Local officials poised for upcoming elections with adjusted timeline

Candidate packets now are available for the Rockwall Independent School District school board election, RISD officials announced Jan. 3.

Three RISD places are up for election, as are three places on Rockwall City Council.

In the RISD Board of Trustees election set for May 12, three places are up for election: Place 1, presently held by Chris Cuny; Place 2, presently held by Russ Childers; and Place 3, presently held by Craig Zurek.

Candidates may file for a place on the ballot beginning Feb. 6 at the Administration/Education Center. The deadline to file is 5 p.m. March 5.

RISD Board of Trustees candidate application packets may be obtained during regular business hours (Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. – 4:30 p.m., and Friday from 8 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.) in the superintendent's office at the Rockwall Independent School District Administration/ Education Center, 1050 Williams Street, Rockwall.

Rockwall City Secretary Kristy Ashberry reports that Councilman Mark Russo is eligible to run for re-election, but Cliff Sevier and Margo Nielsen are "termed out" according to the city charter.

While city elections will not occur until May, Rockwall County has received a number of applications for the primary elections.

Some citizens continue to express anxiety about voter registration cards that expired Dec. 31, but Rockwall County elections administrator Glenda Denton reminds the public that redistricting lawsuits across the state have had a major effect on the regular timeline.

A Dec. 16 Federal Court Order provided a new deadline to send out voter registration certificates -- on or before Feb. 13. The deadline to change county election precinct lines has been moved to Jan. 31. The new filing deadline for primary candidates, independent candidates and minor party candidates is now 6 p.m. Feb. 1. Filing was permitted to continue under the previous court order through Dec. 19, said a memo from the interim director of elections, State of Texas. The 2012 primary election dates are scheduled for April 3, with a runoff election date of June 5.

Denton reported that so far no Democratic candidates have filed for the primaries.

"There will be another filing period that will start sometime in January, and will end on Feb. 1," said Denton. "I will not know the re-opening date until the federal redistricting case has been settled."



"Our schedule is to have the frontage roads complete by the end of February, 2012, with the westbound frontage road most likely finishing first. The eastbound main lanes of I-30 are under construction now and will most likely be fully open very close to the completion of the entire project in early summer.'

All of the direct connection ramps that make up the interchange are open allowing the traffic to flow from the Eastern Extension to the I-30 main lanes, said Releford.

From TxDOT's perspective, she said, it is too soon to tell what kind of an impact the new routes have had on traffic flow to I-30 and Hwy. 66, but commuters commenting on Twitter have reported having as much as 20 minutes shaved from their travel time between Rockwall or Rockwall and southern Metroplex suburbs.

The last phase involves cleanup work and establishing some vegetation on the right of way area.

"The public may still see cones and barrels here and there until all of the punch list items are complete and the job is released," said Releford, "but for all practical purposes, the job will be called complete in early summer."

As the projects near completion, TxDOT will continue to notify commuters in advance of lane closures with portable message signs, bulletins posted on txdot.gov or dfwtraffic.org or through Twitter at twitter. com/txdotdallaspio.

BABY TEETH, ADULT CONCERNS

In this age of fluoridated water and toothpastes, it may seem that cavities are on the decline among young children. 

Frustrated with **Immigrants?** Just Wait until They Leave

The enforcement of laws against illegal immigrants remains a bone of contention between states and the federal government (and on the GOP presidential campaign trail), and the U.S. Supreme Court has now agreed to weigh in on the issue. There is, however, an irony to this battle that appears to be lost on deportation proponents: many people are already leaving voluntarily or choosing not to come.

That's right, for the first time in sixty years, net illegal migration from Mexico has gone to zero; it may even have tipped into the negatives. Approximately six out of ten illegal immigrants in the United States originate from Mexico, but in just the past three years apprehensions along the southern border have fallen by 53 percent. In fact, the Pew Hispanic Center puts the current number of illegal immigrants at 11.2 million, down from a peak of 12 million in 2007.

A further testament to the reversal is that the demographics of illegal residents are changing. Just 15 percent of today's illegal residents arrived within the last 5 years, for example; it was 32 percent in 2000.

And it's not only illegal immigrants eyeing distant lands. The Census Bureau's net international-migration measure has been trending downward since 2000 (PDF, p. 17). Even if the accuracy of that data may be questionable, anecdotes abound of immigrant communities packing up shop and heading home. The Atlantic magazine went so far as to call this trend "The End of Chinatown."

As fewer immigrants come, legal or otherwise, and more return home, two grains of truth become apparent for those willing to observe. First, immigration is not the cause of America's problems, so its reversal will do nothing to restore economic prosperity or individual liberty. Second, America is no longer the shining city on a hill that many people revere. It is becoming less free and prosperous at an alarming rate, and the changing immigration flows reflect that.

Fears about immigrants

One leading fear regarding immigrants is that they tend to replace domestic workers. This, of course, assumes individuals born in a certain location or holding certain government-granted privileges are more valuable than other individuals. However, if we put aside the nativism, a recent incident in Asheville, North Carolina, shows that this fear is unfounded.

To comply with the E-Verify program and avoid legal charges, a wholesaler of flowers fired more than 60 illegal immigrants in 2009. Two years later, despite 8 percent unemployment in the county and higher than 10 percent unemployment in the state, the owner has been unable to find replacements. "Those who want to work fail to pass E-Verify, and those that pass fail to work," he explained.

The work ethic of these immigrants, and their willingness to accept menial labor rather than pursue welfare (PDF, p. 5), puts many native-born

Okay, but perhaps their departure will require employers to pay better wages to attract locals. That does make some economic sense, but as the warehouse owner points out, "Without comprehensive immigration reform, [verification requirements are] going to kill agriculture." In other words, some ventures are simply not viable at a higher cost of labor.

And, as Bryan Caplan of George Mason University has noted, "Immigration has little or no effect on overall wages. Educated Americans are primarily customers, not competitors, of new arrivals." So pushing foreigners out in the hopes of increasing the employment of native-born Americans is a fool's

What about crime then - shouldn't that be subsiding as the number of immigrants decreases? Perhaps this will be surprising to some, but evidence suggests that immigrants commit fewer crimes than native-born Americans. Even the Center for Immigration Studies, which actively seeks to reduce immigration into the United States, admitted that they "found no strong evidence one way or the other for the notion that immigrants commit either more or less crime than the American population."

Why is immigration falling?

The sad part of this story is that people are leaving (or not coming in the first place) because the American dream is on the way out. Migration follows economic freedom, and the United States is no longer the freest nation on earth - far from it. In fact, according to the Fraser Institute ranking, the United States has less economic freedom than Canada and the United Kingdom; and it fell four places, from the sixth to the tenth position, in the latest ranking (based on 2009 data; PDF).

"Much of this decline is a result of higher spending and borrowing on the part of the U.S. government, and lower scores for legal structure and property rights," the release notes. Of course the many trillions of official debts and unfunded liabilities are hardly enticing to would-be immigrants or Americans. Who would want to be stuck with that tab?

This last year, more than 120 volunteers joined ether to develop the first stages of a five-year strategic plan for the county. guidance given to them was simple: Develop a Strategic Plan that lays specific objectives of what you, the citizen, want our county to look like

Pretty simple instructions, you might say, but just the simple logistics getting that many people focused on a cohesive plan was challenging. d it was accomplished; organized, directed, published and briefed to the mmissioners Court by volunteers, where it was then accepted as the start he Rockwall County Strategic Plan going forward.

Because of the census every 10 years, the county must go through istricting of our political boundaries just like the state does. Third, and very important, is finances. No one wants taxes raised, and no e wants their entitlements reduced or taken away. And that's the major bblem facing all governments today. The county is no different, but intense cus has resulted in good results.

The county budget this year (fiscal year 2012) is a balanced budget with tax increases. It was not easy to accomplish. For the first time, the county d a RIF (involuntary reduction in workforce); leases on buildings were minated; several buildings owned by the county were vacated and put

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up for sale; capital expenditures for vehicles, office equipment, etc., were significantly reduced; a small COLA of 1.5 percent was allowed for nonelected officials, but no other raises for employees; most departments took a 5 percent reduction in their operating expenses; and several additions needed within the county structure were not added. That was on the operating side of the budget.

On the capital side, we pulled about \$5 million from our reserve fund to complete our obligation for the new courthouse. This payment was authorized back in December of 2009 and completes the \$7.2 million that was added to the \$30 million tax note action to fully fund the completion of the new courthouse. The courthouse was completed on time and in the budget approved in 2009 of \$37.2 million. Our unaudited reserve fund now has a balance of about \$14.5 million. Our stated financial policy on this fund, and the one communicated to all bond agencies, is to have four to six months of operating cash in the reserve fund. We currently have significantly more in the fund than required by our rating agency policy.

As you have probably observed, we are also moving forward on building the roads our citizens approved in the 2004 and the 2008 bond elections The John King overpass and FM 740 north in Heath are both in the middle of construction. Approval has been obtained from the state, and they are obligating the money to go along with county money, for the construction of the Erby-Campbell overpass in Royse City, the FM 551 overpass in Fate, the FM 3549 overpass between Fate and Rockwall and the FM 740 South road completion in Heath. These road construction projects, while annoying when you have to wait for traffic while they are working on the roads, are the key to the continued expansion of our county and they have the highest priority of the Commissioners Court.

Finally, attitude of the court. As mandated by the Texas Constitution, each county in Texas has a commissioner court made up of four commissioners and one county judge. This group is the policy-making organization for each county and the developer of the annual budget. The group is very limited by state statute in terms of what they can do. (My personal frustration with the county system of government as dictated by the state is that it is inefficient, no one is in charge measured and held accountable, and everyone is always telling you what you can't do rather than how to make something work.)


Some courts are effective; others are dysfunctional and accomplish little other than making the newspapers in a non-flattering way. Our court in Rockwall County has several advantages over many: All the members are conservative, all are from the same political party, and all have the best interests of the county. That is not to say the court is always in agreement; in fact quite often members of the court are at opposite ends of an issue when it is first raised. Civil debate and discussion, however, focuses the issue and acceptable solutions are most often reached. It takes three votes on the court for an issue to be passed; it takes five votes for something to really be

Do the citizens always agree with the decisions of the court? Absolutely not. Do a majority agree? In most cases, yes. Has the court made errors? Yes. Has the court made major errors this last year? No. This court is an effective court; it is working to become an excellent court.

Your help is needed as we go forward. Our county government is not mired in the mess of endless political battles that reach no conclusion, does nothing for our citizens, or continues to drive us deeper and deeper into debt without addressing and fixing the problems facing its citizens. Tell us what you want; get involved; become a volunteer; let us know your expertise and where you would like to volunteer; talk to your elected officials and grade them on how well they meet the citizen's needs; and finally, don't give up on us or America. Concerned and involved citizens can help lead the way


