



On God's Word

Jesus Christ walks with his disciples and continues to teach

In Continuing with the records surrounding the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ we come to the time that he and his disciples left the room. He had just eaten his last meal with them and taught many things. Throughout the meal he stayed right under God's spiritual beat. Musically speaking, he didn't miss a lick. Our readers are urged to go back and read through the records that we have covered so far. Let them soak and abide within. Jesus Christ's ministry on earth was our perfect example for learning to walk with and speak for God with love and boldness. After teaching his disciples about love, believing and much more, Jesus said, "Arise and let us go" (John 14:31). This record no doubt matches Matthew 26:30, Mark 14:26, and Luke 22:39, where it says they sang a hymn and went out into the mount of Olives.

Jesus once again prophesied that Peter would deny him three more times. This is found in Mark 14:27-30, "And Jesus said unto them, 'All you shall be offended because of me this night. For it is written, I will smite the shepherd, and the sheep shall be scattered. But after I am risen, I will go before you into Galilee.' But Peter said unto him, 'Although all shall be offended, yet I will not.' And Jesus said unto him, 'Verily I say unto you that this day, even in this night, before the rooster crows twice, you shall deny me three times."

The same event is found in Matthew 26:31-34 where it refers to another crowing. The word "the" comes from an earlier known Greek word that meant "a" or "another," and does not contradict the record of a second crowing.

Peter very likely denied knowing Jesus Christ nine times at the most, or at least six times. It should be noted that just because Peter argued with him, it does not mean the other disciples did any better. Jesus said that they would all be offended. It says in Mark 14:31, "But he [Peter] spoke more vehemently, 'if I should die with you, I will not deny you in any wise.' Likewise said all of them." At this point, the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke jump straight to the place where Jesus began to pray in Gethsemane, with the Gospel of John revealing a great deal more in between.

John chapter 15 through the end of chapter 17 is packed with extensive teaching and prayer that is edifying to read and study. Jesus taught his disciples about fellowship by comparing himself to a vine and the rest to branches. All who abide in him will bear spiritual fruit to the end that God in heaven is glorified.

to help in the deeply devastated Diamond Creek neighborhood. I dropped the kids at school, slathered on the sun block and headed out, work gloves and all.

What I witnessed was like food for my soul.

The church was literally overflowing with volunteers and donated materials and food. It is located within walking distance of the homes of Diamond Creek, so naturally I slowed to a crawl as I drove by. Seeing the destruction on TV is one thing, but being there, seeing it with my own eyes elicited a more powerful reaction than I had anticipated. I had many conversations with God that day.

My mom and my friend and I were put on a crew with other volunteers and after being trained, we went to work clearing debris from the open field that separated MCCC and Diamond Creek. Several other crews were sent directly to help the homeowners. The field was littered with bits of insulation, roofing paper and shingles, family pictures, and a Chrysler SUV, picked up by the tornado from the nearby elementary school and tossed like a toy to its resting spot. It was barely recognizable in its scrunched and windowless condition, its back axel torn off and laid to rest yards away.


As I stood speechless in front of the mangled heap of metal, I met a man from the neighborhood who was taking pictures. He recounted his version of the events he had experienced, and how he raced away from the coming tornado, fearfully watching it as he drove in reverse as fast as he could down his street. He felt lucky to be alive and hopes to never see anything of that magnitude with his own eyes ever again. I can't believe I was cowering in my closet while this man was in a race for his life.


I was very supposed to learn that the folks that I met at MCCC were actually the organizers of a group called Response & Relief, based out of the church and led by their pastor, Robert Kennedy. Now here is no coincidence. This group had been formed by Kennedy when he felt he had been divinely called to help in the aftermath of Katrina. The group has also served the victims of the Joplin tornadoes and the fires in Bastrop County. And now pastor Kennedy was putting his God-given talent to work literally in his own backyard.

"My dad watched the tornado from the church as it went through Diamond Creek," said Kali Kennedy, pastor Kennedy's daughter and one of the Response & Relief leaders. "He stood with his arms out praying over it the whole time.... God knew it would happen and that they are here and can help."

Volunteers also were trained and sent to work in Royse City and Lancaster. A great outpouring of support was given by communities all over the area with enough food, supplies and other necessities to provide critical help to

Creekview capitalizes to knock Lady Jackets from playofyoff

For the third consecutive year, the Rockwall girls' soccer season lasted a long time but ended too soon.

The Lady Jackets fell behind Carrollton Creekview on a goal just before halftime Tuesday night. Despite holding a territorial advantage over the Lady Mustangs in the second half, RHS couldn't score the equalizer and lost 2-1 in a Region II-4A Quarterfinal match at Eagle-Mustang Stadium in

Rockwall hadn't reached that level of the playoffs until 2010, but has gone at least that far in each of the last three seasons. The Lady Jackets advanced to the Regional Semifinals in '10, and to the Regional Final last year.

Now it will be Creekview (18-3-4) advancing to this weekend's Region

II-4A tournament at Standridge Stadium in its home town. "I told our team, 'If you're going to lose, lose to somebody good," said

RHS head coach Melissa Garcia. "They're a fantastic team. They've got the whole package."

The Lady Jackets (20-4-4) might have been in awe of Creekview, which

had defeated RHS in a tournament earlier this season. Or they might have

underestimated the Lady Mustangs. RHS allowed the first goal in the game's 13th minute. A free kick from midfield seemed to catch Rockwall's defense off guard. The ball sailed over

Garcia said, "We came out flat, but this team finds ways to win. We got back in the game."

"We had a mental lapse on that second goal. We had gaps and holes, and you can't do that against a team like this. When you have those mental breakdowns, you hope they don't take advantage of them. They did."

Indeed, the Lady Mustangs' goals were really their only first-half scoring chances. They put some shots wide of the goal, and Rockwall shot a few balls over the crossbar at the other end.

In the second half, RHS had the advantage everywhere but on the scoreboard. The Lady Jackets outshot Creekview 6-1 and had a 3-1 advantage in corner kicks.

The best scoring sequence came during the 71st minute, with 9 minutes left to play. Rockwall's Niki McKnight set up teammate Kayla Smith racing in toward the goal. She tried to shoot the ball across the goal mouth, but Palacios' made a diving stop, deflecting the ball wide to the left. 

The annual Great 100 nurses celebration was conducted at the Morton Myerson Symphony Center in Dallas this week.


Hospital receives **TMF Silver Award**

of the Bill of Rights, the clause in the Fifth Amendment that says no person shall be denied life, liberty or property without due process. Smith urges the passage of the Due Process Guarantee Act that - if enacted - would ban indefinite detention. He urges people to contact their representatives and senators calling for their support of the measure.

A few well-written letters to the editor wouldn't hurt either.

But unlimited detention, warrantless wiretaps, and the presidential power to kill U.S. citizens anywhere in the world are really symptoms of a decaying political mindset. The American mindset was once based on respect for the individual, but it is now focused on the power of government.

racism with its horrible treatment of the Indians, and the denial of rights to women. Many immigrant groups faced their own brand of discrimination, but America was the place people wanted to be. Many gambled their lives on steerage passage across the oceans to come here. They came with the hope of building a life where they would be free of government repression, and where their natural rights would be honored more than the physical power of government. There was the chance of being a free person instead of merely

9/11, but it's been worse since. As I wrote in a recent editorial,

There are bad people in the world, people who wish to harm the United States. But we as people must ask ourselves why. The Osama bin Ladens and the Anwar al-Awlakis don't hate us because of our freedoms. They hate the United States because our foreign policy is intrusive and meddlesome, because it doesn't respect the rights of others, as our domestic policy no longer seems to respect ours.

County officials' duties and responsibilities

This is the second in a series of articles describing the responsibilities of elected official's positions in Rockwall County government.

As with the position of constable in county government, the justice of the peace has a historical background going back to the year 1195 when King Richard The Lionheart established Knights to preserve the "King's Peace." These Knights picked up the title of Keepers of the Peace. Then in 1361 under King Edward the actual title of justice of the peace was used. Here again their function was to guard the King's Peace.

When the English came to America and started the colonization, the King brought over from England the office of the Justice of the peace to "establish and maintain order." This office continued to exist as the United States was formed and the JP court became known as the people's court as it was the lowest level court where citizens could seek justice.

When Texas became a republic, with the decentralized population and vast spreads of land, the Justice of the peace became an integral part of the governmental structure. Then in the 1876 Constitution of Texas, the justice of the peace was established as a court with judicial powers.

The justice of the peace court now only exists in seven states as more and more local magistrate courts are replacing this office. Texas, along with Arizona, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont, New Hampshire and Arkansas, still retain the justice of the peace system.

A justice of the peace does not have to be a lawyer to hold the office. They must be a U.S. citizen, 18 or older, never convicted of a felony, a Texas resident for 12 months of which six months must be in the precinct from which they are elected, and not be mentally incompetent. They must run for office and be elected by the citizens of their precinct. Their term of office is for four years.

In our county, we currently have two JPs; however, because of our growth, we must add two additional JPs with the election this fall. For these new positions, hotly contested races of three candidates each are now in process. But what do these JPs do?

JP courts have original jurisdiction in "criminal matters of misdemeanor cases punishable by fine only." These are referred to as Class C misdemeanor cases under the Texas Penal code. An example of such a case would be a traffic ticket where one was arrested by a state trooper on I-30. The JP also hears civil cases where the limit is \$10,000. An example might be a dispute where an individual has sued another for work done of less than \$10,000.

The JP also will hear cases involving eviction as well as foreclosures and cases where one wishes to place a lien against personal property.

The JP also may issue search warrants, arrest warrants and both juvenile and adult statutory warnings. They can also conduct bail examinations for arrested persons as well as conduct magistrations for adults and juveniles.

(This is usually done every morning by one of the JPs in the county jail.) JPs also may issue mental health and chemical dependencies warrants (arrest or commitment orders)

Another area of major focus by our JPs is juvenile violations. Specifically, failure to attend school, disorderly conduct, minor in possession of illegal drugs or alcohol, and offenses against other juveniles are receiving increasing attention by both the JP courts as well as the school system. Both of these organizations working together are making some impressive headway in reducing these type offenses. It should also be noted that in addition to the juveniles, their parents are also being ACROSS 39 Americans were

brought before these JP courts and they too are being held accountable for their kids' actions.

There are a couple of unusual aspects of a JP court. First, there is no record of the hearing or trial where an individual appears before the court. If a defendant appeals a ruling made by the JP, it will require a new trial at the next level of the court system. Second, while a jury may be requested to hear the case, most individuals appear before the JP rather than requesting the jury trial. Finally, because of the nature of most offenses, most individuals appear before the JP without a lawyer even though they have the right to have a lawyer with them.

There is one final responsibility of the JP that is probably the most unpleasant. When any person dies in the County, a JP must go to the scene of the death and act as the coroner to determine the cause of death and if an autopsy should be conducted.

But the final thing a JP can do does bring pleasure. A JP is authorized to marry people... and on some days people are lined up in the courthouse waiting their turn.


