noted the things they have spent their own money on to build or improve such as sidewalks, lights and benches. She spoke of how this change will affect the families who have lived here for generations.

"This will not only be a grievous error in justice but a slap in the face to those of us who live here," she said as she informed the council she had brought with her a petition of 250 signatures against doing anything to the downtown area. She said she had collected all the names within the last two weeks.

"If you take the Burton route, we will have to close our medical office and it will affect thousands of our patients. This council has the power to displace our office and close our doors. We ask that you abandon the project. We are against doing anything," Marilyn Jones said. Her comments were greeted by applause and comments of support.

At this point, the mayor informed the audience that "the studies and actual work on this project won't even begin until the year 2035. The

County of Rockwall has asked us to make a decision. So this is the dilemma this council is in tonight.

"Also, in order to speak before the council, the person wishing to speak must live in Royse City or own a business here," he said.

When he called the second person to speak, the woman said from her seat in the audience, "I don't live here or have a business here in Royse City, but I do come here to shop and eat. But I just found out that's not important."

When Lucille Bell came to the podium, she told of her parents and how Royse City had been her entire family's home. Now her children and grandchildren make their home in the city. She talked about how the town has changed and grown over the years.

Jim Hunt spoke briefly.

"Remember who brought you to the dance," he said. "Dr. Jones and his family and the Bells (Lucille and Councilman Bill Bell and their families) has brought this city to the dance."

"I she drive 37 miles from Lone Oak just for appointments with Dr. Jones," Kathy Bell said, "and I think that he is a real treasure to the city. You have a real, compassionate doctor who cares for so many patients."

Mary Johnson, a former Royse City Council member, also spoke.

"Our hearts are in this situation and I know the council's are too," she said. "The city has a lot of time and money invested in Main Street and it is important to keep it untouched."

She discussed the Main Street Merchants Association of which 36 businesses are members and talked about how Main Street and Royse City were formed.

"I agree with what she was saying," City Councilman James Branch said. "This is a plan for the future, 2035, and we're dealing with a lot of historical things that have happened here in the past."

Johnson received applause and comments from the audience when she said, "I'm surprised that Main Street wasn't brought into the decisionmaking."

Dr. Ron Jones stood in the audience and described how much this project could affect his business and customers. His daughter also stood to speak. The mayor asked her to come forward to the microphone as the council could not hear her. She was angry, repeatedly telling the council that the city was taking away her, her children and her family's inheritance by destroying their business. She became so upset that the mayor eventually asked her to taker her seat.

Branch spoke again. "Ultimately TxDOT will decide where this will go as it is a state highway," he said.

Councilman Bill Bell added, "The state will take the council's decision into consideration."

"We are a historic district, and I ask you to please listen to the people's

voices," said Carol Burks. "Just listen to the people's voices." Burks' comments were met by applause and more outbursts from the

No one in the audience spoke in favor of the proposed changes.

At 6:55 p.m. the mayor told the audience the council was taking a few minutes for a break and then would restart the meeting. At 7:10 p.m., the council members returned. "I am going to call for a motion right now on one of the 11 choices we

have to make," the mayor said. No council member responded. The room was silent.

"OK, there's no action on this. Meeting adjourned," the mayor said,

Once again, no decision has been made on the State Hwy. 66 reconstruction.

## Kathy Darst earns ribbons in State Fair competition

Local artist Kathy Cornelius Darst has been notified that both of her entries in the State Fair of Texas art competition were tapped to receive first-place ribbons.

Darst's first entry, a portrait, is a painting of her father, lifetime Rockwall resident Clifford Cornelius.

"This was a painting of love," she said in a news release issued last week. "After my father passed away, I channeled my feeling of grief into creating a painting that represented his life. I can almost hear his voice when I look at this painting."

The second entry is a still life. "Still life has always been my favorite medium to paint," Darst said. "I have done several paintings of fruit, but I am exceptionally fond of these apples."

Darst, a fifth generation Rockwall resident, has been painting since she was old enough to hold a crayon.

Over the last 10 years she has entered nine paintings in the State Fair's artistic competition. With those entries she has brought home five first place ribbons and four honorable mention awards. This marks the first year that she has entered to paintings in two different categories and won first place with both.

The State Fair, conducted annually in Dallas, will run Sept. 27 through Oct. 20. Darst's

The base work, which consists of the first three phases, began Monday and will run though Sept. 19

City officials said they plan to keep the roadway open to traffic as much as possible during the repair process; however, drivers should expect possible delays.

The asphalt is scheduled to be placed on or around Sept. 20, weather permitting. The road also will remain open to traffic during the asphalt laying process.



#### The U.S. Constitution and the right to vote addressed

The Constitution of the United States of America addresses the right of citizens of the United States to vote. The precise language of right to vote is used four times. The Constitution makes no mention of the citizen's privilege to vote. The framers knew that some actions might "abridge" a right without "denying" it altogether. The language of the constitution takes this into consideration when it states that "the citizen's right to vote shall not be abridged or denied. Whatever the status of the right, as a right, that right is strictly protected from any kind of limit.

#### The Fifteenth Amendment

Section1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### The Nineteenth Amendment

Section1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Section2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### Twenty-fourth Amendment

Section1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senators or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied by abridgement by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay poll tax or other tax.

Section2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### The Twenty-sixth Amendment

Section1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

## TGIF: The Cynical U.S. Policy on Chemical Weap

"I didn't set a red line. The world set a red line."

That was President Obama's response this week to those who believe he wants to attack Syria in order to defend his own credibility. Secretary of State John Kerry said the same thing before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. They were referring to the 88-yearold Geneva Protocol (Protocol for the Prohibition of the Use in War of Asphyxiating, Poisonous or other Gases, and of Bacteriological Methods of Warfare) and the 20-year-old Chemical Weapons Convention (Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on their

Although 189 nations, including the United States, are parties to the CWC, it doesn't follow that the United States has been anointed to enforce it. In fact, U.S. action against Syria would in itself violate international law, which permits the use of force by one government against another only in self-defense or as part of a UN-authorized action. Neither applies in this case. (There are libertarian grounds against war even when the UN has authorized it.)

Because the gruesome images of children and other noncombatants killed and wounded allegedly by Bashar al-Assad's chemical weapons constitute a powerful part of Obama's appeal for public support for his missile strike (or more), it pays to take a close look at the U.S. record on chemical weapons.

Fortunately, Stephen Zunes, a professor of politics and international studies at the University of San Francisco, where he chairs the program in Middle Eastern Studies, has done this. The record isn't

Before looking at Zunes's findings, let us note that while Syria is not a party to the CWC, neither are U.S. allies Egypt and Israel, which receive billions of dollars each year in military equipment. (Unlike Egypt, Israel signed the convention in 1993, but it has not been ratified by the Knesset, which means that Israel is not a party to it.) Israel, like Egypt, is considered to have stockpiles of chemical weapons; it also has biological and nuclear weapons. Indeed, Israel is a nuclear monopolist in the Middle East — a fact usually left unmentioned in reports on Iran's alleged nuclear-weapons program. Moreover, unlike Iran, Israel is not a party to the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

Syria's chemical arsenal and Israel's nuclear arsenal are linked, according to the Washington Post's Fact Checker, Glenn Kessler, in "History Lesson: When the United States Looked the Other Way on Chemical Weapons":

Syria's chemical weapons stockpile results from a neveracknowledged gentleman's agreement in the Middle East that as long as Israel had nuclear weapons, Syria's pursuit of chemical weapons would not attract much public acknowledgement or criticism. (The Fact Checker, when serving as The Washington Post's diplomatic

correspondent, learned of this secret arrangement from Middle Eastern and Western diplomats, but it was never officially confirmed.) These are the sorts of trade-offs that happen often in diplomacy. After all, Israel's nuclear stockpile has never been officially acknowledged, and Syria in the 1980s and 1990s was often supportive of U.S. interests in the region, even nearly reaching a peace deal with Israel.

U.S. presidents have not always been as vigilant about the use of after the regime's use of poison gas was confirmed. chemical weapons as Obama is today. Saddam Hussein gassed and killed tens of thousands of Iranians during Iraq's war against Iran in the 1980s. Kessler writes,

As documented in 2002 by Washington Post reporter Michael Dobbs, the Reagan administration knew full well it was selling materials to Iraq that was [sic] being used for the manufacture of chemical weapons, and that Iraq was using such weapons [against Iran], but U.S. officials were more concerned about whether Iran would win rather than how Iraq might eke out a victory. Dobbs noted that Iraq's chemical weapons' use was "hardly a secret...."

In 1988, Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein ordered chemical weapons attacks against Kurdish resistance forces, but the relationship with Iraq at the time was deemed too important to rupture over the matter. The United States did not even impose sanctions.

Of course, Barack Obama was not president in the 1980s, but that does not keep the world from seeing the hypocrisy in his position on Syria.

The Post report supports Zunes's conclusion in his May 2 article, "The U.S. and Chemical Weapons: No Leg to Stand On," that "U.S. policy regarding chemical weapons has been so inconsistent and politicized that the United States is in no position to take leadership in response to any use of such weaponry by Syria." Zunes points out a glaring example of this inconsistency:

Never has Congress or any administration of either party called on Israel or Egypt to disarm their chemical weapons arsenals, much less threatened sanctions for having failed to do so. U.S. policy, therefore, appears to be that while it is legitimate for its allies Israel and Egypt to refuse to ratify this important arms control convention, Syria needed to be singled out for punishment for its refusal.

Bear in mind that during the June 1967 war, Israel wrested the Golan Heights from Syria and annexed them in 1981, building settlements in contravention of international law, which forbids acquiring territory via war. While the border between Syria and Israel has been stable all these years, Syria aspires to recover the lost territory and has been willing to negotiate with Israel. "In 2007," Zunes writes, "the United States successfully pressured Israel to reject peace overtures from the Syrian government in which the Syrians offered to recognize Israel and agree to strict security guarantees in return for a complete Israeli withdrawal from occupied Syrian territory." Today, Israel's chief American lobby, the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, is actively promoting an American war against Syria (and Iran).

The U.S. record on chemical weapons is poor in other respects.

Zunes reports administration of George W. Bush forced the removal of the respected director general of the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW), which enforces the Chemical Weapons Convention, Brazilian diplomat José Bustani:

[B]y 2002, the United States began raising objections to Bustani's insistence that the OPCW inspect U.S. chemical weapons facilities with the same vigor it does for other signatories. More critically, the United States was concerned about Bustani's efforts to get Iraq to sign the convention and open their facilities to surprise inspections as is done with other signatories. If Iraq did so, and the OPCW failed to locate evidence of chemical weapons that Washington claimed Saddam Hussein's regime possessed, it would severely weaken developing chemical weapons.





PUBLIC NOTICE **Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments** Special Election November 5, 2013

#### **Proposition Number 1** (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence tion from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

#### **Proposition Number 2** (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operation-

#### **Proposition Number 3** (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

#### **Proposition Number 4** (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

#### **Proposition Number 5** (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property in addition to the current

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making for the purchase of homestead ments in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

#### **Proposition Number 6** (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

#### **Proposition Number 7** (HJR 87)

HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option (8683).

for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appointment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less."

#### **Proposition Number 8** (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax property and to amend lender rate allowable for hospital dis-State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas counties.

> The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

#### **Proposition Number 9** (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Con-




