Mencia and her husband are missionaries to Venezuela; they

translate the material and take it into some of the most remote parts of the jungle, to the villages of people who do not have the access to Bibles or other Christian literature as found in America.

Mencia also uses the Bible study in her personal life as a stay-athome mother of three children on the mission field.

Gyaraki and her sister are the main translators in Hungary. Gyaraki said her country is hungry for the word of God. Because of the resources of Love God Greatly, they are able to minister to the women in their country with the knowledge that God loves and truly cares for them and will never forsake them.

The U.S.-based writers were Sally Clarkson, Joy Forney, Jen Thorn and Whitney Daugherty. Each of these ladies are ordinary wives and mothers in their own right.

"Its not that I am extraordinary, it's because I serve an extraordinary God," Thorn said when it was her turn to speak.

Each one of the speakers spoke on the love of God and how He works in us, to make even what we may think is the normal, everyday, and mundane into the extraordinary.


Sally Clarkson, who co-wrote "You are Loved" with Perritt, said, "I love how God uses normal people who have a heart, and are willing to serve and obey Him.

REPORTED MISSING

Missing teeth is one of the most common developmental problems in children, with permanent teeth being more likely to be among the missing than primary teeth. This inherited tendency often involves lateral incisors, second premolars, and third molars. When a missing tooth creates a gap in the dental arch, not only does this present a problem in terms of aesthetics, but it also poses a functional problem that is likely to lead to malocclusion. The failure of individual third molars to appear is usually uneventful unless the opposing molars over-erupt. However, large gaps between primary or permanent teeth must be filled in order to avoid drifting of adjacent teeth or over-eruption of opposing



On God's Word

Believe, then confess with the mouth ... Rom. 10:10

There is a striking similarity between Romans 10:9-15 and Acts 2:4. This helps greatly to determine at what point people experience the new birth and salvation.

Acts 2:4 says they were filled with holy spirit, and then began to speak with tongues as the spirit gave the words.

Starting with Romans 10:9-10, "That if you shall confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus, and shall believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you shall be saved. For with the heart it is believed unto rightesousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." This establishes a prerequisite for salvation, which is to be made righteous. It's impossible to obtain salvation without first being made righteous.

Following the order, people must first believe with their hearts that God raised Jesus from the dead, then confess with the mouth. Comparing with Acts 2:4, when the spirit was poured out, they were already believing with their hearts that God raised Jesus from the dead. Thus they were immediately filled with holy spirit, and made righteous in God's eyes.

Next, they spoke words with their mouths. What does it say in Romans 10:10? "with the mouth it is confessed unto salvation."







One notable German Christian pastor was Deitrich Bonhoeffer, who not only served in the resistance, but helped establish an underground church during NAZI rule. In 1937, Bonhoeffer wrote "The Cost of Discipleship," which may be found in the libraries of many Christian pastors. He was later imprisoned and executed by the German government.

There are many more examples that can be given from past history of the importance of controlling religious bodies to enforce government laws, regardless of God's Word. There are also many examples of sectarian and religious people seeking to use governments to openly/discreetly control others. An in-depth study of the NAZI movement reveals close financial connections between Hitler and certain internationally powerful people.

onth marks the seventh anniversary of the bursting of ig bubble and the subsequent economic meltdown. The Congress following the meltdown resembled the panicked e that followed the September 11th attacks. As was the September 11th, Congress rushed to pass hastily written that, instead of dealing with the real causes of the crisis, ve the government more power.

few understood the role our interventionist foreign policy the September 11th attacks, few in Congress understood 008 meltdown was caused by the Federal Reserve and not by unregulated capitalism. Not surprising to anyone ith economic history, the story of the 2008 meltdown starts ursting of the Fed-created tech bubble.

ng the collapse of the tech bubble, the Fed began ly pumping money into the economy. This money flooded ousing market, creating the housing bubble. The Bush ation and the Republican Congress also added fuel to ng bubble. These so-called "free-market" conservatives

expanded federal housing programs in hopes of creating an connected crony capitalists. "ownership society."

If Congress understood the Austrian theory of the business cycle, it would have allowed the recession that followed the housing bubble's inevitable collapse to run its course. Recessions are the economy's way of eliminating the distortions caused by the Federal Reserve. Attempts by Congress and the Fed to end a recession via inflation and government spending will only lead to future, and more severe, economic downturns.

The corporate bailouts, government spending, and money creation via quantitative easing that Congress and the Fed have engaged in since the fall of 2008, have failed to produce even the illusion of prosperity. The daily experience of most Americans shows that the government's doctored statistics drastically understate both unemployment and inflation.

This is not to say that no Americans have benefited from Federal Reserve policies. Even Donald Trump has called quantitative easing "a great deal for guys like me." Much of the growth of government over the past seven years, from the bailouts to the increases in military and domestic spending to Obamacare, has also benefited politically-

The Federal Reserve's continued delay of an interest rate increase suggests that, contrary to its public statements, the Fed understands that the economy has not recovered from the meltdown and is on the brink of another major recession. Fear that the Fed is not being fully forthcoming with its view of the economy is one reason the stock market declined following the Fed's recent decision to once again postpone increasing interest rates.

Learning the full truth about how the Fed evaluates the economy and its plans to respond to another downturn are two reasons why it is important to pass the Audit the Fed bill.

A vote on Audit the Fed would probably be the only good thing to occur in Congress this year. A Congress that cannot defund Planned Parenthood is unlikely to make any serious cuts in spending. Instead of waiting for politicians to do the right thing, those who know the truth must spread the ideas of liberty as far and wide as possible. Only when the teachings of the Austrian school are embraced by a critical mass of Americans will Congress cut warfare spending, cut welfare spending, and audit, and then end, the Fed.

when we're being bombarded with wall-to-wall news covnews cycles that change every few days, it's difficult to stay one thing-namely, holding the government accountable by the rule of law-and the powers-that-be understand this. As investigative journalist Mike Adams points out:

This psychological bombardment is waged primarily via the mainstream media which assaults the viewer by the hour with images of violence, war, emotions and conflict. Because the human nervous system is hard wired to focus on immediate threats accompanied by depictions of violence, mainstream media viewers have their attention and mental resources funneled into the never-ending 'crisis of the NOW' from which they can never have the mental breathing room to apply logic, reason or historical context.

Consider if you will the regularly scheduled trivia and/or distractions in the past year alone that have kept us tuned into the various breaking news headlines and entertainment spectacles and tuned out to the government's steady encroachments on our freedoms:

Americans were riveted when the Republican presidential contenders went head-to-head for the second time in a three-hour debate that put Carly Fiorina in a favored position behind Donald Trump; Hillary Clinton presented the softer side of her campaign image during an appearance on The Tonight Show with Jimmy Fallon; scientists announced the discovery of what they believed to be a new pre-human species, Homo naledi, that existed 2.8 million years ago; an 8.3 magnitude earthquake hit Chile; massive wildfires burned through 73,000 acres in California; a district court judge reversed NFL player Tom Brady's four-game suspension; tennis superstar Serena Williams lost her chance at a calendar grand slam; and President Obama and

Facebook mogul Mark Zuckerberg tweeted their support for a Texas

student arrested for bringing a homemade clock to school. That was preceded by the first round of the Republican presidential debates; an immigration crisis in Europe; the relaxing of Cuba-U.S. relations; the first two women soldiers graduating from Army Ranger course; and three Americans being hailed as heroes for thwarting a train attack in France. Before that, there was the removal of the Confederate flag from the South Carolina statehouse; shootings at a military recruiting center in Tennessee and a movie theater in Louisiana; the Boy Scouts' decision to end its ban on gay adult leaders; the first images sent by the New Horizons spacecraft of Pluto; and the victory over Japan of the U.S. in the Women's World Cup soccer finals.

No less traumatic and distracting were the preceding months' newsworthy events, which included a shooting at a Charleston, S.C., church; the trial and sentencing of Boston Marathon bomber suspect Dzhokhar Tsarnaev; the U.S. Supreme Court's affirmation of samesex marriage, Obamacare, lethal injection drugs and government censorship of Confederate flag license plates; and an Amtrak train crash in Philadelphia that left more than 200 injured and eight dead.

Also included in the mix of distressing news coverage was the death of 25-year-old Freddie Gray while in police custody and the subsequent riots in Baltimore and city-wide lockdown; the damning

report by the Dept. of Justice into discriminatory and abusive practices by the Ferguson police department; the ongoing saga of Hillary Clinton's use of a private email account while serving as secretary of state; the apparently deliberate crash by a copilot of a German jetliner in the French Alps, killing all 150 passengers and crew; the New England Patriots' fourth Super Bowl win; a measles outbreak in Disneyland; the escalating tensions between New York police and Mayor Bill de Blasio over his seeming support for antipolice protesters; and a terror attack at the Paris office of satire magazine Charlie Hebdo.

Rounding out the year's worth of headline-worthy new stories were protests over grand jury refusals to charge police for the deaths of Eric Garner and Michael Brown; the disappearance of an AirAsia flight over the Java Sea; an Ebola outbreak that results in several victims being transported to the U.S. for treatment; reports of domestic violence among NFL players; a security breach at the White House in which a man managed to jump the fence, cross the lawn and enter the main residence; and the reported beheading of American journalist Steven Sotloff by ISIS.

That doesn't even begin to touch on the spate of entertainment news that tends to win the battle for Americans' attention: Bruce Jenner's transgender transformation to Caitlyn Jenner; the death of Whitney Houston's daughter Bobbi Kristina Brown; Kim Kardashian's "break the internet" nude derriere photo; sexual assault allegations against Bill Cosby; the suicide of Robin Williams; the cancellation of the comedy The Interview in movie theaters after alleged terror hack threats; the wedding of George Clooney to Amal Alamuddin; the wedding of Angelina Jolie and Brad Pitt; the ALS ice bucket challenge; and the birth of a baby girl to Prince William and Kate.

As I point out in my book Battlefield America: The War on the American People, these sleight-of-hand distractions, diversions and news spectacles are how the corporate elite controls a population by entrapping them in the "crisis of the NOW," either inadvertently or intentionally, advancing their agenda without much opposition from the citizenry.

Professor Jacques Ellul studied this phenomenon of overwhelming news, short memories and the use of propaganda to advance hidden agendas. "One thought drives away another; old facts are chased by new ones," wrote Ellul.

"Under these conditions there can be no thought. And, in fact, modern man does not think about current problems; he feels them. He reacts, but he does not understand them any more than he takes responsibility for them. He is even less capable of spotting any inconsistency between successive facts; man's capacity to forget is unlimited. This is one of the most important and useful points for the propagandists, who can always be sure that a particular propaganda theme, statement, or event will be forgotten within a few weeks."

But what exactly has the government (aided and abetted by the mainstream media) been doing while we've been so cooperatively fixated on whatever current sensation happens to be monopolizing the so-called "news" shows?

If properly disclosed, consistently reported on and properly digested by the citizenry, the sheer volume of the government's activities, which undermine the Constitution and in many instances are outright illegal, would inevitably give rise to a sea change in how business is conducted in our seats of power.

Surely Americans would be concerned about the Obama administration's plans to use behavioral science tactics to "nudge" citizens to comply with the government's public policy and program initiatives? There would be no end to the uproar if Americans understood the ramifications of the government's plan to train non-medical personnel—teachers, counselors and other lay people—in "mental first aid" in order to train them to screen, identify and report individuals suspected of suffering from mental illness. The problem, of course, arises when these very same mental health screeners misdiagnose opinions or behavior involving lawful First Amendment activities as a mental illness, resulting in involuntary detentions in psychiatric wards for the unfortunate victims.

Parents would be livid if they had any inkling about the school-to-prison pipeline, namely, how the public schools are being transformed from institutions of learning to prison-like factories, complete with armed police and surveillance cameras, aimed at churning out compliant test-takers rather than independent-minded citizens. And once those same young people reach college, they will be indoctrinated into believing that they have a "right" to be free from acts and expressions of intolerance with which they might disagree.

Concerned citizens should be up in arms over the government's end-

run tactics to avoid abiding by the rule of law, whether by outso illegal surveillance activities to defense contractors, outso inhumane torture to foreign countries, causing American citiz disappear into secret interrogation facilities, or establishing that would allow the military to indefinitely detain any citiz including journalists—considered a belligerent or enemy.
