Local Relay For Life generates crowds, donations

The Rockwall County Relay For Life kicked off April 29 with stretches before the Opening Celebrate Ceremony. Heath Mayor Pro Tem Lorne Liechty and Relay Chair Carla Brooks opened the event before a small group from the Rockwall Children's Chorus sang the National Anthem, Boy Scout troop 314 presented the colors and Scott Holcomb-McClain gave the invocation.

The reason behind Relay For Life has never more apparent than during Friday night's event in Rockwall County when 5-year-old Nate Oxford raced around the track with his family during the Survivor Lap. Nate is suffering from Medulloblastoma, but was full of energy as photographers ran to commemorate his trek around the Cain Middle School track. The Survivor Lap was followed by the Caregiver Lap.

The leap from sentimentality to silliness was almost instantaneous when the Face-the-Cookie contest began on the stage. Participants were challenged to get a cookie from their forehead to their mouth without using their hands. Continuing the food theme, the Cake Decorating Contest followed with Walkers of the Light taking top honors, the Presbyterian Pathfinders a close second place, and Team Mouse taking third place. The cakes were then given away during the cakewalk. The Parade of Countries Lap, Poker Lap and NFL Lap were next on the agenda before the arrival of Brownie troop 3398, serving as Hush Angels, quieted the crowd for the Hope Ceremony.

Singing "If You Believe (in Miracles)" and "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," the Rockwall Children's Chorus set the stage for Maribeth McCreary's poignant story of her struggle with cancer. Next Tom Davidson provided bagpipe music that accompanied everyone around the track while the word "cure" spelled out in glowing luminarias, shone from the bleachers.

The mood was quickly elevated to hysteria during the Spaghetti Hair contest when participants attempted to place a pound of raw pasta into their partners' hair which led up to the ever-popular Miss-ter Relay Contest when male team members dress in drag and parade around the track with their purses open to receive donations. Rockwall-High student Wes Brown took top honors, but the team of "fraternal twins," Michael Logue and Zack Thacker, collected the most money.

Crazy activities like the Nose Dive Contest, which involved cotton balls adhered to noses with Vaseline, and the Magic Carpet Ride Contest led up to Mike Howell's inspirational message during the Fight Back Ceremony at midnight. Mike and his son, Sam, are active in Relay following the loss of Mike's wife and Sam's mother from cancer.

Participants were refueled with a late-night snack before the Crazy Tie Lap, Marga-Relay-Ville and Beach Boys Laps. There was a Best Parrot Head Contest at 2:00 a.m. followed by the Limbo Lap, Putt-Putt Contest, karaoke, scavenger hunt and PJ Lap before the Cheeto Face Contest, which involved shaving cream and a certain cheesy snack. More activities followed like Celebrity Look-Alike Contest, Chop Sticks Stacks, Sports Trivia Contest and the Crazy Slippers and Sunglasses laps.

As daylight dawned, those still standing were energized by the exercises and the Celebrate Lap before gulping down breakfast burritos. Awards were presented at 6:30 a.m. with LPC Cancer Support





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The threat affects the total raw water supply available to NTMWD to service its customers.

An environmental threat to the water supply is a condition that prompts the initiation of Stage I of the Water Conservation and Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Response Plan of the City of Rockwall and NTMWD.

According to a City of Heath

news release, its water customers are being asked to adhere to the following Stage I restrictions:

• Do not water between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. April 1 to October 31. · Do not water or wash hard surfaces such as concrete.

· Do not water during rain freezing temperatures. · Limit lawn and landscape ir-

rigation to two times per week. · Lawn and landscapes may be water hose with a shut-off nozzle.

The environmental threat identified is the presence of zebra mussels in Lake Texoma, according to the news release. The non-native mussels multiply rapidly and attach themselves to boats, piers, cables and other objects. Zebra mussels can block water treatment plant intakes and pipes and cause declines in fish populations, native mussels, and birds.

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



# On God's Word

Prophecy and interpretation of tongues...1Corinthians 12:10 by Timothy W. Burnett

The references to prophecy and interpretation of tongues in 1Corinthians 12:10 involve spoken words with the mouth that come from the spirit of God. Prophecy generally falls into two categories. One involves speaking words that are given by revelation in advance. According to 2Samuel 7:2 Nathan is referred

to as a prophet, or a person who speaks for God.

David felt sorry for God because he lived in a place made of Cedar while God abode in a place made of curtains. We see in verse 4 that "the word of the Lord came unto Nathan." He said, "...tell my servant David..." God gave Nathan words by revelation and instructed him to relay them to David. According to verse 17 Nathan spoke all the words from God to David. In other words, Nathan prophesied to David according to all the words that God gave him earlier.

Another kind of prophecy is where the words are given by the spirit of God only after the speaker starts talking. In Luke 1:41-55 Elizabeth prophesied as soon as she was filled with the holy spirit. God did not give her the words to speak in


The words were given as she began to open her mouth to speak. It was edifying for both her and Mary.

The interpretation of tongues refers to giving the interpretation of the language spoken. 1Corinthians chapter 14 addresses the distinction between speaking in tongues and prophecy as applied during an orderly assembly of believers.

This will be covered on a later date. In essence speaking in tongues during the church time is not edifying unless the one speaking gives the interpretation afterward. If that person does not believe to give the interpretation, then that one should not speak in tongues during the assembly (1Corinthians 14:27).

Interpretation of tongues is in essence prophecy with a specific purpose to give the interpretation. See 1Corinthians 14:5, "I would that you all speak with tongues, but rather that you prophesied. For greater is he that prophe-

sies than he that speaks with tongues, except he interpret, that the receive edifying."

Whether or not we understand what it means to speak in tongues in interpretation, we cannot deny that the two are listed in the manifest holy spirit for profiting. Not understanding or believing God's w change His word. It only affects whether we will act on it.

If God instructs us that we can profit from prophecy, speaking in the the interpretation of tongues, then that means we as Christians can from them. God would not give His word about this if He knew the not be able to act on it. God is very gracious and loving to help us get where we will start speaking in tongues.

But it's up to us to dive into His word and learn what is available, means, and ultimately take the believing action to start speaking in topersonal prayer lives.

And to start speaking words of prophecy by God's spirit inside. Who set acting on God's word, then we'll begin to see the profit in our lives

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
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

# After-school program to serve special-needs kids


A new after-school club for children with special needs will open in Rockwall this fall in two locations as a cooperative venture of the Rockwall Independent School District and The Arc of Dallas, a nonprofit agency for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The program is a response to the challenge working parents face when they have a child with an intellectual disability such as Down syndrome, autism or mental retardation, according to a news release issued this week. A parent information meeting to outline the new program is set for 6:30 p.m. May 12 in the Sharon Shannon Elementary School library in Rockwall.

For the past 10 years, The Arc has offered its summer "Adventure Camp" in Collin, Dallas and Rockwall counties. The Rockwall ISD decided to support The Arc for the 2011-12 school year in offering "Adventure Club" for elementary age children from 5 to12. 

# Pille's no-hitter sends Lady Bulldogs to Area roun

Royse City received major help from an expected source, with Alicia Pille pitching a no-hitter, as well as from a surprise hitting hero to sweep its best-ofthree Bi-District softball playoff series last weekend.

The Lady Bulldogs, ranked 10th among the state's 4A teams, defeated Nacogdoches 5-1 Friday and 6-0 Saturday at Athens High School.

RC started out quickly, scoring first-inning runs in each game, as the District 13-4A champions (19-8 overall) stretched their winning streak to 16 games.

The offense provided more than enough runs for Pille, who allowed only one hit and struck out 30 batters in the two games combined to improve her personal record to 19-3.

Royse City appeared ready to win Saturday's game by the 10-run rule. The Lady Bulldogs' first five batters each scored a run to give them a 5-0 lead. But Jessie Richardson, the losing pitcher in Friday's game, entered Saturday's game after just three batters and kept RC from scoring again until the seventh inning.

Before that, singles by Preslei Morrow, Krissy Tubb and Kyla Simmons produced the first run. After Richardson walked Pille to load the bases, two runs scored when the Lady Dragons' left fielder dropped Kourtney Kelley's fly ball.

The score was still 3-0 with two out when Briana Wacik, the Lady Bulldogs'

eighth batter, popped a single over the first baseman's head to drive in two runs. "Briana had a big hit last night too," Royse City head coach Michelle Booker

noted. That was also a two-run single to right field during a three-run sixth inning that broke open a 2-1 game.

On Friday, Pille helped herself by singling to drive in a first-inning run. Morrow drove in a fifth-inning run, and Shelbi Bane had a run batted in during the deci-

Pille finished that game with a one-hitter and 16 strikeouts.

She pitched out of trouble Saturday in the second inning, when two errors put Nacogdoches runners on second and third bases with two out. Pille struck out Brittany Phillips to end that threat. The only other Lady Dragons to reach base were on walks in the first and fourth innings. The RC ace retired the final 11 batters, seven on strikeouts, to complete her no-hitter with 14 strikeouts.

Royse City's final run scored in the seventh. With one out, Pille singled. Kelley walked, and a wild pitch moved up the runners. Bane then laid down a squeeze bunt to make the final score 6-0.

The victory put the Lady Bulldogs into the Area round against Corsicana, which swept two games from Pflugerville Connally 1-0 and 4-1 to advance. Corsicana finished third in District 15-4A with an 11-5 record (25-12 overall).

The teams scrimmaged before the regular season began, but Booker said her memory of the Lady Bulldogs' next opponent was fuzzy.

"Their pitcher has a decent fastball. We just have to wait for something in the (strike) zone and have discipline at the plate. The top of their lineup has decent speed, so they might try to play small ball by bunting. They try to make you make





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

# Hernandez, Thompson lead Hawks into playofc


Rockwall-Heath's path to its second consecutive District 10-4A baseball title wasn't as easy as in 2010, when the Hawks were on their way to winning their first 38 games.

The most difficult part was rallying from a three-run deficit to defeat Highland Park after losing in the seventh inning during their first meeting with the Scots.

That victory put RHHS and HP into a first-place tie with one game remaining. When both won Friday, April 29, they were co-champions at 12-2 in 10-4A games.

There was no need for a rubber game to decide a district champion - at least not until a possible rematch in the Region II-4A finals. With Frisco and Frisco Centennial tying for third place in District 9-4A, the four schools decided that the Hawks (27-5-1) would meet Frisco (22-8-1) in the Bi-District playoffs. Highland Park, ranked eighth among the state's 4A teams would take on Centennial.





# Opinions A right to live where you choose

In addition to certain days being designated as holidays, the federal government and various organizations have also singled out certain days, weeks, and months as times to emphasize a particular issue or commemorate a group or event.

Some of these are well known, like Earth Day (April 22) and Black History Month (February); others are fairly obscure, like National Cancer Survivors Day (June 1) and National Missing Children's Day (May 1).

In addition to being Poetry Month, Dental Health Month, National Cancer Control Month, Parkinson Awareness Month, and Irritable Bowel Syndrome Awareness Month, the month of April is also National Fair Housing Month.

April is the month that the Fair Housing Act (FHA) was passed in 1968 as Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968. Along with Medicare, Medicaid, and Head Start, the FHA was one of the key parts of Lyndon Johnson's Great Society.

#### Prohibiting "discriminatory acts

The FHA prohibited discriminatory acts regarding the sale, rental, and financing of housing based on race, color, religion, and national origin. It has since been amended, adding to the prohibition list discrimination based on sex, disability, and familial status, and its enforcement mechanism strengthened. And although it is not part of the official list, housing discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity is now also being targeted.

The Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity (FHEO) administers and enforces federal laws relating to housing discrimination. It maintains a housing discrimination hotline and a website where one can report housing discrimination in English, Spanish, Arabic, Cambodian, Chinese, Korean, Russian, and Vietnamese.

To commemorate National Fair Housing Month, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which has the primary authority for enforcing the FHA, has launched a national media campaign using newspaper and magazine ads and social networking sites to "increase the Department's efforts to educate the public and housing providers about their fair housing rights and responsibilities."

The campaign is called "Live Free." One of its more controversial print advertisements features a Latino worker looking into the horizon with a caption reading: "You Have the Right to Live Where You Choose."

#### Is that so? Is there a right to live where you choose?

First of all, no sane person would take the Live Free campaign statement at face value. No one would say that there is a right to live in the White House, in the middle of an interstate highway, in the Sears Tower, or in the local public library. No one would say that there is a right to live in Bill Gates' mansion, Donald Trump's apartment, your house, or my house. And, of course, there is no right to live anywhere that you cannot pay for, although some liberals and progressives might think otherwise and want the federal government to subsidize housing.

What HUD and the Office of FHEO are concerned about is the practice of discrimination in the sale and rental of housing. One "Fair Housing" document on the HUD website, the front page of which reads: "You have the right to choose where to live!", says that in the sale and rental of housing, no one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, religion, gender, disability, familial status, or national origin:

- Refuse to rent or sell housing
- Refuse to negotiate for housing Make housing unavailable

\_ Deny a dwelling

Set different terms, conditions or privileges for sale or rental of a

Provide different housing services or facilities

\_ Falsely deny that housing is available for inspection, sale or rental For profit, persuade, or try to persuade homeowners to sell or rent dwellings by suggesting that people of a particular race, etc. have moved,

or are about to move into the neighborhood (blockbusting) or Deny any person access to, or membership or participation in, any organization, facility or service (such as a multiple listing service) related to the sale or rental of dwellings, or discriminate against any person in the

#### terms or conditions of such access, membership or participation. There's nothing wrong with discriminating

Second, although it is an established principle of our age that we must never discriminate, there is in fact nothing wrong with discriminating. Discrimination is not a dirty word. We used to laud a man for having discriminating taste. Discrimination involves choosing between or among options. When you eat a hamburger, fries, and a coke at a fastfood restaurant you discriminate - consciously or unconsciously - against chicken sandwiches, onion rings, and water. This doesn't necessarily mean that you hate chicken sandwiches, onion rings, and water. It just means that on that particular day and under a particular set of circumstances you prefer a hamburger, fries, and a coke. But, it is argued, people are not food. Agreed, but it works the same way, and usually on a larger scale. When a man proposes marriage to his sweetheart, he discriminates against every other woman in the world. When a couple adopts a child, they discriminate against every other child in world. When you pick your friends, you discriminate against the ones you reject. We can't go through the day without discriminating.

#### Government can never know for sure

Third, how does the government know for sure that someone was denied housing because of discrimination due to his race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability, or familial status instead of his credit score, income, debt-to-income ratio, criminal record, immigration status, employment history, or references? Can government bureaucrats and social workers read minds and judge motives? One Recent cases investigated by HUD include a New Hampshire woman who was discriminated against and insulted by her landlord because she was married to a Hispanic man and Black and Latino tenants in the state of Washington being charged higher rents for the same units.

But the state is not even sure of its own anti-discrimination laws. In the Live Free ad campaign, there are two print advertisements that feature a parent with a child. They both say: "Refusing to rent to persons because they have children is almost always against the law." Why is it "almost always" against the law? Does this mean that discrimination against people with children is sometimes okay? Apparently so. But I thought all discrimination was bad. Discrimination laws are based on the false notion that society rooted in conflict and that a central authority is necessary to bring about social peace and justice.

## Good and rational reasons to discriminate

Fourth, there may in fact be good, reasonable, and rational reasons to discriminate in the sale or rental of housing. A religious person may not wish to rent his house or apartment to an unmarried or same-sex couple because he feels he would be providing the means for them to "live in sin." A landlord may want to charge college students a higher security deposit or not rent to them at all because of a well-founded fear that the students will

disturb the neighbors with loud parties or damage the residence of an apartment complex may prefer a relatively homogeneous avoid potential racial or ethnic conflicts among the tenants.

#### No constitutional authority to enforce the current

Fifth, and most important, even if the housing discrimi deserved, reasonable, and rational, and is in fact undeserved, n and irrational, as well as bigoted, racist, and xenophobic. be no federal laws against it. If I as a homeowner forbid another of any race, creed, color, or national origin - from moving in with my family - for any price - then no one bats an eye. A homeowner allow another family - even one that looks and sne like my family - to move into my house with my family - f not - then there is still no objection. But if I vacate my house and rent it - once again selectively deciding who shall live there. potential lawsuits and fines for housing discrimination if - and rent to the family that looks and speaks like my family. This is Just as there is a right to live where you choose if you own them there is no right to live where you choose if you don't own to Housing discrimination laws are an attack on private property. association, and a free society.

#### FHA and HUD should be abolished

The other relevant point here concerns the very existence laws like the FHA, but of HUD itself.

According to all Con Photol release, HUD "recently awarded nearly \$41 million to 108 fe organizations and non-profit agencies across the country to the public and combat housing and lending discrimination." Acc another HUD press release, "\$100 million in new grants was in to 45 regional areas to "support more livable and sustainable on across the country" and to "build economic competitiveness by housing with good jobs, quality schools and transportation."

The stated mission of HUD is to

create strong, sustainable, inclusive communities and quality homes for all. HUD is working to strengthen the housing market the economy and protect consumers; meet the need for quality rental homes: utilize housing as a platform for improving qui build inclusive and sustainable communities free from disa and transform the way HUD does business.

However noble these goals are, there is one big problem nothing in the Constitution that authorizes the existence of a department - termed HUD or something else - to achieve them.

It is simply not the job of government to provide publi subsidize housing, ensure that housing is affordable, regulate th or housing market, strengthen the housing market, provide m guarantee mortgages, or stamp out discrimination.

Republicans in Congress who claim to want to cut the budg federal spending, and adhere to the Constitution should be call wholesale elimination of HUD. Why aren't they?

# The Budget Mess: A Crisis in Legitimac

Reality has finally caught up with the ruling elite, and its members inside and outside government are in a panic. They have freely spent the taxpayers' money for generations building a corporatist warfare-welfare state, and when that wasn't enough to finance their projects, they borrowed just as freely. For a long while it paid off handsomely in power and wealth, but now even they realize things can't go on as they have for so long.

This fiscal year the government will spend \$3.8 trillion, more than 40 percent of which will be borrowed. In the last full year before the current administration came to power, outlays were just under \$3 trillion. Earlier this year, the Office of Management and Budget estimated that under President Obama's budget, spending in 2016 will rise to \$4.5 trillion. The FY 2008 deficit stood at less than half a trillion dollars - an astounding amount in its day. It hit a record \$1.88 trillion in 2009. According to administration estimates, the deficit won't fall below a trillion dollars until 2013, then will \$5.7 trillion to \$10.7 trillion. begin rising again 2016.

Deficit projections of course depend on assumptions about economic growth. When the public is clamoring for action on the deficit, officials have an incentive be unrealistically optimistic.

Also, budget discussions overflow with opportunities for deceit. As we

Orwellian Washington a spending cut is really an increase.

Deficit spending has had a deep structural effect on America's political economy. In mid April the national debt was \$14.3 trillion, about 98 percent of GDP. Last year the administration's Mid-Session Budget Review projected the debt would hit 100 percent of GDP by 2012, and would double by 2020, exceeding 100 percent of GDP for the rest of the decade.

To see the yearly budget impact of that, in 2010 the U.S. government paid more than \$400 billion in interest, a little less than the Medicare budget - the fourth largest budget item. This year the government is on track to exceed that amount. It is estimated that in 2019 the government will pay \$700 billion in interest.

Obama's profligate spending should not lead us to think he succeeded a budget hawk in office. On the contrary, the eight years of George W. Bush saw outlays go from \$1.9 trillion to nearly \$3 trillion and the debt go from

Virtually everyone agrees that the current situation is unsustainable. It's easy to see why the ruling elite think so. They are concerned that if some control is not achieved over spending, by 2025 all revenues collected by the national government will be swallowed up by Medicare, Medicaid, Social Security, and interest on the debt. But then how will the politicians saw with the recent compromise over the 2011 continuing resolution, in do all the other things they do: subsidizing pet projects (many of which are

carried on by well-connected businesses); policing the globe for and economic reasons (fighting overt and covert wars and billions to the military-industrial complex); and generally a power in Washington, D.C.?

The regime faces a double crisis. The first is fiscal: Unless something, it won't have the money to maintain the gravy train. is a crisis in legitimacy. People are catching on that the borrowing hides the cost of government, imposing burdens on future general politicians don't appear to fix things their careers are in jeopardy

Hence, Budget Chairman Paul Ryan's House-backed meager Prosperity" and Obama's expression of support for modest b (plus tax increases on the wealthy). But both approaches, what differences in detail and style, have one overriding feature in comm aim to preserve the corporatist warfare-welfare state. Neither representations serious rethinking of the role of government. In the end, there wil change, no matter who prevails.

# State Redistricting Is it Silly

Last month in the state of Wisconsin the Democratic legislators got in their cars and left the state so there wouldn't be a quorum present in the State House to vote on a controversial bill proposed by the Governor. How silly, you might say. But do you remember about this same time of year ten years ago when a group of Democratic legislators left the state of Texas and went into hiding in Oklahoma so a quorum wouldn't be present in our State House to vote on, of all things, a redistricting plan for the State of Texas?

When that happened, I remembered thinking how silly on the part of both political parties; on the Democrats for leaving the state, and on the Republicans for trying to reconfigure the boundaries of political areas to favor them after they had just won a majority in the recent election.

Actually I was partially wrong; it was silly on the Democrats for leaving the state to avoid an inevitable vote, but not silly on the part of the Republicans in changing the political areas the legislators would represent. In fact, the change was mandated by law which states that after every ten year census, the political boundaries of the Federal, State, County, and local voting precincts will be examined and changed, if necessary, to fit a set of criteria that may have changed due to populations movements recorded by the most recent census.

We are now in that redistricting process here in the State of Texas and in our Rockwall County. While it may sound confusing and complex, it really

The basis of redistricting is population location and equal representation for all people. Because of population shifts as people move in and out of areas, the process of redistricting looks at each political area and attempts to change boundary lines so that each political area that results has about the same number of people in the area. Some other restrictions also apply to make sure of the equal, one person-one vote criteria.

Here in the county, for example, we have four Commissioners at the county level that represent the citizens of Rockwall County. For this representation to be fair and equal, each Commissioner should have about the same number of citizens in their precinct. Based upon the census of 2000, the boundaries were established for each Commissioners area so they were equal. However when we recently received the results of the 2010 census, we found they were no longer equal in number. Based upon our population of 78,337, we should have about 19,600 people in each precinct. Precinct 1 and 3 meet these criteria, however precinct 2 is about 6,000 people short of the 19,600 and precinct 4 has about 8,000 too many people. Thus we must go through "redistricting" to bring the boundaries in line so each Commissioner has about the same number of people which they will represent.

While this would be relatively simple to do, other restrictions also apply. For example, one of the rules is "established voting blocks cannot be broken up during the redistricting process." As an example, let's say there is a large block of Hispanic voters in a particular area. It would not be legal to break up this grouping into different precincts to dilute their vote in future elections for County Commissioner; they must retain their voting strength as a voting group. This retains their ability to significantly influence who will represent them, as their voting strength as a group remains strong,

The county has retained the law firm of Allison and Bass, located in Austin, to assist us as we go through the process of redistricting. We met with them for the first time last week after they had received and analyzed the 2010 census data, and we are now starting the process for the development of the new Commissioner boundaries.

The methodology by which we do this involves the law firm, the Commissioners Court, and a group of volunteer citizens called the Citizens Redistricting Committee. First the law firm will develop a draft plan that meets all of the federal guidelines for redistricting. This plan will then

Ideally, each precinct should have 5,000 people within its boundary. Because of the shifting population be necessary to redefine some of these boundaries as was done Commissioner precincts. The same process will be used as was on the Commissioner precincts.
