The Texas primary is over for one open seat on the Rockwall County Commissioners Court - but not the other.

Dennis Bailey took the lead in replacing retiring Bruce Beaty for the Precinct 3 seat, but did not clear the majority threshold needed to avoid a runoff election. Bailey received 809 votes (46 percent) while Randy Puckett took 543 votes (31 percent). Leon Tuttle placed third with 22 percent.

## Wimpee claims victory in Precinct 1 commissioner race

# Hall nabs another easy win

Eavenson cruises past challenger Tuggle to remain county sheriff

U.S. Rep. Ralph Hall won an overwhelming victory in the March 4 Republican primary, as did most local incumbents.

In Rockwall County - Hall's home - the 14-term incumbent scored 6,348 votes and nearly 86 percent of the total for that race. His four challengers each received less than 6 percent of the vote in Rockwall, and fared only slightly better throughout the 4th District together they captured 27 percent of the 16-county total, leaving Hall just under three-quarters of the votes.

Hall said he appreciated the support, which he said re-energized him for his work in Washing-

# filing nearing

### STAFF REPORT

Positions on five Rockwall County city councils are up for grabs this May but the filing deadline is fast approaching.

March 10 is the deadline to file for a place on the upcoming ballots. Candidates must meet certain criteria before running - including a 12-month residency requirement - but there is no filing fee. Interested residents should contact the city secretary at their city hall for more information. All seats are based on "at-large" districts, meaning they are allocated by popular vote and not assigned to a specific area within a city.

In Rockwall, three city council positions are open. Incumbents Stephen Straughan, Cliff Sevier and Margo Nielsen are running for re-election. Rockwall City Hall is located at 385 S. Goliad St.

In Heath, two city council seats and the mayor's position are available. Mayor John Ratcliffe and councilwomen Julie Zurek and Lorne Liechty are running for reelection. Heath City Hall is located at 200 Laurence Drive.

# **Getting A Head Start** Rockwall ISD hosting parents' info session for pair of programs

A meeting will be held March 6 in Rockwall to inform parents of how to register their children for enrollment in Head Start and pre-kindergarten programs for the 2008-2009 school year.

From 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., representatives from the two programs will meet with parents at Dorothy Smith Pullen Elementary School, located at 6492 Farmfor a briefing on what is required to qualify for Head Start and pre-K, what documentation is needed for enrollment and how to apply. During the program, child care will be provided for parents with children 3-12 and a translator will be available for Spanish-speaking parents.

Rebecca Peurifoy, Rockwall bilingual and ESL coordinator, said this is the second year an informational meeting has been offered to

# **Traveling West Texas on the information superhighway**

ne day, as I was surfing the Internet, I came across RoadsideAmerica.com Web site on Texas tourist attractions and oddities. Being an almost lifelong Texan, I decided it would be interesting to see how many of these places I'd seen, or, for that matter, even heard of over the last four and a half decades.

Being from West Texas, I was quite surprised at the number of attractions right in my own back yard that I had somehow missed along the way.

If I'm anything like the rest of you, there's quite a number of these "attractions" that leave you scratching your head and saying, "what?" or even more often, "why?'

Since the list is in alphabetical order, the first place I came across that grabbed my attention was my hometown of Amarillo - home to no less than nine attractions. Sadly enough, I did not have a clue about three of them including a "huge pair of legs," "The Texas Tornado Museum," and a "swimming pool shaped like Texas." In my defense, I haven't lived there in more than 20 years. Nonetheless, I still have relatives there who should have clued me in about the tourist hotspots in my hometown. However, in hindsight, at least one of them - the Texas-shaped swimming pool - has probably been around since the 1980s.

After a little additional research, I discovered that the man behind the huge pair of legs was no other than Stanley Marsh 3 (yes, that's 3, not III). I should have known. Marsh, whose quirky public art projects have created quite a stir over the years, is also the cocreator of the infamous Cadillac Ranch, a row of 10 graffiti-covered cars (1949 through 1963 models) buried nose down in the dirt, ou side of Amarillo along Route 66. I don't know when the Texas Tornado Museum was established, but apparently I can no longer put it on my list of places to visit. According to an entry posted by a Web site visitor in 2005, the museum, which was located next to the Big Texan Steak Ranch, is

### now closed.

At the risk of being accused of leaving out this little tidbit out because I'm a vegetarian, I'd better mention the Big Texan's own Claim to Fame - a free 72 oz. steak dinner to anyone who can eat it in an hour. However, before you decide to put their offer to the test, make sure you realize that the word "dinner" is key here since diners also are required to consume a salad, potato and roll. Beware, if you don't clean your plate, the dinner will cost you \$50. No matter how hungry think you are, rest assured there aren't many who've managed this challenge successfully. According to the menu, of the more than 27,500 who have attempted this feat, most of their eyes were apparently bigger than their stomachs since less

than 5,000 have succeeded. According to the restaurant's menu, pro wrestler Klondike Bill ate two dinners in an hour back in the '60s, while one apparently famished patron polished of the famous four- and-a-half-pound dinner in nine and a half minutes.

ed by locals as the "Biggest Texan." At 47 feet, Tex Randall is about 5 feet shorter than Big Tex of the State Fair fame, but still quite massive when you consider he weighs in at 7 tons.

Also a short drive from Amarillo, in Groom, visitors can get their eveful of not one, but two attractions that made the list - a leaning water tower and the second largest cross in the Western Hemisphere.

According to the Web site, the water tower is the last surviving piece of the Britten U.S.A. Truck Stop. The leaning tower was reportedly brought to the town by Ralph Britten to serve as a tourist attraction and a gimmick designed to encourage travelers to stop at his truck stop.

I'll have to say I have a different opinion than one of Web site visitors who said she was more impressed by the water tower than the cross. Even though I know some of the Britten boys from my Texas Tech days, I'd have to say the cross definitely wins out as the dominant attraction in my book.

Just in case that isn't enough to entice you to visit West Texas, consider what the town of Shamrock has to offer. A fragment of the original Blarney Stone, pried from the ruins of Blarney Castle, is located in a concrete monument in the city park. Each year, a festival is held around St. Patrick's Day where Miss Shamrock is crowned.

So, for those of you wondering what you were going to do for Spring Break, I've just mapped out one heck of a road trip to visit some of West Texas' finest attractions and witness the crowning of Miss Shamrock to boot. Or, if you'd rather head in a different direction, the Website offers more than 300 other attractions located throughout the state.

A series of qualifications can be considered for the pre-K program including children who come from lowincome homes, are not able to speak English proficiently, fall under the Homeless Act or have parents who are actively serving in the military.

Currently, three schools in Rockwall are open to pre-K students who qualify as a bilingual students while two campuses are open for students who come from low-income homes or have a parent serving in the military. One school, Dobbs Elementary, is open for Head Start students while an additional Early Head Start program offered for kids ages infancy to 3 is offered through the Early Head Start Center on Townsend Drive. Peurifoy said in the event that a student does not qualify for the two early childhood programs, they can still be eligible for a tuition-based pre-K program. Registration for all

the programs are ongoing.

ton and gave a strong start to the general election.

"Of course I feel good. I hadn't expected to have that great a percentage over four opponents, and I'm very grateful," Hall said from his Capitol Hill office. "And it's great to run well at home, that's the best feeling of all, 'cause home is where I'm going to be when it's all over."

Othercontestedlocalraces were just as decisive. Incumbent Sheriff Harold Eavenson won 77 percent (4997 votes) in the race against challenger Teresa Tuggle, who took 1,484 votes (23 percent). Bill Broderick also defeated challenger Mary Lou Curtis by nearly a two-thirds margin in the race for Republican Party chairman in Rockwall County.

In other election news, Rockwall County mirrored the state average for U.S. president and senate results - more or less. Local Demo-

cratic primary voters gave New York Sen. Hillary Clinton a slightly smaller advantage than the average - 50.35 percent here, compared to 51 percent statewide - and 43 percent of local voters supported Rick Noriega for U.S. Senate compared to 51 percent statewide.

On the Republican side, Rockwall voters gave Arizona Sen. John McCain a smaller lead - 47.75 percent here, compared to 51 percent statewide

but gave former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee a much larger slice of the remainder. In Rockwall County, 44.62 percent of Republican primaryvoters supported Huckabee - more than six percent less than the statewide average. Those numbers gave McCain the official party nomination, and Huckabee has since withdrawn from the race.

Rockwall voters also supported incumbent Republican Sen. John Cornyn slightly more than statewide averages - 84 percent compared to 81 percent.

# Testimony under way in Sumrow thekwall's

### STAFF REPORT

DALLAS - Rockwall County District Attorney Galen Ray Sumrow wasn't in his office on the morning of March 5, instead he was in Dallas with his attorney, defending himself on five indictments of taking public money and using taxpayers' money to have a wireless computer installed in his home.

And in testimony March 5, Sumrow faced some possibly very damaging testimony from a former employee of the DA's office.

Sharon Larey, a former administrator, testified that she would often stay silent about any large amounts of cash that was being kept in the office because she was afraid the money would turn up missing and she would be blamed.

The best news for Sumrow and his defense team was that Larey's testimony came with the jury out of the courtroom and State District Judge John Nelms ruled that the information

would not be allowed to be a signature on a introduced to jurors.

The jury was, however, allowed to hear testimony from another employee -Sue White - that several coworkers felt "uneasy" about Sumrow's frequent purchasing of computer equipment that never made its way in the office.

Defense attorney James Wheeler has said the investigation - which Rockwall County Sheriff Harold Eavenson began in the fall of 2006 at the behest of former County Treasurer Shereé Jones - was a vendetta initiated after Sumrow prosecuted Jones for taking and then repaying \$2,100 in county money and carried out by Eavenson.

Jury selection for Sumrow's trial began March 3. Sumrow has another




Multi-term incumbent Jerry Wimpee, county commissioner in Precinct 1, had nearly twice as many votes as challenger Bruce Clark. Wimpee received 1,356 votes (66 percent) to Clark's 708 votes (34 percent).

Wimpee said during the campaign that he hoped to continue working on his open space initiative, which will enter a new phase this year, as well as keeping taxes and operating costs low.

"What I've likened it to is that saying, 'You're watching your mother-in-law go over the cliff in your brand new Cadillac.' I've got mixed emotions," Clark said. "But things worked out all right for me, I don't feel bad at all. And Jerry [Wimpee] is a good man, he's just a bureaucrat and they do things a certain way."





"I get a report of one or two every six months," said state game warden Jenny Simpson of the Texas Parks and Wildlife.

Simpson said housing development in Rockwall County is taking over their habitat.

"Basically, they're being pushed out of their habitat," Simpson said. "As Rockwall continues to develop and farm land is built up, it's going to cause more sightings of big cats. Not just mountain lions and bobcats, but coyotes."

Simpson said that not only are the animals pushed from their habitat, but their hunting land is also being abolished.

Rockwall resident Ron Gilleland reportedly stood 30 feet from a mountain lion Feb. 26. He went outside to see why his dogs were barking at his Meadowdale Drive home and found the mountain lion holding his Boston terrier in its mouth. The big cat reportedly dropped the dog and fled over Gilleland's fence. The dog is recovering from its injuries.

Simpson said it's rare for mountain lions to attack people. She said they normally try to avoid human contact.

Simpson said mountain lions, which are the most widely distributed cat in the Americas, tend to follow creek beds and railroad tracks and that the one Gilleland saw was



But when they went into the doctor's office on Friday, the news was not good.

"They told us that the cancer was very invasive, very aggressive. And it was either a Stage 3 or Stage 4."

An appointment was set up with an oncologist. When Anne and Jeff got home, they faced their fears together.

"Jeff told me, 'You can't leave me,' " Anne said. "I told him that I would fight this. And if I didn't make it, I would do whatever I could from the other side."

She and Jeff sat down and made up a list of friends who would help.

Anne's sister in Oklahoma cared for her three girls during her surgery. Anne was alone in the house on Saturday. Her friends had told her they would get together and pray for her starting at 1 p.m. Anne sat in a quiet spot in her home and prayed.

"I was crying and scared. I was worried about how Jeff would cope with three small children.

Holly was in the third grade and her twin daughters, Marlie and Darcie, were in the first grade. Around 2:30 p.m, Anne was suddenly filled with a sense of peace. Her friends' prayers had worked.

Two of Anne's friends in Oklahoma volunteered to drive her children home to Rockwall. After she was sure the children were on the way home, she called her sisters and told them the news. She knew it would be hard for them to hear, especially since their mother and their grandmother had had breast cancer. She knew they would be worried about their own risk of developing cancer.

Before her appointment, Anne meditated on Psalm 139:13-16: "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful ... All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be." When Anne walked into the offices of her breast surgeon, every room she walked into had that scripture in it. It was on a vase, framed on the wall. It was everywhere. "The nurse was comforting, too. She told me that she was a breast cancer survivor, and that she was grateful to have had it. Before her cancer she was always too busy to enjoy life. Now she pulls her car over on the way home just to watch the sunset," Anne remembered.

charged, she stayed in a recliner in the family room. An allergic reaction to the steroids made her legs swell so they had to be wrapped in bandages and elevated. Even so, the skin on her legs split

down the middle. "I was not a pretty sight. I was bald, my face was swollen and the steroids caused me to gain 70 pounds."

By this point her friends and neighbors had stepped in to help with meals, babysitting and driving her girls to and from school. A nurse came daily to assist in her care. A physical therapist came two times a week, and an occupational therapist came three times a week. It was while she was attempting to take a few steps using a walker that she passed out. She was rushed to the hospital. Blot clots had formed in her legs and had traveled to her lungs. A filter had to be surgically implanted into her vena cava to prevent clots from traveling through her body. It was December when they found her brain tumors, one in the front of her brain and one in the back, were not responding to treatment. She had developed a sinus infection that could not be cured with antibiotics. Her vision was blurry and she was experiencing hallucinations. She was afraid to go to sleep, because she was sure she would die if she did. The doctors sent her home and advised her husband to contact hospice care.

Miraculously, a surgeon was found who would attempt two separate operations, days apart, on her



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

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

They just weren't feeling super enough to talk about it.

With six of the seven members present at its last meeting, the Rockwall City Council voted to table a potentially controversial discussion that would require an absolute - or super - majority to pass. Such a majority would require at least six votes, and council members opted to postpone the discussion until all seven seats could be filled at a meeting April 7.

Most council business requires only a simple majority of present voters, and a super majority is uncommon. In this case, a possible overturn of a committee decision and fifteen concerned citizens brought about the requirement.

The Rockwall planning and zoning committee recently met and rejected a residential development request near Independence Pass street. The original proposal called for detached single family housing on the site, and when notices were sent out to nearby homeowners, 15 opposed the zoning change - saying the

properties would effectively for a full council before disbe townhomes. Robert La-Croix, director of planning and zoning, said the developer has since changed his plans to allow detached single family units, but the planning and zoning committee voted down the initiative 3-2.

The city council may reverse that decision, but because so many residents opposed it, approval would require a "super majority" of the council - six of the seven total votes. Because Councilwoman Margo Nielsen was absent, and since Councilman Glen Farris will be away during the next regular meeting, the council voted to postpone the discussion until April 7.

The move prompted an exodus of grumbling residents from the council chambers, but councilmen Cliff Sevier and Matt Scott said it would be best to wait

cussing a super majority vote.

"I would like to see this tabled until we have the last council member present," Sevier said at the meeting. "I think it's an important vote, and when it has to be a super majority like this I think we need everyone here."

In other council news, Mayor Bill Cecil declared March 3 "Caden Shaulis Day" in honor of a brave 5-year-old Rockwall resident.

Cecil read a proclamation describing events a month earlier, when Shaulis noticed that a friend was "in distress" during nap time. He notified his teacher, who called 911 and helped the child to a speedy recovery.

"You're very courageous," Cecil told a bashful Shaulis. "You did a very special thing, and we're all thankful."



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
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
