Rockwall offers Hazardous Waste Collection event April 18

The City of Rockwall will once again set up its collection site to assist residents with disposal of hazardous waste materials. The Saturday, April 18 Hazardous Waste Collection Day is open to residents of the City of Heath, City of Fate, City of Rockwall and Rockwall County residents.

Items will be accepted at the municipality's City Service Center between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. on April 18. The center is located at 1600 Airport Road.

City of Rockwall residents will need to show a current utility bill or driver's license for proof of residency.

City f Heath, City of Fate and Rockwall County residents will need a voucher to drop off materials. Vouchers may be obtained at the City of residence.

Enhanced signage and additional staff will be on hand this year to better assist local residents in disposing of their hazardous waste items. City officials also recommend that residents remember the site will be open until mid-afternoon, and that the lines tend to "decrease dramatically after lunch." Residents are advised to pack materials in the trunk of their car or in the bed of their truck. Trained volunteers will then unload the materials from vehicles.

Gates will be closed at 3 p.m. No late loads will be accepted.

Materials that will be accepted include household quantities of pesticides, paint products, household cleaners, herbicides, motor oil, automotive chemicals, swimming pool products, propane, medicines and prescription drugs and tires (no rims).

It is requested that materials be brought in their original containers

It is also requested that children are not brought to the collection site for safety purposes.

Examples of items that will not be accepted are commercial and industrial waste, radioactive waste material, PCBs and Dioxins, medical waste, compressed gas cylinders, Freon cylinders, household garbage, ammunition and explosives.

Last year, more than 61,000 pounds of paint and 38,000 pounds of other hazardous materials were accepted. Also accepted were more than 1,200 tires, 216 batteries and about 6.5 tons of outdated computer equipment.



Eddy throws one hitter while striking out 15, T-N delivers clutch hit, as Heath beats RC 3-0

Needing a Richardson Pearce victory over Rockwall as well a win over Royse City themselves to gain a tie for the District 10-4A lead, the Rockwall-Heath Lady Hawks did their part, shutting out the Lady Bulldogs 3-0, as they used Chelsey Eddy's dazzling 15-strikeout, one-hit effort and Taylor McLouglin's key two-run double April 14 at RHHS.

Pearce, not so much.

The Lady Mustangs got walloped 10-0 by the Lady Jackets, who all but sewed up the district championship, leaving the Lady Hawks all but assured of the runnerup spot in the standings with three district games remaining, all against second-tier teams.

Adding in their 21-0 shellacking of Newman Smith April 10, Heath stands 9-2 in the district and 21-7 overall. The Lady Bulldogs, who beat the Lady Hawks 2-0 earlier in the season, fell back to third place at 8-3,

Although both Rockwall and Rockwall-Heath entered their important 10-4A matchup April 10 riding seven-game winning streaks, the first-place Jackets would be starting one of their aces, once beaten Tim Parish, who sported an ERA of just 0.89.

The third-place Hawks, meanwhile, would counter with Drew Benefield, who normally does the catching for Heath, who was just returning from an injury and had thrown only five innings all year. Final:11-0, Hawks. In just six

innings. Say what?

While Parish (3-2) pitched credibly, surrendering only six hits while also striking out six, his defense completely self-destructed, committing six errors - four in the first inning alone - to hand the Hawks a 7-0 lead by the time he exited after five innings.

Benefield (1-0), meanwhile, threw, in a word, brilliantly, yielding a leadoff double in the bottom of the first and then retiring 15 batters in a row before giving up a two-out single in the last of the sixth to finish with a two-hitter.

He struck out four and walked just one while the Heath defense played errorless ball behind him, as the Hawks handed the Jackets their first district loss.

"This game was a another big win for the Heath baseball program," said Hawks' coach Greg Harvey. "Rockwall is a great team that is at the top of our district. At this point we are playing some good baseball in all phases of the game. Our hitters are confident, our defense is making the

plays, and our pitchers are throwing strikes and forcing opponents to hit the pitch we want them to

Apparently still on a roll after trouncing the Jackets, the Hawks got a three-hit, seven-strikeout performance from James Baune as they rallied past Newman Smith 3-1 for their ninth win in a row April 10 to move into a tie for second place in District 10-4A.

"We are kind of hitting our groove right now," Harvey said. "We are just clicking along, playing the game the way it should be played."

Heath is now 8-2 in district and 16-7 for the year. Smith, now also 8-2, fell to 15-5 for the season.

Down 1-0 against Smith, Heath tied the score on Trevor Holland's leadoff homerun and then went ahead for good when Charlie Martin singled, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt, stole third and came home on Benefield's sacrifice fly.

The Hawks added an insurance run in the fifth. Benefield unloaded a double and was replaced by courtesy runner Drew Baxter who moved to third on a long fly out and scored on a balk by the Smith

"James Baune pitched a heck of a game. He had complete command the whole game," said Harvey. Baune improved to 4-1 for the year.

Against the Jackets, The Hawks used Rockwall's four errors in

five batters and two hits, including Thomson's RBI-single, to take a 3-0 lead in the top of the first.

Rockwall's Travis Ballew led off the bottom of the first with a ringing double and moved to third on a past ball. But that was as far any Jacket runner would get.

In fact, other than a two-out, first inning walk, no other Rockwall player reached base until the Hawks were just one out away from a win in the bottom of the sixth when Jonny Blake singled up the middle.

"Drew Benefield pitched a great game," Harvey said. "I knew going into the game that he could handle the pressure because he is such a fierce competitor. He was in complete control the entire game. Big time players show up in big games. Benefield showed up and gave our team exactly what we needed."





Jackets return to district lead after loss

It didn't take Rockwall long to get over Friday night's baseball loss to Rockwall-Heath, which dropped the Yellowjackets into a tie for first place in District 10-4A.

The Jackets came back to the Campbell Complex the next afternoon to defeat Mesquite 7-3. On Tuesday, after beating Carrollton R.L. Turner 12-0, they went back into the lead alone because Rockwall-Heath knocked Carrollton Newman Smith out of its share of first place with a 3-1 victory.

With four games remaining in the district schedule, Rockwall (9-1 district, 20-3 overall) has a one-game lead over both R-H (8-2, 16-7) and Newman Smith (8-2, 15-5).

That sets up RHS' game Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at Carrollton's Kelley Field against Newman Smith, which could determine the district champion. Before that, Rockwall is scheduled to play Richardson Pearce (5-5, 9-10) at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the Campbell Complex.

"All the focus is on beating Pearce right now," said Jackets head coach Jeff Payne. "The guys are not looking past Pearce. Pearce won't be afraid of us at all."

The Hawks weren't at all intimidated by Rockwall on Friday either. Before they knew what hit them - which most often was their own misplays – the Jackets trailed 3-0. Then 6-0. And finally 11-0 in a game that ended after six innings because of the 10-run mercy rule.

Rockwall hadn't allowed more than seven runs or scored fewer than two (in a 2-0 home victory over Newman Smith March 30) in any of its first 20 games this season. The Jackets certainly hadn't committed six errors - or four in an inning, as they did in the first inning against Rockwall-Heath.

With one out, the Hawks' Matt Bielski hit a ground ball to RHS third baseman Steve Bean, who threw wildly to first base. Drew Benefield then hit a smash that Bean couldn't handle. Another error. That didn't seem to matter when Connor Lewis hit a ground ball to shortstop Michael Hatcher that seemed destined to become a double play. Instead, the ball went by Hatcher for an error and a run.

Jake Thompson singled to drive in the second run, then was safe at second base when Hatcher fielder Drew VerHagen's grounder and threw to second baseman Dakota Herrera, who missed the ball. Cody Sargent then singled with two out to make the score 3-0 against RHS pitcher Tim Parish.

The Jackets seemed ready to come back when Parish led off the bottom of the first inning with a double. But he and Travis Ballew, who walked with two out, were left on base when Quin Baker struck out to end the inning.

That was the first of 15 consecutive batters Benefield retired before allowing pinch hitter Jonny Blake's two-out single with two out in the sixth inning. Josh Steward then smashed the ball, but right at first baseman Thompson to end the game.

Payne said, "Benefield is a gamer and a winner. He will not pitch at the next level, but he's a kid that loves to compete and loves the pressure. We knew he'd be tough to score on." Rockwall-Heath managed 10 hits against Parish and Wesley Cox. But

what about the defense that committed all six errors in the first two innings to spot the Hawks a 6-0 lead? Payne said he had no explanation. "Nobody was nervous. Nobody was

unfocused. Just a bad game. It happens in baseball. We picked a bad time for it. Our defense is a big reason we are 20-3." The Jackets shook off the defeat to beat Mesquite (8-10 overall). The

offense provided eight hits, including doubles by Steward and Derrek Clinard, to support winning pitcher Kyle Turansky. And the defense committed only one error.

There followed 16 hits and only one error again Tuesday at Turner (0-10 in the district). The Jackets supported Cox, the winning pitcher in a three-hitter, by pounding nine extra-base hits - by nine different players. Blake had a triple, and Turansky, Steward, Parish, Hatcher, Ballew, Baker and Ian Zembower each hit a double. Cox also helped himself with a double.

Payne explained how Rockwall can defeat Newman Smith again. "Same as last time – keep their speed guys off base and put some pressure on their defense. They will be tough to beat next Tuesday for sure."

RC Lady Bulldogs clinch playoffs, fall to Lady Haw

Royse City will be in this year's softball playoffs, but not exactly where the Lady Bulldogs want to be.

On Tuesday, 11 days after Rockwall knocked RC out of a tie for first place in District 10-4A, Rockwall-Heath defeated the Lady Bulldogs 3-0 to drop them out of a second-place tie and into third.

At 8-3 in the district and 18-10-2 overall, Royse City has clinched a playoff berth and has a two-game lead over fourth-place Richardson Pearce with three district games remaining.

It seems likely that the Lady 'Dawgs would finish in third place, but in this case the line between second place and third could be important. 10-4A's third-place team would open the playoffs against the second-place team in District 9-4A. Currently tied for that district's lead are McKinney (22-7-1 overall and

ninth in the state 4A rankings) and Frisco Wakeland (24-5-2, including two wins and a tie against Royse City).

The second-place team in 10-4A would play 9-4A's third-place entry. In that position now is Frisco Centennial (13-15).

McKinney scouted its likely playoff opponent Tuesday.

The game turned out to be similar to the teams' meeting March 19 at Royse City. The pitchers were the same. The Hawks' Chelsey Eddy pitched a two-hitter, but one of those hits was Alicia Pille's two-run home run in the fifth inning. Pille pitched a five-hit shutout, and RC won 2-0.

Tuesday's game again was scoreless through four innings in what was shaping up as a strikeout fest. Eddy struck out the first eight Lady Bulldogs on the way to a 15-strikeout game. Pille's first five outs were strikeouts. She had 13 strikeouts.

Again, Rockwall-Heath had five hits. But Eddy held Royse City to one hit, Shelby Pille's line drive into left field leading off the fourth inning. RC threatened in the fifth. Julia Zielinski drew a leadoff walk on a 3-2 pitch, and went to third base with two out when Mallory Baumann

reached base on third baseman Dakota Whittern's thro Kourtney Kelly then popped out to Eddy to end the threat, Like the Lady Bulldogs in the first game, R-H broke the i runs in the bottom of the fifth.

Whittern and Hailey Galloway each singled and moved when Pille's third strike to Victoria Combs got past cate Heinaman. DeBona lights-out with two homers against Greenville

The power went out, delaying Royse City's home baseball game against Greenville for an hour and a half Tuesday.

The lights, which went out because a car hit a utility pole on FM35, came back on. But it was Wesley DeBona supplying the power.

Inserted into the lineup as the designated hitter, DeBona belted two home runs to lead the Bulldogs to their second 12-6 victory over Greenville this season.

"We hit the ball. We had 17 hits," said 'Dawgs head coach Clay Wolfe, who had shaken up the lineup to try to improve the offense. They had lost their three previous games – 12-2 to Bishop Lynch, 4-0 to Rockwall and 7-6 at Richardson Pearce.

Even against Pearce, RC's offense sputtered. After taking a 1-0 lead in the first inning on an unearned run, the Bulldogs (3-7 in the district, 8-13 overall) fell behind 5-1 and didn't have another hit until the fifth. Three hits then, including Dalton McAden's second double of the

night, produced two runs that cut the margin to 5-3, but the Mustangs (5-5, 9-11) built their lead to 7-3 entering the seventh inning.

Kevin Williams led off and reached base on an error. Scotty Arterberry then followed with a two-run homer, his first this season, to foreshadow the offensive explosion against Greenville.

Wolfe said, "Scotty came up big. That's something we hadn't had, for guys to step up and take charge."

With one out, a walk and singles by Scot Lane and pinch hitter DeBona cut the lead to one run, with Bulldogs at first and third bases. Wolfe then called a suicide squeeze, figuring Dillon Jones could bunt the ball and get Lane home with the winning run. But Jones missed, and Lane was trapped. He stayed in a rundown long enough for DeBona to reach third base, but Pearce relief pitcher Nolan Barbee struck out Jones to end the

"We've always been pretty good at it in the past," Wolfe said of the squeeze play. "That's probably the second time in three years that it hasn't worked. That's a pretty high-percentage play."

Against Greenville (1-9, 4-15), the Bulldogs reached a season high in hits. Included were DeBona's homers and five doubles - two by winning pitcher Richard Morrison, and one each by Lane, Dylan Funderburk and Cameron Nichols.

If Royse City is to make a late playoff push, that wouldn't be easy. The 'Dawgs will be at home for both of this week's games, but those will be against surging Rockwall-Heath (8-2, 16-7), which has its sights set on first place, and Highland Park (6-4, 17-10), currently in fourth place.

The first time through the division schedule, RC lost at Rockwall-Heath 10-0 and at HP 5-3

Wolfe said, "Heath on Friday will be tough. We don't expect to get as many hits against (Drew) Benefield as we did against Greenville. But at this point it comes down to what we do. If we're performing well, we have to keep performing well."

Taxation with Misrepresentation

It's tax season. Consider what that means. It's the time of year when you must account for yourself to the government. You must report every dime you earned last year, and if you believe any of it should be beyond the state's grasp, you'd better have the proof.

If the government withheld more of your money than (you think) the rules require, it is your burden to prove that. You then must submit the official paperwork by a certain time. If the authorities are not satisfied with what you submit, they will demand that you prove you've done it right. If you can't, you'll have to do it their way and pay more. Should you refuse to comply with any of these requirements - and a lot more no one understands - the government has the power to make your life hell and impose additional financial burdens. It can even imprison you.

And all in a country most people would swear is free.

Why we tolerate this outrage is one of the great mysteries of life. Our revolutionary forebears had a far lower tolerance for taxes than we have. Yes, there was the matter of not having representation in Parliament, but truthfully, does having a congressman and two senators really make such a big difference? They don't even read the bills.

What we have is taxation with misrepresentation.

A few people cling to the civics-book fairy tale that we are the government. Let's get real. Do you really feel as though you're paying taxes to yourself and your neighbors? If they threatened to jail you for not ponying up, you'd call the police. The system that extracts wealth from us is out of our control. Your single vote every two, four, and six years has little effect on the juggernaut.

Over the years the tax system has evolved to the monstrosity it is through countless political transactions, each of which was guided largely by politicians seeking continuation in power by pleasing special-interest constituencies. Little consideration was given to individual rights because there was no political payoff in it.

You and I have about as much control over the machinery of legal plunder as a colonial American had. At least the colonial knew he was a subject. Today, with the Treasury, Federal Reserve, and Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation without congressional authorization — subsidizing investors so they'll buy the banks' toxic assets, there is not even a democratic fig leaf. The Bush-Obama regime has given us a costly financial dictatorship that we and our children will pay for dearly.

These have been particularly rough times for the taxpayers, and they won't be easier for the next couple of generations. Bailouts to big financial companies and bogus stimulus spending will cost trillions of dollars. Even if explicit taxes are not raised to pay that bill - and to some extent they will be - wealth will be extracted from productive individuals nonetheless.

The government is borrowing a mind-numbing amount of money from the capital markets, while the Federal Reserve is setting records creating money from nothing in a process known as "monetizing the debt." This will eventually sock the common people with a triple whammy by 1) immediately transferring scarce capital from productive entrepreneurs to parasitic politicians, 2) misallocating other resources within the private sector, making the economy vulnerable to a new recession, and 3) eroding the purchasing power of the dollar. In other words, government debt affects us like taxation does, only less visibly.

In the tax season, we can all use a laugh, and the government has provided it. Every time the politicians approve a bailout, they promise to "protect the taxpayers." Some even say the taxpayers might profit off the toxic bank assets when the government resells them in a revived market later. Nonsense. Even in the unlikely event the assets appreciate sufficiently, it won't be the taxpayers who profit. It'll be the politicians. They will be the ones with more to spend. If you think they will cut taxes to offset that revenue, you are in for a surprise. We are not the government.

If the politicians were serious about protecting the taxpayers, they'd leave us the hell alone.

Budget Expands Government as Economy Contracts

Last week the House passed another budget that increases federal power, raises taxes, and increases the national debt. I voted against it, and was pleased to see that not a single Republican representative voted for it. Legislators often see bipartisanship as constructive, but I disagree especially where the destruction of our economy or our liberty is concerned. There has been too much bipartisan consensus on expanding government far beyond the bounds of the Constitution which we all swore to defend and uphold. Because of this, I have never been able to vote for a budget. However, it was good to see Republicans come together on this important vote, even if their alternative budget was almost as bad.

Despite the deterioration of our economy, this is the largest budget ever passed, at \$3.6 trillion. Gross domestic product and tax receipts are shrinking. The government has less money to spend this year, and so it spends more - \$1.5 trillion more-than it has. When the economy expands, the government expands. Worse, when the economy contracts, the government expands more. Even more troubling is that even though the size of the budget boggles the mind, it is never the final word on federal spending.

No allowance has been made for future bailouts and stimulus plans that are highly likely. There are always supplemental bills passed later in the year. War spending is one of those. Spending on Afghanistan is only partially included in budget, with a supplemental request expected in the future. History shows that true costs far exceed estimates. So even though these numbers sound appalling enough, I predict spending will top \$4 trillion this year, raising the

national debt by over \$2 trillion when all is said and done. Some may notice that the neo-conservatives who masterminded the policy

of global interventions are not complaining about the level of military and foreign spending. This is because rather than drawing down our costly interventions, Obama is largely staying the course


In fact, this week a group of leading neoconservatives met to discuss how best to support the President on foreign policy! I am disappointed and concerned that, in spite of a change in leadership, we will remain the policeman of the world, placing ourselves at grave danger in many ways.

As our mountain of debt is projected to double with the new budget, many are wondering how long our country can keep this up before serious repercussions are felt. Obviously we can't continue down this road indefinitely. Certainly, no country has ever prospered when their public sector spent half or all of the nation's GDP. Yet we are saddled with leadership that seems unwaveringly convinced

that the key to prosperity is public spending. This will be exposed for the lie that it is when our creditors wake up and call in our debt. The temptation at that time will be for the government to simply print up dollars in the amount needed. This type of debt repudiation could signal the end of the dollar as its value sinks to zero. We are seeing all the signs that this could happen. Certainly there are no signs of the alternative, which is paying down debt and taking

the path of fiscal responsibility. Tragically, it is those who save their dollars, the most prudent and responsible among us, that will be hurt most by this irresponsibility in Washington.

Vitational deception about government finances means today's children

will face a financial disaster that will make today's mess seem like a walk in the park. What's called the public debt stands at \$11 trillion and growing. That pales in comparison to the federal government's unfunded liability — obligations that are not covered by an asset of equal or greater value.

Mike Whalen, former policy chairman of the Dallas-based National Center for Policy Analysis, commenting on last year's Social Security Trustees annual report on the state of the Social Security and Medicare programs, said, "The report on the state of entitlement programs is rather grim — the combined unfunded liabilities of both programs are \$101 trillion." What that means is that in order for government to make good on its promises, Congress would have to put aside tens of trillions of dollars in the bank today. Keep in mind that our GDP is only \$14 trillion.

In the absence of massive tax increases or cuts in benefits, in order to meet its promises Congress must cease spending on one in four programs by 2020. such as education and highway construction, and one in two by 2030, and by 2050 or so all federal revenue will be spent supporting Social Security, Medicare and prescription drug benefits. Such a scenario is unsustainable. There will be economic and political chaos. Today's politicians are not likely to take measures to avoid the coming chaos because senior citizens, the major beneficiaries of Social Security and Medicare, vote in large numbers and will exact a high political price. Plus, neither today's senior citizens nor today's politicians will be alive in 2050. I'd be more optimistic if my fellow Americans were simply suffering from congressional deception as opposed to their not caring about the economic calamity that awaits tomorrow's Americans. I'd be even more optimistic if today's seniors started putting heat on Congress to allow those Americans who want nothing to do with Social Security to opt out.






