unto him, 'What is this dream that thou hast dreamed? Shall I and thy mother and thy brothers indeed come to bow down ourselves to thee to the earth?'"

It goes on to say that his brothers envied him, but his father observed what he said.

It's important to understand that Joseph's dreams were truly to him from God. This is also called revelation. No person can predict whether God will reveal something in a dream. But if God is able to do this if He so chooses. In Genesis 40:8 Joseph said, "the interpretation belongs to God." Joseph had a meek heart to receive the dreams and share them openly with his family.

As a side note, it's special to consider that Jesus' step-father, Joseph, also received information in a dream from God. He was commanded to take Mary to be his wife.

After Joseph told his family about the second dream, his brothers began to plot his death. Joseph would soon begin to dwell in the "land of affliction" for many years.

His brothers plotted to kill him, but Reuben insisted that they shed blood.

"And they said one to another, 'Behold this dreamer cometh. Now therefore, and let us slay him, and cast him into some pit, and we will say, 'Some evil beast hath devoured him: and we shall see what will become of his dreams.'"

In the end, they found out what became of Joseph's dreams. In bondage and affliction that Joseph suffered, God raised him up to be the second powerful person over Egypt under Pharaoh. In the end, Joseph and his brothers bowed down before him.

Does this sound familiar? Did not our Lord Jesus also suffer in the hands of the Jewish leaders and the Roman government? Did not mock Jesus and say let's see what will become of his words?

In the end, Jesus suffered greater affliction and tribulation than Joseph. And like Joseph's life, God raised up Jesus from the dead and caused him to sit at His right hand of all power and authority in heaven.

Read the story of Joseph in Genesis chapters 37 through 45 and more about Jesus' meek and lowly heart.

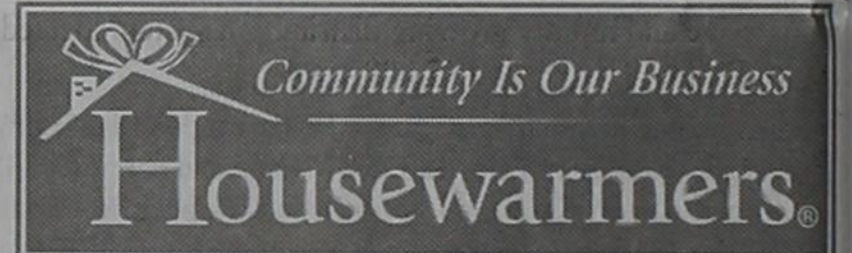

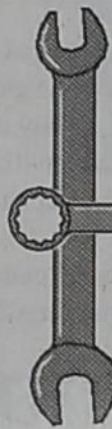

Harbin, Eldridge, Butler win 2 events each in district swimming

Thirty-one Rockwall ISD swimmers qualified for the Region III-5A Championships by placing among the top six in events at Saturday's District 11-5A Championships at the RISD Aquatic Center.

Those swimmers, who helped Rockwall place second and Rockwall-Heath third in the district team competition, will be back at the Aquatic Center for the Regional meet Feb. 8 and 9.

The leading performers were junior Haylie Harbin and sophomore Raena Eldridge of RHS, who each won two individual events and swam on two first-place relay teams.

RHHS junior Jared Butler also won two individual events and swam the leadoff leg on the Hawks' boys' 200-yard freestyle relay.

Two freshmen each won an event: the Yellowjackets' Alex Rodriguez, who also swam on their winning boys' 200 medley relay team, and RHHS' Harper Gillentine, who won the girls' 100 freestyle.

Tyler Lee won the overall, boys' and girls' district championships. Rockwall was second with 239 points to Lee's 306 overall. The Hawks totaled 181 for third place. In the boys' competition, the Raiders had 138 points to 114 for RHS and 104 for RHHS. Tyler Lee's girls scored 168 to 125 for the Lady Jackets and 77 for Rockwall-Heath.

Seventeen Rockwall swimmers and 13 from RHHS qualified for the Regional event.

For RHS' girls, Harbin won the 200 and 500 freestyles, with times of 2 minutes, 1.44 seconds and 5:19.36. Eldridge sprinted to victory in the 50 free in 25.2 seconds and won the 100 backstroke in 1:03.47. Rodriguez placed first in the 100 breaststroke (1:02.24).

Rockwall-Heath's Butler won the boys' 200 and 500 free in 1:46.40 and 4:53.37. Gillentine's win was in the girls' 100 free (55.22).

 As the final buzzer sounded Friday night, the Rockwall-Heath boys' basketball team and its fans were wondering, "How did we lose?"

Across the court at RHHS, the Longview fans seemed equally shocked, wondering, "How did we win?"

Rockwall-Heath had overcome a 5-point deficit after three quarters to take a 54-50 lead into the final minute.

A basket, a turnover and two free throws allowed the visiting Lobos to tie the game. As the Hawks were working the ball for a final shot, they lost the ball again. Longview (13-10 overall, 6-2 in District 12-5A) raced down the court and missed a shot, but Dorian Leonard put in the rebound with 2 seconds remaining. With no timeouts, RHHS wasn't able to put the ball into play for a final shot. Final score: Longview 56, Hawks 54.

It was another in a series of discouraging near-miss losses for RHHS (12-16, 1-7). The Hawks have lost five games by 5 or fewer points, with two of those games in overtime.

Friday's final sequence backed up RHHS head coach Brad Waters' one-word reason why the team can come close without winning so often.

"Rebounding," he said. "They had 15 offensive rebounds in the first half. They must have finished with about 40."

"It's habitual. We watch a shot go up and then say, 'I have to go get the rebound.' By that time it's too late."

Of the Lobos' 56 points, 15 came directly from offensive rebounds. They had 7 such points in the third quarter, when they turned the Hawks' 31-29 halftime lead

into a 44-39 advantage, Longview's largest in a game with 12 lead changes.

RHHS made more than half (20-for-39) of its field goal attempts, including 3-point baskets. Three of the long-range shots were by freshman Camron Talley, whose 16 points trailed only Tyler Zivney's 16 among the Hawks.

Waters said, "Talley played a heck of a game. He kept our lead. 'This was our 28th game. The tears that I saw in that locker room were a sign. They showed that we still care.'"

On Tuesday, Jan. 21, the visiting Hawks had played district leader Mesquite virtually even in the second half but couldn't overcome the Skeeters' 34-halftime lead in a 63-47 loss. Talley scored a game-high 21 points.

The junior varsity had seven weight-class champions, but finished second among 14 teams in its Rockwall JV Team Invitational Saturday. Champion Flower Mound totaled 203.5 points to 176 for RHS. The junior Jackets' top place wrestlers were Carter Smith (113), Jonathan Molengraf (120), Antonio Gudino (126), Adam Solis (160), Heath Terry (170), Frank Solis (182) and Dan Thomas (195).

The varsity and JV teams are scheduled to compete Saturday at McKinney Boyd for District 8-5A championships. However, a middle school team representing Williams and Utley already placed second in the state at weekend's championships in Houston. The Rockwall individual state champions were eighth-graders Cody Kelly of Williams at 132 and Divandre Hernandez Utley at 285. Seven others finished within the top four in the state. "Our season will end on a very positive note," said head coach Brandon Vestal.
