Heath curfew sent home by 4-3 vote

A city-wide curfew for those under the age of 17 that has been in place since 2004 was lifted by the Heath City Council during their regular meeting on Oct. 22.

Citizens in attendance spoke in favor of the ordinance being renewed during the public hearing held about the matter.

The ordinance was up for renewal, with it expiring every third year since it was first approved in 2004.

Director of DPS Terry Garrett also spoke in favor of the ordinance.

"It's one of those tools that we've been able to use, and use effectively when we need to," Garrett said.

There only have been seven violations of the curfew in the past three years, Garrett said, all of which were cited in the same incident, and that the curfew currently in place began an hour later than many surrounding cities.

"It's not something that is used for profiling, it's used as a tool," Garrett said.

During discussion among the council, Mayor Lorne Liechty expressed his views of the ordinance in question.

"I, personally, think that this is an unnecessary law. I've never understood the benefit of making

someone being outside a criminal act regarding what time of day it is. In my opinion, there are plenty of laws to prevent vandalism; there are plenty of laws to prevent drug use, gang activity, anything like that," Liechty said. "To me, it seems unnecessary to make being outside a crime. Again, in my opinion, I think this limits our liberties. We have the right of assembly under the First Amendment and in the Declaration of Independence, we said that we stand for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. To me, it seems like we are almost acting like parents taking on parental activity in making sure that people's children are in the house. I will also say that I have made this speech three other times, but that's what I believe."

In response, Councilmember Kevin Lamberth stood on the other side of the fence. "I do agree with you, that we are allowed to congregate, but we're talking about juveniles and kids," Lamberth said, "I draw the line there. I do think that we should be able to provide some oversight in regards to what happens with juveniles during those times of the evening."

Councilmember Julie Zurek also spoke her opinions and concerns about the curfew.

"I was here when we did this the first time and have supported it,"

Zurek said. "I think our parents need to step up and take care of their kids."

Zurek said she supported the ordinance when her own children were younger, but questioned it now.

She asked Garrett as to if the curfew had made a difference and if kids being out between the hours stated was really an issue.

"I think there are some that are out at all hours of the night and we try to take care of that, many times, in other ways, such as contacting the parent and letting them know, and there are some times where the parent says 'Yeah, I didn't know they were out,'" Garrett said. "It's a partnership between the city, the department and the parents. Like I said before, this is one of those tools. Sometimes we have had to use it and it gets into municipal court and a judge gets to make a decision as to what happens at that point, but that's usually in an extreme situation."

Zurek expressed concerns about the ordinance not being used responsibly and that she wanted the police to be respected by minors and not threatened by them.

"The night we passed this, there were quite a few officers here and my concern at that time was that I didn't want our officers using this as a profiling tool, or as a tool to just pull kids over."

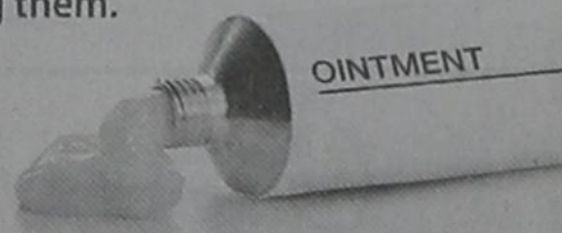

A welcome US/Saudi reset

Last week it was reported that Saudi Arabia decided to make a "major shift" away from its 80 years of close cooperation with the United States. The Saudi leadership is angry that the Obama administration did not attack Syria last month, and that it has not delivered heavy weapons to the Syrian rebels fighting to overthrow the Assad government. Saudi Arabia is heavily invested in the overthrow of the Assad government in Syria, sending money and weapons to the rebels.

However, it was the recent diplomatic opening between the United States and Iran that most infuriated the Saudis. Saudi Arabia is strongly opposed to the Iranian government and has vigorously lobbied the US Congress to maintain sanctions and other pressure on Iran. Like Israel, the Saudis are fearful of any US diplomacy with Iran.

This additional strain in US/Saudi relations came at the 40 year anniversary of the Arab oil embargo of the US over its support of Israel in the 1973 Yom Kippur war. At the time, the embargo caused quite a bit of trouble for Americans, including gas shortages and long lines at the filling stations. A repeat of this move, however, would not have the same effect on the US economy. Though it would not be desired, these are not the 1970s and oil is now a more fungible commodity no longer solely in Arab hands.

Why does Saudi Arabia insist that the United States fight its battles? The Saudis are strongly opposed to the governments in Syria and Iran so they expect the US to attack. It is their neighborhood, why don't they fight their own wars? Israel shares the same position in the region as Saudi Arabia: it has been fighting to overthrow Assad

in Syria for years, and Israeli leadership constantly pushes the US toward war on Iran. They are both working on the same side of these issues but why do they keep trying to draw us in?

We have unwritten agreements to defend Saudi Arabia and Israel, which keeps us heavily involved militarily in the Middle East. But when the US becomes so involved, we are the real losers -- especially the American taxpayers, who are forced to finance this global military empire. Plus, our security guarantee to Saudi Arabia and Israel creates a kind of moral hazard: there is little incentive for these two countries to push for more peaceful solutions in the region because the US military underwrites their reckless behavior. It is an unhealthy relationship that should come to an end.

If Saudi Arabia and Israel are so determined to extend their influence in the region and share such similar goals, why don't they work together to stabilize the region without calling on the US for back-up? It might be healthy for them to cooperate and leave us out of it.

One of Osama bin Laden's stated goals was to bankrupt the US by drawing it into endless battles in the Middle East and south Asia. Unfortunately, even from beyond the grave he continues to successfully implement his policy. But should we really be helping him do so? If Saudi Arabia wants to pull back from its deep and unhealthy relationship with the United States we should welcome such a move. Then we might return to peace and commerce rather than sink under entangling alliances.

Violation of Texas "prima facie speed limit" is not a punishable criminal offense

Texas Transportation Code Section 545.351 Maximum Speed Requirement, and Section 545.352 Prima Facie Speed Limits, do not include language that designates the violation of a "prima facie speed limit" to be a prosecutable criminal offense punishable by a fine.

The Texas Legislature recognized the right of the people to travel freely on the roads and highways of Texas.

Texas Constitution Article 1, Section 16

No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, retroactive law, or any law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall be made.

The act of forcing any business and natural person to purchase any kind of insurance for others, who render services, constitutes "impairing obligation of contracts."

One exception are Federal Instrumentalities engaged in statutory "employment" on the soil of Texas.

Newman's fumble return caps Fulton's rally to win

When The Fulton School needed an opponent to replace two schools that canceled games with the Falcons, head coach Josh Johnson came up with Austin Capital City Christian Homeschool.

Instead of a sure victory over either Waco Parkview Christian Academy or Melissa Christian Homeschool Athletes of North Texas, Fulton had a fight on its hands.

A fight that didn't end until the Falcons overcame an 11-point deficit and twice stopped Capital City in the final minute.

Fulton's Brenner Newman picked up a loose misfired lateral and returned the ball 57 yards for the game-winning score with 55 seconds to play. With sighs of relief, the Falcons (7-2) won 58-56.

With freshman Tyler Treadway pressuring Austin's Garrison Day, he threw the ball toward Gabe Loehr, who was in the backfield blocking. The ball sailed past Loehr, then bounced off the artificial turf at Rockwall High School to Newman.

He pointed toward the south end zone and ran as fast as he could until he crossed the goal line.

"I just picked the ball up and ran," Newman said. Johnson said, "For Brenner to scoop and score, that was a heck of a play."

After Fulton's extra-point pass attempt fell incomplete, the Falcons still had to stop the Cougars (6-2) again.

Capital City recovered an onside kick and returned the ball to midfield. On its first play, Loehr slipped for a loss of 9 yards. Then he threw two incomplete passes. Again under pressure from Treadway on fourth and 24 with 4 seconds remaining, Loehr threw behind Shepherd Medrano incomplete as time expired.

"We moved Tyler to a pass rusher, and he really got after that quarterback," Johnson said. "We have a resilient bunch. They didn't quit."

Fulton led for most of the game, taking leads of 12-6 after one quarter and 26-12 at halftime.

"I think after our first drive, we played flat. We didn't seem to have a sense of urgency offensively," Johnson said.

That might have been an even greater problem in the second half. The Cougars scored three touchdowns to one for Fulton to take their first lead at 36-32 on Loehr's 13-yard touchdown pass to Day and Ross Scher's 2-point conversion kick with 4 minutes, 22 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

The visitors' lead grew to 56-45 midway through the fourth quarter. Senior Todd Treadway threw a 38-yard pass to Hayden Leverett for his second touchdown of the game. Max Mitchell then threw to Newman for an extra point that brought the score to 56-52.

After that came the Capital City drive that gained 1 yard in four plays before Newman made his defensive score.

Todd Treadway ran for 211 yards, passed for 125 and caught a pass for 35 more to lead the Falcons. He passed for three touchdowns and ran for two.

Johnson said, "Todd is just a playmaker. It doesn't get much better than him, especially in TAPPS Division II. He's been banged up, but he's trying to help his team win."

Treadway and the other banged-up Falcons will be able to rest with a bye this weekend. They'll return in their final regular-season game for the TAPPS 6-Man District 3-II title at Longview Trinity School of Texas Saturday, Nov. 9.
