City presented print of USS Rockwall, works to become Film Friendly City

 Rockwall City Council Monday, Aug. 3 met for a special presentation from several residents on a topic that touched many of them: the USS Rockwall. The ship was presented to Rockwall by former city council member Bob Eckert.

"I went to where they were lowering a lifeboat, and there was a corpsman who wouldn't jump over the three yards to the lifeboat, so I jumped from the upper deck into the lifeboat and almost went through the bottom." "It was dark and the waves were about five feet high and you couldn't see anything. Every now and then I could see a light from our ship; they naturally tried to keep the lights down. We finally found him because of our radio-man, then got back to the ship. The captain said to roll out the rope ladder and he wanted him to climb. I said the patient can't go up the rope ladder. He started cussing me out and that didn't scare me! I said he can't go up that and they let down a stretcher. We got him on board ship and he was lucky because he had three broken bones in his pelvis because he hit a toilet drain on the side of the ship when he fell. He couldn't have climbed up."

The print was presented to Rockwall Mayor Bill Cecil, Heath Mayor John Ratcliffe, Rockwall City Manager Julie Couch and Heath City Manager Ed Thatcher. The print will hang primarily in the Rockwall City Hall, but Eckert said it may also be displayed in other cities around the county since the ship represented all of Rockwall County.

Fire Station Update

In other business, Roger Hamm from Speed Fab Crete said fire station #3 has been turned over to the city but that work continues on the punch list. Rockwall Fire Chief Mark Poindexter said the station began taking calls for the north side of Rockwall at 6:30 a.m. Aug. 3. The completion date for station #4 has been pushed back from Aug. 14 to Aug. 21 due to rain in July. City staff is working on dates for dedications ceremonies and will announce those later.

Weekend Directional Signs

The council had a first reading of an amendment to the city's sign ordinance at the request of several developers to allow additional directional signs to new neighborhoods. The ordinance adds a definition of Weekend Development Directional Signs - including times signs would be allowed, size and height limits, sign materials (must have two supporting legs, a steel frame, be self supporting, etc.).

The signs would also be prohibited within 500 feet of the intersections at I-30 and Ridge Road and I-30 and SH 205. The council approved 5-0-2 to proceed with the ordinance and agreed to a six month trial period to monitor the effectiveness of and support for the signs. Council members Glen Farris and Matthew Scott were not in attendance.

Film Friendly City

The city council and staff members have been investigating for more than a year how to market Rockwall as a Film Friendly City, which could potentially attract filmmakers and photographers to the area, creating new jobs and generating revenue.

Councilman Mark Russo said Governor Rick Perry signed in a bill which allocated money to municipalities and businesses offering incentives for films and promotion to gaming businesses who design video games in Texas to look for locations at home. "I think this does fit our role in economic development," Russo said.

The cost to proceed would normally be in thousands, but Russo said depending on which program the city decides upon, the price would be minimal and cost effective under the Film Friendly City program.

He said many times a film company finds a location first and cities take a reactive approach to capitalize on the benefits generated by having them there. "We are one of the first cities to take a proactive approach instead of reactive in the state of Texas," Russo said.

Russo added that the Film Friendly City designation would hopefully generate jobs and could provide new revitalization since film crews leave an area in the same or better condition than they found it.

Russell Blessing, a management analyst intern for the city and a graduate student at Texas A&M, spent the summer working on outlining the three steps to become a Film Friendly City and constructing the appropriate guidelines for film crews to work in the city.

He said there would be minimal expense to the city, including a \$99 per person charge to attend a day long training workshop and pass a film policy approval by the Texas Film Commission. The city would also need to send film location photographs for inclusion in the Film Commission's digital library.

Russell said he used the city of Kerrville's policy as a template for Rockwall. He said Kerrville obviously has a lot of experience in this area and has an extensive resume as a Film Friendly City.

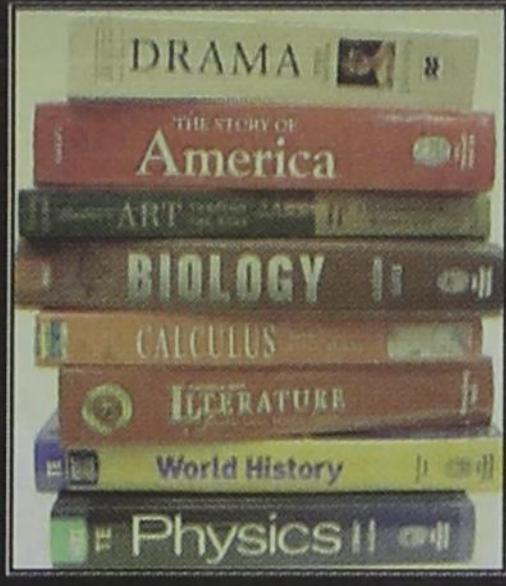
apiece. Tools may be purchased at the shop or brought from home.

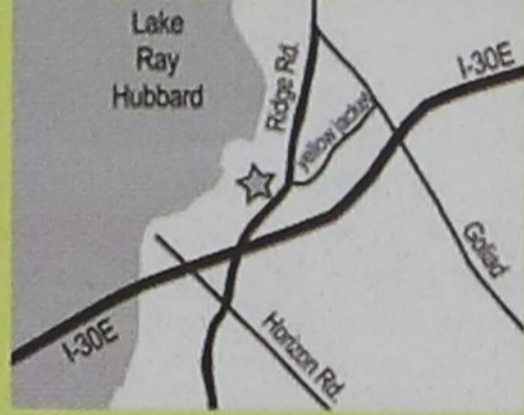



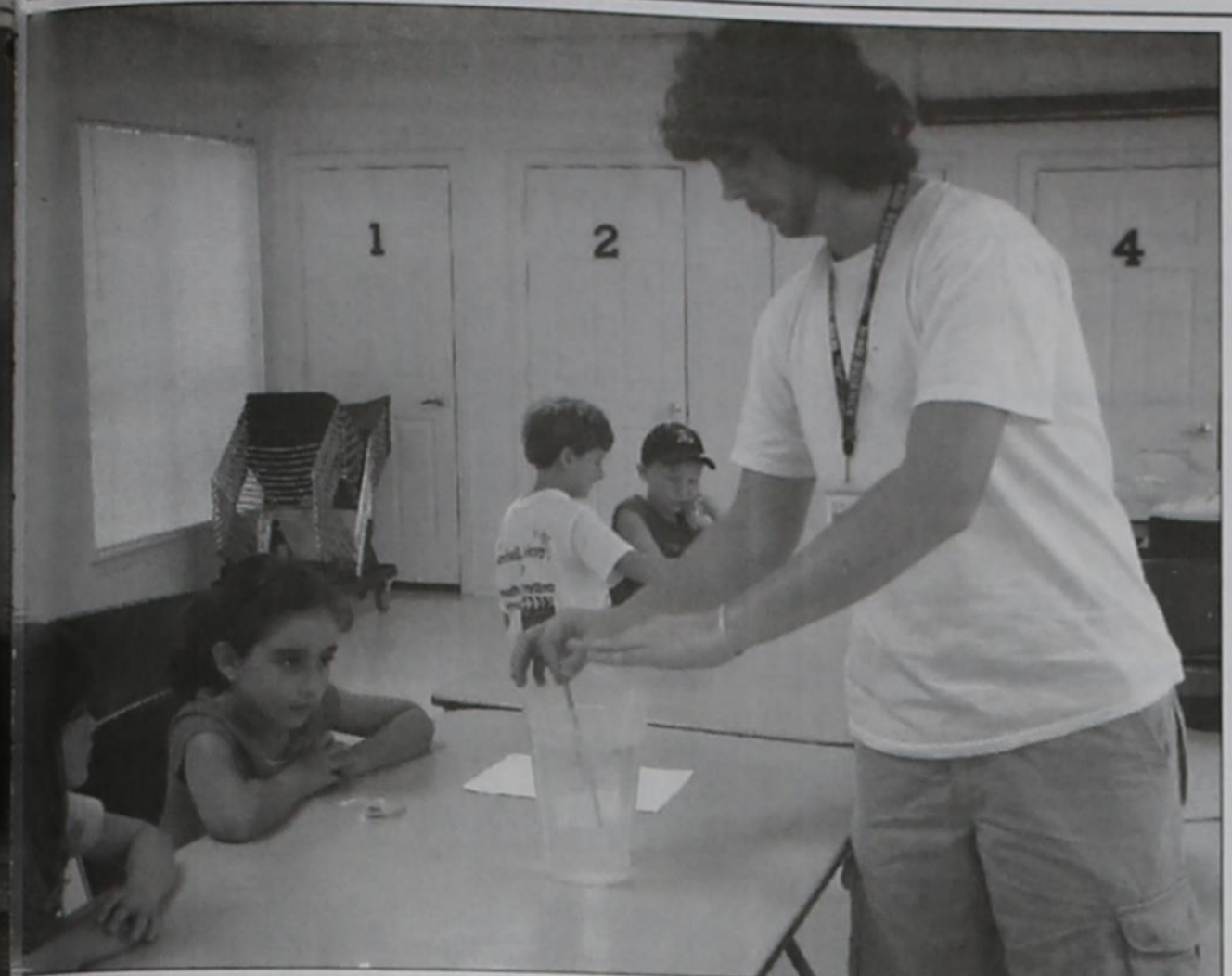

On God's Word

Three days and three nights in the grave

The exact days that Jesus Christ's body lay in the grave can be ascertained with the help of key reference points from the scripture. Our first point of reference is found in John 12:1, "Then Jesus six days before the passover..." The last point is in the Gospel records of the women who returned to the grave on the "first of the week" (John 20:1, Luke 23:56-24:1, Mark 16:1-2 and Matthew 28:1).

Another point of reference is found in Matthew 26:2 where Jesus said, "You know that after two days is the Passover, and the son of man is betrayed to be crucified." The scripture distinguishes between the weekly sabbath and the high day known as Passover.

The above reference to the "first day of the week" was the day after the weekly sabbath. The Passover was a special day that was kept annually. The day before Passover was the day of preparation (see Mark 15:42, Luke 23:54 and John 18:42). It was during preparation that the Passover lamb was killed and prepared for the Passover feast.

It is interesting to note that Jesus Christ was crucified on the same day that the Passover lamb was killed and prepared for the feast. Understanding the Hebrew calendar helps a great deal in this study. The Hebrew calendar day began and ended at sunset.

Given this information, we will know to count the days from sunset to sunset. Jesus' prophecy of his burial provides the exact amount of time he stayed in the grave.

He said, "For as Jonas was three days and three nights in the whale's belly, so shall the son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth" (Matthew 12:40). The reference to "three days and three nights" dispels any possible confusion on this subject.

It refers to three 24-hour days.

Now we can start to pinpoint the days that our Lord Jesus lay in the grave. According to Luke 23:54 Joseph buried Jesus' body toward the end of the preparation day, as the day of Passover drew near. In other words, he was buried around sunset just before the feast of Passover began.

It is commonly understood among Biblical Hebrew scholars that the Passover began at sunset on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Nisan, and that this day fell on our calendar day of Wednesday. Let's count three 24-hour days from sunset on Wednesday: Wednesday-Thursday (day 1)

Thursday-Friday (day 2)

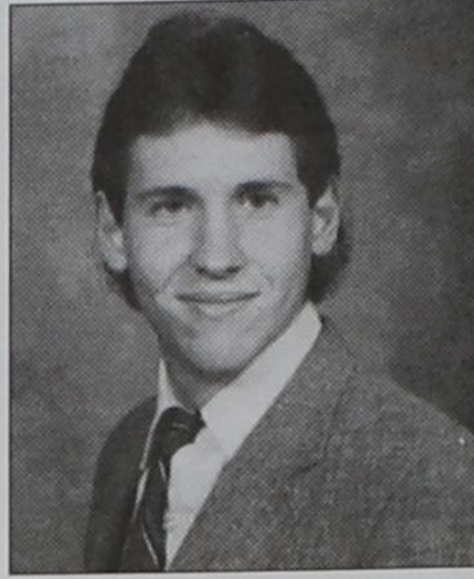
Friday-Saturday (day 3)

God's word is perfectly exact. If His word says that His son would lay in the grave for three days and three nights, then it can be established that He resurrected His beloved son just prior to sunset on the weekly sabbath, which is our Saturday.

Now we can understand better the records of the women arriving at around dawn on the first day of the week, which is our Sunday, to find Jesus' body missing. Upon their arrival, our Lord Jesus was already alive!

Sen. Bob Duell explains health care reform at coffee group

Texas state Senator Bob Duell of Senate District 2, met with constituents for two hours on Saturday, Aug. 1, to provide an opportunity to gain a perspective on the national health care legislation under debate through the eyes of a physician. Sen. Duell, who is also a family physician, practices in Greenville. The meeting, attended by about 32 people, was organized by Mark Russo through the Rockwall County Conservatives and Coffee organization at the Texas Roast coffee shop in Rockwall.

Dr. Duell began by speaking about the issues dealt with in the most recent legislative sessions in Austin and used the discussions there to frame the national considerations. He began by addressing some fundamental parameters within which any solution must work. He spoke at length about problems with existing laws, such as the extreme limitations on assets and ability to work currently in place for disabled Medicaid recipients who would like to work to the extent that they can.

"The fly in the ointment of free enterprise in medicine is that the courts have said that you can't deny emergency care to anyone whether they have insurance or not or even if they are not a citizen," he said.

Who May Harm Whom?

"No one has a right to harm another." Just a little thought, along with a few examples, would demonstrate that blanket statement as pure nonsense. Suppose there is a beautiful lady that both Jim and Bob are pursuing. If Jim wins her hand, Bob is harmed. By the same token, if Bob wins her hand, Jim is harmed. Whose harm is more important and should the beautiful lady be permitted to harm either Bob or Jim are nonsense questions.

During the 1970s, when Hewlett-Packard and Texas Instruments came out with scientific calculators, great harm was suffered by slide rule manufacturers such as Keuffel & Esser, and Pickett. Slide rulers have since gone the way of the dodo but the question is: Should Hewlett-Packard and Texas Instruments have been permitted to inflict such grievous harm on slide rule manufacturers? In 1927, General Electric successfully began marketing the refrigerator. The ice industry, a major industry and the livelihoods of thousands of workers, was destroyed virtually overnight. Should such harm have been permitted and what should Congress have done to save jobs in the slide rule and ice industries?

The first thing we should acknowledge is that we live in a world of harms. Harm is reciprocal. For example, if the government stopped Hewlett-Packard and Texas Instruments from harming Keuffel & Esser and Pickett, or stopped General Electric from harming ice producers, by denying them the right to manufacture calculators and refrigerators, they would have been harmed, plus the billions of consumers who benefited from calculators and refrigerators. There is no scientific or intelligent way to determine which person's harm is more important than the other. That means things are more complicated than saying that one person has no rights to harm another. We must ask which harms are to be permitted in a free society and are not to be permitted. For example, it's generally deemed acceptable for me to harm you by momentarily disturbing your peace and quiet by driving a motorcycle past your house. It's deemed unacceptable for me to harm you by tossing a brick through your window.

In a free society, many conflicting harms are settled through the institution of private property rights. Private property rights have to do with rights belonging to the person deemed owner of property to keep, acquire, use and dispose of property as he deems fit so long as he does not violate similar rights of another. Let's say that you are offended, possibly harmed, by bars that play vulgar rap music and permit smoking. If you could use government to outlaw rap music and smoking in bars, you would be benefited and people who enjoyed rap music and smoking would be harmed. Again, there is no scientific or intelligent way to determine whose harm is more important. In a free society, the question of who has the right to harm whom, by permitting rap music and smoking, is answered by the property rights question: Who owns the bar? In a socialistic society, such conflicting harms are resolved through government intimidation and coercion.

What about the right to harm oneself, such as the potential harm that can come from not wearing a seatbelt. That, too, is a property rights question. If you own yourself, you have the right to take chances with your own life. Some might argue that if you're not wearing a seatbelt and wind up a vegetable, society has to take care of you; therefore, the fascist threat "click it or ticket." Becoming a burden on society is not a problem of liberty and private property. It's a problem of socialism where one person is forced to take care of someone else. That being the case, the government, in the name of reducing health care costs, assumes part ownership of you and as such assumes a right to control many aspects of your life. That Americans have joyfully given up self-ownership is both tragic and sad.

Even though he remains a popular politician, Obama is becoming increasingly estranged from the American people. According to a new Rasmussen poll, 69 percent of Americans believe the USA is a fair and decent country. Sixty-five percent want fewer government services and lower taxes.

Despite a hard sell from the hard left, the socialist vision of "providing" for the poor is not taking root in America. Simply put, most folks support making your own way and do not believe the feds should create massive entitlements.

Here's the interesting question: How far will Obama push government-controlled health care? Will he risk his entire administration on it? Right now, the folks are extremely skeptical because the president cannot articulate specifics. I do not expect that to change.

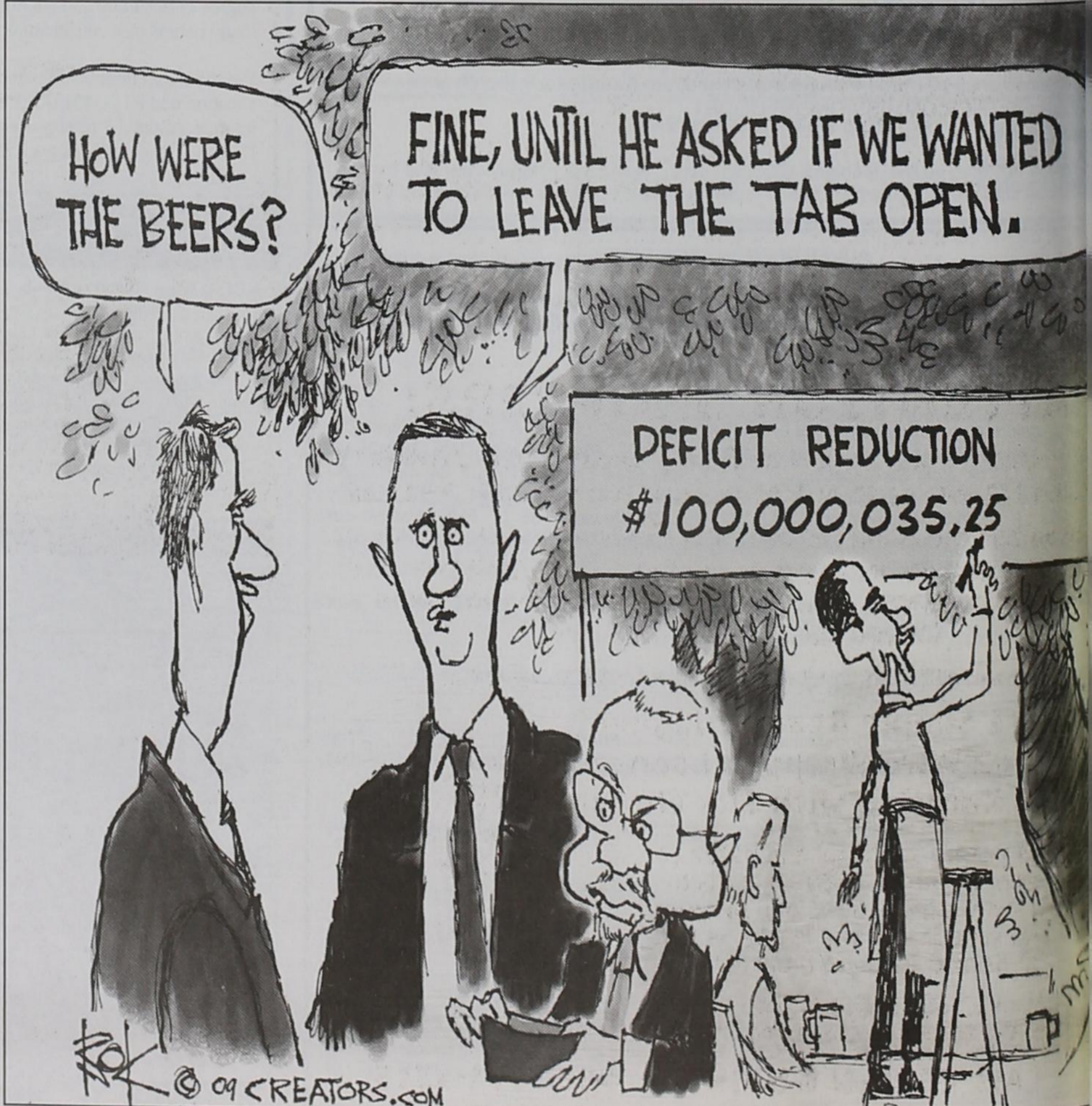
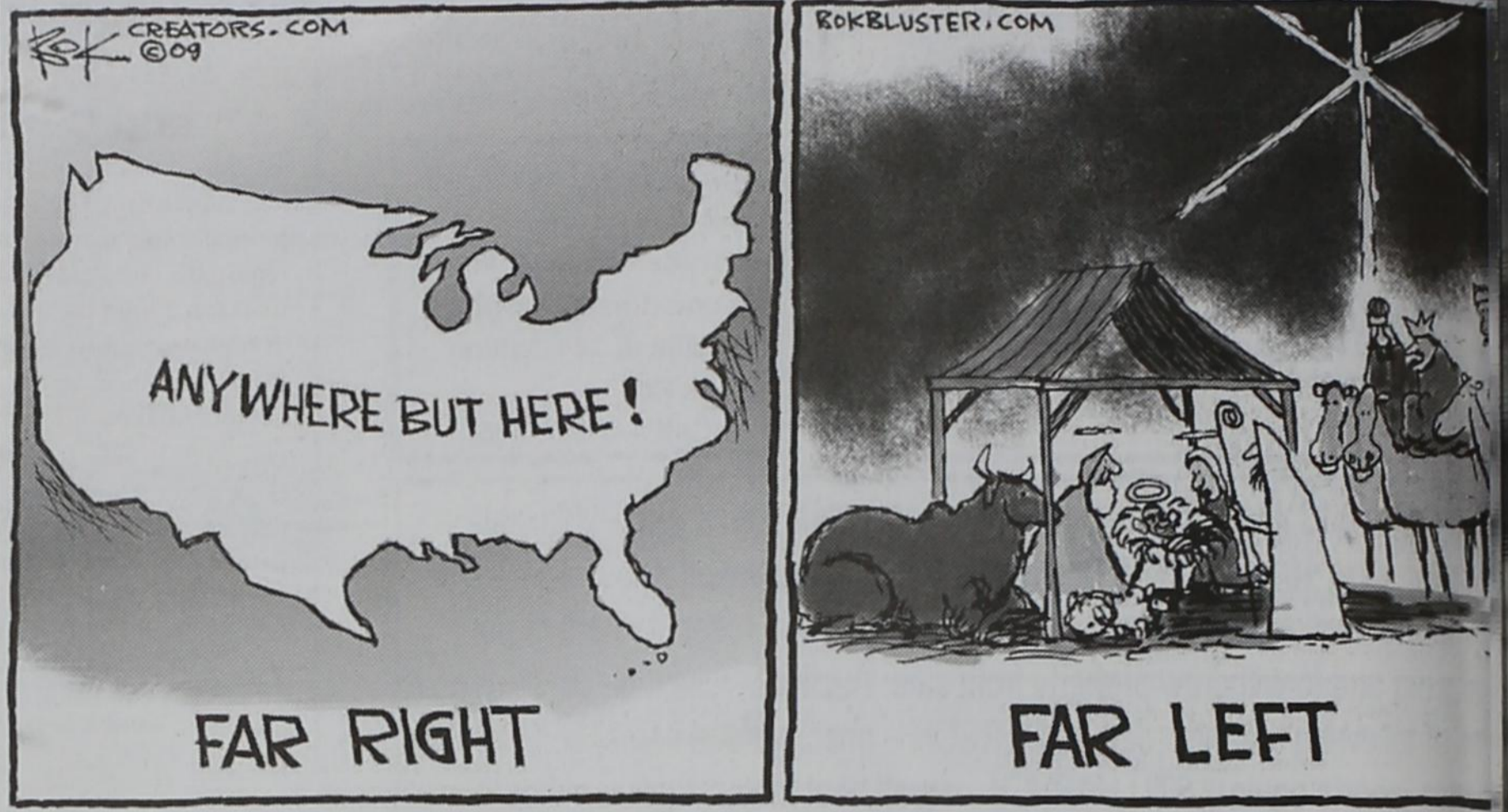

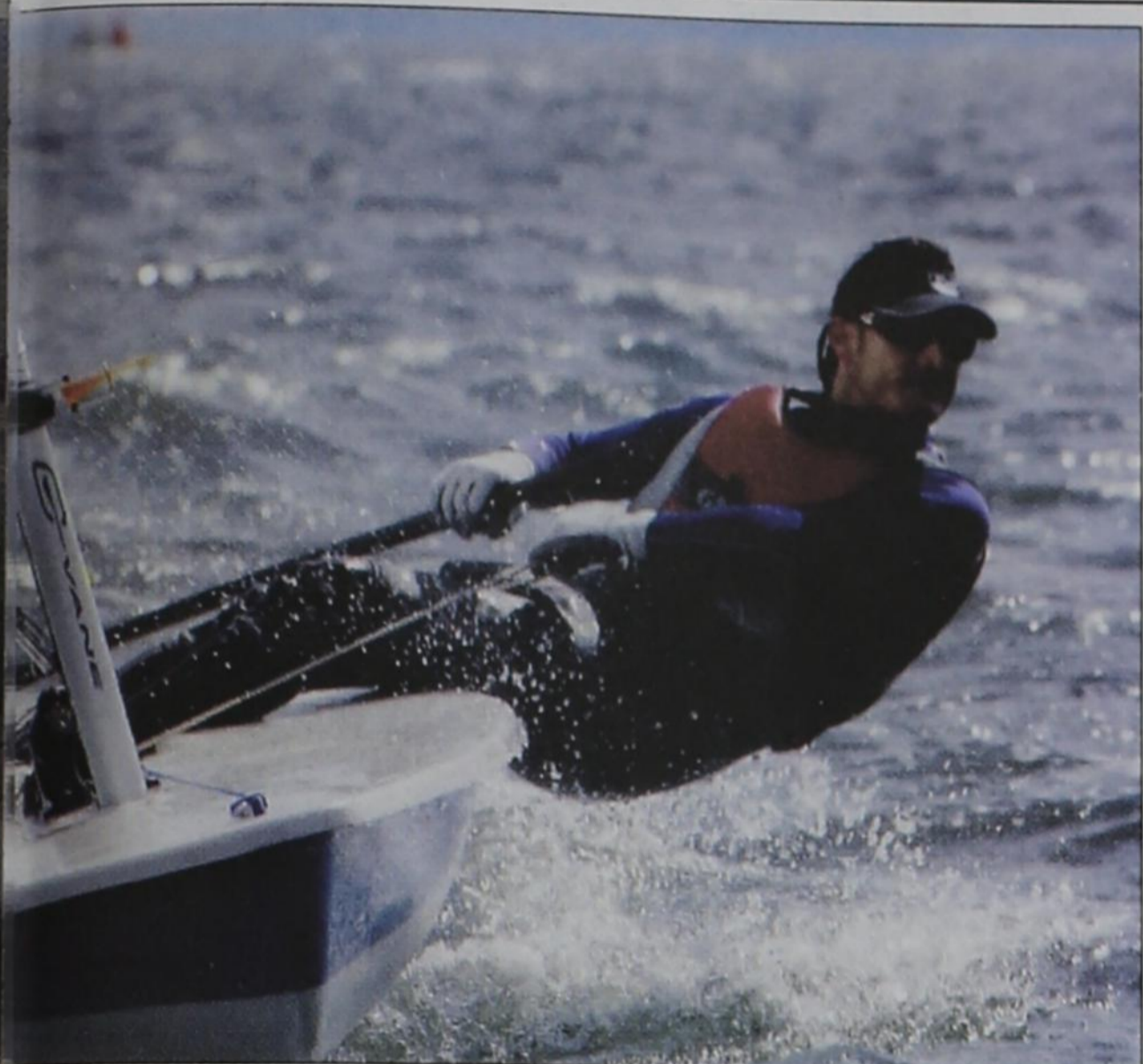

Earlier this month, five sailors from the Houston, led by Rockwall native and professional sailing coach Ryan Minth, area took top honors at the Laser North American championship in Ontario, Canada. The race is an open event for both youth and adults participants.

More than 200 competitors from eight different countries competed for the title at the Buffalo Canoe Club. After three days of racing, two of Minth's students took the top two places in the Laser 4.7 class.

In addition, three of his sailors finished in the top 10 places in the Laser Radial Class.

The Laser is a single-handed boat approximately 13 feet, 8 inches in length.

There are three different types of sail used in the event, including full rig, radial rig and 4.7, depending on the sailor's size and strength.

The son of Judy and Ron Minth of Rockwall, Ryan is a 1985 graduate of Rockwall High School. His neighbor, Don Johnson, and Sea Wolf skipper Scott Self, taught Minth to sail as a youngster.

Minth currently lives in Houston and coaches sailing across the United States. He also mentors in-

dividuals and teams from around the globe. His client list reads like a Who's-Who in sailing, including Luke Lawrence, twice named to the Laser US Elite Youth Team; Philip Crain, First Overall Radial; Laser Radial Midwinter's West Champion - 2007 and 2004 Laser Olympian, Timothy Pitts, USVI.

Minth produced China's first World Champion of an Olympic Sailing Class; coached Lijia Xu to First Overall, her first World Title (ISAF World Ranking into event, 56th) and coached Xiaoying Shen to 16th Overall (ISAF World Ranking into event, 125th). He was the Varsity Sailing Coach for the Naval Academy Athletic Association in 1991 and 1992, established and directed the J/24 Program and helped develop 160 Varsity Sailing Team members annually and many others.

A 1990 graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Minth was Team Captain and Sailor of the Year in 1990 and led the student-coached team at practices and regattas. He also earned the Southeast Interscholastic Sailing Association Achievement Award (All-District) in 1990.

As a staff member of the North Texas Sailing School in Rockwall in 1988 and 1989, Minth was the Junior program Director for Chandlers Landing Yacht Club and Small keelboat instructor for Adult program.

In addition to helping others sail at the top of their game, Minth is also a recognized competitor, receiving honors including the 2005 United States National Sailing Team, Olympic Single-handed Dinghy Men - Laser Class; 2004 United States Sailing Association Single-handed Championship, Bronze Medalist; 2004 USSA Single-handed Championship, Peter J. Barrett Sportsmanship Award; 2003 and 1994 North American Laser Class Association Radial Grand Prix Champion; 2003 International Laser Class Association Midwinter's West Regatta Champion, Radial; 2001 Block Island Race Week Champion, J/105 Class - Rolex Boat of the Week, Skipper; 2001 International Laser Class Association Midwinter's East Regatta Champion, Radial; 1995 International J/24 Class Association US Nationals Champion, Tactician; and 1995 and 1994 Canadian Olympic Regatta Kingston (CORK), 3rd Place Radial (100+ entrants).

Rapp reached personal bests in six of his seven events. He was 10th in the 50 free (28.96), 14th in the 50 and 200 backstrokes (34.78 and 2:40.17), 20th in the 100 free (1:05.78) and 200 IM (2:41.91), 22nd in the 100 back (1:16.38) and 26th in the 200 free (2:25.56). Arnold placed 17th in the 50 butterfly and 32nd in both the 50 breaststroke and 100 fly. Tokuz was 23rd in the both the 100 fly (1:10.91) and 50 free (28.96).

Deuell continued by pointing out that since emergency treatment must be provided, it makes more sense to provide preventative care to reduce the strain on the emergency system and provide care at a better cost to the taxpayers.

A great deal of discussion focused on the scope of care changes that the proposed national legislation would bring in and on the costs associated with the changes. Dr. Deuell was very frank in explaining that the changes cannot be implemented without raising costs significantly, which would likely lead to reductions in services provided.

He stated that 67 percent of Medicaid money goes to elder care and that most of that is spent on emergency care or goes to healthcare providers.

He further explained that the state of Oregon had gone in this direction after its costs escalated rapidly when they implemented some of the same changes a few years ago.

The senator had several ideas for ways to make the health care system more responsive. He specifically mentioned that the disconnect between the care recipient and the payer seems to encourage people to use health care services without regard for the cost. He believes that people would be more responsible with their own health and the care that they seek if they had more "skin in the game."

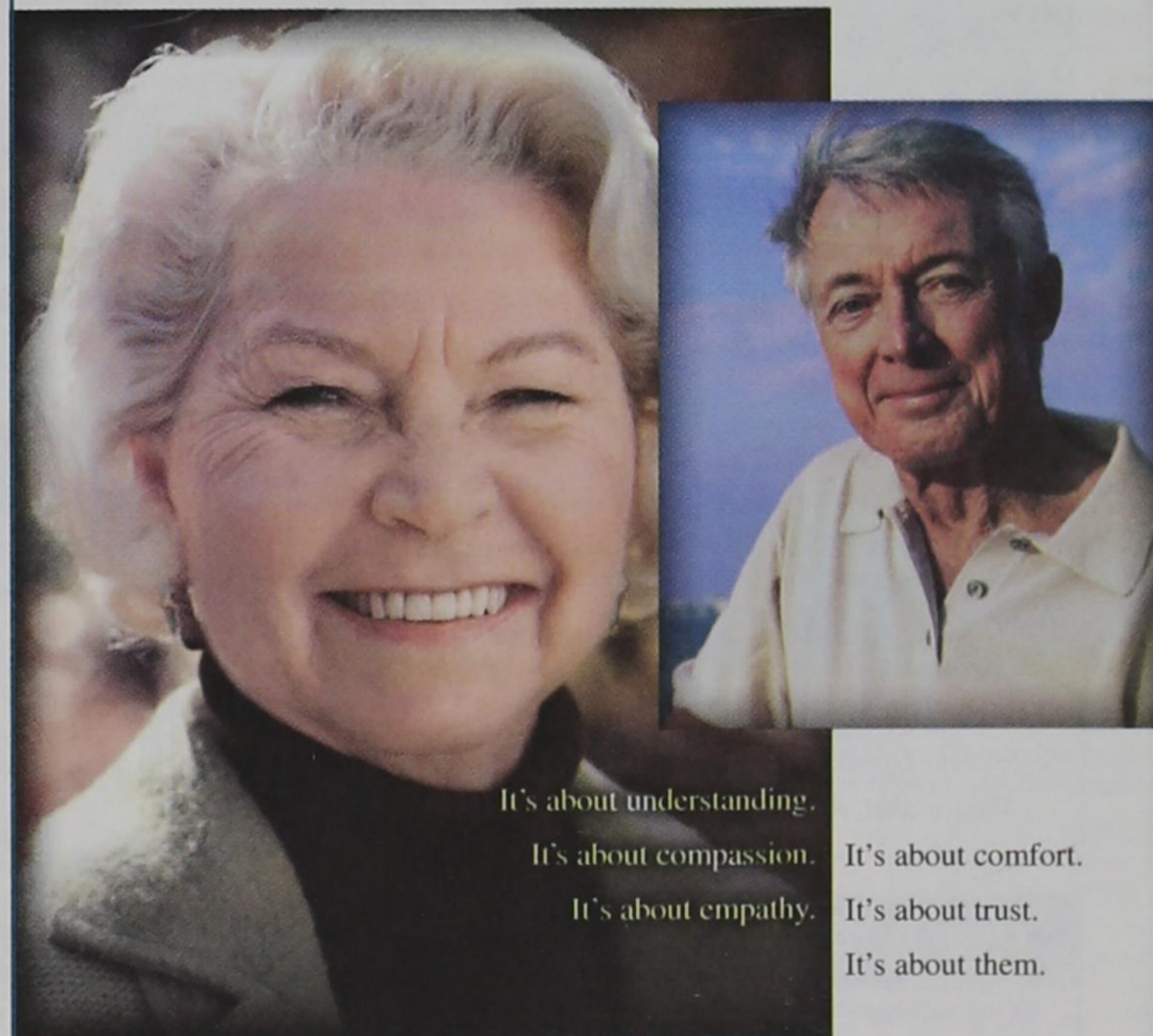

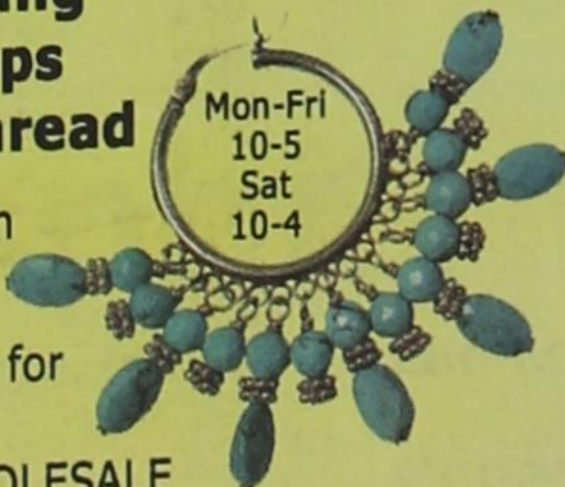
