Lisa Constant appointed Rockwall County Auditor

Rockwall County is pleased to announce the appointment of Lisa Constant as Rockwall County Auditor. Constant is a graduate of the University of Texas at Arlington and brings almost nine years of experience in Rockwall County Government, including serving for the past one and one-half years as the elected County Clerk, and previously as an assistant auditor.

Pursuant to the Government Code, it is the legal duty of the District Judge to appoint an auditor for Rockwall County every two years. The current term of the previous auditor, John Blackwood, expired, completing twelve years of service. District Judge Hall said, "After careful evaluation and consideration, I have decided that this would be an appropriate time to make a new appointment in the office of auditor. During Mr. Blackwood's service, Rockwall County has experienced many developments, including the construction of a new library, passing of a bond issue for new roads, and planning for the construction of a new Justice Center. Mr. Blackwood's contribution to our county government is greatly appreciated and I wish him the best in the future."

Based on her experience, education, training, and proven ability to manage employees and interact well with all departments of government, I believe Lisa will be a great asset to Rockwall County in the position of auditor," Judge Hall said. "I am deeply honored and enthusiastic about the opportunity to serve as Rockwall County Auditor. I would not have

considered this position prior to the end of my term in office as County Clerk if I was not completely confident in my well-trained and capable staff at the Clerk's office to perform at the level that the citizens of the County expect. I would also like to thank the citizens and voters for their support. I look forward to working with county employees, elected officials and the public, and I will continue to make integrity, efficiency and service to my community my top priorities."

Pursuant to the Government Code, the duties of the County Clerk will be fulfilled by the Chief Deputy County Clerk until the position is filled by the election process. Constant's current term would have ended next December 31, 2010. The primary election for County Clerk is in March 2010, with the general election to be held in November 2010.

Rockwall County Citizens wishing to run for Rockwall County Clerk may file to become a candidate beginning on Thursday, Dec. 3 and ending on Monday, Jan. 4.

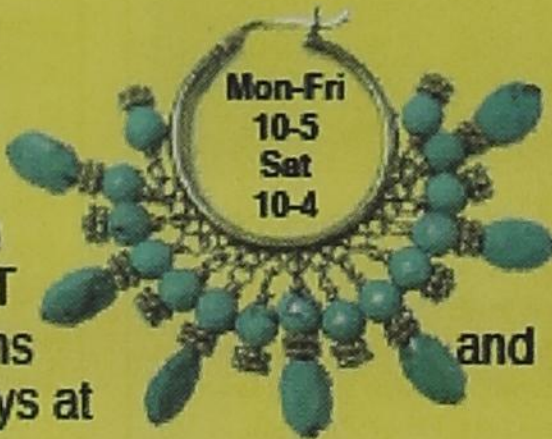

Clinic to teach safe horse handling for young riders

The Rockwall County Rockin' Riders 4-H Horse Club, in affiliation with the Bar S Arena in Royse City, is sponsoring an all day Youth Equestrian Clinic on Saturday, Nov. 7. This event, a continuation in the series, "Fundamentals of Horsemanship," will focus on horse handling with safety in mind and is tailored for all levels of riders.

Participants are limited to youth ages nine to 18 years old, who want to learn more about the basics, reinforce essential skills and gain greater confidence to create a more rewarding relationship with their horses. Topics to be covered include catching a horse in a stall or other place safely, no treats or feed needed; leading and controlling a horse - keeping the horse's attention on the handler. Teaching the horse not to crowd or pull; lunging a horse using a line and halter; how to keep horse and rider relaxed while preparing for a ride; how to saddle and bridle a horse. How to check tack for damage, fit and position; maintaining control while mounting; cue the horse to move as you like using reins and leg pressure, back, turn, forward; distribution of weight when riding to maintain seat in the saddle under most conditions; basic cues from training the horse with leg pressure and reins for general riding to cues used when we work cattle, side pass, etc.; what to do when the horse is out of control or refuses to respond as the rider desires.

A limited number of horses with minor behavioral problems will be accepted to use as examples.

Cost is \$40 per rider and \$20 for non-riders. Horses are available for rent for \$25. Negative Coggins required. Youth must have a parent/guardian on site at all times during the clinic. Bar S all day clinics start at 9 a.m. and conclude around 5 p.m.

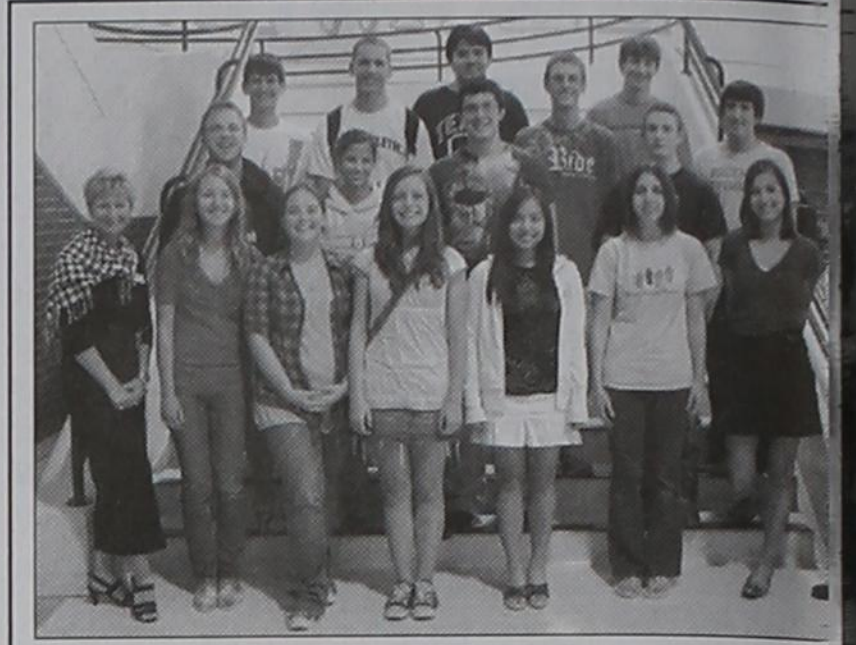

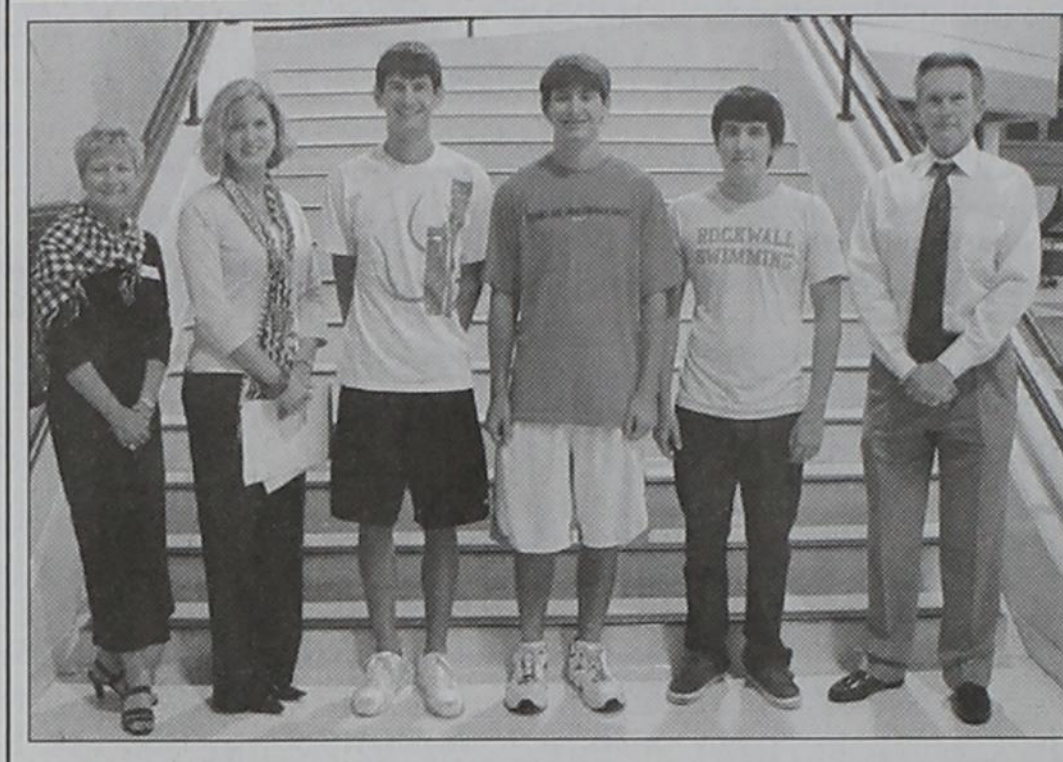

Locals 'locked up' for MDA fundraiser

Speak Up For Kids 5K Run planned

CASA volunteers monitor a child's well being in foster care, advocate for the child within the court system and help ensure that the child receives the services he or she needs.

In 2008, CASA volunteers advocated for more than 100 children.

The nonprofit program recruits community members from Kaufman and Rockwall counties to serve as volunteer advocates and board members. Funding and financial support comes from federal, state and county grants, local organizations and donors and fundraisers.

The 5K run/walk will include a special Kids Fun Run, as well as activities such as Blue Cross and Blue Shield Blue Bear and mobile unit; informational booths on CASA and child abuse, fitness and health, WIC, foster care and police; children's face painting; clowns; bounce houses; local vendors; and EMS.

All registered participants will receive a T-shirt, race packet and refreshments.

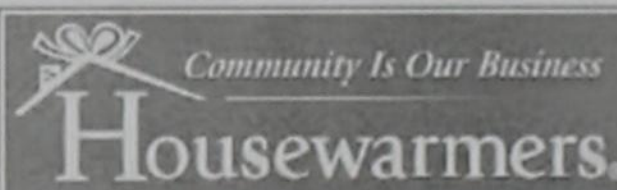

Heath Hawks hope to shake off tough loss when they host RC Bulldogs for homecoming

In a battle of two teams hoping to rebound after disappointing losses to teams that they likely could have beaten, Rockwall-Heath will host the Royle City Bulldogs tonight in the Hawks' homecoming game at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.

But while the Hawks, 2-1 in District 10-4A and 4-2 overall, will look to stay in the thick of the district race, the Bulldogs (0-3, 0-6) will be looking simply to get in the win column for the first time this season.

The defending district champion Hawks lost their first 10-4A game under second-year coach Mickey Moss, 28-14, to Newman Smith last Friday.

Moss, who directed the Hawks to the regional semifinals and a 13-1 record last season, is an eye-popping 17-3 since taking over for Tam Hollingshead.

While Heath's normally potent offense was stymied by the Trojans' defense most of the game, it was a pair of special team mistakes that proved at least as troublesome: a Smith kick off return for a TD and fumbled kickoff return of their own that led to a short drive for another Trojan score.

The Bulldogs, meanwhile, failed to take advantage of another struggling team, as they jumped out to an early lead against Greenville, but couldn't hold on, falling 45-28 to the Lions.

Greenville (1-2, 4-2) opened the season with three straight wins, but had been outscored 97-24 in one-sided losses to Heath and district leader Highland Park (3-0, 5-1) prior to its game with RC.

Currently in a four-way tie for second place with Smith, Rockwall and Richardson Pearce, the Hawks can be part of a two-way tie for the second playoff berth with a win, since Rockwall travels to Pearce to face the Mustangs tonight.

Heath, which won last year's game with RC 42-28, is led by running back Dorian Lawry, The sophomore has rushed for 645 yards and scored 11 touchdowns, including a career-best 227 yards and five TDs in a 55-38 win over Rockwall.

He had just 61 yards and one score against Smith.

Quarterback Kevin Rodgers has passes for 1,308 yards and seven touchdowns with four interceptions, including two against Smith.

Senior wide receiver Ryan Peterson has caught a team-high 22 passes for a team-leading 360 yards and three touchdowns. Cameron Wilson has 20 receptions for 285 yards and three TDs, while Clark Pope has 16 catches for 233 yards.

For the Bulldogs, multi-pur-

pose player Ryan Fedric has 404 rushing yards and 152 receiving yards with seven touchdowns.

QB Taylor Corbin has completed 96 of 163 passes for 986 yards and six scores but has been intercepted 11 times. He has rushed for 150 yards, third on the team behind Fedric and Lewis Mapps, who has run for 296 yards.

Kristopher Smith leads the Bulldogs receivers with 26 catches for 327 yards and three touchdowns.

Senior David Tanner leads Heath's defense with 57 stops and eight sacks in six games, and now has gotten to the opposing QB 18 times in the last two seasons. Deep back Dru Mayfield has 51 tackles while Justin Powers has 50 stops.

For RC, Ryon Phillips averages 8.0 tackles a game, followed by Ryan Perry (7.3) and Jr. Arredondo (7.8).

Heath, which scores at the rate of 29 points a game, averages 427 yards a game in total offense, ninth-best in the DFW area, while the Bulldogs average 334 total yards and 18.7 points a game.

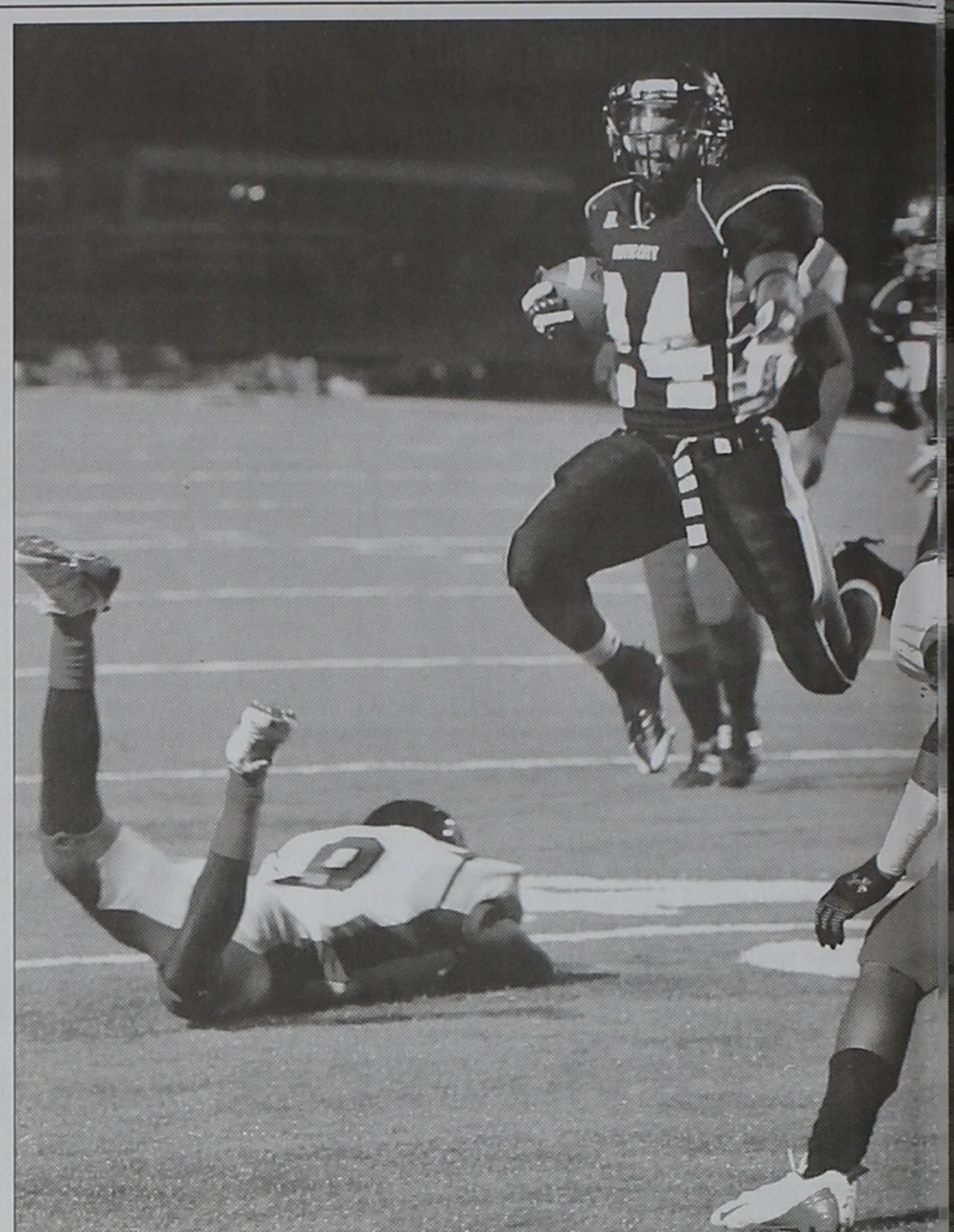

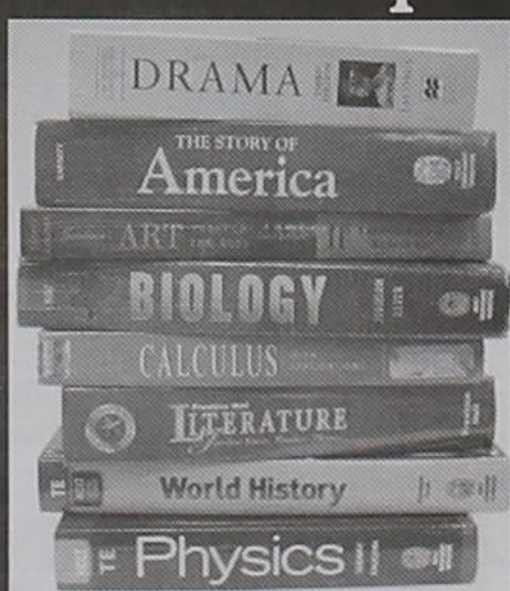

Lady Jackets sweep Greenville, Pearce No. 1 Pearce Friday

The volleyball team warmed up for Friday's match against Pearce, ranked No. 1 in the Texas 4A poll, by sweeping them from visiting Greenville.

The Lady Jackets, ranked 13th by the Texas Girls Coaches poll, started slowly but rallied from a 14-11 deficit to take the game 25-19. Finally free of the H1N1 flu virus that swept the team, RHS trailed only briefly in the second and third sets, winning 25-20 and 25-13.

Brindock's leadership showed in Tuesday's first game. Greenville's last lead was at 16-15. RHS tied the game on a side out, then Brindock served three consecutive points, with sophomore Ashton Atwell providing the last two of those with a block and a kill. Brindock's kill ended that game.

In the second game, Brenna Mason served five consecutive points, including an ace, to put Rockwall ahead 6-1. The Lady Jackets held that lead in part because of Brindock's three kills and an assist on Meredith Marlett's kill.

The Lady Lions led the third game for the last time at 8-7. Liz Lee then served five points, and Loren Kelly had a run of six as Rockwall scored 19 of the final 24 points. Lee also provided two points on blocks in that game.

The victory improved Rockwall's District 10-4A record to 7-3, good for third place with four matches remaining behind Pearce (10-0) and Highland Park (8-2).

Returning to Pearce's team this year are most of the players who took the Lady Mustangs to the state semifinals last season.

Wilson knows he can expect a tough match at home Friday (6:30 p.m.) against Pearce. He said, "There's a difference between poor blocking and doing it right. If you don't (block correctly) against Pearce, you might as well not jump."

Jesus Instructs His Disciples

After Jesus Christ built up the believing of his disciples, they were very glad in heart and no longer feared the Jewish leaders. We know this because according to John 21:1-3 many of them were out fishing. There is only one explanation for their boost of confidence and lack of fear. They no longer doubted that Jesus the Christ was alive. After the first two visits with our Lord Jesus, they could walk out of that room with the confidence to face any possible confrontation from the Jewish leadership.

Just imagine the happiness in their hearts when they saw and touched our Lord Jesus. They must have been in awe over the whole experience as Peter said, "Don't know about y'all, but I'm going fishing!" So he and other disciples got in some boats and hit the lake. They were on the lake all night and didn't catch a thing. Next morning they saw a man standing on the shore who said, "Children, do you have any food?" And they answered, "No." The man then told them to cast the net on the right side of the ship and they would find fish. Having done as the man instructed, they caught so much fish the net was too heavy to draw up into the boat.

It was at that time that one of the disciples told Peter the man was Jesus our Lord. In hearing this, Peter threw on his clothes and jumped in the water. The other disciples used the different boats to simultaneously drag in the net, and upon landing ashore they found Jesus with fish on a fire along with bread. He told them to bring their fish. Peter and the others drew the net up with nearly 153 fish and the net did not break. Jesus then invited them to dine with him and nobody dared to ask who he was because they all knew. This was the third time Jesus showed himself to the disciples since his resurrection (John 21:4-14).

When they dined, Jesus asked Peter three very important questions that were designed to grab his attention. In each question he asked, "Do you love me more than the others?" Each time Peter emphatically answered "yes." On the first question Jesus followed up with, "Feed my lambs." On the second he said, "Feed my sheep." And on the third he said, "Feed my sheep." This can be found in John 21:15-17. A study of the earlier Greek words for feed, lambs and sheep helps to understand it better.

The first question uses the Greek word bosko for feed, which meant to feed and pasture. It was related to the word lambs, which came from the word poimaino meaning to tend, shepherd and nourish, and was related to sheep (probaton in the Greek). The third time, the word feed comes from bosko again, and is related to sheep, which is also probaton. With the use of Young's Concordance to the King James Bible, a word study of these Greek words as used in other areas will help to understand what Jesus was saying to Peter. I have heard it taught that Jesus told Peter to provide good pasture for growth to the younger believers, and to feed and nourish the elders.

Please note also that Jesus did not say, "Feed your lambs..." Instead he said, "Feed my lambs..." So often we tend to think God gives his people to ministers and pastors. But in truth God gives them to our Lord Jesus. The pastors' responsibilities are to provide good ground so the younger ones can graze on the truth and grow, and to nourish the elder believers. This is done on behalf of our Lord Jesus, as servants of God.

Smith 'Smitty' Hargrove

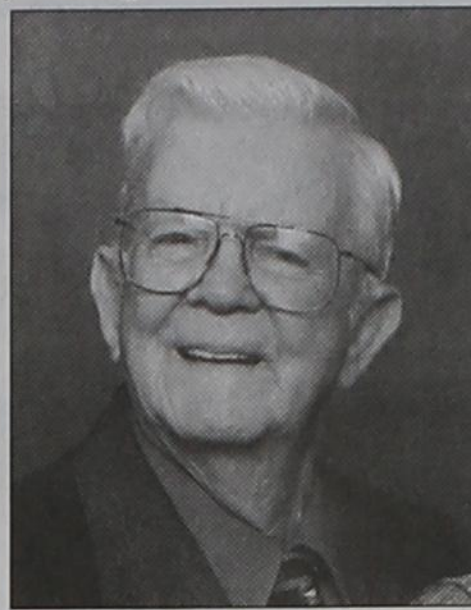

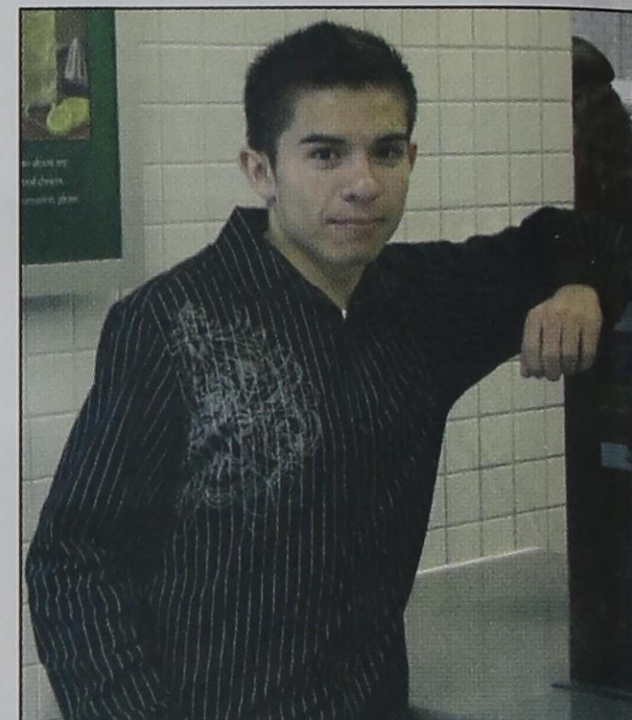
Carlos Campos earns Chick-fil-A Leadership Scholarship
