"We would like to attract national and regional credit type tenants," Austin said.

Austin is also a longtime resident of Heath.

"We don't have any users in tow yet. We need to get through the zoning process and development process to get this show on the road, if you will, to market it to the users," Austin said.

"This is a new process for Heath, this commercial, and I think we've negotiated a win-win here with everybody involved," Councilman Justin Holland said. "I think it's going to be a kick-starter. I think that once people see this going in and the success and the class it's going to bring that it's going to be a kick-starter for other people."

Council members unanimously approved the zoning change.

The fee schedule also was approved.

Included in the proposed fee schedule was an increase in fees for field rental at Towne Center Park, with fees increasing from \$10 and \$20 to \$25 and \$50 for practice use and game use, respectively.

Holland said he would rather the fees not be increased until improvements were made to the

fields to justify the substantial increase in fees.

The fees will remain at \$10 and \$20 for now per the request of the Council.

Before heading into executive session, Council members had the responsibility of replacing Conder's seat. Because of Conder's retirement, a seat was left open.

Mayor Lorne Liechty clarified that the individual elected to fulfill the remainder of Conder's term would not necessarily become chairman, but would only fill an empty seat.

Council unanimously elected Krisha Brooks, wife of Councilman Barry Brooks, to fill the seat.

Other items on the discussed included a request to approve a conditional use permit for a roof with a 5/12 slope in Mallard Crossing. Builder Scott Gunderson was present and informed the council that a tile roof was the reason for the request for a slope change. The City of Heath requires a permit is for a roof pitch of less than 8/12.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Oct. 8.

Editor's Note: Heath City Secretary Stephanie Galanides stated that the required notice of the public hearing regarding the request for a zoning change on 8.04 acres situated at the northwest corner of the intersection of FM 740 and Heathland Crossing was published on August 16, 2013.

An ordinance approving an increase in water and sewer utility rates of 5 percent passed unanimously, 7-0.

Mayor Pro-Tem Janet Nichol complimented Brent Stowers, Roysie City's park superintendent, for the improvements to the parks and soccer fields.

In an interview with Stowers, he said the parks in Roysie City include City Lake Park, the Splash Park on SH 66, Walker Hawk Sports Complex, which is behind the Splash Park on SH-66 and Erby Campbell and contains a baseball, softball and football field. He said they were working diligently to improve the surface of the sports fields by aerating the soil, which means loosening up the soil so it will absorb the water better, doing top dressings, which means filling in all the holes then putting loose soft dirt on top, and spraying chemicals to target weeds and bald spots. They also are watering more often to make the appearance more inviting.

Residents on Welch Road of the Sunrise Meadows Addition spoke to the council concerning the drastic increase in their water bill. They said there were only two adults living in their house and they are gone all day to work. They said the water usage jumped last month from 2,700 to 15,000 gallons this month with a bill of \$1,200. One of them noted that possibly the meter was malfunctioning or the meter reader wasn't reading the meter accurately. Alsabrook requested that Dario Lopez, the public works director, check into her problem.

Rockwall County Elections Office: Photo IDs now required to vote in person

The Rockwall County Elections Office, in a news release issued last week, reminded voters that photo identification now will be required for in-person voting.

"In Rockwall County we are working to make sure our voters understand the new ID requirements and have all the information they need to cast their ballots," the news release stated.

According to the release, a voter will be required to show one of the following forms of photo ID at the polling location before the voter will be permitted to cast a vote:

- Driver's license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- U.S. military ID card containing the individual's photo
- U.S. citizenship certificate containing the individual's photo
- U.S. passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired in no more than 60 days before being presented at the polling place, according to the release.

This ID requirement pertains to voters casting ballots in person, not by mail.

Voters ages 65 and older may vote by mail.

Election officials are encouraging voters to update their voter registrations to reflect the names on their IDs. Voters may use IDs that do not exactly match the name on their IDs if the names are substantially similar, but the voter will be required to sign an affidavit stating they are the same person.

A resolution passed unanimously canceling the Oct. 8 city council meeting due to the fact that several of the council and staff members will be attending the Texas Municipal League annual conference and exhibition in Austin.

Alsabrook addressed the issue brought up at the last meeting of Sept. 10 concerning the citizens residing on Welch Road in the Sunrise Meadow Addition, who vented their concern over water usage and an excessively high water bill. Lopez and Joe Stegall, chief financial officer, followed up on the issue as requested by Alsabrook at the last council meeting. They found that the reported \$1,200 monthly charge was actually \$120. They checked the history of the complainants' water usage and it seemed to be consistent from year to year. A new water meter was installed at the residence.

The meetings are conducted at the Police and Courts Building, 100 W. Main St., on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 7 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for Oct. 22.

Voters may look up their registrations at votetexas.gov. If their names are not an exact match, they can update their voter registrations online at votetexas.gov.

Texans can obtain an EIC at any of the more than 220 Texas driver license offices during regular business hours; select driver license offices from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturdays; and at EIC mobile station locations. Information on these locations may be found at votetexas.gov.

To apply for an EIC, an applicant must provide documentation verifying U.S. citizenship; documentation verifying identity; be eligible to vote in Texas; be a Texas resident; and be 17 years and 10 month or older.

There is no charge for an EIC, which only can be used for voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification, according to a news release from the state. Texans with a documented disability may apply at their county voter registrar for a permanent exemption from the photo ID requirement.

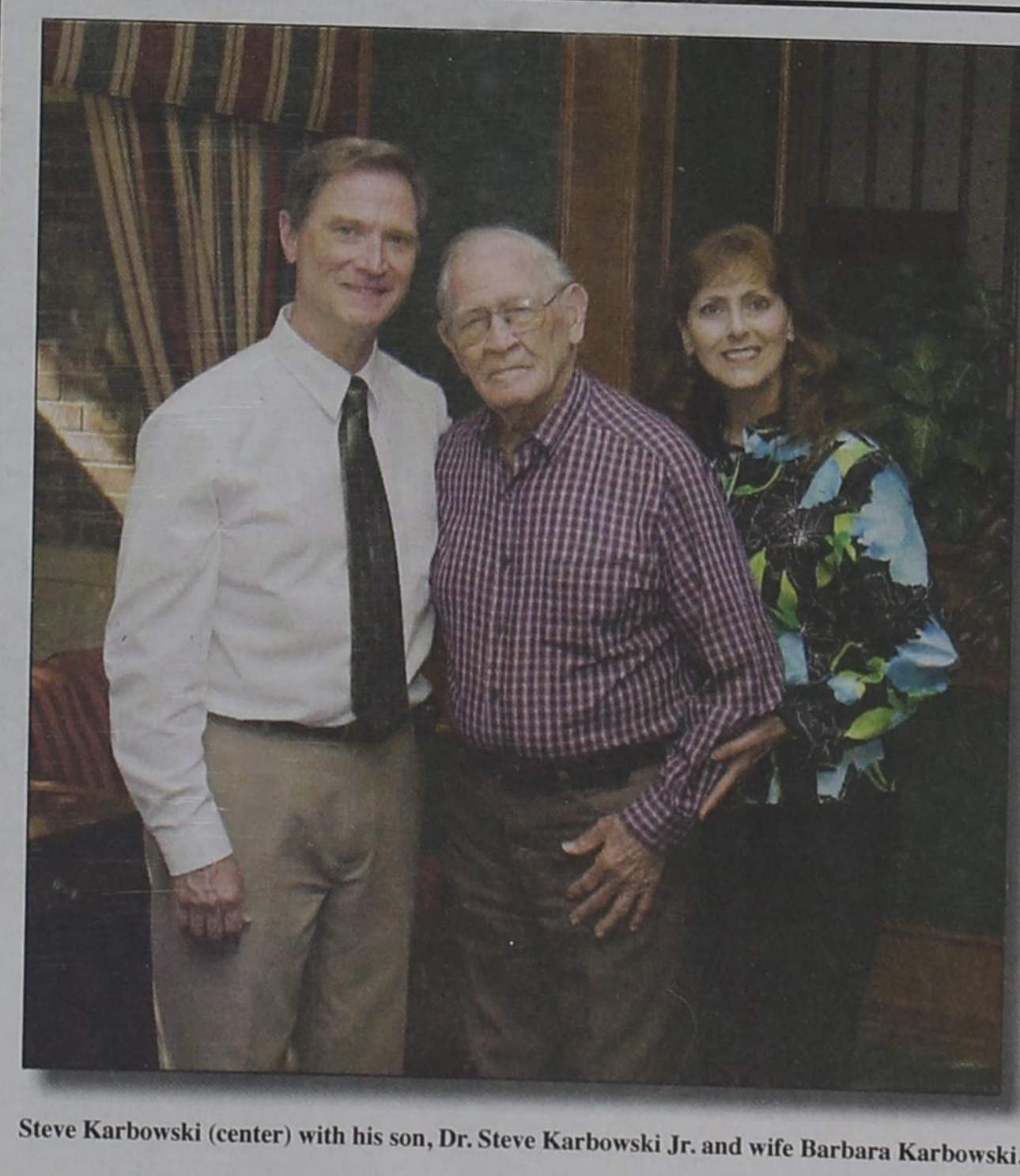

Smith Brothers carved out place in com



MILLIE JEAN COPPEDGE Reminiscing Royse City

 The Smith Family was a well-known family in Royse City during the early 1900s. The Smith Brothers Service Garage and Car Dealership, on the corner of Main and Elm Street, was owned by the Smith family. Their business was where the Z's Kwik Stop is now located. No part of the present structure was ever part of the Smith family business. Products from the Willys-Overland Motor company were their specialty. Willys-Overland was the second-largest producer of automobiles in the United States from 1912 until 1918, with Ford Motor Company being number one. In 1913, the Smith Brothers added the Willys-Knight nameplate. In 1926, when the production of the Overland ended, Smith Brothers started selling the Whippet, a smaller, more economical automobile. As a bit of history for the automobile sales, severe financial problems began to affect the automobile sales in the 1920s. After the Great Depression, which began around 1930, the sales of the Whippet began to drop. Production ended in 1931. By 1933, the Willys-Knight also closed

its doors. In 1936 the Willys-Overland Motor Company as Willys-Overland Motors. Although they kept str... able to stay in business. Despite the company pa... production during World War II, it never again wa... popularity it had during the early 1900s. But for the Smith Brothers, the Burton Ford Mo... over their business in 1929, according to Lois Ballar... Museum. In 1957 the building burned. 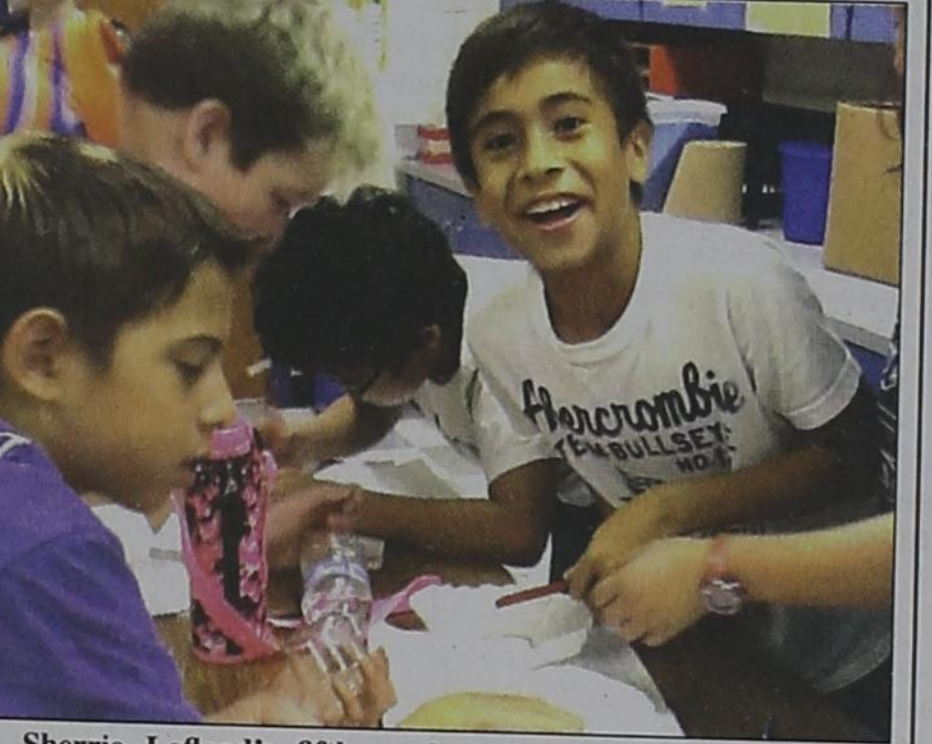

Observations of Fate City Council ...

I just sat in my first City of Fate council meeting and I left after five hours feeling very deflated.

I spent a lot of today looking at some of the growth and information from the last year that has taken place in the City of Fate compared to years past and was impressed by what I read. I talked to people who have lived in Fate longer than I have and have been involved with the city government and heard good things about the current city manager. Coincidence that the growth comes at a time when they have a person hired in May 2012 to achieve the goals and implement the policies of the City Council? Possibly.

Tonight, after a closed executive session, the city manager was terminated from his position. At this point we do not know why because the City Council elected to exercise their rights under the Open Meetings Act and close the session to deliberate on the personnel matter involving both the city manager and the mayor.

This is what I do know. I know that Mayor Broderick, while acting as the chairman of the City Council, was unprofessional in his actions towards other city council members and towards the citizens of Fate that were in attendance at the meeting. When Councilman Stacy made a motion on Action Item 4.b) to affix and levy the property tax for fiscal year beginning October 1, 2013, to the effective rate and not the rate as entered into the agenda, Council Member Megyesi seconded the motion to which Mayor Broderick responded, "What a surprise."

Of course my reaction as a citizen to say out loud that that was not acceptable was not at all professional either, but it should be noted that I am not an elected official of the City of Fate.

I also know that a majority of the people who were at the meeting tonight do not have faith in our elected city officials that they are making the best decisions for them nor do they believe the meetings are a forum where the effected persons included on the agenda are heard. I know this because I spoke to several people while the meeting was in several recesses and while the members were in the closed meetings. I also listened to others talk among themselves regarding their feelings towards the council. I also heard the same concerns from the owners of the land, who were present to testify, that are being considered for annexation by the city.

My question I would like to ask the City Council is: Did you listen? Based on your answers to the landowners you do not. It seems to me that if you are considering annexing property and that you must recognize this is going to be something the landowners will have issue with that you educate yourselves on the process including the Municipal Service Plan.

What did happen when questions arose about benefits that would be afforded to the land owners through the annexation was a deferment to the city manager who stood up and, although did not know the answer, read through the plan with the citizen who had asked the question in order to get her the answer she needed. So here is what I saw: The council deferred to the city manager to answer a question directed at them when the plan was at the corner of the table for all to access. The city manager then tried to answer the concerned citizens question and then later that evening he is the one terminated?

Lastly, the response from the council members on the question of "does this even matter" and his comment of "this is a done deal anyway" received from the landowner who stood up and ask to be heard on the annexation of his property was in my book not acceptable. Although the response was barely audible, I made out "that is why we are here." The response from every council member (or I would have settled for one) should have been one that let this person and all others know that the city councilmembers of Fate are open minded and come to the sessions without a decision already made about the items in the public hearings - that they listen to the people in the community, the people who vote for them, those that are affected by their decisions.

The first reaction for many of the council members based on what I wrote may be to defend yourself or worse -- to lash back. You can take this criticism any way you like. It is my hope that what you do is view it as a concerned citizen's view on how she and others see their elected officials and that it spurs you to do better. I hope that it makes you see that others have witnessed an internal conflict and that immediate steps are taken to address and resolve this conflict so that the citizens of Fate can have confidence in all the members of the council.

I do not expect to agree with the council members decisions on everything, but what I do expect is leaders who listen to the constituents of the community they represent and work harder at building the confidence of the community in their elected officials.

Thank you for your attention to this email and my concerns.

MSA Day, October 3, 2013

This letter to bring awareness to a disease called MSA (Multiple System Atrophy). Multiple = (many), System = (brain control different functions), Atrophy = (cell shrinkage)

Multiple system atrophy, a neurodegenerative disorder, is a rare, neurodegenerative, progressive brain disorder caused by loss of cells in specific areas of the brain. This loss causes problems with movement, balance, and autonomic functions of the body. Autonomic functions are body functions that occur without conscious thought, such as bladder and bowel control, swallowing, blood pressure, muscle coordination and breathing. It is not curable and most patients live five to six years after diagnosis.

Previously known as Shy-Drager Syndrome, Multiple System Atrophy and Sporadic Olivopontocerebellar Atrophy, researchers learned that there is a common underlying genetic mutation, so they are now referred to as MSA.

MSA falls into the category of Atypical Parkinsonism, or Parkinson's disease, a group of diseases linked to a lack of dopamine in the brain that controls movement. While Parkinson's is the most common form of Parkinsonism, many people are misdiagnosed due to the lack of symptoms.

Only a neurologist can sometimes take more than 10 years to make all the diagnostic testing, MRI's, CT Scans, blood tests, and error on different medications.

My father, L. Talley suffered with this disease and we had to watch him suffer for years before he was diagnosed.

After reading the diagnosis and immediately going to the doctor, I could learn anything about it.

I wanted to find out how rare it was and started reading the literature. There are way too many symptoms to list here, and I have different issues at different stages.

My father's golf course forced him out of the game he loved, and he had a very dark day in his life.

He could not drive anymore and had to surrender to using a wheelchair. His desire to play golf again so he joined the YMCA to get back into his muscles.

After, but as the disease progressed he became weary of joining an online support group, for I gained a great strength in dealing with the disease.

RISD football teams maintain close game to the end, Yellowjackets defeat Hawks 2

On a perfect night for football, the cross-county Rockwall Independent School District varsity football teams battled to the end as the Rockwall Yellowjackets prevailed over the Rockwall-Heath Hawks 24-20.

During the first half, Rockwall (1-0 District, 3-2 overall) put up 3 points with a field goal by kicker Tony Pecora.

The Hawks (0-1, 4-1) would not finish the half without rally as quarterback Jordan Hoy connected with R.J. Williams for a touchdown with 41 seconds left in the half. The extra point by Dylan Calder finished the half with a 6-3 lead for the Hawks.

The 3rd quarter was like a hard pounding seesaw contest as both teams added 14 points to the scoreboard.

The Yellowjackets started the second half with a passing game drive from about midfield ending with a touchdown pass from Will Reed to Jay Galloway with 10:45 on the clock.

The Hawks answered with a variety of plays including a quarterback keeper, a pass to Jake Fisher, and an incomplete pass to Alex Solis, and finishing with a pass to Williams who ran along the left sideline for a touchdown with 9:05.

During the next drive, Rockwall High took advantage of two 15-yard Hawks' personal fouls. The temporary breakdown in discipline propelled the Yellowjackets to the Hawks' 26-yard line. After an incomplete pass, and an 8-yard gain by Tamba Juanah, Rockwall hit a snag with the quarterback sack by Richard Gary and Nathan Solomon. With 4th down and 7 yards for a first down, Reed passed the ball to Xavier Castille who ran in for a touchdown. With Pecora's extra point, Rockwall bounced back into a 13-17 lead with 6:28.

The last six minutes of the second half belonged to the Hawks. After two runs by Henderson and a pass to Preston Smith, Rockwall-Heath switched to a series of effective quarterback keepers by Hoy, who finished the drive with a touchdown run along the right side, with :43.

The Yellowjackets' next drive into the 4th quarter resulted in a pass by Reed to Galloway into the end zone for the game ending score of 20-24.

After both teams punted on 4-&-out drives, Rockwall-Heath made one last attempt at scoring with a drive that used nearly six minutes.

The Hawks' fans saw what appeared to be a new quarterback pull off a number of successful quarterback keeper plays in the number 23 jersey. It was soon announced that Hoy was wearing a different jersey number.

The Hawks drove to the 15-yard line. At 1st down and 10 yards, Hoy

kept the ball up the middle for a touchdown, only to see it taken back because of false start penalty.

Rockwall stopped the next two quarterback keeper plays, and won the ball back with a quarterback sack by Alex Montanez at the 21-yard line.

Rockwall is scheduled to play Mesquite Horn on Friday October 4 at 7:30 p.m. at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium in Rockwall. With a 48-21 win over Tyler Lee, Horn will come to Rockwall 5-0 overall.

Rockwall-Heath will travel to E.H. Hanby Stadium to play Mesquite (0-1 District, 3-2 overall) at 7:30 p.m. on Friday. Mesquite will return from a 67-17 loss to Longview High School.

Fulton turns to a re-Treadway to help defeat Fau

On Saturday, The Fulton School played its second consecutive with senior Todd Treadway's playing time limited while recovering from an injury.

Against Irving Faustina Academy, Fulton had a good replacement for Treadway - another Treadway, Todd's freshman brother, Tyler.

It was a good day for the Falcons and Tyler Treadway at Cain Middle School. He was honored as the Homecoming Prince, and scored four touchdowns in a 73-28 victory.

Todd Treadway also scored, on a kickoff return. Their older brother, Tanner Treadway, the 2011 Homecoming King, was on hand to crown 2013 royalty Fernando Giannazzo.

Todd also played a major role in a defensive change that turned a close game - 23-20 after the first quarter - into one that ended early in the fourth quarter because of six-man football's 45-point mercy rule.

Faustina (3-2) led twice during the first quarter on touchdowns by John Rodriguez, but the Falcons (4-1) took the lead for good on Tyler Treadway's second touchdown of that period. It came on a 10-yard pass from classmate Max Mitchell, the first of his five TD passes.

The Faustina Falcons came right back 16 seconds later to score on a 44-yard pass, and had the ball with a chance to regain the lead early in the second quarter.

But when the visitors' offense lined up at the 3 yard line following a goal-line stand, they saw an entirely different Fulton defense.

Head coach Josh Johnson explained the changes for the host Falcons. "Basically, we spied their up back, number 9 (Rodriguez). He's their best target, best athlete and fastest player. And we rushed two guys hard.

"We lined up our three best athletes - Brenner (Newman), Todd and Hayden (Leverett) - and rushed two of three with one to spy, and mixed it up."

The pressure from the pass rush clearly affected Zach Sipe, who had thrown for 102 yards in the first half. On the first series, he threw four incomplete passes. When the ball went over on downs, Tyler Treadway scored on Fulton's first play.

Sipe missed on his first nine passes in the quarter, when Fulton outscored Faustina 38-8 for a 61-28 halftime lead. Faustina's only score came on an interception return; its offense didn't score after the first quarter, even though four freshmen and a sophomore were rotating for playing time in Fulton's secondary.

Johnson said the defensive changes were in part a reaction to his Falcons' only loss, 72-64 at Greenville Christian School a week earlier. Fulton lost a 20-point third-quarter lead.

"We had four blown assignments against Greenville that led to three touchdowns. That was a wakeup call. It was humiliating."

There was no humiliation against Faustina. Fulton, which has scored at least 60 points in every game this year, reached a season high with its 73.

Also scoring were Leverett with two touchdowns and a 1-point

conversion run, Carson Newman with two TDs and Brenner a touchdown and 6 2-point conversion kicks.

Fulton is scheduled to return to Cain for a 7:30 p.m. game against Dallas The Covenant School's junior varsity. Six considers the Falcons, ranked fourth among TAPPS 6-7 22-point favorite. The Covenant's varsity is ranked first in 1.
