## Heath Council eyes \$20M in capital improvement projects

The Heath City Council, during its Oct. 25 meeting, reviewed a plan of finance from the city's financial adviser to fund close to \$20 million in new capital improvement projects and approved a resolution authorizing publication of notice of intent to issue combination tax and surplus revenue certificates of obligation.

The Rockwall County News has not received an order from City Secretary Norma Davis, for publication of the required notice.

The plan encompasses the financing of approximately \$7 million for various projects including streets, parks/trails, a fire truck and municipal building improvements.

The Combination Tax and Surplus Revenue Certificates of Obligation issued are not anticipated to impact the current tax rate, according to a news release from the city.

The plan also includes \$13 million to fund critical water and sewer infrastructure to serve a growing community. The Combination Tax and Surplus Revenue Certificates of Obligation for this portion of the planned projects are anticipated to increase current utility bills, according to the news release. The increase is expected to be \$6 per month.

"I am excited about the opportunity to continue an aggressive approach to launching and completing Capital Improvement Plan projects that are much needed, and in some cases, past due," Mayor Brian Berry said in the news release. "Many are necessary to ensure that we deliver water and sewer services to a growing community in compliance with state and federal mandates.

"We are committed to ensuring a high quality of life and sustaining Heath's reputation as a premier DFW community, and we are very pleased that these critical projects can be addressed with an anticipated minimal financial impact on the citizens we serve."

The Heath City Council will consider and approve issuance of the bonds in January.

## Shotgun found buried in Hunt Co. farmer's field

On Monday, Oct. 17, a Hunt County farmer was plowing his field, getting ready to seed it, when he unearthed a shotgun, according to Roysse City Chief of Police Jeff Stapleton.

The farmer immediately notified authorities as a murder had recently taken place in the area and he knew there had been extensive search for the murder weapon -- a shotgun.

For days after the murder, the Roysse City Police Department, the Rockwall County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Department of Public Safety searched the area in an attempt to locate the weapon.

After the weapon was recovered from the field, Stapleton said a search of the area revealed several other items thought to be related to an ongoing murder case, but he could not reveal what the items were as they are evidence in the case.

"The area where the shotgun was found was walked by law enforcement after the incident; however, due to the weapon being buried, (it) prevented it us from locating it," Stapleton said.

At about 10:40 p.m. on the night of Sept. 9, the Roysse City Police received a call that a female attempting to stop vehicles in the road was at FM 35 near Hunt County Country Road 2595, according to reports. When officers arrived at the scene, the female told them her husband had been shot and was in his vehicle down the dirt road at the edge of the wooded area.

Robert Pointer, 47, a captain with the University Park Fire Department, was found dead in his vehicle with one shotgun wound to the back of the head.

Due to suspicious and conflicting information given to law enforcement by the woman, Pointer's wife, 29-year-old Chacey Tyler Poynter, an arrest warrant for conspiracy to commit murder was issued. She was jailed in the Hunt County Jail with bond set at \$500,000.

As the investigation progressed, a second party was arrested. Michael Glenn Garza, 37, of Quinlan also was booked into the Hunt County Jail on charges of murder. His bond was set at \$1 million.

Pointer told investigators she and her husband were getting a divorce, but Stapleton reported that officials were not sure if either party had actually filed.

The couple lived in Hidden Creek Phase 2 and had a 6-year-old daughter.

As of 8:56 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 27, Stapleton said "... officials have verified the owner of the weapon and feel comfortable that this is the weapon that was used in the murder." He did not name the owner of the gun.

### TREATING GUM RECESSION

The term "gum recession" refers to the process in which the margin of gingival (gum) tissue surrounding each tooth pulls back or wears away. 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### On God's Word

#### Know the basics ... the body and brethren?

Last week, we addressed the question of who is the Bride of our Lord Jesus Christ. Based on the Gospels and Revelation, the best candidate is Israel. More specifically, it is people of Israel who were alive anytime between its establishment and the death of the Messiah Jesus.

In fact, it is highly likely that the last person who will be part of the Bride of our Lord Jesus, was the man who was crucified with him.

After Jesus' death and ascension, came the day of Pentecost when the holy spirit was poured out as recorded in Acts 2:1-4. This event would have launched the start of a completely different spiritual period of time. Paul referred to it as the dispensation, or better translated, administration of the grace of God (See Ephesians 3:2).

It also marked the beginning of the administration that will end in the Lord's Day (See Acts 2:20).

During the time of the administration of the grace of God, the Lord Jesus Christ is seated at God's right hand in heaven and it is available for anyone to not only be filled with holy spirit unto righteousness, but to get born-again unto salvation.

With this in mind, we may safely conclude that the Bride and Groom relationship is being held until a future time.

There is a different kind of relationship between people and Jesus Christ during the administration of the grace of God.

After revealing the nine different ways to profit from the manifestation of holy spirit, it says in 1 Corinthians 12:12, "For as the body is one, and has many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body; so also is Christ. For by one spirit are all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Gentiles, whether bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one spirit."

As a side note: this would have been a great verse to include in the comparative study on the baptism of water and holy spirit. It clearly says, by "one spirit are all baptized."

It is no longer about whether people are Jews or Gentiles, but of the body of Christ. This signified a huge spiritual paradigm shift!

All people who are filled with the holy spirit become part of the body of Christ. This would include they who have been born-again unto salvation, who are the children of God. Thus, the relationship is not as a Bride with her Groom, but as the "body of Christ."

What about the children of God?

## Blame government, not markets for monopoly

 Time-Warner announced it planned to merge with another telecommunications firm, many feared the new company would near-total monopoly power. These concerns led some to call for government action to block the merger in order to protect both Time-Warner's competitors and consumers.  
 I am not talking about Time-Warner's recent announced plan with AT&T, but the reaction to Time-Warner's merger with internet giant AOL in 2000. Far from creating an unchallengeable crushing all competitors, the AOL-Time-Warner merger is in under a decade.  
 Failure of AOL-Time-Warner demonstrates that even the companies are vulnerable to competition if there is open entry marketplace. AOL-Time-Warner failed because consumers are for competitors offering lower prices and/or better quality. Large mergers and "hostile" takeovers can promote economic growth by removing inefficient management and boards of directors. These managers and board members often work together to protect their own interests instead of generating maximum value for investors by providing consumers with affordable, quality products. Thus, laws making it difficult to launch a "hostile" takeover are an inefficient use of resources and harm investors, workers, and consumers.

Monopolies and cartels are creations of government, not markets. For example, the reason the media is dominated by a few large companies is that no one can operate a television or radio station unless they obtain federal approval and pay federal licensing fees. Similarly, anyone wishing to operate a cable company must not only comply with federal regulations, they must sign a "franchise" agreement with their local government. Fortunately, the Internet has given Americans greater access to news and ideas shut out by the government-licensed lapdogs of the "mainstream" media. This may be why so many politicians are anxious to regulate the web.  
 Government taxes and regulations are effective means of limiting competition in an industry. Large companies can afford the costs of complying with government regulations, costs which cripple their smaller competitors. Big business can also afford to hire lobbyists to ensure that new laws and regulations favor big business.  
 Examples of regulations that benefit large corporations include the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) regulations that raise costs of developing a new drug, as well as limit consumers ability to learn about natural alternatives to pharmaceuticals. Another example is the Dodd-Frank legislation, which has strengthened large financial institutions while harming their weaker competitors.  
 Legislation forcing consumers to pay out-of-state sales tax on

their online purchases is a classic case of business seeking to use government to harm less politically-powerful competitors. This legislation is being pushed by large brick-and-mortar stores and Internet retailers who are seeking a government-granted advantage over smaller competitors.  
 Many failed mergers and acquisitions result from the distorted signals sent to business and investors by the Federal Reserve's inflationary monetary policy. Perhaps the most famous example of this is the AOL-Time-Warner fiasco, which was a direct result of the Fed-created dot.com bubble.  
 In a free market, mergers between businesses enable consumers to benefit from new products and reduced prices. Any businesses that charge high prices or offer substandard products will soon face competition from businesses offering consumers lower prices and/or higher quality. Monopolies only exist when government tilts the playing field in favor of well-connected crony capitalists. Therefore those concerned about excessive corporate power should join supporters of the free market in repudiating the regulations, taxes, and subsidies that benefit politically-powerful businesses. The most important step is to end the boom-bust business cycle by ending the Federal Reserve.

## Economic Ideas: The French Physiocrats and the case for laissez-faire

 The Freedom Foundation (fff.org)  
 In the middle decades of the eighteenth century two schools of thought emerged, one in France and the other in Great Britain that rejected Mercantilism, the government system of economic control and regulation in the 1700s. In Great Britain, the primary proponent was members of what has become known as the Scottish Enlightenment.  
 The proponents of the new ideas of economic freedom were known as the Physiocrats. The term came from the ancient Greek word, "physiocracy," meaning "rule by nature." They also called themselves "the economists."  
 One of their critiques of the regulatory state of their time was that there was a "natural order" to things in the social world, much as in the physical world. A proper arrangement of institutions of society required reflection on the nature of man, his requirements for survival and betterment, and his relationship to a society.  
 The Austrian economist, Murray Rothbard, summarized, "In political economy, the Physiocrats were among the first to call for complete internal and external free enterprise and free trade unfettered by subsidies, taxes, privileges or restrictions. By removing such restrictions on commerce, agriculture and the entire economy would flourish. They also supported the operation of a free market and the natural rights of person and property."

**The Physiocrats and a Natural Order to Society**  
 Pierre-Paul Mercier de la Riviere presented one of the clearest statements of the Physiocrat's conception of man and the social order in, *The Natural and Essential Order of Political Societies* (1767).  
 Each man, Riviere said, has a natural right to secure what was necessary for his survival. This was, also, the cornerstone for deducing the relationships that would be both just and wealth generating for all men:  
 I do not think that anyone will deny the existence of the natural right to secure one's own survival. This basic right is, indeed, only the result of a basic duty that is imposed upon man under penalty of pain or even death...  
 Now, it must be clear that man's right to secure his own survival includes the right to acquire, by his own work, those things that are useful to his existence as well as the right to keep them after their acquisition. It is evident that this second right is only part of the first, for one cannot be said to have acquired what one has not a right to keep; the right to acquire and the right to keep form together only one and the same right although considered at different times...  
 The exclusive property of his person, which I am going to call personal property is thus for each man a right by absolute necessity; and since this exclusive personal property would be nil without the exclusive ownership right to those things which man acquires by his own labor, this second exclusive right of property, to which I shall give the name of negotiable property is an absolute necessity, like the first from which it is derived...

Once it is realized that it is absolutely necessary that personal and movable property are exclusive rights we are able to realize that each man has also duties which are of absolute necessity. These duties consist in the obligation not to invade the property rights of others, for it is evident that without these duties right would cease to exist.  
 Property and, consequently, security and liberty of enjoyment are the essence of the natural and fundamental order of society. This order is part of the physical order, and therefore its principle characteristics are in no way arbitrary.  
**Francois Quesnay and Circular Flow of Economic Coordination**  
 If there was a natural order to society, how did it ensure harmony and balance in the productive activities among men? An explanation was given by one of the leading figures among the Physiocrats, Francois Quesnay.  
 For two decades Quesnay served as royal physician to the king of France, Louis XV.  
 But his attention and interests were focused equally on the social system and its functioning. He blended his knowledge of agriculture with his training as a medical doctor.  
 He insisted that it was the production of the land – resources and food production – that was the basis of all prosperity in society. Manufacturing and industrial crafts were derivative and not primary sources of wealth. There would be nothing to transform into finished goods for consumption and other productive uses if the resources of the earth had not been mined, and the soil had not been tilled so both those who worked the land and those who were employed in industrial enterprises could have the means of material survival. Thus, in the division of labor, it was the agricultural sectors that were the foundation of society and its economic wellbeing, Quesnay argued.  
 In 1758, Quesnay prepared for the King his famous *Tableau Economique* ("The Economic Table") It was designed to demonstrate the interdependency and flow of goods and money through the various sectors of the economy: farmers, landowners, manufacturers and merchants. It showed a harmonious and self-balanced coordination in the division of labor.  
 Quesnay's *Tableau Economique* outlined the interdependency of the various specialized activities within the economic order. The resources and foodstuffs produced by the agricultural sectors were exchanged for the manufactured goods of the towns. The town manufacturers and craftsmen supplied those who worked in agriculture with the tools and implements that increased their productive capability on the land as well as with finished items for consumption that the farmers could not as easily produce for themselves.  
 The more abundant the output from the countryside, the more the people could be freed from agriculture to specialize in manufacturing in the towns. And the more improvements from specialized manufacturing there were, the better the tools and equipment that those in agriculture could acquire to improve their own productivity over time.  
 Goods circulated in exchange from countryside to towns and from towns to countryside. And the circulation of all these various goods between town and country was facilitated by the medium of money. Quesnay's intricate diagram showed how goods for money and money for goods flowed through the various parts of the economic system and how wealth was distributed among the farmers, the manufacturers and merchants, and the king and the Church.

## County official: Take advantage of early voting

Early voting winds to a close on Friday, Nov. 4, Rockwall Elections Administrator Christopher Lynch is encouraging voters to vote early.  
 Rockwall has an active voter base, Lynch said in a recent news release, and to prevent long lines at the polls on Election Day, voters, Nov. 8, people should do what they can to vote early.  
 There are about 56,000 registered voters in Rockwall County, but turnout is historically more than 75 percent, Lynch said.

"Typically, about 50 percent of Rockwall County voters participate in early voting, which leaves a lot of people trying to cast ballots on election day," Lynch said in the release. "To avoid the potential for long lines at the polls, we're encouraging as many people as possible to vote early this year."  
 Rockwall County has purchased additional equipment and plenty of paper ballots to accommodate the expected volume of voters, he said.

## General Election Day Voting sites, times detailed

The days of campaigning will draw to a close Tuesday, Nov. 8, as in Rockwall County, as well as the remainder of the state and will head to the polls.  
 On Oct. 25, Rockwall County had a total of 57,623 registered voters according to the Rockwall County Elections Department. Madison Hill, of Rockwall, launched her Freshman year in the Marshall University volleyball program in Huntington, West Virginia, with high numbers and flying colors.

### Morton to finish Junior year Emporia holding school record

Rockwall native, Austin Morton, is making a name for himself as the Kicker for the Emporia State University football team.
